





CAPETOWN NOIR DOMINATES GUINEAS

Capetown Noir (SAf) (Western Winter) cruised to an easy victory in Saturday's G1 Cape Premier Yearling Sales Guineas in Kenilworth. The black colt progressed through the ranks to run second, beaten a pixel, in the G2 Selangor Cup over course and distance last time Dec. 2, and he continued his rapid rise with an

crown for trainer Dean
Kannemeyer and
jockey Karl Neisius
with his fourth. Black
Toga (SAf) (Black
Minnaloushe) grabbed
the early lead and set
quick splits, while
Capetown Noir settled

on the rail three back. Committed earlier than usual here, he surged clear passing the quarter-mile marker and kept on strongly under mild coaxing inside the closing panel to score by daylight. Winning owner Lady Christine Laidlaw had a momentous day, celebrating her husband's 70th birthday, their 25th wedding anniversary and her second Guineas victory in four years. Capetown Noir will now point to the G1 Cape Derby or the G1 J&B Met, both back here Feb. 2.

SHADOW OF A CHANCE

Today's G1 Arima Kinen at Nakayama in Japan features a plethora of talented locals, as well as a few options for good value. One horse that fits the latter profile is **Dark Shadow (Jpn)** (Dance in the Dark {Jpn}), who may not have yet reached the stature of race favorites **Gold Ship (Jpn)** (Stay Gold {Jpn}), **Trailblazer (Jpn)** (Zenno Rob Roy {Jpn}), and **Rulership (Jpn)** (King Kamehameha {Jpn}), but is a legitimate threat on recent form to capture his first Group 1 victory. A two-

time graded stakes winner in his native land last year, Dark Shadow closed out his 4-year-old campaign by finishing second in the G1 Tenno Sho Autumn S. at Tokyo. In his first start of 2012, the Tomokazu lizuka colorbearer finished two lengths in second behind Trailblazer in the G2 Kyoto Kinen Feb. 12 before venturing overseas for the



RACETRACK ROUND-UP

PAYNTER SET TO RETURN TO BAFFERT BARN

Paynter (Awesome Again), who has battled colitis and laminitis since winning the GI Haskell Invitational at Monmouth Park in August, has been cleared to leave the New Bolton Center and return to the Southern California barn of trainer Bob Baffert. Owner Ahmed Zayat confirmed via twitter Saturday night that the 3-year-old will ship from New Jersey to California Dec. 29. "My family and I are extremely excited and proud of our warrior," Zayat said. "We have made plans to personally travel to California to be the first to welcome our special colt back to his old home and make sure that he is settled safely and happily."

MARCH RETURN LIKELY FOR FORT LARNED

Fort Larned (E Dubai), unraced since winning the GI Breeders' Cup Classic, has been enjoying some time off, but trainer lan Wilkes is planning on a spring return for the Janis Whitham homebred. "We're not in a big rush, but the race I've earmarked for Fort Larned is the [Mar. 9] GII Gulfstream Park H.," said Wilkes. Fort Larned, who won the GIII Skip Away S. over the Gulfstream oval last winter, is currently in light training at Palm Meadows. "There is plenty of time for workouts," Wilkes said. "He looks good and is doing very well, I'm very happy with him."

ACTION ANDY DRILLS FOR MR. PROSPECTOR

Action Andy (Gators n Bears), aiming for a fourth straight stakes victory in Saturday's GIII Mr. Prospector S. at Gulfstream Park, worked four furlongs in :49 2/5 yesterday at Tampa Bay Downs. "He's a good horse doing great right now," said trainer Carlos Garcia. "We're going to do things a little different than when we brought him down there last year and he didn't run very well. Instead of shipping down the day before, we'll come several days ahead to let him settle in. John Velazquez is going to ride him."





BLACK-TYPE PREVIEWS

Shadow of a Chance (cont. from p1)

Second in the G2 Sapporo Kinen in his return to the races Aug. 19, Dark Shadow was a close-up fourth in the Tenno Sho Autumn Oct. 28, and was most recently fourth, beaten 2 1/4 lengths, in the G1 Japan Cup Nov. 25, behind, arguably, the three best horses in training in Japan: Gentildonna (Jpn) (Deep Impact {Jpn}), Orfevre (Jpn) (Stay Gold {Jpn}), and Rulership. Trainer Noriyuki Hori indicated that his charge is plenty fit for today's challenge.

"For his last two starts, we worked him hard on a Wednesday, trying to get his weight down," Hori said. "But this time he was ready to go last week. The big concern for us last time [in the Japan Cup] was the distance, but we know now he can handle it. He traveled at the back and we had to make our move early, but he was still accelerating in the straight. We got a lot out of his last race."

Dark Shadow gets the services of top international rider Ryan Moore for the Arima Kinen.

"He seems like he's in pretty good condition," Moore noted. "I could tell right away that he's got a lot of quality, that he's a very good horse. I'm really pleased with where he's at. You never know how a race will turn out, but I'm in this to win it. Hopefully I can deliver a Christmas gift to all the fans."

AI A POSITIVE FOR STANDARDBRED INDUSTRY

On Dec. 19, Australian Federal Court Justice Alan Robertson brought a contentious and long-spanning

debate to a close when he ruled that the live cover requirement to register Thoroughbreds in that country is not an illegal restraint of trade, thus upholding the ban on artificial insemination for Thoroughbreds intended to race. Small-scale Thoroughbred breeder Bruce McHugh brought his case against the Australian Turf Club more than three years ago, claiming that the ban on AI was an illegal trade restraint, and violated Australia's competition and consumer act. The case garnered international attention,

drawing witnesses from France, Ireland, the UK, and Hong Kong during its six-week trial last year.

And for good reason: a lift of the Al ban in Australia would not only set a precedent for similar practices to be allowed in other countries, but it would also potentially restrict Australia's prospects of international competition, as its Al-conceived Thoroughbreds would not be eligible to compete outside the country.


A number of the world's Thoroughbred breeding officials and organizations breathed a collective sigh of relief at Justice Robertson's ruling. In addition to challenging international standards, the practice of Al

could invite a number of negative ramifications, including the narrowing of the gene pool and loss of business for boarding farms that would generally house mares shipped to their regions for covering.

It is important to note, however, that the Thoroughbred is the only major breed in the world that does not allowed conception by artificial insemination. Harness racing in the U.S. began allowing AI in the late in 1950s when Hal Jones, a Harness Racing Hall of Famer and manager of Pickwick Farms in Ohio, developed the practice in order to grow the

book size of his popular sire Gene Abbe from the standard 48 mares to 90.

"That was a number we had never seen before," explained Alan Leavitt, a Harness Racing Hall of Fame breeder and President and General Manager of Walnut Hall Farm in Kentucky. "There was a legal action brought against it by the United States Trotting Association, and they lost. From that time, other farm managers lost no time in taking up artificial insemination."

Leavitt noted that the development of the process has been gradual. In the beginning, mares were still required to ship to the stallion premises to be inseminated artificially. Today, semen is chilled and shipped to breeders, allowing everyone to stay at home.

Bob Marks, the Marketing Director of Perretti Farms, the largest Standardbred breeding farm in New Jersey, said he sees nothing undesirable about AI.

"I don't really see any negatives," Marks said. "It enables you to keep your mares home and simply breed them to the stallion of your choice, which may be totally out of jurisdiction. It's also easier on the stallion. It enables him to breed, from one collection, up to 15 mares, depending on how fertile he is. We can also send the semen all over the world. It seems primitive in this modern age to put a mare and foal on a truck and waste gas and time driving her someplace to get bred, when we have the technology to get the semen from here to there lightning quick."

New York is the only state that still does not allow semen to be shipped outside its borders. Marks said the necessity of sending his mares on long van rides to use New York sires affects his breeding decisions.

"I have a breeding to a New York stallion to use next year, and at first I'd been thinking I'd really like to breed a particular mare," he said. "But then I got thinking, she's 20 years old, she doesn't need to get put on a truck and go four hours up to the mountains of New York just to be bred. I have to actually change my breeding plans to select a younger, more appropriate mare to do that. That's the way we think."

Marks explained that even with transportation of semen permitted for Standardbred breeders, a certain amount of shipping and boarding of mares can be involved. Because quality of semen among stallions will vary, some breeders find it advantageous to house their mares, especially the better ones, nearer to the stallion, so as to make the Al process as quick and efficient as possible. He said boarding farms in New Jersey, even with few stallions in the state, have not been affected by the practice of Al, as far as he can tell. Leavitt, however, noted that he has seen a decrease of Standardbred boarding facilities in Kentucky.

"I've been in Kentucky for 18 years now, and I see all these Thoroughbred farms that live by boarding mares and bringing them to be bred to stallions," he explained. "It's a great economy for the mare owners."

While AI allows Standardbred breeders to ship semen around the globe, it does not eliminate the possibility of the stallions shuttling to the Southern Hemisphere. Perretti's leading U.S. sire Rocknroll Hanover, as well as young sire sensation Somebeachsomewhere, are currently finishing the Southern Hemisphere season at David James's Empire Stallions in Victoria, Australia. *Cont. p7*





"The Australians seem to want the horse there," Marks explained. "Some horses get sent down there and do double duty, other horses we simply send the semen, depending on what the supply and demand is, and how fertile the horse may be. Also, if you don't feel like he's a good shipper, you might just send the frozen semen. Rocknroll Hanover will breed 150 mares there, and I don't know if he would breed that many if we just sent his semen."

Some involved in the Thoroughbred industry have expressed concern that, because AI and shipping of semen would eliminate certain costs and allow for ease of access to any stallion, only the most prolific stallions would be in demand, causing a narrowing of the gene pool that would be a detriment to the breed. In 1992, a genetic analysis performed on the Standardbred breed showed this, in fact, to be the case.

"The woman who did the study, Dr. Judith King, a graduate student at the University of Kentucky, told us that there was a 16 to 17% loss of heterozygosity in

the breed, particularly with trotters," Leavitt explained. "Heterozygosity is the variability factor. She said scientifically that's a terrible loss, and is heading the breed in totally the wrong direction."

In 2007, a number of Standardbred breeders approached the USTA, which passed a rule that, beginning in 2009, any stallion entering the stud book would be restricted to covering a maximum of 140 mares. Because of legal considerations, the rule could not be extended to include active stallions that had already been

sold and syndicated.

"A lot of us were not in favor of it, but they did it anyway," Marks said. "A lot of us felt that the market via supply and demand decided [how many mares a stallion would cover]. In other words, if a horse isn't any good, guess what? He's not going to have too many breeding applications. The most important thing is to make intelligent breeding decisions."

Tom Charters, the President and CEO of the Hambletonian Society, said he hasn't observed much protest to the limitation.

"When they enacted the rule, there were many horses covering more than 140 mares," he said. "But I haven't heard a great outcry where there's a dozen stallions that people aren't getting booked to. If you talk to the stallion owners, they'll tell you it's a bad thing, but in terms of diversity, it provides more opportunities for more stallions, especially for the state-bred programs. It gives the smaller programs better opportunity to get good horses."

Charters said that, while he is in agreement that Al contributed to narrowing the Standardbred gene pool, it has also accelerated improvement of the breed.



"The Standardbred, in my lifetime, has improved by about eight seconds, and that's 40 lengths," Charters noted. "[Al] has accelerated the improvement of the breed very much so. So that's the good part of it, other than the individual benefit to a few stallion owners. I think that the ability of the great stallions to cover so many mares in some ways narrowed the gene pool, but it also accelerated the speed and gait of our horses."

This is an observation that Marks said he shares.

More recently, the USTA implemented another measure that will influence stallion activity. Beginning with foals of 2014, any progeny of a stallion under four years of age will not be eligible for certain stakes throughout the country, unless that stallion was retired due to injury. Once the stallion turns four, his future progeny will be eligible for those races. Marks noted, however, that this new rule makes it difficult for owners to syndicate their stallions at a young age. He also said it could be difficult to determine which injuries would force retirement, leaving grey areas in the system.

Leavitt also noted that the switch to AI and transportation of semen has caused a steady decrease in fertility rates for Standardbreds. Where 90% in foal rates for stallions were once the norm, many stallion managers are now satisfied with 70%.

"The problem is that when you're shipping chilled semen, once you send it off, you have no control over it once it leaves your farm. Where it winds up frequently is with people that don't use a vet a great deal and rely on teasing to decide when their mare is ready to be bred." *Cont. p8*

Despite such downfalls, however, Leavitt noted that he still prefers AI to live cover, with safety to both horses and people being an important consideration.

"I would opt for artificial insemination [over live cover] without any second thoughts," he said. "The minute we got away from live cover, we got away from the accidents that occur every day in the breeding shed. We have none of that now."

Charters said that while AI has worked well for the Standardbred industry, he can appreciate the complexities of introducing it for Thoroughbreds.

"With Standardbreds, and I assume with American Quarter Horses and the other breeds that practice it, it's a no-brainer by now, but I can see where it's a complex problem, especially internationally," he said. REFLECTIONS AS WE TURN THE PAGE ON 2012

I read with interest Charlotte Weber's letter that appeared in the *TDN* on Dec. 21. That same day I also read the CNN article, "How Racing Became Cool" and an article in the *Wall Street Journal* on hand-held devices and Internet gambling. The combination gave me cause for year-end thoughts as we turn the page on 2012.


There isn't a more constant and loyal supporter of American racing and breeding than Charlotte Weber that comes to my mind. To refer to her as a stalwart of the sport isn't an exaggeration. Her words struck true with me because they remind me of two important takeaways I had during a period of time I spent several years ago exploring ways to revitalize our sport and coalesce our industry. Working with Anthony Manganaro, Duncan Taylor, and Doug Cauthen, I attended several meetings exploring "next steps" for an industry in crisis. Although, as of this writing the project is dead, I had the opportunity to meet several very bright people in the world of sports entertainment and sports law. The takeaways I came away with were this:

- 1. Our industry needs a strong owners group to represent and assert themselves and take control of their product and the playing field. The present model where the racetracks (movie theaters) and trainers (directors) have more control than the owners (film studios) is backwards and detrimental.
- 2. We need racetracks that present our sport in a modern fashion that can compete with other major league sports and leisure activities. Fans want an experience that represents value, in attractive, clean, technologically advanced, modern facilities.

Although a handful of racetracks provide a quality experience, many like Calder that Charlotte references, seem to have little interest in promoting our sport or providing their patrons with a quality experience. Further evidence of many racetrack operators and the industry's deficiency is the absence of allocating slot revenue to make capital improvements to the racing areas of their facilities and develop a meaningful marketing plan to promote racing. Perhaps a strong owners group could show the way by attracting investors to own and operate a state of the art race track unlike any we have presently?

The CNN article illustrated that the large ship can change course. England now has attractive and modern facilities offering a pleasant experience for their patrons. Placing the emphasis on the social experience has helped revitalize the sport and attracted a young audience. What reasons are there that, if a similar model was employed here following best practices in places like England, Australia, Hong Kong and Japan, where racing is popular, that we wouldn't see similar results?

If Internet gambling is soon to be with us and patrons can gamble on their hand-held mobile devices as outlined in the WSJ article, then a threat like we have never seen may be upon us. The ease of play, convenience and addiction factor make this a competitive force that could be a lethal threat to many gambling entities, not just racing. It puts even greater need for the points outlined above; modern clean facilities enhancing the social experience of a day out.

As we close the book on another year it seems to me that there are "green shoots" out there that provide reasons for hope. Organizations like The Jockey Club, Breeders' Cup, and RMTC are taking the lead on numerous important fronts that have required attention for years. They are committing capital and taking important steps to lead us in several critical areas. They should be applauded for and supported in their efforts.

Let's hope that 2013 can see further progress. We all know the world doesn't stand still and the competition isn't resting.

NJ BETTING LAWSUIT TO CONTINUE

U.S. District Judge Michael Shipp ruled Friday that four professional sports leagues can continue their lawsuit against New Jersey to block sports gambling in the state. The NBA, NHL, NFL and MLB, as well as the NCAA, argued that allowing gambling on their respective sports would be detrimental to fans' perception of the games. The state of New Jersey sought to have the lawsuit dismissed, saying the leagues could not prove gambling would damage their image. U.S Representative Frank Pallone, Jr., who is seeking to overturn a federal law banning sports betting in all states but Nevada, told Associated Press, "It is absurd for the professional sports leagues and the NCAA to claim that they will suffer injuries as a result of the legalization of sports betting in New Jersey. That these organizations claim that the sports they represent will somehow have their reputation impacted is naive at best and assumes that illegal gambling is not currently occurring in lieu of legal sports betting. The fact is that the presence of illegal betting and the crime that goes with it has a far greater impact on the legitimacy of sports organization."

GETTING TO THE TRACK, AND GETTING BACK... WITH A MODEST PROPOSAL

Sometimes, associating two extraneous images leads to a discovery. I recalled that, for Tim Herboth and his wife Tracy (*TDN* Blog, 17 Dec), an integral part of the adventure of visiting tracks around the world was getting there by public transportation, and sometimes even getting lost. Then, I saw the name Bowie on the list of the 86 racetracks attended by Bill Finley.

This association of two isolated points took me back to my teenage years. For a date with a girlfriend, we were to take the special racetrack bus from New York to Bowie, Maryland, during the winter of discontent when no racing was available anywhere northeast of Bowie. It was a thrill to be with a cheery girl on a two-hour bus ride, far away from hometown errands, where parents and school were not intervening.

I already had lots of experience taking the racetrack bus from the Flushing, Queens subway station to Aqueduct. *Cont. p12*



There were two separate cultures on those bus rides. On the way to the Big A, it was a lively crowd, brimming with optimism, with good-natured exchanges on who you liked and who you didn't like, resembling the tropical joy of life I would later experience in the Caribbean.

On the way back, there would be a brooding silence, and the one or two people who had won that afternoon would not dare display their joy amidst such commiseration. I felt I was inhabiting a Daumier etching

called "The second-class bus."

Same people round trip, but on the way to the track you were in one country and on the way back in another.

My recollection of the old train to Del Mar is similar. Poet and horseplayer Charles Bukowski took that train. In his poem On the Train to Del Mar, he speaks with the dining car bartender:

the bartender sees that / I am feeling good / he smiles a real smile and / asks- / "How's it going?" / how's it going? my heels are down / my shoes cracked / I am wearing my father's pants and he died / ten years ago / I need 8 teeth pulled / my intestine has a partial blockage / I puff on a dime cigar /

"Great," I answer him.

(An example of on-the-way-to-the-track levity.) My girlfriend and I shared a sense of cozy independence on the way to Bowie, which I wanted to somehow preserve for the way back. I hit the winner in the first race, for a modest profit. Then I changed my plan for the day, radically. With my teenage bankroll I had been used to betting a minimal amount on each race. But this time, I took insurance for the return trip, by deciding to keep the profit and pass all the remaining races. We shared the Thoroughbred spectacle, the peacefulness of the walking ring, the colorful silks, the poetry of horses galloping. We rooted for dead heats.

It was the first time I'd ever passed a race, and I passed eight of them. You could call it "compulsive non-gambling." My compulsion was the deep desire to preserve the same atmosphere for the return bus ride.

So here's my proposal. People are not attending the races these days. They are staying home, betting on line. The weekday Santa Anita grandstand, today a graveyard, used to be thriving. Bukowski would be sitting there, in the last section above Clockers' Corner. Today, that section is closed off.

So why not fill the grandstands again, by reviving the special racetrack buses and, when geographically possible, racetrack trains? Some folks get burned out driving to the track. Who needs the 405 to Hollywood Park or the Foothill Freeway to Santa Anita? Even in Maryland, where it was a pretty 26.2-mile drive through rolling farmland from my Gaithersburg home to Laurel, I eventually burned out from the frequent drive.

On the bus or the train, you can read the *Racing Form*, do some handicapping. So it's time gained, not lost. The special racetrack buses I am proposing could take the freeway, making turn-offs at strategic stops, at park-and-rides, at senior housing

complexes, at Metro stations. In LA the designated bus could begin at its Spanish-style Union Station; in DC, also at its own classic Union Station; in Saint Paul, Minnesota, at Mickey's Diner: all great places for a late breakfast. Then relax with the pps all the way to Santa Anita, Laurel, Canterbury.

Or you could have less practical more historic pick-up places: Three-Mile Island for Penn National, John Brown's statue at Harper's Ferry for Charles Town, Haymarket Square in Chicago for Arlington.

So let's bring people back to the only place in the world where everyone gets the same odds, where one can remain oblivious to natural and man-made catastrophes, and even forget intestinal disorders and upcoming visits to the dentist: the racetrack. A # will distinguish first-time stakes-winners, a @ will indicate first-time graded stakes-winners, a + will indicate first-time starters, an (S) will be used for state-bred races, a (C) will be used for maiden-claiming races and an (R) will be used for other restricted races.
