**SCENE SET AT TATTS FOR DRAMATIC BOOK 1**  
 By Emma Berry

As the European bloodstock market braced itself for the three most important days of the yearling season, there was an expectant hush around the sales ring at Tattersalls on the eve of Book 1 of the October Sale. In the amphitheatre that last year saw the world record for a yearling filly broken when a 5 million guineas daughter of Galileo (Ire) was sold to Sheikh Joaan Al

Thani of Qatar, the smell of new carpet is likely to give way today to the smell of money. More than 70-million guineas was spent during Book 1 last year, and following an ebullient start to the yearling sales season across the Northern Hemisphere, it's easy to believe that sum will have been improved upon by the end of this week.

"You always approach Book 1 of the October Yearling Sale with a degree of cautious optimism and apprehension," said Tattersalls Marketing Director Jimmy George Monday at Park Paddocks, which has played host to a number of the world's major owners and breeders over the weekend as the consignments of yearlings arrived and showing began.

"It kicks off the sales season for us here at Tattersalls, and Book 1 has been fantastic for the last few years," George added. "Last year's sale in particular set the bar very high, but this is a very good catalogue and results on the track have been terrific this year. We've had a Guineas winner, a Derby winner and a St Leger winner from the sale--two from Book 1 and one from Book 2--and that's a tribute to the quality of yearlings on offer in this sale."

"Furthermore, the sire power in Britain and Ireland at the moment is as strong as most of us have known it in our lifetime," he continued. "I think that's recognized by the leading owners in the world and, hopefully, it will be reflected in the likely participants over the coming weeks." **Cont. p3**

**GARSWOOD RETIRED**

**Garswood (GB)** (Dutch Art {GB}--Penchant {GB}, by Kyllachy {GB}), who capped his career with a victory in the G1 Prix Maurice de Gheest Aug. 10, has been retired to Cheveley Park Stud. Trained by Richard Fahey, the 4-year-old broke his maiden in listed company at Ayr in September 2012, and recorded his second stakes win in Newmarket's Listed European Free H. two starts later in his sophomore bow. He added the G2 Lennox S. later that year, and was last seen taking the Maurice de Gheest by a half-length. "He was a listed winner at two, a Group 2 winner at three and a Group 1 winner at four," Fahey told *Racing Post*. "He had a super temperament and was a legend. Ability wise, he was definitely one of the best I've trained."

Along with the new carpet, new portraits adorn the wall of the sales ring depicting the aforementioned Tattersalls-sold Classic winners of the season--English and Irish Derby winner Australia (GB) (Galileo {Ire}), sold for 525,000gns to Coolmore; Night Of Thunder (Ire), a 32,000gns son of Dubawi (Ire) who won the G1 2000 Guineas in May, and Kingston Hill (GB) (Mastercraftsman {Ire}), the St Leger winner who was bought from Book 2 for 70,000gns.

Down towards the bottom of the hill in block AA, the same spot in which they were stabled with last year's record-breaker, now named Al Namaah (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}), the gang from Ireland's Lodge Park Stud are dodging rain showers and doing an equally good job of trying to avoid any pre-sales hype this time around. Al Namaah's dam Alluring Park (Ire) has no yearling this year, but among the four horses consigned by her nursery is her relation, a Galileo (Ire) half-brother to Group 1 winner and young Coolmore stallion Alfred Nobel (Ire) (Daneshill Dancer {Ire}) ([lot 312](#)). His 2-year-old half-sister Stellar Glow (Ire) (Sea The Stars {Ire}) was still unraced when the catalogue was printed, but has subsequently finished a good second in a Leopardstown maiden.

She was later third in the G3 CL and MF Weld Park S. at the Curragh a little over a week ago.

"She looks promising and,, hopefully she'll be a Classic filly," says Damian Burns, who runs Lodge Park Stud with his mother, Patricia, and brothers Patrick and Jamie. Another brother, Ronan, runs Herbertstown House Stud, which is selling three yearlings this week. The eldest of the quartet, Damian remained remarkably cool in the wake of last year's memorable result and is similarly unflappable on the eve of this year's sale. He says, "Genuinely, as I said last year, for us it really is all about what happens on the racecourse. Of course good sales results help--they mean we can keep the show on the road and use the stallions we want to use. We also picked up a few nice mares last year, but we really are geared towards the racecourse rather than the sales ring."

Despite the strength of the market, Burns warns that Book 1 is all about being extremely selective in the yearlings offered.

"You have to get everything right--especially at this sale," he said. "There's no room for error. That's the market generally, but particularly at Book 1."

Selective the market may be, but it looks as though it will once again be boosted by a hugely varied and international buying bench. Plenty of Americans have been patrolling the grounds over the last few days, including Alex Solis and Jason Litt, who were in action in Ireland at Goffs last week, as was Marc Keller. They have been joined by Andrew Rosen, Bobby Flay and Jon Kelly, while potential South African buyers include Jehan Malherbe and Mary Slack.

Michael Wallace from China Horse Club spent €850,000 on a Sea The Stars (Ire) colt at Goffs, and augmented that purchase with a hefty spending spree at Arqana's Arc sale on Saturday night, which included an outlay of €800,000 on G2 Prix de Chaudenay winner Auvray (Fr) (Le Havre [Fr]). He and fellow Australians Lee Freedman and Jeff Gordon are also in town, along with members of the Hong Kong Jockey Club buying team and Hong Kong-based trainers Chris So and John Moore's son George. The Japanese bloodstock ranks are represented by potential buyers from Northern Farm and Big Red Farm.

Taking into account various Qatari and Dubaiian operations with significant racing and breeding operations in Europe, along with the stalwarts in camp Coolmore, it's fair to expect plenty of high-stakes horse-trading in the small Suffolk town of Newmarket over the next few days. The dress rehearsals have taken place and Tattersalls is ready for curtain up.

*Consigned by Camas Park Stud*

From a family that is known to cause a stir in the Tattersalls ring, this filly could get proceedings off to a fast start. The January foal is a three-quarter sister to G1 Investec Oaks and G1 German Oaks winner Dancing Rain (Ire) (Danehill Dancer [Ire]), who caused so much commotion when selling for 4 million guineas at Tattersalls' Mare Sale in December. Another of her sisters, the stakes-winning Sumora (Ire) (Danehill), is the dam of G1 Moyglare Stud S. heroine Maybe (Ire) (Galileo [Ire]), and was a 2.4 million guineas buy at the December Sale in 2011.

**Lot 75, f, Street Cry (Ire)--Strawberrydaiquiri (GB), by Dansili (GB)**  
*Consigned by Aislabie Stud*

A member of the third to final crop of the recently deceased Street Cry, this is the first foal out of the dual group winner Strawberrydaiquiri, a daughter of multiple stakes winner Strawberry Morn. She is bred on the same cross as Street Cry's G2 Ribblesdale S. winner Princess Highway (out of a Danehill mare).

**Lot 83, c, Galileo (Ire)--Swiss Lake, by Indian Ridge (GB)**  
*Consigned by Watership Down Stud*

A March foal by the peerless Galileo, this bay is out of the multiple stakes-winning Swiss Lake, who has produced five winners from six to race, including Group 3 winners Swiss Diva (GB) (Pivotal {GB}) and Swiss Spirit (GB) (Invincible Spirit {Ire}), and listed winner Swiss Dream (GB) (Oasis Dream {GB}). He is bred on the same cross as New Approach (out of a mare by Ahonoora, by Indian Ridge), G1 Irish 1000 Guineas winner Nightime (Ire) and multiple group winner David Livingston (Ire).

**Lot 97, c, Oasis Dream (GB)--Titivation (GB), by Montjeu (Ire)**  
*Consigned by Floors Stud*

This strapping bay is the second foal out of the winning Titivation, a half-sister to the dual Classic winner and five-time Group 1 winner Attraction (GB) (Efisio) (GB). He is therefore closely related to Attraction's Group 3-winning colt Fountain of Youth (Ire) (Oasis Dream {GB}).

**Lot 107, f, Dansili (GB)--Tyranny (GB), by Machiavellian**  
*Consigned by Croom House Stud*

Despite being a late May foal, this bay filly should attract plenty of attention on pedigree alone. She is a full-sister to G1 Phoenix S. winner and young sire Zoffany (Ire) and a three-quarter to multiple group winner and Group 1-placed Wilshire Boulevard. Tyranny's unraced 2-year-old Galileo filly was a 600,000 buy back in this ring last year.

**Lot 142, c, Oasis Dream (GB)--Zee Zee Top (GB), by Zafonic**  
*Consigned by Meon Valley Stud*

Out of the G1 Prix de l'Opera winner Zee Zee Top, this February foal is a half to dual Group 1 winner Izzi Top (GB) (Pivotal {GB}). His second dam is G1 Irish Oaks winner Colorspin (Fr), who has produced multiple Group 1 winners Kayf Tara (GB) (Sadler's Wells) and Opera House (GB) (Sadler's Wells). Colorspin is also the second dam of 2003 Irish champion 2-year-old filly Necklace (GB) (Darshaan {GB}).

**Lot 144, f, High Chaparral (Ire)--Agnetha (Ger), by Big Shuffle**  
*Consigned by The Castlebridge Consignment*

High Chaparral, who has enjoyed a strong run as of late with Group 1 winners Toronado (Ire) and Lucky Lion (GB) to his credit this year, plus a pair of winners at Longchamp over the weekend in High Jinx (GB) (G1 Prix du Cadran) and Frine (Ire) (G2 Prix Royallieu), is the sire of this bay filly, who has attracted a lot of attention at the barn. A daughter of the Group 3 winner and Group 1-placed Agnetha, she is a three-quarter sister to Grade III winner Starstruck (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}), and bred on the same cross as Lucky Lion.

**Lot 154, f, Galileo (Ire)--Aleagueoftheirown (Ire), by Danehill Dancer (Ire)**  
*Consigned by Glenvale Stud*

The stakes-placed Aleagueoftheirown has thus far produced two stakes-placed winners by Galileo. One of those, Criteria (Ire), was purchased by Cheveley Park Stud for 535,000gns in this ring in 2012.

**Lot 157, c, Sea the Stars (Ire)--Alizaya (Ire), by Highest Honor (Fr)**  
*Consigned by The Castlebridge Consignment*

The last lot catalogued for session one, this April foal could bring the day to a close on a high note. By the much sought-after Sea the Stars, he is out of an unraced mare who has produced two winners from two to run.

Regarding Integral's next start, Richardson said, "We'll see how she is, and so far she is fine, but the final decision will rest with Mr. and Mrs. Thompson [owners of Cheveley Park Stud]," Integral, winner of the G2 Duke of Cambridge S. at Royal Ascot and G1 Falmouth S. July 11, was exiting a third-place finish in a tactical G1 Prix Rothschild. "Ryan [Moore] gave her a great ride from the front and it was pleasing to put her last run in France behind us, as we knew that was all wrong," Richardson added. "The QEII is certainly something to think strongly about."

## RACETRACK ROUND-UP

**TREVE 'FINE' AFTER ARC NUMBER TWO**

Trainer Criquette Head-Maarek reported that **Treve (Fr)** (Motivator {GB}), who turned around a sub-par 4-year-old campaign in emphatic fashion to defend her G1 Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe title Sunday, exited the race in good order. "She's fine today and has eaten everything," Head-Maarek said. She added that the Arc was likely to be Treve's last run, as was reported after the race. "I think that's definitely it," she said. "Sheikh Joaan wants to retire her. She's going to Sheikh Joaan's stud, I don't know to what stallion first, maybe Galileo. She will stay here for a while first, I need to let her down and let her go without pressure." Head-Maarek added that if Treve hadn't experienced physical issues this year, she would be tempted to try for a third Arc. "If she hadn't had problems I would have been asking the Sheikh to let us go for a third Arc, but not with her problems--that is now impossible," she said.

Explaining her confidence in her charge leading up to the Arc defense, Head-Maarek said, "She only did one gallop after [finishing fourth in the G1 Prix] Vermeille. She was cantering every day and but I took her to work 2200 meters. It was misty and you couldn't see too much. She only went a normal pace, but when I saw [jockey Thierry] Jarner come back, I could see he was pleased." Al Shaqab's contracted rider Frankie Dettori had partnered Treve in her first two outings of the year, but Head-Maarek explained why she wanted Jarner, Treve's previous regular rider, back in the saddle.

"Frankie is a fantastic boy, and I hope he's riding for me again, but it was important for her to have Jarner riding," she explained. "The mare is more agreeable with Jarner, she doesn't pull as much. When I asked Sheikh Joaan to have him back on board, he didn't say yes, he didn't say no, he said do the best you can. I do think having Jarner, he knows the filly and it was a help."

**CURSORY GLANCE DONE FOR THE YEAR**

Merry Fox Stud's homebred **Cursory Glance** (Distorted Humor), winner of the G1 Moyglare Stud S. Sept. 14 and the G3 Albany S. at Royal Ascot for trainer Roger Varian, will be put away for the year with the focus on next year's G1 1000 Guineas, Varian revealed yesterday. Varian noted that the form of the Moyglare, which has subsequently produced G2 Rockfel S. winner Lucida (Ire) (Shamardal) and Sunday's G1 Prix Marcel Boussac winner Found (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}), further bolsters Cursory Glance's profile.

"The Moyglare form is working out unbelievably and she is a class filly," he said. "She won the Albany and then split the two speed fillies (Tiggy Wiggy and Anthem Alexander) in the [G2] Lowther [S. Aug. 21]. The form of the race in Ireland speaks for itself, and I thought Malabar [fourth in both the Moyglare and the Marcel Boussac] was probably a bit unlucky not to finish second on Sunday as well. Our filly won't run again this year, but we'll be training her for the Guineas in the spring."

### EURO CHARLINE OUT OF QEII

Team Valor International's Euro Charline (GB) (Myboycharlie {Ire}), early favorite for Saturday's GI Queen Elizabeth II Challenge Cup at Keeneland, will bypass the race after developing lameness in her right hind ankle. Originally scheduled to work for trainer Todd Pletcher at Belmont yesterday morning, the winner of Arlington's Aug. 16 GI Beverly D. S. underwent X-rays and was found to have bruising of the medial condyle of the cannon bone. A follow-up nuclear scan is expected to be conducted this week and, if upon further examination no surgery is required, the 3-year-old will be turned out for 60 days at Dr. Gary Priest's farm in Versailles, Kentucky. "It is a huge disappointment, one that really knocked the wind out of our sails, but fortunately, she should never look back from this," said Team Valor CEO Barry Irwin.

"Her form has been confirmed with two horses behind her in the Beverly D. coming back to win Grade I races [Stephanie's Kitten and Emollient], and we were really looking forward to seeing her at Keeneland, especially after she had a five-furlong breeze on the grass at Belmont where she went the last quarter in :22 4/5."

Purchased privately after launching her career with a pair of wins on the Polytrack at Wolverhampton in England last winter, Euro Charline--third for trainer Marco Botti in the G1 Coronation S. at Royal Ascot June 20--concluded her European campaign with a win at Ascot July 25. "We will probably wind up keeping her in America to race next year," offered Irwin. "However, I will speak with my partners and see if they would rather return her to England instead."

# op/ed feedback

(Editor's note: There has been much back-and-forth comment since Jerry Brown's op/ed, [An Immodest Proposal](#), appeared in Friday's TDN. It was quickly followed by a reply by Barry Irwin Saturday, [Racing: Sport or Business](#).) Today, we let Jerry have the last word.)

Before I respond to Barry Irwin's comments, I have to pay my respects. First, his record of outstanding accomplishments with Team Valor speaks for itself--anyone in our game who isn't aware of them must be living under the proverbial rock. Second, and more importantly to yours truly, he's the other guy who was fighting to rid the game of cheating using drugs way before it became fashionable to do so. So Barry has my respect--even when he's wrong. With that said, let's see if I can make my way through the rhetorical underbrush, avoid tripping over the straw men, and disentangle some conflated issues and tortured logic.

From Barry: "Jerry Brown...proffered the notion that racing was a business, not a sport." What I actually said was, "This is a business first, and a sport second." Look--football is a sport; the NFL is a business. Baseball is a sport; MLB is a business. Golf, the PGA...you get the point. Yes, racing can be pure sport--if you want to see it pack a picnic basket and go to a hunt meet, and given Barry's sporting outlook I look forward to seeing lots of Team Valor horses in the entries at Fair Hill. But major league racing doesn't exist without purses, yearling sales don't happen without purses, and purses don't exist without betting handle, and betting customers. On the face of it, that means racing as we know it is a business first, because without betting you have...tailgating and picnic baskets.

Next, Barry accuses me of being a New Yorker. Oh, wait, he's right--one for Barry. But you know what? New Yorkers know how to run a business, and handle might not have gone down 10% nationally this past September if New Yorkers were running this one. It seems to this New Yorker that racing needs the centralized authority that MLB and the other major sports have, with that authority in the hands of someone with extensive experience in the pari-mutuel field, on one side of the betting windows or the other. It seems to me that since horseplayers (again, we're not "fans") represent maybe 90% of the people participating in the industry on a given day, and are the sole source of revenue, it would make sense to actively seek them out and bring them into the decision-making process at all levels, on all issues. But what do I know? I'm a brash New Yorker.

Barry goes on to say my position on Lasix being allowed just for actual bleeders is wrong because racing "is survival of the fittest, not the weakest or slowest."

That is an admirable concept, but Barry is being too narrow about applying the idea of going *au naturel*. Throat operations? Ban them; if the horse can't get enough air on his own he shouldn't be racing. Chip in his knee? If it comes out, he's barred from racing. Let him tough it out. Horse needs blinkers? Tough. If God intended a horse to wear blinkers he would have been born with them.

Okay, let's move on to Hong Kong--where they have historically had a gambling culture, have centralized authority which knows how to run a business, and doesn't face competition on network television from four major pro sports (five if you count the PGA), plus college games. Barry, you think the absence of Lasix accounts for the high handle there? Seriously? Come on, man. But in his discussion of Hong Kong and elsewhere, Barry also does both the things I pointed out are hindering the general debate. First, he conflates the Lasix "issue" with a real one, cheating using drugs. Again, those are two distinct things, and Hong Kong takes the cheating issue maybe a thousand times more seriously than we do here--they test more horses, do it thoroughly and professionally (which is NOT being done here), and don't allow vets to come onto the backside carrying ANY drugs--they have to buy all medications at the HKJC on-site pharmacy, as needed. As a result, another reason horseplayers pour money through the windows in Hong Kong is they're less worried about getting screwed.

And Barry also continues to present a binary (and false) choice-- either everyone gets to race on Lasix, or no horse does, which position he is invested in. My "third way" proposal on Lasix can be found in my original *TDN* piece.

Finally, this from Barry: "I have no fear that horseplayers will adapt to a return to the good old days pre-1970 when horses ran without Lasix". First of all, I suggest that Barry and anyone who hasn't read the piece Alex Harthill wrote that appeared in *DRF* near the end of his life do so (he reportedly treated Northern Dancer with Lasix for the Derby, and I would love to see *TDN* reprint that article\*). What Barry really means is that he wants to see a return to the good old days when Lasix wasn't legal, or listed in the program, not that it wasn't being used. But more importantly, Barry, what the hell do you base that assessment of horseplayer behavior upon? Did you talk to any? Every single response I have gotten from horseplayers to my original piece here was in agreement with my position. I know that isn't as flowery as your "full cry of valor that viscerally impacts even the hardest-hearted of professional gamblers," but it has the alternative virtue of actually being true.

### SILVER DEPUTY

Major sire **Silver Deputy** (Deputy Minister--Silver Valley, by Mr. Prospector), who had been pensioned at Fred Seitz's Brookdale Farm since 2008, was euthanized Oct. 4 due to the infirmities of old age. He was 29. A member of Deputy Minister's first crop, Silver Deputy was purchased for \$200,000 by Ontario-based Windfields Farm at the 1986 Fasig-Tipton July Selected Yearling sale. An impressive 6 1/2-length winner at Woodbine in July 1987, the grey followed up with an easy score in the Swynford S. that August before sustaining a career-ending knee injury.

Silver Deputy, who stood for \$2,500 during his first season at Windfields in 1989, was moved to Brookdale Farm after finishing runner-up to Forty Niner on the 1992 North American freshman sire list.

At Brookdale throughout the rest of his career, the grey's fee rose to a career-high of \$75,000 in 2000. At stud, Silver Deputy sired 694 winners and earners of over \$88 million, including seven champions and 88 stakes winners. His leading offspring include Eclipse champion Silverbulletday, Canadian champions Archers Bay, Deputy Inxs, Deputy Jane West, Scotzanna, Poetically and Larkwhistle.

Silver Deputy was buried at Brookdale.



**POLICE EVACUATE PROTESTERS FROM NORMANDY HORSE COUNTRY WASTE DUMP**

Seventy French policeman descended upon the town of Nonant-le-Pin yesterday morning at 3:30 to evacuate the protesters who have been blocking the entrance to a vast waste dump in the heart of horse country in Normandy, France, according to an alert from Jour de Galop. The site, operated by Guy Dauphin Environment (GDE), has been the cause of controversy since it opened last year. Last October, GDE conducted two days of dumping of auto parts and plastics before the entrance was blocked by protesters, who have blocked the gates every day since October 24, 2013 to prevent any further dumping while a fight is carried out in French courts.

The police were successful in routing the protesters this morning, and shutting down the roads which lead to the facility. The protesters responding by parking three tractors across the road five kilometers further out, effectively prohibiting the passage of any dump trucks which might be enroute to the site, according to the website ouestfrance.fr.

The site, if allowed to re-open, would see 2.5 million tons of automobile waste dumped into the agricultural lands less than 500 meters from the center of the small village of Nonant over the next 17 years, in an area populated by 160 stud farms, some of which directly surround the waste site. Opponents have expressed fears of contamination of the surrounding land and water.

The legal battle has raged on for a year, with both sides claiming victory. On May 13, GDE was convicted of illegal waste management by the Criminal Court of Argentan and was ordered to permanently close the site. The company is appealing the decision. On July 17, the Caen Administrative Court faulted the state for failing to stop the blockade, which it called illegal. While that decision is also being appealed, it was that ruling that was cited as the justification for yesterday's action.

"This expulsion is a provocation," Karima Delli, Northwest European Deputy of the ecological political group EELV told ouestfrance.fr. "It is an incomprehensible decision to the extent that we are still awaiting legal decisions regarding the legality of the project and the evidence accumulated against GDE. This type of project, planned in the heart of a rich and sensitive natural area, is absurd and should be banned in France as it is in the rest of Europe. Since the

beginning, ecologists have been opponents of this landfill project. The mobilization against GDE is the symbol of a citizen resistance to preserve these natural resources in a rural setting for everyone."

Jose Bove, also with EELV, told ouestfrance.fr, "The expulsion will not stop the mobilization. Legal remedies persist. It is not acceptable that this project goes forward to the detriment of the local population, jeopardizing a vibrant agricultural economy. This project is being legitimately questioned. The agricultural way of life of this land

should be preserved, and the breeding of racehorses can not be sacrificed for the benefit of a polluting industry."

## DRUG REFORM FOCUS OF IFHA CONFERENCE

Flanked by a delegation including Kentucky Governor Steve Beshear and the top three Kentucky Racing Commission officials, The Jockey Club Chairman Ogden Mills "Dinny" Phipps told delegates of the 48th

International Conference of Horse Racing Authorities Oct. 6 that North America must end the use of drugs in racing.

"I assure you that nothing is more important to The Jockey Club at this point in time," Phipps declared to the assembly of racing leaders from around the world.

"If we don't have integrity, we don't have fans. And if we don't have fans, we don't have an industry. A medication-free environment would be good

for all of us, whether the consumer is the investor in bloodstock or the gambler," Phipps said. "In North America, our main focus is reforming our medication policies."

The Jockey Club's management team continues to work on "developing and implementing a national legislative strategy, which will include a broad coalition of supportive industry groups and individuals," he said.

James Gagliano, president of The Jockey Club and also an IFHA vice chairman, said during a conference break that the organization is conducting meetings and seeking input on the issue and will become more active following national elections in November.

"If we take a look back at the last four years, anyone who has been involved can only say there has been a large shift toward uniform, better regulation and the elimination of race-day medication," Gagliano said. "We see it every day, going back to that trainers' announcement in August [that Lasix should be eliminated in racing]--there's been some remarkable progress that we can build upon going into the next year and beyond."

Gagliano said he was pleased to see the Kentucky officials at the meeting, which also was attended by owner and breeder Bobby Flay.

IFHA leaders have pressed North America to ban medication in racing, and at times some officials have suggested that the region's graded stakes should not be recognized if horses that compete in those events race on drugs not allowed elsewhere.

"We believe--and often state--that horses should compete only when they are free from the influence of medication," Phipps said during his speech. "Research has confirmed that our medication policies in North America are alienating current fans, prospective fans and prospective partners--not to mention animal rights activists, media and Congressional leaders."

Noting the complexities in dealing with 38 different states, as well as the various provinces of Canada and all the varied racing rules, Phipps said progress has been made toward achieving the goals of the National Uniform Medication Program that covers drug classifications, accreditation of drug testing labs and penalty guidelines.

He also praised the work of the IFHA, which counts 60 member nations that collaborate on international objectives, and said the organization offers an inspiration that the 38 jurisdictions in the United States can come together to ban drug use in racing.

"It gives me hope that 38 states in the same country will follow that example [of the IFHA]--and that they will do so sooner rather than later," Phipps said.


Beshear, who attended the G1 Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe, was joined at the IFHA meeting by Kentucky Racing Commission Chairman Bob Beck, Vice Chairman Tracy Farmer and Executive Director John Ward.

"We need to be a part of this discussion," Beshear said in a brief interview regarding the topic of prohibiting drugs in racing. "We need to listen and try to find ways for a solution and to work with our worldwide partners."

"Just the fact that [the issue of drugs in racing] is being discussed is a step forward," Beshear added. "The more that happens, then people will come to some kind of a solution. I'm glad Kentucky is here to participate. We want to be part of the worldwide discussion."

Romanet reported in a written document that IFHA has made "significant steps" over the past two years in the campaign against drugs in racing, achieving a ban on anabolic steroids in Europe, Asia and the Americas [with some therapeutic use still accepted]. Additionally, South America has prohibited Lasix in all Group 1 and Group 2 races, with Uruguay and Brazil taking further action by prohibiting the drug in all graded and black-type races. In praising Phipps's speech, Romanet said he hopes that by the time of inaugural Pan-American Conference set for New York next year in conjunction with the running of the GI Belmont S. "that you will have some good news for us" on the progress to make American racing drug-free.

**Improved Drug Testing Necessary...**

In another presentation during the conference, a call was issued for increased drug testing on horses while in training, not just on those that have raced.

Romanet joined Dr. Yves Bonnaire, director of laboratory drug testing for French racing, in declaring that out of competition drug testing is important to ensure the integrity of racing.

"We want to develop control of horses outside of competition. I must insist on that," Romanet said, adding that perhaps in the future horses that are identified with microchips could be detected by GPS anywhere they are located and thus accessed for testing, if needed. "The key is we must know where the horses are."

Bonnaire explained that some drugs cannot be detected in post-race samples, but that unannounced, out of competition testing--particularly conducted just prior to big races--could turn up abuses.

He also suggested that testing of hair samples for drugs be conducted "as soon as possible," in order to reveal as much information as possible about what kinds of substances might be in racehorses' systems.

During the International Conference of Racing Analysts and Veterinarians in Mauritius in September, Bonnaire said the 240 delegates from 31 countries discussed harmonization of rules as well as which drugs are the major threats to racing. A proposed threshold level for cobalt, which can enhance the use of oxygen in the body like EPO, will be presented soon. Bonnaire outlined the substances that should be prohibited at any time in the career of a racehorse, listing anabolic agents, Beta-2 agonists--unless prescribed by veterinarians as a bronchodilator at appropriate dosage levels--and peptide hormones, growth factors and metabolic modulators. During the ICRAV, a laboratory harmonization task force was created and a variety of labs have been designated as IFHA reference laboratories that will test international race samples.

A list of the most critical drugs for testing will be developed by the end of 2014 and testing procedures and other requirements will be proposed by early 2015, with a full protocol in place before the end of next year.

With financial resources always an issue, Bonnaire urged sharing of information, including research testing.

**Fierce Debate Continues Concerning Surface Issues...**

During another featured presentation on the safety of racing surfaces, American-based, English-born trainer Graham Motion told IFHA delegates that he hopes that the U.S. will do away with Lasix in racing and conduct only drug-free competition.

"As a generalization, I think we all are pushing to do away with medication," Motion said in response to a question about whether racing injuries in the U.S. could be tied to drug use as well as to racetrack surface safety issues. Both Motion and Dr. Mick Peterson, Ph.D. of the University of Maine and a racing surface testing and safety specialist, praised all-weather racetracks for being more consistent and thus generally safer for horses than either dirt or turf tracks. However, both pointed to both real and perceptual issues with the surfaces that have led to their decline in the U.S.

Peterson said he was "a fan" of synthetic surfaces until they began to degrade with age and exposure to weather. The cost of initial installation and then replacement of these types of surfaces generally cannot be supported, he said.

"If properly maintained, the best dirt tracks are very similar to synthetics," Peterson added. "We need to make every dirt and turf track as good as possible...we

need to have top-quality maintenance at every level [of the sport]."

Motion, who presented a film about the dirt, turf and all-weather track facilities at the Fair Hill Training Center in Maryland, where his racing operation is based, said that the

"problem with synthetic tracks in America is that they were introduced as being maintenance-free, and that's far from the truth."

The fact that all-weather surfaces need ongoing maintenance, as is regularly given to the synthetic track at Fair Hill even though it is not subjected to the demands of racing, is what "led to the demise" of synthetic racetracks," Motion said. "People aren't prepared to put that much money into them."

California's mandate in 2006 to require all racing be conducted on synthetic surfaces was "noble" but "the result was not, as the tracks are now being removed and replaced by dirt," Motion said. He suggested that there was not enough known about synthetic surfaces at the time the mandate was issued and that track maintenance crews were not properly prepared to perform that maintenance.

Additionally, he said it seems as if "some corners were cut in the construction" of those tracks, leading to problems with drainage.

Motion said he prefers to train his horses on the synthetic surface at Fair Hill, which remains consistent even in wet and cold weather, although he will start his young horses on dirt to see how they perform prior to selecting other surfaces for racing as warranted.

The addition of synthetic surfaces in some racing jurisdictions could offer another alternative during inclement weather to either turf or dirt tracks, which both are affected by rain. When races are taken off the turf at Saratoga Race Course, for example, Motion said there would be larger fields and thus better racing if an all-weather surface could be used rather than switching those races to muddy dirt ovals.

"The point is I believe there is a place for synthetic tracks in America," said Motion, who trained champion Animal Kingdom to win the GI Kentucky Derby in his first career effort on dirt as well as a victory in the GI Dubai World Cup on an all-weather track and a troubled but brilliant runner-up finish in the GI Breeders' Cup Mile on turf to Wise Dan.

"They shouldn't have been installed as quickly as they were, but they also should not be dismissed," he continued. "They've proven to be safer, and ultimately we have a responsibility to the horse."

Motion added that he "will gladly take part" in Keeneland's meeting with its "sophisticated, researched and high-tech dirt track" and emphasized that racing should continue studying what kind of surfaces are the safest for the horses.

Peterson said data now is being collected at seven primary tracks, as well as at other locations, and that study will continue into the elements of the safest racing surfaces.

### Social Media is the Answer...

During another panel presentation, racing authorities were told by representatives of the Manchester United soccer team and BMW how those organizations reach out to fans and customers with social media.

In introducing the discussion, Hong Kong Jockey Club Chief Executive and IFHA Vice Chairman Winfried Engelbrecht-Bresges noted that the explosive growth of Internet connectivity means that 39% of the entire world population now has online capability, with acceleration of access ongoing. In Hong Kong, 63% of people have mobile phones and the population there averages about six devices per person.

Therefore, social media has become "the main way people communicate or get information," Engelbrecht-Bresges said. "It's a unique opportunity for us in racing to connect with the mainstream.

"It is not a matter of should I invest or not. It is a must," he added. "If you are not there, you are not relevant and you will not become an option for future customers."

David Sternberg, head of media for Manchester United, said the team focuses on unique content including exclusive video, original artwork and "as much behind-the-scenes content as we can possibly secure because we know that's what our fans are looking for and there is no place else they can go to get it."

**Social Media is the Answer..cont.**

Wolfgang Breyer, BMW's head of international advertising, online communication and entertainment marketing, said that social media now encompasses every avenue of life, noting that even the previous Pope established a Twitter account some years ago. By the year 2020, social media will not be referred to by that name and will just be the standard avenue of communication globally.

Organizations must establish clear rules about what to present on social media, with BMW's four tenets as follows: be present, be relevant, boost joy and drive sales. BMW encourages people to post and comment via its social media platforms on its automobiles, he said.

**KRA Seeks Recognition as a Part II Country...**

In other IFHA presentations, Park Yang-Tae, general manager of the Korea Racing Authority, announced the KRA's plan to seek recognition as a Part II country by 2016 under International Grading and Race Planning Advisory Committee standards.

During the summer, Korea hosted the Asian Challenge Cup with horses from Singapore and Japan competing against locally-based runners. By next year, another country will be invited and by 2016, five countries will be included with the race potentially achieving Korean Group 1 status and international Group 3 recognition.

Longer term, the KRA would like for the race to be an international Group 2 event by 2019.

The KRA's aims include upgrading the value of Korean-raced horses and raising the perception of Korean racing around the world while giving fans better racing and encouraging the breeding and development of more competitive Thoroughbreds.

As part of the strategy, Park said Korean races should be integrated and not separated by horses' country of origin, as now is done to give Korean-breds preference. Additionally, price restrictions on colts and geldings purchased abroad should be relaxed.

Another part of Korea's strategy will be to attain international ratings for its horses, both through hosting international races and by sending domestically-trained horses to racing events in other countries.

Korea currently imports many yearlings and horses for breeding from the U.S. If it can achieve Part II status, it would be included with Hong Kong, India, Macau, Malaysia, Panama, Puerto Rico, Scandinavia, Singapore, Turkey, Uruguay, Venezuela and Zimbabwe.

IFHA delegates also were warned of the challenges racing faces around the world and in Scandinavia by Harold Dorum, chief executive of the Norwegian Tote and a horse owner.

Racing in general has been far too slow to respond to the ever more rapidly changing world and capitalize on media and technology, he said.

"The challenge for the sport is about much more than improved racetrack facilities, investing in new technology and communicating what the sport is about with new and modern packaging," Dorum said.

"Apart from some modest attempts to modernize the graphics, adding 'more of the same' to race meetings, I would claim that there are few differences in how a race meeting is organized and presented to the public today compared to 40 years ago.

"But despite this, we ask ourselves why people have stopped going to racing anymore and wonder why our audience gets one year older every eight months. This is a warning sign, just as much for us as betting operators as for the horseracing authorities. You don't have to be a rocket scientist to understand that if we do not move, and if we do not move fast and surprise the market by investing in new technology and new solutions to improve the racing experience, I am afraid that we are going to face a year-by-year decline."

Racing must be open to change including the addition of more betting products and recruitment of new owners while promoting the sport with a more "modern appeal," he said.

**Priority Must Be Placed on Horse Welfare...**

In closing the conference, Romanet emphasized that every jurisdiction must place a priority on horse welfare, which he said is "paramount for IFHA." Global standards must be developed with the recognition of how important public perception of horse welfare is to the sport of racing. With the sponsorship of Longines, the IFHA has secured financing through 2018 and has set goals that in addition to implementing best practices for horse welfare, include an agreement with the Organization Internationale des Epizootes [the world animal health panel] to facilitate the international movement of horses; the new program of certification for testing labs; quality control of graded races; higher profile regional conferences and a development of communications, both internally and otherwise, to promote IFHA policies.

**Alec Head Receives LONGINES & IFHA Award...**

Prominent horseman Alec Head was presented with the second LONGINES and IFHA International Award of Merit by Louis Romanet, IFHA Chairman and Juan Carlos Capelli, LONGINES' Vice President, Head of International Marketing at the Jockey Club in Paris, France Monday evening following the 48th Annual International Conference of Horseracing Authorities.

"Both the Head and the Romanet families have been involved in the racing industry for more than 100 years on two different sides," said Romanet.

"The Heads were active horsemen and we were regulators, but we have greatly enjoyed working together and the names of our two families are known everywhere around the world thanks to my father Jean and to Alec who were both totally international minded and respected all around the world. There really may be no other person (than Alec Head) that better embodies the accomplishments, values, and excellence that the LONGINES and IFHA International Award of Merit represent."

Head trained four G1 Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe winners as well as an G1 Epsom Deby hero during his time as a trainer. He is also a manager of the family farm Haras Du Quesnay which is associated with greats like Le Fabuleux (Fr) (Wild Risk {Fr}), Bering (GB) (Arctic Tern) and Treve (Fr) (Motivator {GB}) just to name a few.

Added Capelli, "I would like to congratulate Alec Head, who has won fame successively as a jockey, trainer, owner and horse breeder, for his award. He is one of the most prominent personalities in the horse racing and has, thanks to his impressive career, deeply marked this world. His experience and dedication to horse racing are a true inspiration for all of us and his award is fully deserved."

But for those pesky Longchamp stewards, the Arc weekend's two Group 1 juvenile races would have acted as the perfect advertisement for the 26 Galileo yearlings scheduled to come under the hammer at Tattersalls over the next three days.

Found's victory in the Prix Marcel Boussac made her the fourth group winner to emerge from Galileo's 2012 crop. Two of the four--the ambitiously-named John F. Kennedy and the Group 2 winner Highland Reel--have added further luster to the golden Galileo-Danehill cross. However the other two--Found and the G1 National S. winner Gleneagles, who was demoted after winning the Prix Jean-Luc Lagardere--have provided a timely reminder that Galileo's success story is far from being one dimensional.

Predictably it is the Galileo-Danehill cross--or variations on a theme--which dominates this week's Galileo contingent. Four have dams by Danehill, another four have dams by Danehill Dancer and there are single offerings from daughters of Dansili, George Washington and Rock of Gibraltar. The Danzig line is also represented by a filly with a dam by Treve's broodmare sire Anabaa, who has such a good record with Galileo. Also there are two colts with dams by sons of Green Desert, which means they are bred along similar lines to the excellent Australia.

The popularity of this cross is very understandable, as Galileo owes 15 of his Group 1 winners to mares from the Danzig line. However, this means that he has 25 other Northern-Hemisphere-sired Group 1 winners which don't have dams from the Danzig line. Indeed none of these 25 even have a second dam by a Danzig line stallion.

The message is that all 26 Galileo yearlings are well worth a look and there are some interesting pedigrees among the colts in the non-Danzig team. For example the first of them into the ring, Lot 83, is out of Indian Ridge's very accomplished and speedy daughter Swiss Lake. We all know how well Galileo has done with fast mares and daughters of Indian Ridge have nearly 14% Group winners among their 22 foals by Galileo. One, Nighttime, won the Irish 1000 Guineas.

Lot 442 is another colt with the right sort of background. For a start he a half-brother to Harbinger, an 11-length winner of the King George, and he is out of a mare by Bering. Bering sired the second dam of Galileo's Irish Derby winner Treasure Beach and Galileo has two Group 1 winners among his four foals out of mares by Pennekamp, a son of Bering.

Buyers of high-priced yearling colts often state that they were influenced by the colt having a stallion's pedigree. In which case, the big guns will all be looking at Lot 212, the first foal of a sister to Tapit.

The Longchamp victory of Found should help focus attention on one of the Galileo fillies--Lot 372, a sister to the very useful performers Field of Miracles and Cameron Highlander. Like Found, this filly has a broodmare sire from the Roberto male line and that broodmare sire--Arch--has the added attraction of being out of a mare by Danzig.

Now it's time to concentrate on Found, who warmed up for her Paris success by finishing a close third to Cursory Glance and Lucida in a very hot edition of the G1 Moyglare Stud S. Her dam is by Intikhab, whose grandsire Roberto is playing a sizeable role in Galileo's success story. To date, Galileo has sired group winners from daughters of five different sons of Roberto and two grandsons. The broodmare sire with the most remarkable record is Silver Hawk, who has achieved 45% stakes winners with 11 Galileo foals. This achievement is even more noteworthy because of the presence of the Group 1 winners Nathaniel, Great Heavens and Seville among the five stakes winners. The five also include this year's American Grade III winner Aigue Marine.





Galileo also has 22% stakes winners with daughters of Red Ransom, this cross's best representative being the much-travelled Mahbooba, who enjoyed Group 1 success in South Africa, Group 2 success in the UAE and listed success in Britain.

Found's broodmare sire Intikhab is a son of Red Ransom. Indeed he had very strong claims to being the best son of Red Ransom.

Intikhab's rating of 130 on the International Classifications made him the highest-rated European horse of any age in 1998 and placed him 1lb below Skip Away and level with Awesome Again. Timeform went even further, naming him Horse of the Year with a figure of 135, one pound above Skip Away.

These exalted ratings reflected his breath-taking eight-length victory in the Queen Anne S. at Royal Ascot Although Intikhab appeared to have the 1998 miling division at his mercy, a troublesome splint kept him off the track for 11 months and he fractured his pelvis on his return.

As might be guessed from his 2014 fee of €6,000, Intikhab has come nowhere near to becoming a world leader as a stallion, but he has certainly had his moments. He has sired three Group 1 winners--all fillies--and one of them is the magnificent international performer Snow Fairy. This mare's long career featured victories in the Oaks, Irish Oaks, Irish Champion S., Hong Kong Cup and two editions of Japan's Queen Elizabeth II Commemorative Cup, plus a third in the Arc.

However, the filly who really put Intikhab on the map as a stallion was Red Evie, the dam of Found. This magnificent filly--one of only 36 foals in Intikhab's third crop--started at 100-1 when she made little show on her only start at two. It was a very different story at three, though. She was winning for the seventh consecutive time when she used her impressive acceleration to land the G1 Matron S. at Leopardstown in 2006.

Red Evie had been entered in Tattersalls December Sales at three but she was withdrawn, to stay in training as a 4-year-old. Although her winning sequence had come to an end on her final start at three, she resumed winning ways on her reappearance at four, when she added a second Group 1 victory, this time against the males in the Lockinge S.

This time Red Evie met her engagement at the December Sales and it was disappointing when she was led out unsold at 1,000,000gns. Fortunately for the Coolmore partners, they stepped in to buy her privately and she has since become one of Galileo's constant companions. She has produced five consecutive foals by him and three of the first four have won. Another of the winners is Magical Dream, a Group 3 winner at two who went close to winning the G3 Noblesse S. over a mile and a half at three. Magical Dream is now in the U.S., where she visited War Front this year. Found looks superior to her older sister and she must have every chance of developing into a classic filly next year, from a mile to a mile and a half.

Red Evie is the second daughter of Intikhab to shine with Galileo. Her predecessor, Zarinia, visited Galileo on one of his visits to Australia and the resultant filly, Igugu, was sent to South Africa. Igugu proved outstanding in her adopted land, winning ten of her 12 starts, including the G1 Durban July.

As I said earlier, stamina shouldn't prove a problem for Found next year. Her fourth dam, Pavlova, was a half-sister to Random Shot, a winner of the Ascot Gold Cup, but this family doesn't lack speed. Pavlova's best offspring, the Prince of Wales S. winner Lucky Wednesday and Found's third dam Martinova, were respectively third in the Irish 2000 Guineas and Irish 1000 Guineas. Martinova produced a variety of winners, ranging from Export Price, a group-winning French sprinter, to Ninepins, a leading steeplechaser in the U.S. Red Evie's dam Malafemmena won a listed race over six furlongs in Italy at two.

The first session of the Saratoga Fall Sale of weanlings, yearlings, broodmare and horses of racing age kicked off its two-day run Monday. The sale, which was a single session last year, had a total of 131 horses catalogued for the first session. The 69 horses that sold grossed \$902,500, good for an average of \$13,080. A total of 22 horses did not sell for a buy-back rate of 24.17%. The median was \$6,500. The session was topped by [hip 11](#), an unraced 2-year-old filly by

Curlin, and High Quality (Elusive Quality), who sold as [hip 43](#), at \$60,000. The Curlin filly is a half-sister to multiple-stakes winner Wiredfortwotwenty (Greatness) and was consigned by Wes Carter. Carolyn Vogel, who purchased subsequent GI Gulfstream Park Turf winner Lochte (Medaglia d'Oro) and GII Monmouth Cup S. winner Valid (Medaglia d'Oro) at last year's sale, signed the ticket. Stakes-placed mare High Quality, who produced a Mission Impazible filly earlier this year, was consigned by Sequel Stallions New York and purchased by PTS Ranch, Keith Crupper, agent.

[Hip 154](#) is a half-brother by Lucky Pulpit to Golden Artemis (Malibu Moon), the dam of Grade I winner My Conquestadory; while [hip 210](#) is a full-sister to multiple graded stakes winner Halo Dolly (Popular). A colt by The Pamplemousse topped last year's October sale when selling to Arnold Zetcher for \$160,000. In all, 159 yearlings sold at last year's sale for an average of \$19,689 and a median of \$13,000.

"We're very pleased with the catalogue and the traffic out back," said Barretts' General Manager Kim Lloyd. "The momentum of California Chrome is carrying through, as we have 26 Lucky Pulpits. People are really interested in buying Cal-breds and are taking advantage of our California breeding program."

**AMAZOMBIE TO OLD FRIENDS**

**Amazombie** (Northern Afleet--Wilshe Amaze, by In Excess {Ire}), the 2011 Sprint Champion and Eclipse Award winner that was retired from racing earlier this year, will be pensioned at the Old Friends Thoroughbred Retirement Center in Georgetown, Kentucky. It was announced earlier this week that multiple Grade I winner Game on Dude (Awesome Again) will also be sent to Old Friends, and the decision was made to ship the horses cross-country together in the coming weeks via H.E. Tex Sutton Forwarding Company LLC.

"It's wonderful to have another great Breeders' Cup Champion joining Old Friends," said Michael Blowen, founder and president of Old Friends.
