NYRA EXECS PLACED ON LEAVE FOLLOWING

NYSRWB REPORT Allegations included in an interim report from the New York State Racing and Wagering Board's investigation into incorrect takeout rates applied to New York Racing Association races have led to NYRA President and CEO Charles Hayward and NYRA Senior VP and General Counsel Patrick Kehoe being placed on administrative leave without pay by the NYRA Executive Committee pending further investigation.

The NYSRWB report alleges that "Information obtained by the Board indicates that various NYRA officials, including the President/CEO, were aware that the 'takeout' rate was above the legally allowed rate. yet continued to collect it," according to a letter from NYSRWB Chairman John Sabini to Robert Megna, chair of the Franchise Oversight Board, which accompanied the Apr. 26 report. An investigation by the NYSRWB was launched after it was discovered by state regulators in December that takeout on exotic wagers at NYRA tracks from Sept. 15, 2010 to Dec. 21, 2011 had not been reduced by 1%, as it should have been following the expiration of a 2008 law. A total of \$8,487,647 was incorrectly withheld from pools due to the error. NYRA has since reduced takeout by an extra 1% in order to make up for the mistake, in addition to issuing refunds to affected bettors it could identify.

While the report establishes that NYRA officials attributed the incorrect takeout rates to an "inadvertent error," the NYSRWB claims that its investigation of more than 5,000 NYRA documents, including emails and financial records, has uncovered evidence that NYRA executives were aware of the issue. The report states that, "Based on a review of NYRA's emails, several NYRA personnel, including CEO Charles Hayward, were notified and/or were aware that the exotic takeout rate had expired. NYRA may not have lowered the rates due to perceived political and financial reasons." In his letter to Chairman Megna, Sabini explained that the NYSRWB's investigation is ongoing as the Board waits for more documents to be provided by NYRA.

A subsequent letter from Megna to NYRA Chairman Steven Duncker dated Apr. 29 requests that the NYRA Board investigate the allegations made in the report and relay their findings and subsequent actions to him by May 4. Megna also said in his letter that he is "simultaneously requesting RWB to review the conduct of the executives cited in the report in regards to licensing standards, and requesting the New York State Inspector General to conduct a review to determine if civil or criminal laws have been violated." always


does," Cisneros said. "When I asked him for a little more in the stretch, he came flying. I'm very happy."



Monday evening, NYRA announced that Hayward and Kehoe had been placed on administrative leave. "NYRA takes the matters identified by the Franchise Oversight Board and the New York State Racing and Wagering Board extremely seriously," said Steve Duncker in a release. "NYRA will take all appropriate steps and actions to cooperate with the State's inquiries and insure the integrity of our operations. As part of these efforts, we will respond to Chairman Megna's letter as requested by May 4. NYRA has worked diligently over the past number of years to improve the racing and agricultural industries in New York State and enhance its national status as an industry leader, and we will continue with that commitment."

NY TIMES SERIES CONTINUES

The second part of a New York Times series on horse racing appears as the lead story on page one of today's New York Times, as well as one of the lead items on the internet homepage and email edition. "Big Purses, Sore Horses, and Death" examines the relationship between enhanced purses at slots tracks and breakdowns, focusing particularly on New York's Aqueduct Racetrack. "Since a casino opened at Aqueduct late last year, offering vastly richer prizes, 30 horses have died racing there, a 100% increase in the fatality rate over the same period the previous year," the story says. The Times story says itobtained the medication records of many of the horses who suffered catastrophic injuries, and reports that "many had been injected repeatedly with pain medication in the weeks before their breakdowns." The story cites the American Association of Equine Practitioners's recommendation that "no purse exceed a horse's value by more than 50%," and argues that when purses exceed that threshold in claiming races, owners are less likely to act in the best interest of their horses due to asymmetric potential financial rewards. The New York State Racing and Wagering Board released a statement Monday following the publishing of the Times piece announcing changes to purses allowed in claiming races (see below for more). The Times piece also examines incidents involving owner Michael Gill, who was banned from Penn National by the Pennsylvania Racing Commission after a rash of breakdowns by his runners led by a refusal of jockeys to ride in races involving horses Gill owned. The story concludes with a description of an incident involving prominent owner Earle Mack, who sold his runner Star Plus for \$1,000 on the grounds that the injury-plagued horse would never be raced again. Star Plus did return to the track for his new owners, however, until Mack was able to work out a deal to purchase him back for \$7,000. "These horses have fought so hard for us and given us so many great thrills and happiness," Mack concludes. "Don't they deserve to be cared for? Don't they deserve better than what we're giving them?" The full story may be read here.

NYSRWB ANNOUNCES RULE CHANGE

On the same day the second installment of a *New York Times* series on horse racing that focused heavily on incidents at Aqueduct, the New York State Racing and Wagering Board announced Monday two significant actions aimed at "[increasing] safety and integrity of horse racing in New York State." The first action was to introduce a new rule for purses in claiming races. Horses in the state must now be entered for a claiming price of at least 50% of the purse for the race. "The previous claiming rule, which had a flat threshold of \$1,200, does not account for the increase of purses due to the proliferation of video lottery terminals (VLTs)," the board explained in a release.


The Board also announced that it is re-considering its rules regarding race-day Furosemide (Lasix), and has begun a two-week public comment period from people in the horse racing industry on the prospect of whether or not to continue to allow the use of the drug.

"We are taking significant action today to address the significant challenges facing horse racing," Racing and Wagering Board Chairman John Sabini said. "There are serious and valid concerns about the safety of racehorses and their riders. The emergency rule we are enacting today creates a more equal and safer playing field in Thoroughbred racing in our state, eliminating the enticement for owners and trainers to put underperforming horses in races where they are pushed beyond their physical capacity. Additionally, the Board's consideration of changing its race-day drug policies starts a conversation whose time has come."

HEARING WITNESSES SUPPORT FEDERAL INTERVENTION IN RACING by Bill Finley

A respected group of Thoroughbred industry participants told members of Congress Monday that federal intervention into horse racing may be the only way for the sport to save itself from itself.

Witnesses Gary Stevens, George Strawbridge, Gretchen Jackson and Arthur Hancock, trainers Kenny McPeek and Glenn Thompson, and veterinarians Dr. Kate Papp and Dr. Gregory Ferraro all stated the belief that the industry would benefit from the passage of Interstate Horseracing Improvement Act of 2011, arguing that ultimately this is now a sport where no one is in charge. The bill has been introduced by Rep. Ed Whitfield (R-KY) and Senator Tom Udall (D-NM) and would allow the federal government to regulate the sport in an effort to curb the use of performance-enhancing drugs and severely punish those who break the rules.

"We must try to change the status quo and I believe the only way to do this is to have a national governing body that has uniform rules and uniform significant penalties for those disobeying these rules," Strawbridge testified. "Perhaps the federal government would mandate this. If the federal government does not affect change, change will not occur as our present organizations are ineffective or unwilling to seek reform. Our alphabet organizations have only produced a Tower of Babel."

With the exception of McPeek, the other seven witnesses testified that the use of drugs, illegal and legal, in the sport has gotten out of control to the detriment of the sport, the jockeys and the horses themselves. Cont. p6

Some of the most forceful testimony came from Papp, a private veterinarian who works out of Penn National.

"It is not uncommon for me to see on race day a practitioner enter a stall in one of the private barns or the detention barn with three to 10 syringes full of medication to be administered and not be questioned by anyone," Papp testified. "In the meantime, there is hardly any surveillance of the horses that are permanently stabled on the racetrack and trainer administration of drugs is ubiquitous...Not a week passes where I am not asked by an individual on the track or at the training center about a new product or a new treatment they have heard about to make their horses run better and if I can obtain it for them. Of course, my regular clients already know better than to ask me how to cheat."

The committee and the witnesses delved into the topics of trainers using illegal drugs in an attempt to improve the performances of their horses as well as the use of legal medications like Lasix. When it came to both matters, the consensus was that the only medications that should be allowed are the ones that have genuine therapeutic affects. That list, most argued, should not include Lasix or other race-day medications.

"To me it's black and white," Stevens said. "If you would get rid of race-day medications you would solve a lot of the sport's problems."

Ferraro, a former racetrack veterinarian who is currently the director of the Center for Equine Health at University of California-Davis, said that he once supported the legal use of drugs like Lasix and Bute, but has changed his mind.

"In hindsight, I was incorrect," he said. "These drugs have not served the industry or the horses well. The industry made a bad decision 40 years ago to go down the path of permissible medication."

Hancock said that those, like himself, who do not approve of race-day medication feel they must have it in order to compete.

"[To not have medication] is like getting into a fight with one hand tied behind your back," he said. "We've got a lot at stake here." Cont. p7

At times, the Congressmen seemed mystified that anyone would want the federal government to get involved in its business and warned the witnesses they could be asking for trouble.

"Here is the difficulty I am having," Congressman Michael Burgess (R-Texas) said. "If there is the ability of racing commissions and your professional organizations to deal with this, in my experience, you are so much better off doing that than asking the U.S. Congress to get involved because, unfortunately, sometimes that creates new and unforseen problems. The law of unintended consequences is one that is alive and well in the United States Congress. Is there any possibility of putting the genie back in the bottle, going back 40 years and creating a structure within the industry itself where federal legislation isn't necessary?"

Ferraro said there wasn't.

"We had a similar hearing like this four years ago and the industry promised you it would solve this and they have basically done nothing," he said.

There was little doubt that the witness list was put together with the intent of stacking it with those who are in favor of expanding the government's role in racing and with those who are anti-drugs. The closest thing to a dissenting opinion was a statement distributed by the National Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association which argued that drugs are not misused in the sport. The group took particular exception to an on-going series of articles in the *New York Times* that has painted drug use in the sport as being out of control.

The bill introduced by Whitfield and Udall would amend the Interstate Horseracing Act of 1978 that legalized simulcasting. The new legislation remains at the committee level.

Jones was still not committing to a start in Saturday's GI Kentucky Derby. "I'm not going to guarantee that we're in or out," Jones commented. "Tomorrow will tell more and we'll know, really, on Wednesday morning when I get on him. Especially if he tries to buck me off coming off that track, then he's in

the gate." Mark Valeski worked in fractions of :11.60, :23.40, :35.20 and :47.60. He galloped out six furlongs in 1:14.60.

"We wanted to make sure we got off to the pole good, but we didn't want to beat him up either," Jones explained. "We sent him away from there to see if he'd keep the pace but, you know, maybe at some point he'll become a good work horse and maybe not. He's never worked well by himself. Cont. p8

"I think he beat a minute one time in his life without having somebody to prompt him to do it," Jones continued. "That's just kind of him. Larry [Melancon] said he got to looking around coming down the lane. It was either call on him and ask him hard or let him finish up the way he did and we know we're fit. The big thing was he didn't drink any water and it sure doesn't seem like it took anything out of him."

Liaison Makes His Case...

Liaison (Indian Charlie) convinced trainer Bob Baffert he belongs in the GI Kentucky Derby field with a five-furlong drill at Churchill Downs Monday in 1:00.80. Working in company, the bay colt carved out fractions of :24.80, :37.20 and :48.80 with jockey Martin Garcia in the irons. He galloped out six furlongs in 1:13.20 and seven panels in 1:26.60.

"Today, he looked more like a Derby horse than he has in the last couple of months," Baffert said. "I was pretty excited with the way he went. He still has a ways to go, but the way he went today, I think definitely he deserves a chance to run in the Kentucky Derby. All systems are go."

Liaison ended his juvenile campaign with a win in the GI CashCall Futurity, but has been off the board in three starts this term. He clipped heels and lost his rider in his 2012 debut in the Feb. 4 GII Robert B. Lewis S., was fourth in the Mar. 10 GII San Felipe S. and sixth in the Apr. 7 GI Santa Anita Derby.

"He was struggling with Santa Anita and never

worked well there," Baffert explained. "The track at Santa Anita was a little bit funny for some horses. He had trouble with it. I think it was a little bit too hard for him. Since he's been here, it's like he's a different horse. He's really moved way up. I'm glad I

brought him to give him that opportunity. From what I saw today, I'm not thinking that he can't lose, but at least he's going to be competitive."

Baffert added that likely Derby favorite **Bodemeister** (Empire Maker) was doing well a day after working five furlongs at Churchill in :59.60. "He looks good," Baffert said. "He handled the work pretty easily. He's a very fit horse. We just need to draw well and have some racing luck."

Union Rags (Dixie Union) returned to the track Monday, two days after an impressive five-furlong drill in :59.80. "He jogged two miles and walked through the paddock," said trainer Michael Matz. "He came out of the work very well." Matz added the strapping bay has been doing well since arriving at Churchill last week. "[Assistant trainer] Peter [Brette] said he thought he was going to pull his arms out this week," Matz said. "There's nothing else we can do except keep him happy until Saturday."

Brette was also the regular exercise rider for Barbaro (Dynaformer). "It's very nice to be back," Brette said. "We have some very nice memories from here. It's really nice to be back with a horse that's got a really good chance."

Of Union Rags, Brette said, "He's a very happy horse. He's always been a happy horse, very easy to deal with. He's certainly coming into himself right now. Since we've brought him up to Kentucky, he's certainly starting to peak."

Longchamp's empty stands show French racing appeals more to trainers by Chris Cook, guardian.co.uk

When you persistently offer something for free, you run the risk of suggesting it has no particular value. When you offer something for free and get hardly any takers, the fact would appear to be proven. That is the uncomfortable position in which French racing found itself here at Longchamp on Sunday, when this famous course staged Europe's first Group One race of the year, won in stirring style by Cirrus Des Aigles, one of the four best racehorses in the world. Entry cost nothing but the pitiful crowd, for which a figure was not available, did not appear to number more than 3,000 by the estimate of one regular.

Arnold in Familiar Territory...

Two years ago, trainer Rusty Arnold saddled the Alex Campbell homebred It's Tea Time (Dynaformer) to a ninth-place finish in the GI Kentucky Oaks. That filly was coming off a runner-up finish in Keeneland's GI Ashland S. Arnold returns this year with another Campbell homebred in Karlovy Vary (Dynaformer), who is coming off a front-running victory in the Ashland.

"It's Tea Time had not run on dirt before the Oaks," Arnold recalled yesterday. "Karlovy Vary ran here in the [GII] Golden Rod last year and she had the 10 hole and was wide most of the way [before finishing seventh]."

The Golden Rod is Karlovy Vary's only start to date on the dirt, but Arnold thinks the surface won't be a problem. "Because of her pedigree, she started long on the turf, but she had trained on dirt a lot before she ran," Arnold commented. "She has come a long way. She was a little bit intimidated last year, but she is a different horse now. She breezes well on the dirt and her work here Saturday was good. I can give you a lot of opinions, but the facts will come out Friday."

Karlovy Vary broke her maiden over the Keeneland turf in her second start. She is unbeaten in two outings this term after opening the year with an allowance win over the Gulfstream turf Feb. 26 before her 3/4-length Ashland victory.



Successful on her first two starts over 12 furlongs at Clairefontaine last summer, Aquamarine was sixth in the Listed Prix de Liancourt over 1 5/16 mile at Longchamp in September and fourth in the Listed Prix Solitude over 10 furlongs at Saint-Cloud in November. A return runner-up finish behind "TDN Rising **Star"** Amaxios (GB) (Monsun {Ger}) in a 10-furlong conditions event at Longchamp Apr. 8 gave little indication that she was ready to capture a contest of this nature and she was mainly ignored by the crowds as a result. Keen initially for Thomas Huet while tracking the leading trio headed by last year's Arc runner-up Shareta, the bay showed the sharper turn of acceleration in the deep ground to gain the edge with 150 yards remaining and assert from that rival and the staying-on Haya Landa. Talwar Added to 2000 Guineas...

Vimal Khosla's **Talwar (Ire)** (Acclamation {GB}) was yesterday supplemented for Saturday's G1 Qipco 2000 Guineas, making a maximum field of 22 colts for the Newmarket Classic. Successful on his 3-year-old bow in the Listed International Trial S. over a mile on Lingfield's Polytrack Apr. 14, the Jeremy Noseda trainee was last of five behind Derrick Smith, Susan Magnier and Michael Tabor's **Camelot (GB)** (Montjeu {Ire}) in the G1 Racing Post Trophy at Doncaster in October. That unbeaten colt is one of three left in by Aidan O'Brien alongside **TDN Rising Star"** and G1 National S. winner **Power (GB)** (Oasis Dream {GB}) and the Apr. 15 G3 Leopardstown 2,000 Guineas Trial S. victor **Furner's Green (Ire)** (Dylan Thomas {Ire}).

There were no surprise withdrawals at yesterday's five-day stage, with other notables in the list being the **TDN Rising Star"** Born To Sea (Ire) (Invincible Spirit {Ire})--who is set to sport the Tsui silks of Sea the Stars (Ire)--and Top Offer (GB) (Dansili {GB}). The latter was taken out of his intended prep in the G3 Greenham S. due to testing ground and jockey James Doyle is hoping that the rain abates for the Juddmonte challenger. "He's in great form and worked very nicely yesterday, but I just hope the ground has dried up by Saturday," Doyle said yesterday.

One who will not be inconvenienced by an easier surface is Gerard Augustin-Normand's Hermival (Ire) (Dubawi {Ire}), who was last seen finishing third behind the re-opposing compatriots French Fifteen (Fr) (Turtle Bowl {Ire}) and Abtaal (Rock Hard Ten) in the G3 Prix Djebel over seven furlongs at Maisons-Laffitte Apr. 5. Trainer Mikel Delzangles, who won this two years ago with another son of Dubawi in Makfi (GB), told PA Sport, "I was happy with his run at Maisons-Laffitte and I think he has improved a lot for that, so we are looking forward to running him. It is too early to compare him with Makfi--it is very difficult. But he is in good form and he won't mind if the ground is soft."

Newmarket's Clerk of the Course Michael Prosser provided an update on conditions at the Suffolk venue yesterday. "There is more rain on the way tonight, but there is nothing of major consequence after that," Prosser said. "It's looking like we will start on the soft side of good."

Trainer Ralph Beckett yesterday added Lady Marchwood's impressive G3 Fred Darling S. winner Moonstone Magic (GB) (Trade Fair {GB}) to Sunday's G1 Qipco 1,000 Guineas at Newmarket. Successful by 3 3/4 lengths in Newbury's seven-furlong trial Apr. 21, the unbeaten homebred's supplementary means that a maximum of 20 fillies will oppose Michael Tabor. Derrick Smith and Susan Magnier's **TDN Rising** Star" Maybe (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}). "They are forecasting more rain over the next 36 hours, with showers for the weekend," Beckett told PA Sport yesterday. "Newmarket say it will be good ground at best and it is a shade of odds-on to be slower than that given the forecast, in which case we really felt we should run. It may be quick running her back again, but she seems to have recovered from her exertions at Newbury, so it is the right thing to do."

Alongside the unbeaten G1 Moyglare Stud S. heroine Maybe, Ballydoyle also has a trio of contenders headed by the Apr. 15 G3 Leopardstown 1,000 Guineas Trial S. scorer Homecoming Queen (Ire) (Holy Roman Emperor {Ire}), while a strong Irish presence is bolstered by Joerg Vasicek's G1 Phoenix S. scorer La Collina (Ire) (Strategic Prince {GB}) and Pearl Bloodstock's G1 Cheveley Park S. winner Lightening Pearl (Ire) (Marju {Ire}). The latter's trainer Ger Lyons tweeted yesterday, "Lightening Pearl is well and on course for the 1000 Guineas. Hope the rain stops ASAP."

RACETRACK ROUND-UP

Kempton Save Ascot Card...

Wednesday's meeting at Ascot, which was set to feature the G3 Sagaro S., was yesterday switched to Kempton due to waterlogging of the Berkshire venue. As a result of the heavy rainfall which has blighted Britain in the last week, Ascot's Clerk of the Course Chris Stickels was given no option but to call off the fixture. "We've had an unprecedented amount of rain during April--123 millimetres of rain this month, 110 of which has fallen in the last two weeks--and we've got waterlogged places on the straight and round course."



Racecourse Gallop for Frankel...


Sir Henry Cecil yesterday announced that Frankel (GB) (Galileo {Ire}) will take part in a racecourse gallop at Newmarket on Sunday as he is geared towards the May 19 G1 Lockinge S. at Newbury. Hopes remain high that the world's highest-rated performer will make that mile comeback. "At the moment everything is going fine and we're going to have a racecourse gallop. hopefully on Sunday at Newmarket," Cecil said yesterday. "Hopefully we'll get to the Lockinge." Cecil also had news of Frankel's full-brother Noble Mission (GB), who holds an entry in Saturday's Listed Newmarket S. "He's a nice horse who needs experience, so we'll probably run here at Newmarket," he said. "He has to go on improving and time will tell--he's settled down now and has a hood on to keep him relaxed. We also have a half-brother to him called Morpheus (GB) (Oasis Dream {GB}) who will be out later in the year."

Cirrus Fine after Ganay Romp...

Corine Barande-Barbe yesterday gave a clean bill of health to Sunday's impressive G1 Prix Ganay hero Cirrus des Aigles (Fr) (Even Top {Ire}), who is being targeted at the G1 King George VI and Queen Elizabeth S. Successful by eight lengths in the Longchamp contest, the 6-year-old is set to return to Ascot in a bid to follow up his G1 Champion S. success there in the July 21 highlight. "He is so well--when he needs a rest, we will give it to him--and I think he has not yet reached the top," Barande-Barbe said. "Where he runs next will be determined by the field and the going, but one thing is for sure, I'd like to run him in the King George. I think he loved Ascot last year and he stayed 12 furlongs in Meydan and at Deauville in the soft last year. If he could also take on Frankel (GB) (Galileo {Ire}) over 10 furlongs, that would be a big sensation for us and he may get the chance when he goes back to Ascot to try and do the double in the [Oct. 20] Champion S."

Tin Horse Waits...

Trainer Didier Guillemin yesterday scratched last year's G1 Poule d'Essai des Poulains winner **Tin Horse** (Ire) (Sakhee) from the G2 Prix du Muguet due to the testing ground. Marquesa de Moratalla's homebred would have raced under a penalty in today's mile contest and instead will be prepared for a tilt at the G1 Prix d'Ispahan at Longchamp May 27. "As it is his first run for eight months and he has top weight, I have decided not to risk him on such testing ground," Guillemin told the *Racing Post*.

It's Classic trial time again in Europe, so it is to be expected that Galileo's name will never be far away from the headlines. Sure enough, Europe's highest-priced stallion scored a notable double for the Coolmore partners last week with a pair of TDN Rising Stars". Firstly, his son Imperial Monarch took the G3 Derby trial at Sandown and then Pour Moi's high-priced three-parts-sister Kissed recorded a facile victory in the Salsabil S. For good measure, Galileo also cropped up as the broodmare sire of Hard Dream, the Oasis Dream colt who was winning for the third time in four starts when he landed the G2 Prix Noailles, one of the main trials for the Prix du Jockey-Club.

Because the riders employed some extreme measures in a bid to cope with the bottomless ground, which suits so few horses, television's Nick Luck likened the Sandown meeting to Wacky Races. Imperial Monarch's young rider Joseph O'Brien was indeed as scheming as Dick Dastardly in deciding to take a very long route on the wide outside in search of better going. Whereas Dastardly's plotting never paid off, O'Brien's strategy was rewarded with a victory over Thought Worthy, a brother to the St Leger winner Lucarno. While it is anyone's guess as to what the form amounts to, the trial had looked a quality renewal beforehand and there's every chance that Imperial Monarch will develop into a leading Derby contender.

After all, he comes from a family which has made several bold attempts at winning the Epsom Derby or its French equivalent, thanks to Galileo's sire Sadler's Wells. When this astonishing stallion was first mated with Imperial Monarch's second dam Snow Day (who had been good enough to contest the Prix de l'Arc), he sired the 1990 Derby second Blue Stag. Snow Day's next Sadler's Wells colt, Oscar, also found only one too good for him when he contested the 1997 Prix du Jockey-Club over a mile and a half. Cont. p14

Imperial Monarch's stakes-winning dam Ionian Sea also became a regular visitor to Sadler's Wells after being bought for 45,000gns in 1998. Her first visit produced The Great Gatsby, who, at 20-1, came to the final furlong of the 2003 Derby with a lead of about two lengths, only to be worn down by Kris Kin in the closing stages.

Ionian Sea's four subsequent foals by Sadler's Wells included a pair of Group 1 performers in Magritte, a lightly raced third in the Racing Post Trophy, and Roman Empress, third in the Yorkshire Oaks. Since then she has visited Sadler's Wells's sons Montjeu and Galileo, with Demi O'Byrne signing the ticket at 400,000gns for Imperial Monarch's year-younger sister last October.

It is easy to understand why Ionian Sea was considered an ideal candidate for mating to Sadler's Wells. In addition to being a half-sister to two Classic performers by him, she was by Slip Anchor. Like his sire Shirley Heights and grandsire Mill Reef, Slip Anchor had triumphed in the Derby, and mares by these Mill Reef line stallions had excelled with Sadler's Wells. Sadler's Wells ended up with 13 Group 1 winners out of mares by Mill Reef's sons Shirley Heights and Doyoun or by Shirley Heights' son Darshaan. One of the best of them was High Chaparral, winner of the Derby and Irish Derby.

With Sadler's Wells gone, Galileo became a natural alternative for these Mill Reef line mares, and he has more than 90 foals aged three or over out of Darshaan mares, plus around 30 out of daughters of Shirley Heights. The Shirley Heights contingent includes the Group 1 winner Sans Frontieres (G1 Irish St Leger) and Kissed is his eighth stakes winner out of Darshaan mares. The previous seven include the group winners Alandi (G1 Irish St Leger and G1 Prix du Cadran), Midas Touch (second in the G1 St Leger), Adored, Sevenna, and Sense of Purpose. Galileo also has a phenomenal record with mares by Darshaan's son Mark of Esteem, notably siring the Irish Derby winner Treasure Island. As most of Galileo's good winners out of Darshaan mares have stayed a mile and three-quarters, there is every reason to expect Kissed to improve further when she steps up to the 1 1/2-mile Classics. The same very much applies to Imperial Monarch, especially as his broodmare sire Slip Anchor was a stronger influence for stamina than his paternal half-brother Darshaan.

Although there is no inbreeding in the first five generations of Imperial Monarch's pedigree, two of his grandparents--Urban Sea and Slip Anchor--are out of mares with similar German bloodlines. Urban Sea's dam Allegretta was inbred 2x4 to the German Derby winner Alchimist and had a second dam by another German Derby winner, Magnat. On the other hand, Slip Anchor's dam Sayonara was inbred 4x4 to Alchimist and had a third dam by Magnat.

Moving on to Galileo's success in the role of broodmare sire of Hard Dream, he is still in the very early stages of this aspect of his career. His Northern Hemisphere daughters have fewer than 110 foals aged three or over, with this year's 2-year-olds boosting the total to around 190. The encouraging news is that there are four group winners among the first hundred or so foals, the others being the Group 1 winner La Collina (by Danehill's grandson Strategic Prince), the Group 2 winner Saamidd (by Street Cry) and the Group 3 winner Alexander Pope (by Danehill Dancer).

One interesting aspect of Hard Dream's pedigree is that he is by Oasis Dream, a son of Green Desert. Of course it was Cape Cross, another son of Green Desert, who sired Galileo's brilliant half-brother Sea The Stars. Invincible Spirit, yet another son of Green Desert, is the sire of Galileo's half-brother Born To Sea, who could well add further distinction to Urban Sea's exceptional record in Saturday's 2,000 Guineas.

Breeders have been keen to send their Galileo mares to Green Desert stallions and they already have nine foals of racing age by Invincible Spirit, including four 2012 2-year-olds, six by Oasis Dream, including three 2012 juveniles, and five by Cape Cross. Not surprisingly, though, in view of Galileo's Coolmore connections, the most popular option for Galileo mares has been Danehill's sons, such as Aussie Rules (3 foals), Clodovil (2), Danehill Dancer (6), Duke of Marmalade (6), Dylan Thomas (8), Holy Roman Emperor (4), Oratorio (5), Rock of Gibraltar (2) and Tiger Hill (5). Oasis Dream's 2-year-olds out of Galileo mares include Aidan O'Brien's Illustrate, who should be well worth watching out for judging by his 700,000gns price tag as a yearling.

Congratulations to Mr. Whiteley on his wonderful article in the *TDN* regarding the need for a Super Fund for the welfare of our Beloved Thoroughbreds (<u>TDN Op/Ed, April 27, 2012</u>). I have written in the past to The Jockey Club, NTRA, Thoroughbred Charities of America, Thoroughbred Retirement Fund, *TDN, DRF*, Ray Paulick with suggestions similar to his. I think a lot of the equine media now sees the need to end the slaughter.

It will benefit the industry to do so. His pointing out that a donation made here and there has not and will not save our TBs from slaughter is so true. His suggestions for owners/breeders to pay a mandatory fee at the time of registering a foal is spot on. And if and when the horses are sold, new owners should pay a fee toward the horses' retirement welfare. Also, percentages of the horses' earnings should be set aside for retirement, as he said. A portion of every entry fee can also be made as a contribution to the retirement fund. I believe this has to include the low-level claimers at tracks all over the country, who are the innocents mostly sent to slaughter. Although, Au Currant proves that it can happen to any one of them as they change hands or move down the claiming ranks.

As a gentleman of prestige in the industry, I thank him for stepping up and addressing what needs to be done to save our horses from a brutal death.

I love them all; champions and claimers, and they all deserve a good life after racing.

Kudos to the Clays at Three Chimneys for saving Au Currant and I thank Mr. Whiteley again for putting the horses first.

JOCKEYS' GUILD ISSUES STATEMENT OF **POLICIES** Edited Press Release

The board of directors of the Jockeys' Guild has voted to adopt the following policy statement concerning race day medications and safety concerns:

- The safety of human and equine athletes must be paramount at all times in racing.
- We participate on, and support the mission of, the Racing Medication Testing Consortium board ("RMTC"), which is striving to develop and promote uniform rules, policies and testing standards at the national level; coordinate research and educational programs that seek to ensure the integrity of racing and the health and welfare of race horses and participants; and protect the interests of the racing public.
- The rules regarding race-day medication should be uniform throughout the United States through the creation of an Interstate Compact on Horse Racing which will enable states to act cooperatively with more uniform, effective and efficient practices, programs, rules and regulations related to racing.
- We support the RMTC's recommendation to reduce the threshold of in-blood for phenylbutazone (Bute) from 5 micrograms/milliliter (ug/ml) to 2 micrograms/milliliter (ug/ml).
- We support mandatory pre-race veterinary exams as the only real guarantee against unsafe horses on the racetrack. We believe there should be a stronger emphasis on the responsibility of the veterinarian in the afternoon to scratch horses that are not warming up soundly during the post-parade.
- We agree that the improper use of clenbuterol and illegally compounded non-FDA-approved substances is a serious concern. We support the RMTC's current efforts to determine the withdrawal times before a horse so treated can be allowed to race.

- We agree that corticosteroids have to be thoroughly studied and limited in use as the science dictates.
- We support rigorous limits on extra corporeal shock wave therapy. Every owner, trainer, or veterinarian who owns or buys a shock wave therapy apparatus must register it with the Commission. Board of Stewards and race track where it is being used before it is used and give notice every time it is used. Shock Wave therapy needs to be conducted at a designated area, overseen by a regulatory veterinarian or racing official. The details of any such treatment for any horse shall be provided to all jockeys and the horse shall not race within 10 days of treatment as currently stated in the ARCI Model Rules.
- We agree that no adjunct race day medications are permissible.
- We support continuing scientific studies of the safety of utilizing Furosomide ('Lasix') as a raceday medication and will work with the industry to take any actions necessary to ensure safety. If Lasix is used it shall be administered by a regulatory veterinarian.

MELBOURNE YEARLING SALE ENDS

The two-day Inglis Melbourne Autumn Yearling Sale concluded yesterday with 310 yearlings grossing A\$2,896,750. The sale average was A\$9,344 and the median was A\$6,500. The buy-back rate was 18%. During last year's sale, 247 yearlings sold for A\$2,843,250, an average of A\$11,511 and a median of A\$7,500. Steve Brem paid the sales' top price of A\$58,000 (US\$60,478) for hip 245, a son of Musket (Aus) out of Zirascible (NZ) (Zabeel {NZ}) from John North's Bowness Stud. Among the foreign buyers active at the auction were the Malaysian-based stable of Katherine Hughes, Singapore trainers Theo Kieser and Dr. KC Yeoh and the Hong Kong-based Price Bloodstock.



Recently, I wrote to a senior manager at Churchill Downs, requesting that they allow offsite fractional wagering for Superfectas on the Oaks and Derby days' cards. (The host site determines the wagering menu.) Thus far, it has fallen on deaf ears. In my humble opinion, declining to offer offsite fractional wagering for Superfectas truly represents an opportunity squandered for the entire Thoroughbred industry. The feedback that I have received from advance deposit wagering companies, racing journalists, and a former major racetrack executive indicate that they fully agree with my statements.

My plea, made via e-mail, is restated below.

I do have sincere empathy for the magnitude of the operational challenges facing you on Derby and Oaks days. I can fully comprehend that trying to accommodate all types of wagers is simply not practical on these critical revenue dates.

As we discussed, on major race days such as the Kentucky Derby and the Oaks, because of the magnitude of the events, many "non-racing aficionados" attend. Most of them will make wagers, but will struggle in their attempt to stipulate the desired wager, creating delays in the individual transaction process at the teller windows. Compounding this, when you then add fractional wagers to the menu, you will have the teller trying to maintain concentration for multiple small wagers, and then providing change (including coins) to complete the transaction. This creates a mounting non-recoverable backlog situation at the teller windows.

Recognizing that these two events (Derby & Oaks) most probably "make or break" the entire season, maximizing the gross revenue via handle at the onsite teller stations is critical to CD's success and overall profit.

My Request: Allow all offsite wagering venues to offer fractional Superfecta wagering on the Oaks & Derby Day cards, while maintaining your onsite policy of \$1.00 minimum onsite wager menu for Superfectas.

CD's Alleged Primary Reason For Not Allowing Offsite Fractional Wagering: It is unfair to the onsite patrons to have a different wagering menu than offsite bettors.

Counterpoint: Is it fair for onsite patrons to pay \$20 - \$50 (or more) for parking on Oaks and Derby days when they would normally pay \$2-\$5 (or free) on other race days? Is it fair for the onsite patrons to pay staggering entrance costs plus seat license fees in order to attend on Derby and Oaks days? Is it fair for onsite patrons who reside great distances from Louisville to pay lodging fees that double or triple for this wonderful event?

Yes, we all acknowledge that you have a captive audience that will pay the additional sums for the sheer enjoyment and experience of your magnificent event; ...an event that represents the greatest Thoroughbred horse race in the world.

The entire CD management team deserves much credit for the enduring aura and growing success of these two significant race cards.

The Marketing & Business Logic of My Request:

With the massive competition for entertainment and gambling revenues, it is critically important to identify and expand every opportunity. Without growth in interest in Thoroughbred horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering, this product, in general, will continue its steady decline. Ultimately, the impact will resonate to Derby and Oaks days.

To the best of my knowledge, fractional exotic wagering is the only growing segment of pari-mutuel wagering. Fractional exotic wagering is most attractive to the potential new customer, and also to the long established "improver of the breed." This is especially true for major races that have the maximum amount of entries.

For those who use online advance deposit wagering (ADW) there is literally no impact to the system. For those who use terminals or kiosks at the tracks and OTBs throughout the country, there is perhaps some minimal impact to the individual transaction time. However, for tellers at the tracks and OTBs, I would estimate that the gross wagering revenue would be greater with the option of fractional Superfecta wagering vs. non-fractional Superfecta wagering.

To the small or novice bettor, placing a "boxed Superfecta fractional wager" on the Kentucky Derby is similar to purchasing a lottery ticket, but with vastly improved odds of winning. For as little as \$.10 for a straight four-horse selection, or \$2.40 for a "boxed four-horse selection," someone can wager on these important races and have some fun, maintaining a keen interest in the entire telecast while watching and wagering from home (via an ADW system). For under \$10.00 total (\$9.60), they can increase their chances of winning four-fold (four boxed selections involving various combinations of four horses). With large fields and no heavy favorite as is often the situation in the Ky. Derby, as you well know, the payoffs can be quite handsome.

His is an opportunity for NBC and Churchill Downs to promote ADW in general, and <u>especially via</u> <u>TwinSpires</u>. The fractional wager can be touted as the "responsible wager," generating interest and fun. For those who have ADW accounts, they may tune-in for the entire telecast at their homes. By promoting fractional wagering as <u>"responsible wagering,"</u> it may possibly build interest and fan base for future telecasts. Promotional opportunities abound for ADW and can start immediately!!!


