

LADY ELI TO BE OFFERED AT KEENELAND NOVEMBER

Five-time Grade I-winning multi-millionaire and Breeders' Cup champion **Lady Eli** (Divine Park--Sacre Coeur, by Saint Ballado) will be offered for sale by Hill 'n' Dale Farms in their Keeneland November Breeding Stock consignment later this year.

"All of us in every aspect of the game live to be around the best horses and this is an extremely rewarding experience to be able to consign a horse of her caliber," said Hill 'n' Dale President John G. Sikura. "It's an honor to have her in our consignment. Horses like her really become public property with such a fan following and we appreciate the opportunity to offer her to elite breeders from all over the world. We hope her broodmare career will be as spectacular as what she's done at the racetrack. She is class personified and the best of the best. I hope she can win another Breeders' Cup, as well as the Eclipse Award she richly deserves."

A \$160,000 Keeneland September yearling and \$160,000 Keeneland April 2-year-old, Lady Eli broke her maiden first time out at Saratoga and capped off an undefeated juvenile season with an impressive victory in the GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies Turf where she defeated four Grade I performers and was later named an Eclipse finalist.

EQUESTRICON CLOSING AS A BIG SUCCESS

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y.--One thing that I think all racing fans can agree on is that racing fans are complainers. It's in our nature, and most of it comes from a good place--being defensive about a niche sport struggling to survive in many areas and thus wanting it to be portrayed in the best possible light at all times. But the constant navel-gazing micro-criticism can get tiring and often becomes counterproductive, bogging down the industry in petty squabbles instead of tackling larger issues.

That's why it was so refreshing to go to Equestricon, the first all-encompassing horse racing convention, and experience nearly 100% optimism and enthusiasm. That isn't to say there weren't disagreements and grievances aired--quite the opposite. But everything was constructive, and the frequent spirited debates had a distinct undertone of empowerment.

At three, Lady Eli defeated top fillies Miss Temple City (Temple City) and Sunset Glow (Exchange Rate) in the GIII Appalachian S. at Keeneland and added an authoritative victory over an international field in the GI Belmont Oaks Invitational by 2 3/4 widening lengths before contracting, and--ultimately--overcoming a much publicized battle with laminitis.

“She had that willingness to overcome, but to get back to that highest level is really something else,” Sikura said. “Maybe she’s the best now that she’s ever been and full credit is owed to the owners and to trainer Chad Brown for doing such a great job with her. With gratitude we’re offering her to the public. We’re proud of what we’ve accomplished in the ring, but I know we’ve never had the privilege of offering a mare with this kind of resume. Turf horses

are an international currency and she’s an elite performer on the surface most covet. I don’t see a deficit.”

Lady Eli established herself as one of the favorites for the 2016 GI Breeders’ Cup Filly and Mare Turf, returning to the winner’s circle with an impressive victory in the GI Flower Bowl S. at Belmont, but was nosed out in the final jump at Santa Anita. Kept in training for a 5-year-old campaign, Lady Eli dropped a narrow decision in her seasonal return in Keeneland’s GI Jenny Wiley S., but has since bounced back to win the GI Gamely S. (video) while forced to race atypically handy to the pace, and Saratoga’s GI Diana S. (video). First or second in all 12 of her career starts, Lady Eli has amassed earnings of \$2,719,800 and is pointing for a return to the Filly and Mare Turf.

"We have been incredibly fortunate to be a part of the story of Lady Eli. She has given us, our friends, and our families the thrill of a lifetime through her five Grade I wins," said partners Sol Kumin and Jay Hanley in a statement. "However, the true joy of owning Lady Eli has been witnessing her impact on the multitude of industry members, racing fans and general public. She has inspired the masses through her enormous heart and determination to persevere in the face of adversity. She is a racing icon and an ambassador for this sport that cannot be replicated. We thank all those that worked so hard to raise, nurture and heal her over her lengthy career. She is truly the horse of a lifetime."

When asked by the *TDN* what went into the decision to sell Lady Eli rather than breed her themselves, Kumin and Hanley said, "The decision to sell Lady Eli rather than breed her was, as one might imagine, an impossible decision. The answer is not because we don't love her. The answer is not because we don't stand in awe of her accomplishments on and off the track. We pinch ourselves every day for being the lucky stewards for this wonderful mare throughout her racing career. The answer is, quite simply, that at this point our primary intention in the Thoroughbred industry is to race, not to breed. Breeding a mare of this magnitude and one this historically significant is an entirely different endeavor, and one that we are not currently prepared to undertake."

A half-sister to MGSW Bizzy Caroline (Afleet Alex), Lady Eli is out of a winning half-sister to GSW Jacodra's Devil (Devil's Bag) and hails from the female family of Grade II-winning juvenile filly Changing Ways (Time For a Change), GI Kentucky Derby runner-up Tejano Run (Tejano) and MG1SW Alwuhush.

"The brilliant Lady Eli has a strong connection to Keeneland, where she sold twice," said Keeneland Vice President of Racing and Sales Bob Elliston. "It's an honor for Keeneland to have the opportunity to feature her at our upcoming November Breeding Stock Sale."

"I think she's one of the all-time great turf mares," added trainer Chad Brown.

Added Sikura, "She's a great physical, a big beautiful mare. She has as much versatility as you can expect in an elite performer. To race at a top level for four years is almost unheard of."

We were all here because we loved and were knowledgeable about horse racing, and the ethos of Equestricon was to make clear that we all could do things, both individually and collectively, to improve and grow horse racing. That everyone here was a stakeholder in the game, there are way more of us than we sometimes think and, especially for us younger attendees, that the future of racing is in our hands.

One thing that struck me about the event and the seriousness of its participants was seeing featured speakers in panel discussions and then turning around and seeing them again in the audience of the next panel, asking questions and engaging. There were very few, if any speakers who did their hour or so and left. That set a great example and conveyed to attendees that no one was here just to hustle speaking fees or increase their brand. They're all participating because they feel empowered to make the changes they see as necessary in the industry.

Nick Luck rang in Day Two of Equestricon with his "Racing Keynote" address in the main hall of the Saratoga Springs City Center. Fresh off of helming the innovative and well-received American coverage of Royal Ascot for NBC Sports Network this June, Luck called upon much of that experience to talk, as he has before, about how the U.S. racing industry should feel more pride in its product on the world stage.

"The United States lacks the confidence of a world leader in racing because the perception is that other nations don't necessarily like what they see here," he said. "They don't like the medication, they don't like the facilities, they don't like dirt racing. I love dirt racing. It stretches the equine athlete to the maximum. It's a reward for both class and courage."

Luck added that one of the things making Royal Ascot gain in popularity is the ever-increasing American participation in the five-day boutique meet, thanking U.S. trainers for sending more horses over.

"They're not doing it for the money, they're doing it for the love of the sport and they are proving that American horses can excel on global stage, on any surface, without the benefit of raceday medication," he said.

Medication, specifically Lasix, got a lot of play throughout the day, but not in the way you may be used to. There was unanimity that the drug is a net positive for horse health, but a larger point was continually made that racing's constant obsession with fighting over this topic overshadows more significant challenges the industry would be better served focusing on.

Adam Driver, veterinarian and managing director of Global Equine Group, explained the Lasix issue in great detail during the International Perspectives on Racing panel presented by the Breeders' Cup, even getting up several times to draw crude designs of the anatomy of a horse's lungs and breathing system.

"Lasix is misunderstood," Driver said. "It's the only effective treatment for bleeders. People think it's masking symptoms that could lead to catastrophic events and there's no evidence of that. It affects a very specific part of the lung, is pretty safe and helps horses run to their top ability."

Driver manages the career of Fanciful Angel (Ire) (Dark Angel {Ire}), who ran second at over 70-1 in Saturday's GI Arlington Million and whose owners were among many in attendance for the panel.

"In England, you can train on Lasix, but you can't run on it, and it hinders horses performing up to their ability," he said. "Fanciful Angel is a low-level bleeder and his data was telling us that he could compete at a Grade I level. We went to Arlington because they allowed Lasix and it gave us that opportunity to see him perform at his top level."

Driver concluded by saying that 80% of horses bleed and that, "If you want to breed fast horses, they're going to have this problem. Help them."

Pat Cummings, Executive Manager of Public Affairs for the Hong Kong Jockey Club, moderated the panel and spoke about the transparency in racing there, displaying slides that showed the HKJC website giving bettors information that is routinely hidden from the American betting public, like surgery and rehab reports when a horse is starting off of a layoff. He noted that bettors in Hong Kong reward them with over \$18 million in handle per race and attendance over 20,000 per race day, and also said that the HKJC gives all of its revenue after operating costs to charity, donating over \$500 million last year to become the sixth-largest charity organization in the world.

Each member on the panel was asked to give an example of something American racing does well and something it could improve on. All were in agreement that the accessibility of the people behind the horses in America is second to none.

"I went up to Robby Albarado after [Not This Time] lost by a neck in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile and asked for an interview," Luck relayed. "He said, 'let me talk to the owner first,' and the owner said, 'no, you go talk to your fans first.' That would never happen in England."

As for what America could do better, topics like better education and regulation on whip usage, simplifying condition books and stopping races from running on top of each other were raised.

I also sat in on Perspectives: Women in Racing presented by the Thoroughbred Women's Network, which was an illuminating look at the array of challenges young women face in the business, including systemic sexual harassment.

"There's no other corporate industry in the world where you expect to be harassed if you're a woman," said Eclipse-award winner racing writer Natalie Voss. "If I'm not wearing my credential on the backstretch, it's a guarantee I get catcalled. You have to be pretty comfortable in your work environment to think that would be tolerated. There's this underlying buzz that, 'yeah, that's OK and accepted.'"

Carleigh Fedorka, former farm manager and currently working on a Ph.D in Veterinary Sciences, told a story of hiring an enthusiastic 19-year-old girl to walk a yearling down from Barn 43 at Keeneland at the top of a hill to the sales ring, and watching her enthusiasm completely fade after the harassment she experienced on that walk.

"We lost a fan that day," Fedorka said. "We kill one fan at a time the more we let those residual things go."

Fedorka argued that women could also help the industry's potential immigration crisis as they are more willing than men to take the low-paying horsewoman work than men, who tend to want more managerial positions. The panel then touched on issues like maternity leave and the way in which racing sometimes markets women as "ornamental," as writer Teresa Genaro put it.

Again though, there was an underlying feeling of empowerment, as solutions were discussed at length on how to combat these problems, with the Thoroughbred Women's Network emerging as a tool for fighting institutional sexism in racing.

There was also an immensely fun racecaller panel with Tom Durkin, Larry Collmus, Dave Rodman and Travis Stone, narrated by radio host Steve Byk, that delved into the mindset and preparation that goes into becoming the voices of our sport. Durkin, possibly the funniest person in the industry, was the star, but all four men were great and helped the audience relive

some of their favorite racing moments, as each caller picked one race to show and tell their story about the call. I personally got goosebumps from re-watching Afleet Alex's Preakness win (Rodman's choice) and American Pharoah's Triple Crown win for Collmus, and the anecdotes behind each moment were terrific.

Equestricon concluded with a town hall event narrated by Matt Carothers of TVG featuring ARCI president Ed Martin, BetfairUS/TVG CEO Kip Levin, Fasig-Tipton president Boyd Browning, Jr., Breeders' Cup executive Peter Rotondo and Sagamore Racing president Hunter Rankin. All five had



interesting insights to share, but Martin and Browning each had quotes that helped to crystallize the feeling of the entire convention.

"People who love horses and horse racing have an individual responsibility to promote it," Martin said. "Social media is perfect for that. We have to blame

ourselves if the sport's not growing the way we want it to."

Browning recalled that when he first got the email asking him to participate in Equestricon, he sighed and said, "Oh great, I have to stay another day in Saratoga when all I'll want to do is go home." Then, after walking into the main hall of the convention Monday, he thought to himself, "You knucklehead. These are people giving their time and energy into something we all love and you're whining about staying another day in Saratoga."

As a racing fan, I'm predisposed to being cynical, and the negativity loop in the sport makes its flaws and shortcomings stand out more than its successes. I would have no problem criticizing Equestricon if it didn't hit the mark, but I'm relaying and amplifying what pretty much every attendee will tell you about their experience: it was exactly the kind of thing horse racing needs. A huge gathering of enthusiastic fans of this incredible sport bandying about ideas and putting their minds together to say that yes, racing has its issues, but they are fixable, and we clearly have the energy and motivation to do it. Many of us can feel isolated in regular life, having few friends who follow the sport and not seeing it covered the way we want it to. But we are all out there. We're smart and we're capable, but we all have to be pushing in the same direction at the same time. Equestricon was the first step. **Return to page 1**

GETTING REAL ABOUT BACKSTRETCH WORK

You've heard it before, when trainers talk about the difficulty of hiring non-immigrant barn workers: "No one in America wants this job." That's what one trainer told the audience during a panel on immigration at the Albany Law School's Saratoga Institute on Equine, Racing, and Gaming Law Conference on August 8, as he recounted how

his attempts to hire U.S. citizens often end with people quitting because the work is strenuous and possibly dangerous. The message is that non-immigrant workers are too lazy, too soft. Framing the problem as one of unwilling employees, though, lets owners and trainers off the hook for labor practices and working conditions on the backside.

In 2004 and 2005, I worked as a hotwalker, first at Suffolk Downs, then at Saratoga. I loved the work, which I began without having any horse-handling experience. It was challenging, and as my skills grew and training as a groom was added to the job, it became more rewarding. I appreciated that it was physical without being mindless, routine without being dull, and I liked being part of a team coaxing these animals into giving their best on track.

I wasn't a typical stablehand, in a few ways--I was a citizen, my work status never in question, spoke English as a first language, was college-educated. I'd been working in publishing. But I was paid \$250 a week, like other hotwalkers, and at Saratoga, I lived in the same dorm as other backside workers.

That summer at Saratoga, I worked six weeks straight without a day off. Work began at 4:30 a.m., with scrubbing and refilling water buckets, and continued until 10:30 or 11:00 a.m., whenever the last horse was tucked away, the shedrow straightened, and the lunch feed mixed. That was first shift. Most days, second shift began at 11:30 a.m., or sometimes in the early afternoon--it depended on whether the barn had a horse in a race (and which race). If we were in a late race, work could extend into early evening.

The pace rarely let up, and I leaned into the opportunity--when I had afternoons off from my barn, I'd pick up work from others, accompanying horses to the detention barn and cooling out horses after a race for \$30 cash.

There was always something that needed to be done, and I welcomed the chance to handle all kinds of horses, peek into barns across the backside, and talk to grooms and assistant trainers and exercise riders about how they came to racing and why they chose to make their life in it.

And then, when Saratoga ended, I went home. After 15 months of being a licensed stablehand, after getting to put my hands on \$5,000 claimers and million-dollar earners, I left the backside. It wasn't because of the work--the work was hard, and that was fine. It was the hardness of everything else. It was sharing a 9x12 room with two other women, and living off the bad food available at the track kitchen--the nearest grocery store was more than a mile away, and there was no place to store fresh food or prepare a meal in the dorms. It was the isolation, the feeling of being cut

off from family and friends and life outside the track when days could pass before I had enough time to leave the grounds and get into town.

It was also the sexual harassment, the near daily experience of hearing men say obscene things to me as I worked. The rules of the backstretch are simple--be tough, don't complain. And I didn't. Who would I have said anything to, even if I'd wanted? I accepted the leering and lewdness as part of the culture, as just something I had to put up with to work with horses.

In so many ways, the barn felt like a workplace from another time, and I worked for well-respected trainers with committed crews. My Saratoga coworkers were skilled, dedicated, and proud of their

work. That was the good. The bad was that there was no time-keeping. No breaks. Little protection against injury. Bonuses for wins but no safety nets. **Cont. p9**

Nothing in my experience suggested the conditions I worked in were unusual--from observing how other barns were managed and talking to other workers, it seemed that was just how things were done in most outfits. And while enforcement of labor laws has stepped up in some jurisdictions, such as New York, in the years since I was on the backside, too many workers remain vulnerable to exploitation across the industry.

Owners and trainers will say that the economics of running a stable are brutal, and I don't doubt it. This is an expensive business, and it runs on paying people little money and offering them few benefits. It wants labor that's hungry for 10-, 12-, 14-hour days, that will accept the physical toll of the work and wage precarity. It calls this hunger "passion." The demands made of workers aren't specific to U.S. racing--trainers in other countries use the same rationale as American trainers caught up in crackdowns often do--that this is an agricultural business, exempt from the standards to which other workplaces are expected to hew.

I understood the deal when I worked on the backside. Other workers get it, and it's no wonder that if they have another choice and no great love for horses, they go elsewhere. It's time for trainers to stop using the excuse that they have to hire immigrant labor because non-immigrant workers balk at some hard work. Own what kind of labor you want to hire, and what working conditions you believe people should accept. Own how you turn people's circumstances and sense of vocation to your advantage. The fault is not with workers rejecting your terms--it is your terms.

HAVE AMERICAN-BASED TURF HORSES CAUGHT UP? *By Bill Finley*

The Europeans arrived in full force for last Saturday's races at Arlington Park, bringing a talented contingent that looked better on paper than anything they had brought over to run in the GI Arlington Million, the GI Secretariat and the GI Beverly D. in years. Based on what we have come to expect, that Europeans can come here and win our biggest grass races with second and third-string horses, it looked it could be a rough day for the Yanks.

As it turned out, Team America left Chicago with a clean sweep as American-based horses won all three Grade I events. Was it just a good run of luck or has the tide shifted with our grass horses now close to being on par with theirs? Call me a homer if you will, but I believe it is the latter.

You should have seen what happened at Arlington coming. One reason is that turf racing in North America is booming, whether it's within the stakes ranks or at the lowest levels of the sport. There are more grass races than ever, Aqueduct and Woodbine are both adding second turf courses and it's hard to find a card at places like Gulfstream, Laurel and Saratoga where at least half the races aren't on the grass. Fasig-Tipton has jumped on the bandwagon and later this year will offer the first-ever yearling sale specializing in turf runners. With so many opportunities out there for grass horses, North Americans are no longer shying away from turf stallions like they used to. Just look at Kitten's Joy. The majority of the buyers at the sales are still hoping they just bought a future GI Kentucky Derby winner, but there are plenty now who are looking for a future grass star.

The other reason? Chad Brown. **Cont. p10**

While he has proven that he's more than a one-trick pony who can only win grass races, Brown remains one of the very best turf trainers this country has ever seen, on par, if not better, than Charlie Whittingham. Brown's barn is so loaded with talented and classy grass runners that perhaps the only trainer in the world he has to take a back seat to when it comes to that category is Aidan O'Brien. Brown won the Beverly D. with **Dacita (Chi)** (Scat Daddy), capturing the race for the third-straight year and the fourth time overall. He then won the Million with **Beach Patrol** (Lemon Drop Kid). It was his second Million win. Brown gave someone else a chance in the Secretariat as he did not have a starter in that race.

It is true that European stables normally bring their very best horses here only for the Breeders' Cup races, which you must take into account when assessing what happened at Arlington. But they didn't exactly bring their stable ponies to Arlington Heights, Illinois, either.

The Secretariat included starters from the stables of Jean-Claude Rouget, Aidan O'Brien and Mark Johnston. The best of that trio appeared to be **Permian (Ire)** (Teofilio {Ire}), who was coming off a nose loss in the G1 Juddmonte Grand Prix de Paris. Tragically, he suffered a fatal injury. The race was won by the terrific American 3-year-old **Oscar Performance** (Kitten's Joy).

Dacita had to beat a very good horse from the Aidan O'Brien barn in the 3-year-old filly **Rain Goddess (Ire)** (Galileo {Ire}). She was coming off a second-place finish in the G1 Darley Irish Oaks, which was won by Enable (GB) (Nathaniel {Ire}). That's the same Enable that subsequently came back to beat older males in the G1 King George VI & Queen Elizabeth S. There was also a German horse in the field in **Sarandia (Ger)** (Dansili {GB}).

In the Million, Brown and Beach Patrol conquered, among others, the O'Brien-trained **Deauville (Ire)** (Galileo {Ire}), who was third in last year's Million and won the 2016 GI Belmont Derby. There was also French shipper **Mekhtaal (GB)** (Sea The Stars {Ire}), a Group 1 winner.

And it just wasn't one afternoon at Arlington Park.

The list of North American grass races most likely to attract European starters starts and begins with the following: Beverly D., Secretariat, Arlington Million, GI Breeders' Cup Turf, GI Breeders' Cup Mile, GI Breeders' Cup Filly & Mare Turf, GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf, GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies Turf, GI Woodbine Mile, GI Canadian International, GI E. P. Taylor, GI Belmont Oaks and Belmont Derby. That's 13 races. In the most recent runnings of those events, North American-based horses have won 10. Four of those wins came out of the Chad Brown barn.

It's not just happening in the U.S. and in Canada. Wesley Ward has been a one-trainer wrecking crew at Royal Ascot and **Tepin** (Bernstein) also did the U.S. proud when winning the G1 Queen Anne S. last year.

Perhaps Godolphin, Coolmore and the other major stables in Europe will come over and win everything at the Breeders' Cup. There was a time when that was a distinct possibility. Looks like those times have changed.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

STEVE HOLLAND:

Regarding the McKinsey study article:

Certainly, **McKinsey's study showing that overlapped races reduce overall handle** is no revelation. However, as long as this is now being discussed, perhaps three problems can be addressed:

- Overlapped races
- For patrons at live tracks, running nine live races over four hours is not the kind of action in which people these days will find has a sustaining interest. They may have a good time once a year, but repeat attendance is unlikely.
- Bettors like grass races.

The last time I was in England, there would be three live tracks, and the start times would be coordinated--in fact the race names were, for example, the 1:10, 1:20, and 1:30 at tracks one, two, and three respectively, and so on. It can be done.

In this country, coordinating five tracks is probably not possible, and may not be ideal, anyway. In my experience in the cases where there has been "interleaving," a race every 15 minutes works well--time to handicap, bet, and watch the race.

My suggestions would be:

- Tracks pair off in twos. To best interleave, they would probably have to be in the same time zone.
- The race programs for the paired tracks would have all 18 races, at 15-minute intervals. The paired track's 18 races would all be featured like the live races (on a Jumbotron, on one or more of the simulcast channels, on some of the TV screens at all betting locations).
- When there is no live racing for the paired tracks in the time zone, their patrons would still be able to bet other simulcast races.
- The smaller tracks which are not part of the "national" pairs could create a virtual pair for their patrons by simply interleaving with whichever track they want (or can negotiate a deal with), and publishing their own 18 race program.
- Actually having one national coordinator that prepares a simulcast card of all grass races. Clearly, this would take enormous coordination, with the incentive for each track to move around a grass race being the likelihood of much more betting on the race. If this is initiated, and it works, cooperation will grow. Each betting outlet could then have a simulcast channel devoted to grass racing.

An obvious problem is that the Churchill and Stronach tracks may not want to pair with any other than a sister track. Also, it's not obvious how NYRA, Keeneland and California would pair. But, the above suggestions are just meant to be a starter for addressing the McKinsey overlap study and making other improvements to increase wagering and fan interest.

KHRC GRANTS BIANCONE CONDITIONAL LICENSE

Trainer Patrick Biancone was issued a conditional license by the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission (KHRC) during a Tuesday meeting, *Daily Racing Form* first reported. The Frenchman has not held a license in the state of Kentucky since a raid of his Keeneland barn in 2007 led to the discovery of three vials of cobra venom and a subsequent one-year suspension and ban from the state's tracks. Biancone's veterinarian, Dr. Rodney Stewart, was suspended for five years after the same raid. Biancone maintained that the cobra venom was Stewart's.

Biancone's license is dependent upon two conditions:

1. He must never be found to have falsified or misrepresented any document required to be provided to any racing authority in any jurisdiction, including license applications, health or veterinary records.
2. He must not be found in violation of any medication regulation in any jurisdiction relating to Class A or B substances or substances not classified in the regulations of the Commonwealth of Kentucky or by the Association of Racing Commissioners International.

Biancone would permanently lose his license in Kentucky if found to have violated either condition.

If Almanzor was disappointing in the Gontaut-Biron, then fellow Rouget trainee Brametot was much more so here, finishing almost 10 lengths back in fifth. Again slowly away as he had been earlier this season, it ultimately did not matter as he was never able to land a blow.

"That's vindicated all our thoughts about him and he showed how good he is," winning trainer Martyn Meade said. "There was no lead here and so we had no other tactic than to make it and it worked out on this particular occasion."

Bursting onto the scene when becoming Frankel's first big-race winner of 2017 in the Apr. 20 G3 Craven S. at Newmarket, Eminent was sixth but beaten just over three lengths in the G1 2000 Guineas back there May 6 before meeting some trouble when under two-lengths fourth in the June 3 G1 Epsom Derby. Only fifth in the G1 Eclipse S. when resenting restraint at Sandown July 8, he was able to draw on his inherent zest for running that his sire was famed for, as he lit up a sun-bathed Deauville. For Meade, the win was recompense for some knockbacks for his pride and joy.

"He has come through some difficult times and has struggled a little bit," he added. "He had a tough time in the Guineas and that wasn't his trip, then in the Derby he was bumped three times and would certainly have been second or third and again he did not get a clear run in the Eclipse. Today he bowled along and said this is me and what I can do. Beating a dual Classic winner in France is exciting and that's what made this race so good." **Cont. p4**

Now that Eminent is back in the headlines, the attention was turned towards the major autumn prizes, but Meade is in no hurry to commit him to those. “He could possibly end up at Ascot [for the Oct. 21 G1 Champion S.] and there is also the big one back in France [Oct. 1 G1 Prix de l’Arc de Triomphe at Chantilly], but the one thing to think about is that this horse will make a fantastic 4-year-old, so I will try not to overdo him and go too often this year,” he explained. “He has a few options, so I’ll have to think carefully but I do think he loves that distance. We’ll see how is at home, but at least we’ve seen now what this horse is capable of.”

On an unusually quiet day for the Jean-Claude Rouget stable, Al Shaqab spokesman Rupert Pritchard-Gordon was quick to excuse Brametot’s below-par effort. “He broke even slower than usual and it was a truly-run race so it was impossible to get into the race,” he said. “We will have to regroup and see how he is, but we can’t make plans at this stage. Let’s not forget he had two tough races in the Classics and although he needed a break, it might be that he is still not at the top of his game.”

Pedigree Notes...

Eminent’s dam You’ll Be Mine was third in the 2009 G1 Fillies’ Mile, but failed to make an impact afterwards. Her dam was Quarter Moon, who captured the G1 Moyglare Stud S. over seven furlongs at two and stayed a mile and a half on testing ground when runner-up in the G1 Epsom Oaks before filling the same spot in the G1 Irish Oaks. Her full-sister Yesterday (Ire) was also versatile regarding trip, winning the G1 Irish 1000 Guineas and also being the bridesmaid at Epsom, while another full-sibling who was placed in the English and Irish Oaks All My Loving (Ire) went on to produce four black-type performers. They are headed by Diamondsandrudies (Ire) (Fastnet Rock {Aus}), who took the G1 Pretty Polly S., and the ill-fated G2 Hardwicke S. and G2 King Edward VII S. scorer Thomas Chippendale (Ire) (Dansili {GB}). This remarkable family goes back to Alruccaba (Ire) (Crystal Palace {Fr}) and boasts the grey sisters Alborada (GB) and Albanova (GB) by Alzao, the G1 Prix Royal-Oak heroine Allegretto (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}) and the G2 Nassau S. and G2 Sun Chariot S. winner Last Second (Ire) (Alzao).

“All we were coming here for was to be second to Almanzor, but we thought if we ever had a chance to beat him today would be the day,” winning trainer Chris Wall said. “Gerald got him in a good position and gave him a perfect ride. He had not run so well in the past on firm ground, but today the good ground was perfect for him and he’s a very honest horse who gives his all. That’s a step up again and we’ll enter him in the [Sept. 30 G2] Prix Dollar at Chantilly and he is also entered in the Istanbul meeting, but I don’t know if it is right to go that far with him.”

Jean-Claude Rouget was not forthcoming on his thoughts about Almanzor’s run, but jockey Christophe Soumillon told the *Racing Post*, “If I had had enough gas I would have gone between them, but it wasn’t there and he wasn’t able to accelerate like last year. He might need more [work], but obviously I am disappointed.”

The Juddmonte-bred First Sitting, who was sold out of Dermot Weld’s and then David O’Meara’s yard to eventually join Chris Wall’s Newmarket set-up at the end of 2015, had flashed ability when winning by five lengths in a handicap over an extended 11 furlongs at Windsor last June and at Newmarket in August. Second on his black-type debut in the Listed Prix de Boulogne over 10 furlongs at Saint-Cloud in September, his next try at that category was when seventh in the G3 Gordon Richards S. at Sandown Apr. 28 before he beat the solid performers Spark Plug (Ire) (Dylan Thomas {Ire}) and Mount Logan (Ire) (New Approach {Ire}) in Goodwood’s Listed Festival S. May 27 prior to his La Coupe defeat at the hands of Robin of Navan (Fr) (American Post {GB}).

Impressive when beating the subsequent G3 Prix de Psyche winner **Vue Fantastique (Fr) (Motivator {GB})** on her racecourse bow at Saint-Cloud Mar. 19, Gestut Ammerland's homebred had finished third in the G3 Prix de la Grotte at Chantilly Apr. 16 before moving up in trip in the G1 Prix Saint-Alary over 10 furlongs here May 14. Only sixth there but not disgraced, she was only third as the favourite for Maisons-Laffitte's Listed Prix des Lilas June 10 and was given a rest which it was quickly clear had benefitted her as she tanked along in last early under Pierre-Charles Boudot. Travelling like the winner in the straight, the bay was angled down towards the fence but was stopped in her run with just over a furlong remaining.

Angled wide soon after, her chance looked to have gone but the half-sister to Lope de Vega had just enough time to surge down the outer and deny a British-trained pattern-race treble on the afternoon as she headed Tisbutadream in the final strides.

“She needed a little break and had blossomed,” trainer Andre Fabre commented. “She has run a good race today and I think she’ll stay further, so I would imagine she’ll come back next time in the [G1 Prix de l’] Opera [at Chantilly on Oct. 1].”

Now a significant sire, Lope de Vega was able to win the G1 Poule d’Essai des Poulains at a mile and G1 Prix du Jockey Club over 10 1/2 furlongs and with the Frankels looking to have plenty of stamina Lady Frankel should easily stay a mile and a quarter. Her G3 Prix du Calvados-winning dam who was also third in the G1 Prix Marcel Boussac also produced the G3 Prix Andre Baboin scorer Bal de la Rose--whose Daughter Blossomtime (GB) Shamardal) won the Listed Prix Isola Bella--and Lope de Vega’s full-brother Lord of the Land (Ire) who took the Listed Golden Rose S. and was third in the G3 Prix de Meautry. The £1-million G1 Juddmonte International at York is shaping up into a contest that befits it’s status as one of the world’s best races and Richard Hannon has his eye firmly on the prize with **Barney Roy (GB)** (Excelebration {Ire}). The 3-year-old has done the team proud this year and will enter next Wednesday’s race off the back of an agonizing nose defeat to **Ulysses (Ire)** (Galileo {Ire}) in the G1 Coral Eclipse at Sandown in July. He had previously traded blows with **Churchill (Ire)** (Galileo {Ire}), losing out to the Ballydoyle star in the G1 QIPCO 2000 Guineas at Newmarket, but getting his revenge when winning the G1 St James’s Palace S. at Royal Ascot.

“I’m very happy with Barney Roy and we’re all set for York,” Richard Hannon said. “It was a fantastic run in the Eclipse. It proved that he gets the trip and that he’s tough. Hopefully he can go to York and make amends.”

With the trio of Barney Roy, Churchill and Ulysses aiming for the Knavesmire, it brings together various form threads from both generations and sexes and the Stoute/Niarchos team will also fancy the chances of their colt Ulysses despite him being beaten into second in the G1 King George VI & Queen Elizabeth S. last time by Enable (GB) (Nathaniel {Ire}).

“Michael [Stoute] said on Monday he worked very nicely that morning and the plan, all being well, is to go for the Juddmonte next Wednesday,” said Alan Cooper, racing manager to the Niarchos family.

He looks great and it is not like we are dealing with a horse that has been injured and his having his first run of the season. He has had that bit of a break and I'm very pleased with him."

Sunday's meeting at The Curragh features three 'Win And You're In' type races for Longines Irish Champions Weekend and perhaps the most intriguing of the trio could be the G2 Breast Cancer Research Debutante S. for 2-year-old fillies. Aidan O'Brien has six of the 11 entries including last time out Newmarket Group 2 winner **Clemmie (Ire)** (Galileo {Ire}). However it could be two other regally bred fillies in **September (Ire)** (Deep Impact {Jpn}) and **Happily (Ire)** (Galileo {Ire}) that lead the Ballydoyle charge in the seven furlong race. September, a **'TDN Rising Star'** and a daughter of Peeping Fawn (Ire) (Danehill) has not run since winning the Listed Chesham S. at Royal Ascot in June.

Happily, a full-sister to both Gleneagles (Ire) and Marvellous (Ire) impressed when winning the G3 Silver Flash S. at Leopardstown recently.

Their trainer commented, "There's nothing written in stone just yet and we'll have a look at things like the ground and how the horses work later in the week, but September and Happily would definitely be possible runners in the Debutante S. September hasn't run since Royal Ascot, but she seems in good form and we've been happy with her. We were delighted with Happily at Leopardstown and we think she has come out of the race well."

O'Brien is hoping to run **Order Of St George (Ire)** (Galileo {Ire}) in the G3 Comer Group Irish St Leger Trial S. at The Curragh on Saturday and is looking forward to another productive autumn with the 5-year-old. "The Irish St Leger Trial on Saturday is the race we are looking at for Order Of St George at the moment," O'Brien said. "He's back after a break and he wouldn't mind it too much if the ground even got a bit on the slow side."

Order Of St George could face several high class stayers in the race including **Rekindling (GB)** (High Chaparral {Ire}) who is trained by his son Joseph.

Pursuing the Dream was a 150-1 sixth tackling Royal Ascot's June 21 Queen Mary S. in her fourth start before running fourth in a July 5 Bath conditions event and lined up for this second black-type attempt coming back from a fifth in Newbury's July 22 Weatherbys Super Sprint last time. Racing under a firm grip in rear until well beyond halfway, she eased into contention with 300 metres remaining and ran on strongly once stoked up at the eighth pole to claim a first win of any kind nearing the line. "It was a bit of a gamble to come for a Listed race with a maiden, but we knew we could win a maiden race at any time in England so we decided to take the shot and it paid off nicely," explained winning trainer Jamie Osborne. "She's a well-bred filly out of a Dubawi mare so she now has a future. We will consider all options for her next race and, as her limit is five furlongs, it might be the [Sept. 2 G3] Prix d'Arenberg [at Chantilly] or the [Sept. 22 Listed] Harry Rosebery [S. at Ayr]."

Pursuing the Dream, who is a half-sister to a yearling filly by Footstepsinthesand (GB) and a colt foal by Fast Company (Ire), becomes the third winner and first stakes scorer produced by a half-sister to Listed Firth of Clyde S. winner Femme Fatale (GB) (Fairy King) and MSW G2 Sun Chariot S. runner-up Foodbroker Fancy (Ire) (Halling). IRELAND**GOINGSTICK ADOPTED BY GOWRAN PARK**

TurfTrax's GoingStick, a device that objectively and scientifically measures penetration and shear, the two forces exerted by a horse's hoof when it comes into contact with a racing surface, has been formally adopted by Gowran Park, the first racecourse in Ireland to do so. Developed by TurfTrax in collaboration with the Centre for Sports Surface Research at Cranfield University, the GoingStick is designed to work in conjunction with the TurfTrax Mapping System and the Weather System, although all three products are used independently.

"TurfTrax have worked with us to map the course and determine the waypoints where readings will be taken," said Eddie Scally, Gowran Park's General Manager. "This will enable us to add a scientific measurement to current methods of issuing going reports, and will help us plan irrigation programmes to ensure as far as possible that we can deliver consistency across the entire course."

The other mare, eight-time Group 1 winner More Joyous (NZ) (More Than Ready) produced a filly named Woman (Aus) who is in training with Gai Waterhouse and Adrian Bott. She has yet to race, but did run fourth and second in two barrier trials at Randwick in January.

FIRST WINNER IN AUSTRALIA FOR FRANKEL

Juddmonte stallion Frankel (GB) (Galileo {Ire}), who stands at Banstead Manor in Newmarket, was represented by his first winner in Australia on Tuesday when **Merovee (Aus)**, a son of MGSW More Strawberries (Aus) (More Than Ready), broke his maiden at Newcastle. It was the colt's second start for Chris Waller since being purchased by the trainer as a yearling for A\$1.6 million at the Inglis Easter Yearling Sale. Merovee finished sixth of 14 in a maiden at Newcastle over 1200m back in March and he showed the benefit of that experience on Tuesday, as he angled three wide into the straight under Hugh Bowman before knuckling down in the last furlong to get the better of **Legendofoz (Aus)** (Fastnet Rock {Aus}) by just under a length.

BUMPER OVERSEAS ENTRIES RELEASED FOR KEENELAND KOREA CUP, SPRINT *by Alan Carasso*

2016 Keeneland Korea Cup winner Chrysolite | Ross Holburt

A total of 47 overseas entries from seven different racing jurisdictions have been received for the Keeneland Korea Cup (1800m) and Keeneland Korea Sprint (1200m), to be held at Seoul Sunday, Sept. 10.

Japan fields the largest contingent with 18 runners entered across both races, including Carrot Farm's **Chrysolite (Jpn)** (Gold Allure {Jpn}), who defeated his compatriot Kurino Star O (Jpn) (Admire Boss {Jpn}) by six lengths in last year's Korea Cup ([video](#)). Also among the Japanese entries is **London Town (Jpn)** (Kane Hekili {Jpn}), recent winner of the G3 Elm S. at Sapporo in track-record time. The American-bred **Circuit Land** (Mizzen Mast), who won his maiden over the Deauville all-weather in 2014 and has two wins and a second from three starts over the Sha Tin dirt track, could represent Hong Kong, while the lone entry from the United States is the Linda Rice-trained **Papa Shot** (Distorted Humor), whose two most recent appearances have yielded stakes placings in the state-bred restricted Saginaw S. (1700m) and John Morrissey S. (1300m).

Some 26 entries were received for the Keeneland Korea Sprint, including six from the United States, topped by the talented duo of **Stallwalkin' Dude** (City Place) from the barn of David Jacobson and **Limousine Liberal** (Successful Appeal), conditioned by Ben Colebrook. Group 1 winner and Tokyo track-record setter **Moanin** (Henny Hughes) and **Dios Corrida (Jpn)** (Kane Hekili {Jpn}), who made two starts at the Dubai

International Racing Carnival, top eight entrants from Japan, while perhaps the most intriguing possibility comes from Ireland in the form of the globetrotting **Gordon Lord Byron (Ire)** (Byron {GB}), a veteran of 77 career starts and a Group 1 winner over turf sprint distances in England, France and Australia. Though he has never raced on dirt or sand, the nine-year-old is a three-time winner over the Dundalk all-weather. Super Jockey (NZ) (Sandtrap) took last year's Sprint for Hong Kong and that jurisdiction is represented by **Lucky Year (Aus)** (Holy Roman Emperor {Ire}), winner of eight of his 22 runs at home, but untried on the main track.

Singapore's El Padrino (NZ) (Mr Nancho {Arg}) annexed the Sprint in 2014 (then called the Asia Challenge Cup) and was runner-up in 2015 and the nation is represented by a half-dozen nominees this year. Should he handle the switch to the dirt, China Horse Club's multiple stakes-placed **Wimbledon (Aus)** (Snitzel {Aus}), a latest second in the Aug. 13 Garden City Trophy (1200m AWT) at Kranji, could return the trophy to the Lion City.
