### PELEGRINI LURES TWO DOZEN

A field of 24 was drawn yesterday for Saturday's G1 Gran Premio Internacional Carlos Pellegrini at San Isidro Racetrack in Buenos Aires, and Charles Fipke's

**Perfect Shirl** (Perfect Soul {Ire}), last-out winner of the GI Breeders' Cup Filly and Mare Turf, will leave from the nine hole. She is due to arrive in Argentina late today. Luis Bouza, who represented Fipke at the draw, confirmed that John Velazquez will have the call. "It is very good that John can come to Argentina to

ride her," he said. "He knows her very well. I'm not worried that she's never run here, because it is an easy track with the 2400 meters around just one turn."

**Es Richard (Arg)** (Espaciado), one of the local candidates for the Pellegrini and a dual group winner in 2011, will depart from gate 13, and trainer Julio Penna was pleased with the result. "I like that draw," Penna said. "The horse is in great shape and I think he will run well." Making his first start since annexing the G1 Gran Premio Estrellas Classic in June is **Star Runner (Arg)** (Southern Halo). "The horse is ok," confirmed trainer Ernesto Romero. "He had a problem in one of his feet and was given some time off. It is true he hasn't raced in six months, but we believe he will turn in a good effort on Saturday." **More on Charles Fipke, p2**

### MATZ MAPS OUT PLAN FOR UNION RAGS

Given some time off in Wellington, Florida, following a narrow defeat in the GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile at Churchill Downs Nov. 5, **Union Rags** (Dixie Union) is expected to launch his 2012 campaign at Gulfstream this winter,



according to trainer Michael Matz yesterday. "We got on his back Saturday and just walked him for about a half hour," said Matz. "Starting [tomorrow], he's going to be ridden every day.

Then, after the first of the year, we'll take him to Palm Meadows to start some serious training." Matz indicated the Feb. 26 GI Fountain of Youth S. followed by the Mar. 31 GI Florida Derby will be on the bay's dance card early in the new year. "He's here and we don't have to ship him around," said Matz, explaining the colt's schedule. "If something happens and we have a change of plans where we have to do something different, we're going to nominate him to just about everything." The Chadds Ford Stable runner captured his first three starts, including the Aug. 15 GI Sapling S. and Oct. 8 GI Champagne S. "

**Fipke's Been Doing It His Way...**

As a world-famous geologist, Charles Fipke reached the pinnacle of his profession--really, how many geologists have books written about them?--by seeing opportunity where others saw nothing. This path-less-traveled approach led him to, among other things, the Ekati diamond mine in the Northwest Territories in Canada. Fipke discovered the mine, one of the largest of its kind in the world, in

1991, and still owns a 10% interest in it. As an owner and breeder of Thoroughbreds, Fipke has often embraced the atypical, as well. When he retired his Grade I-winning homebred Perfect Soul (Ire) (Sadler's Wells) to the breeding shed at Darby Dan, Fipke aggressively went out and bought blue-blooded mares to support a horse that, truthfully, probably didn't have a lot of commercial appeal. The result of those purchases has been four Grade I winners: Tale of Ekati (Tale of the Cat), Internallyflawless (Giant's Causeway) and Jersey Town (Speightstown) were all bought in utero, while Perfect Shirl, a daughter of Perfect Soul, became her sire's first Grade I winner when she upset this year's GI Breeders' Cup Filly & Mare Turf at Churchill Downs.

Now, Fipke is again veering from the norm. This Saturday, he and Roger Attfield will send out Perfect Shirl in South America's biggest race, the G1 Gran Premio Carlos Pelligrini at San Isidro in Buenos Aires, Argentina. The 4-year-old filly is believed to be the first Breeders' Cup winner to make his or her next start in South America, and the only major North American-based runner to make the trip in recent memory.

For Fipke, the reason to head south is simple. "She came out of the [Breeders' Cup] great, and she's ready to run," he said. "It takes a while to bring horses up to racing speed, and sometimes you have to strike while the iron's hot. She's ready--why not race her?"

Fipke does admit that Argentina was the third choice of late-season international races. He and Attfield originally targeted last weekend's G1 Hong Kong Vase

at Sha Tin, but, according to published reports, were unable to complete the necessary bloodwork and paperwork in time. Next they considered the prestigious--and valuable--G1 Arima Kinen at Nakayama in Japan, a race worth roughly \$4.9 million.

"But we found out you needed to have entered two weeks before the Breeders' Cup," said Fipke. "Which seems a little unusual; I'm not sure they really want outsiders racing there for \$4.9 million. Anyway, we didn't get in there. But going to Japan or Hong Kong is a long, tough trip. Argentina, on the other hand, is only six or seven hours from Miami, and the horse is near Miami. So the traveling is going to be a lot easier on her. The purse isn't that much--I think it's between \$400,000 and \$450,000--which still isn't terrible. But it's the most prestigious race in South America."

Fipke, who himself plans to travel to take a flight to Argentina Thursday evening from Toronto, will be making his second trip to Carlos Pellegrini. He attended the event as a spectator two years ago, and is excited to be returning with a runner. "And I've heard they're pretty excited, too," said Fipke. "It's not often you would get a Breeders' Cup winner running down there, plus one who's going to take on the boys."

Though he's best known for his North American runners--which also include the homebred champion and Queen's Plate winner Not Bourbon, by Perfect Soul's full-brother

Not Impossible (Ire)--Fipke has been expanding his international participation for several years. He has raced in South Africa, and has four youngsters in training in Australia

with trainer Bart Cummings. "I have a few that bought with Bart as yearlings at New Zealand sales--mostly Zabeel (NZ)'s," he said. "I bought one last year, and three the year before that."

Fipke also has four horses in training with John Oxx in Ireland. "I haven't been that successful over there--it's really, really competitive--but hopefully it will work out," he said.

In North America, meanwhile, Fipke's trainers include Attfield, Barclay Tagg, Dallas Stewart, Bob Baffert, Kelly Ackerman, Kenny McPeck and Tim McCanna. He also has broodmares in Canada and the U.S. Asked about how many horses he had in total, Fipke quipped, "I always say the more horses you have, the less intelligent you are—and I'm a moron."

Fipke said he has reworked his breeding program over the last few years, and takes a hands-on approach when it comes to selecting matings. "You can't believe how much work is involved getting the right mating," he said. "I use a lot of science, and I have help, and we've developed our own methods. That's what I did in geology, and that's what I'm doing in racing."

Fipke credits the late Jack Werk, as well as pedigree expert Sid Fernando, for playing a role in his success, and also gives kudos to Florida horseman J.B. McKathan. "All the yearlings go to him to be prepped, and when they're up to working quarters, then they go to the various trainers," he said. "He's a good friend, and I think he's one of the best horsemen there is out there."


If Perfect Shirl's sojourn to Argentina proves successful, Fipke said he'll continue to look abroad for races for his standout filly. "Our next goal is Dubai," he said, noting the 2400-meter G1 Dubai Sheema Classic on turf as the probable target. "And if she did well in Dubai, who knows what we'd do with her? We might even try the Melbourne Cup!"

It would be an atypical path, for sure, but for Fipke, perhaps one worth taking. -L Marquardt

# TDN Q&A

Tom Grossman is the owner of one of the top Standardbred outfits in the business--the Walkill, New York-based Blue Chip Farms. The 45-year-old is also the founder of Union Avenue Advisors, an emerging-markets focused hedge fund. Blue Chip's 680 acres are home to Standardbred royalty: 2011's top pacing sire, Bettor's Delight; 2010 pacer and Horse of the Year, Rock N Roll Heaven; Credit Winner, the leading money-winning sire of 3YO trotters in 2010 and 2011; the World Champion trotter, Crazyed; and this year's pick of the crop among retiring stallions, Roll With Joe, who was 2011's leading money-winning Standardbred regardless of gait with \$1.6 million in earnings.

The owner of Blue Chip since 2001, and a Thoroughbred fan since childhood, Grossman has dabbled in the breed, but with the slots-fueled incentives to breed New York-bred Thoroughbreds, he is now considering jumping in...if not with both feet, than at least with one. Grossman says he's looking for a few good mares...and maybe a stallion or two as well.

The TDN's Sue Finley sat down with him to learn more about his plans.

**What is your involvement with Thoroughbreds right now?**

At this point, I own three or four horses over in the U.K. that Richard Hannon trains, and I still have a mare or two on the farm, but beyond that, I'm just really a handicapper, bettor and big fan.



**There's a huge opportunity in New York right now. In a perfect world, how would you like to capitalize upon that?**

I think in the immediate, the easy task is that we do have some capacity for more boarders at Blue Chip, and I think our staff and facility really does stack up very well--as good or better than anything in New York, and we'd like to think we are as good as anything in Kentucky. The art of running a farm is that we have a huge fixed-cost base, and an excellent labor force. While boarding horses generally is not all that profitable, the incremental boarder is profitable. We'd like to attract a couple of people with a handful of mares and take care of everything for them in New York..

The insured value of our own Standardbred broodmare band is approximately \$4 million and we take care of a like amount of value in our Standardbred and Sporthorse boarders. *(Blue Chip also has a Sporthorse division, headed by their Olympic Grand Prix jumper, Sapphire.)*

Beyond that, we have twice come very close to standing a stallion at Blue Chip, just through people I know at Coolmore and elsewhere. When the slots bill first passed, I bought 12 or 13 mares and started breeding New York-breds and was really one of the first real people to do that. Then we sort of lost the plot somewhere along the way while everyone messed up Aqueduct for 10 years.

But ultimately, the plan would be to stand a well-pedigreed Thoroughbred stallion worthy of breeding your top mare back to. That's obviously not an easy proposition in the New York Thoroughbred market. We are a little spoiled in that we think we have the best stallions in the game in Standardbreds, and obviously that's not going to happen right off the bat in Thoroughbreds. We're going to take our time because the right deal hasn't come along. To be honest, it does take a good deal of thought and investment on our part, in terms of live-cover insurance, staff, etc. But I think we'll be able to do live cover quite well.

**You've raised a lot of standardbreds, and a few of your own Thoroughbreds. Are there differences?**

At Blue Chip, we have industry-high fertility rates, and two guys who have literally been in the foaling barn for 30-odd years. We have an onsite veterinarian, Herb Burns, who I think is as good as it gets. So in terms of our facility, it's absolutely turn-key. Our horses generally grow up in groups in fields, with each field having raised several Standardbred champions. We have put out a group of Thoroughbred weanlings-to-yearlings alone, and have also mixed them in with the Standardbred population. We have tried it both ways and we have learned that the feed program has to be slightly different. But other than that, and other than the breeding shed itself, really, it is the same skill-set.

As far as foaling, maintenance, care, and the preliminary handling of horses, I think we have the reputation in the Standardbred industry that our horses are well mannered and very comfortable with human beings. I have the labor bill to prove it.

We have a staff of 33 and the average tenure would shock you—I would bet it's over 10 years. We have 15 houses on the farm, and that's how you keep the staff. We helped a lot of people with immigration through the years and have really lost very few people along the way.

Blue Chip can offer everything from getting your mare in foal to sale prep. Currently we prep 70+ yearlings per year for auction and have consigned Thoroughbred yearlings in Saratoga in prior years. Part of our success in raising top flight race horses, Thoroughbred and Standardbred, is our nutrition program. Our fields get tested on a yearly basis and the hay we purchased is also tested so that we can "tweak" our customized feed formula. And it is also important to constantly assess the individual condition of each horse.

**How much capacity do you have to dedicate to Thoroughbreds?**

I think we'd be capable of taking up to 30 this year. I think the ultimate number is more, but I'd rather walk, crawl, run, and prove that we can do it with the same quality that we're used to in Standardbreds.

**From a stallion standpoint, what sort of transition would you need to make?**

We have an 11-stall stallion barn, and I think facility-wise, we'd be fine with a very minor investment. We'd have to change our insurance somewhat and you need the right personnel to physically manage the stallions on a daily basis. We already have that now for our present needs in the Standardbred staff, which are responsible for stallions worth in excess of \$12 million in the Standardbred world. Interestingly, New York, in the Standardbred game, has a no-ship semen policy. It is sort of a hybrid between live cover and what all the other states are in Standardbred racing. I would likely at this point to go out and hire somebody who had been very involved at a good farm that does stand Thoroughbreds. I think it will enhance and refine our current services to include Thoroughbred stallion management. Blue Chip would be committed to making sure it is done to top, top standards.

**In a perfect world, is the right opportunity a partnership with someone else, or a stallion you go out and purchase outright?**

Certainly at the beginning, I'd want to go in on a partnership with someone else. I think we'd want to have skin in the game and equity, but I think we want to play on a level where we would want a partner. Unless we got very lucky, I'm guessing it would be a stallion that has stood somewhere else, but who is an individual that someone would be excited to breed a good mare to.

**How did you become interested in Thoroughbred Racing?**

I grew up in New York City, and was either at Aqueduct or Belmont every Saturday from the age of 4 to 14. I've been to Saratoga every summer since I was five or six. I had the good fortune of buying what I think is the best house in Saratoga; on Union Avenue, right across the gate from the track. It's a sacred place in my family, where my father loved to sit on the porch and watch the world go by in August. That's where the name of my company, Union Avenue Advisors, comes from.

**So how did you end up in Standardbreds?**

I grew up with the Kimelman family, who owned Blue Chip prior to me. I was introduced to Standardbred racing by them. As my other business got very good, there was an opportunity to purchase Blue Chip at a time where the Kimelmans weren't willing to invest in the mares and stallions to the degree the facility needed. The reality is that owning Standardbred racehorses is a much better business than owning Thoroughbreds. I know some of the most blue-blooded Thoroughbred fans, mostly from London, where I had a big office for a while. They used to call us 'racing in wheelchairs,' but they want to own Standardbreds now, because they can't believe we race every week, or that I was in two or three million-dollar races this year, and they can't believe that Roll With Joe earned \$1.8 million lifetime, and he cost \$100 grand. Yearling buyers can really make a return in Standardbred racing. Whatever I do, I try to do at the highest level, and it would have been very hard to do that in Thoroughbred racing from a standstill. I think we have a broodmare band that's as high-quality as anyone in the business, and I think that our stallions, as a group, are the best in the business. And I've made money breeding and selling horses in the Standardbred game. Most people I've talked to in the Thoroughbred game wince when they do the math.

**Has anyone made a profound impact on your career?**

**MM:** I have admired a whole host of people at Tattersalls over the years, probably too many to mention. Also, I met John Dunlop [UK-based trainer] in the early days and have known him ever since. He is someone that I have a huge amount of respect for.

**TDN columnist Bill Oppenheim is a frequent house guest of yours. Does he ever overstay his welcome?**

**MM:** Never. How could he? Bill has been staying with me for around 25 years, and he is the easiest guest. He needs very little looking after, just as long as there is an ample supply of biscuits and crisps. Saying that, he does tend to hit me with some obscure stats after a long day at the sales. I might review my answer to this question upon retirement...

**You will be wrapping up your duties at the turn of the year. Any specific plans for 2012?**

**MM:** I will continue as a Tatts' consultant, but we have not defined a specific role yet. However, the British Racing School will be my main focus. The school trains teenagers to be aspiring jockeys, but it does so much more than that. It's truly amazing to see how it turns young people around and sets them on the right path. I will also spend more time with the Darley Flying Start students during their stint in Newmarket. After retiring, I will have more free time to watch my nags run around the country. That's not necessarily a good thing, though...

**21 AND UP: RAPID REDUX DOES IT AGAIN**

Robert Cole, Jr.'s **Rapid Redux** (Pleasantly Perfect) did it again yesterday at Laurel Park, winning his 21st straight race in a wire-to-wire victory facing \$5,000 starter allowance foes under jockey J.D. Acosta. The 5-

year-old gelding was winning his 19th race of the year, which ties the number of single-season victories of both Citation and Roseben, who accomplished in 1948 and 1905, respectively. But despite published reports, he did not set a record for wins in a season. That mark belongs to Donald Macdonald, who won 22 of his 36 starts in 1913.

Sent off the 2-5 choice in the 1 1/16-mile main track event, Rapid Redux was a bit reluctant to load into post one, but nonetheless was away in good order as part of a six-horse field

and soon was in command. He carved out :24.36 and :48.13 splits while moving comfortably and without much pressure. He got to three quarters in 1:13.05 and kicked away in the stretch, and while **Awesome Rhythm** (Toccet) made a game late push, Rapid Redux had enough in reserve to get the win by a half-length.

"I love the horse," Cole said. "The trainer [David Wells] has done an incredible job. I feel very blessed. It's an incredible feat of luck and incredible skill by the horse. My dad talked about Citation all the time, and it's amazing--here we are at 19 with Citation. There is no way you could ever imagine claiming a horse for \$6,000 that would be mentioned in the same breath as Citation. It is more than a million to one. I know that and do not take it for granted."

Rapid Redux was haltered out of \$6,250 claimer at Penn National in October of 2010 and has lost only one start--his third effort for Wells last November--in 24 subsequent starts. He has earned \$256,384 during the stretch while winning at seven different tracks and racing from five furlongs to 1 1/8 miles.

Acosta is one of seven jockeys to ride Rapid Redux during the streak. Yesterday was his seventh victory aboard the gelding. "He is an athlete. He is like Michael Phelps," Acosta said. "This horse is trained to run. As soon as we turned for home he just started running so hard. But he is slowing down some and might need a little break."

On Nov. 20 at Mountaineer, Rapid Redux won his 20th consecutive race to break the consecutive wins record previously held by Zenyatta (Street Cry {Ire}) and Peppers Pride (Desert God)

Wells said Rapid Redux might start once more before the end of the year. "I would love to squeeze one more out, but it is up to the horse," added Wells. "It is amazing he has stayed sound so long. He trains well every day. He is always at 80-plus percent. A lot of days he is at 100. The reason we kept him sound is we picked our spots really well, keeping our spots really well, keeping him in the \$5,000 starters. You run him in an allowance race or a stakes, he is tore up. We have turned down \$35,000 a couple of times, but he is not going to win for more than that."

Wells said last week that he'd like to see Rapid Redux retired at the end of the year. "Why not let him go out on top? That's what I want to do," he said. Cole added, "You want to win as many as you can, but you also don't want to blow one at the end. We would like to end on a good note and not see him get beat." ### Lasix Administration Tops RCI Model Rule Changes:

The Association of Racing Commissioners International (RCI) Model Rules Committee met at the Omni Tucson National Resort Dec. 8 in Arizona to adopt several changes to their Model Rules, including new limits on who can administer race-day furosemide, commonly known as Lasix or Salix. The modified rules prohibit private veterinarians and veterinarian technicians from administering race-day furosemide, which officials believe will lead to increased protection of the betting public. The committee also reiterated its opposition to the race-day use of adjunct bleeder medications. The only therapeutic treatment allowed on race day is furosemide under strictly regulated terms. This policy is currently under review at the request of several RCI member regulators. Also during the meeting, Model Rules were adopted to place emphasis on the importance of racing officials reporting to the stewards or judges "any perceived issues" with a horse that may significantly affect the running of the race. The committee also added changes that clarify the Jockey Scale of Weights which would allow for more flexibility of the rules when 3-year-old horses are competing against older horses. Additionally, jockey insurance was covered, which would allow increased disclosure of on-track jockey insurance policies. Representatives from 18 North American racing jurisdictions were in attendance, as were industry groups such as the Jockeys' Guild, the National HBPA, the American Quarter Horse Association and the United States Trotting Association.
