

BETTER 'LUCKY' THAN GOOD IN DANIA BEACH

Two-year-old grass horses get one final crack at graded-stakes black-type in today's GIII Dania Beach S. at Gulfstream Park. Owners Trilogy Stable and Laurie Plesa took a ride along the Triple Crown trail with

Itsmyluckyday (Lawyer Ron) in 2012, and while **Yes I'm Lucky** (Yes It's True) has never finished worse than third in four tries on the main track, he is perfect in a pair of tries on the turf, albeit at sprint distances. Winner of the Tyro S. at Monmouth Park

Aug. 4, he was runner-up in the GIII Sapling S. Sept. 1 before returning to the lawn for a 6 1/2-length demolition in the Laurel Futurity Sept. 21. The main question this afternoon is the trip. His sire was an accomplished dirt sprinter, while his dam was one of the better short-track horses on the grass, with six black-type victories to her credit on this circuit.

Pleuven (Fr) (Turtle Bowl {Ire}) makes his stateside debut this afternoon for owners Bob LaPenta, Gary Finder and Bradley Thoroughbreds. Third behind subsequent GIII Miss Grillo S. winner and GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies' Turf runner-up Testa Rossi (Fr) (Dr Fong) at Lyon June 2, Pleuven graduated next time out at Chantilly June 24 and was last seen annexing the Prix Roland de Chambure at Longchamp July 13.

"He took a little time to acclimate when I got him into New York and we weren't able to get him to the races up there," trainer Chad Brown explained. "He needed a little extra time. Since I shipped him down here, he's really done well. We're going to give him a shot in this race."

Bon Accord (Showing Up) returns to Florida off a solid fourth in the GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf Nov. 2. He, too, is a stakes winner, having annexed the Calder Dash Aug. 24. **Dania Beach field p4**

FAREWELL, ORFEVRE...

Tomorrow's G1 Arima Kinen at Nakayama Racecourse will mark the end of an era for Japanese racing fans as they bid farewell to 2011 Triple Crown winner and Horse of the Year **Orfevre (Jpn)** (Stay Gold {Jpn}), who will step onto a racecourse for the final time. One of that country's modern greats and the winner of this race when he last contested it in 2011, Orfevre has overcome some stellar opposition--perhaps first and foremost his quirky personality--to thus far collect five Group 1 victories,

two G1 Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe runner-up finishes and earnings of more than US\$17 million. After wrapping up his 4-year-old campaign last year with a nose second to Gentildonna (Jpn) (Deep Impact {Jpn}) in a controversial finish in the G1 Japan Cup, Orfevre's connections made this year's campaign all about his second Arc assault, and the plan appeared to be working, as the strapping chestnut took down the local G2 Sankei Osaka Hai, followed by a repeat victory in Longchamp's G2 Prix Foy three weeks before the main event. Unfortunately for Orfevre, the Arc also ended as a deja vu of last year's effort. He finished second again, with only the mighty French filly Treve (Fr) (Motivator {GB}) too good for him. Trainer Yasutoshi Ikee noted that Orfevre has rebounded from his Arc exploits better than 12 months ago.

"Last year, he flew back two days after the Arc, and I thought there was just no way he was going to be ready for the Japan Cup," Ikee explained. "That's the kind of form he was in at the time. This year, he had plenty of time to recover before boarding his flight. The time he's been given to recover has made a huge difference for this race." Ikee also expressed satisfaction in Orfevre's final work. "His action was good, and he showed a lot of aggressiveness. He may have been a bit too eager, but you can't fault him for that; you want a little spirit ahead of the competition." **Cont. p3**

Ikee continued, "There's no comparing his condition to what it was a year ago at this time."

With regards to bidding his champion farewell, Ikee said: "He almost retired last season, but I begged the owners to put it off a year. Win or lose, this will be his last race. But I don't think I'll have the luxury of dwelling in the emotions on the day of the race. I've got four other horses who will be in the race and to look after."

Good as Gold...

The Arima Kinen suffered a blow Thursday when Eishin Flash (Jpn) (King's Best), also due to make his last run, was withdrawn due to a sprained fetlock. Nonetheless, the race also features defending champion and dual Classic winner **Gold Ship (Jpn)** (Stay Gold {Jpn}), who took the G1 Takarazuka Kinen in June, and will look to rebound from a recent 15th-place finish in the Japan Cup Nov. 24. He gets the services of Ryan Moore, who has enjoyed a stellar autumn in Japan with a pair of Group 1 victories. A duo with potential to hit the board at long odds are

Tosen Jordan (Jpn) (Jungle Pocket {Jpn}) and **Admire Rakti (Jpn)** (Heart's Cry {Jpn}). The former was the winner of the G1 Tenno Sho Autumn in 2011, but hasn't won since and struggled to get back on track this summer when returning from a nine-month layoff.

His last out third, beaten a neck, in the Japan Cup, however, indicates the 7-year-old still has some spark. While Tosen Jordan seeks to regain his best form, Admire Rakti seems to be just coming into his. He recorded his first group victory in his 18th start in the G3 Diamond S. at Tokyo in February, and has since finished fourth in the G1 Tenno Sho Spring and the Japan Cup last out. Australian jockey Craig Williams partnered Admire Rakti for the first time in the Japan Cup, and again in his final work for the race, and express confidence in his charge.

"When I gave him a little nudge in the workout, he accelerated just like that," Williams said. "It was a great reaction from him and I think he'll thrive on the big stage. I've been told he was even being considered for the Melbourne Cup at one point but had he come, I think he would have had a great chance of winning. I rode [the Japan Cup] with confidence because I definitely felt we had a shot. We took position a bit more toward the back than I had hoped, but we managed to travel on the inside. We ran into traffic on the straight but once we found space, he ran really well. That fourth place meant something, and I knew then and there that he would have a good chance in the Arima Kinen."

OPEN LETTER TO RACETRACK VETS

I contend that every race day at every major racetrack in North America a trainer cheats by sending out a horse for competition in an illegally enhanced state.

I further assert that the foreign substance(s) used on their horse in most instances was not obtained or administered by the veterinarian overseeing the horse's welfare at the barn of the trainer.

Yet, if you ask racegoers (be they horseplayers or fans) who they feel is responsible for filling horses full of illegal substances, the majority would finger the veterinarian.

Since vets are not the ones responsible for the preponderance of cheating taking place at American racetracks, why are they not leading the charge to clear up this misconception that paints them as the bad guys?

The answers to that question are myriad. Here are a few: 1) they want to maintain an ongoing business relationship with a particular trainer, 2) they want to keep alive the notion among clients that they might have some secret sauce of their own in their little "black bag" and 3) they want to fly below the regulatory morass without having to dirty their hands.

Racetrack vets have a singular focus: don't interrupt your income stream. Earnings for professional services rendered can be jeopardized by failing to comply with anything a trainer asks a vet to do and by encountering trouble from taking direct responsibility for a mistake with a regulatory body.

Given the state of play, it is nothing if not astonishing that yet another year is about to go by without racetrack vets taking a meaningful positive step to advance the cause of their patient--the Thoroughbred racehorse.

Racetrack vets earn income from the markup between the wholesale and retail cost of drugs, referrals to specialists or hospitals and by charging for diagnostics by use of their equipment, such as X-ray machines, ultra-sound scanners and endoscopes.

If they get paid (which is never a given), they make a good living. But because of the convoluted manner they choose to structure their income stream, they inherently feel vulnerable. So they never want the boat rocked.

In human medicine and in some rare instances on the backstretch, money is earned by charging a patient for services rendered. Physicians get paid for diagnosing ailments. Doctors do not normally operate a pharmacy, which in essence is what racetrack vets do.

If vets changed their fee structure, charged for diagnoses and stopped operating a mobile pharmacy, they would be better off, their equine patients would be better off and the owners of the horses would be better off.

Think about it: if the greatest component of a vet's income is derived from selling drugs, do you think they are prone to writing more prescriptions for their patients?

Incentivizing vets to prescribe controlled substances in order to maximize their income stream is a formula for failure and added expense for horse owners.

(Some vets do charge for diagnoses, including the best known lameness vet on U. S. backstretches and nobody balks. But racetrack vets made a calculated mistake many years ago to offer free diagnoses in exchange for being able to mark up drugs in order to be compensated. It really behooves them to think about standardizing their fee structure to take them out of the pharmacy game.)

Back to my main question, which is "why vets do not try to elevate their professional standing above the cesspool of cheating trainers?" I think it is high time the racetrack members of the veterinary profession took a step to once and for all clear up the notion that cheating through PEDs (performance enhancing drugs) is a racetrack vet issue.

It seems inconceivable that any of the vets practicing at major racetracks in America went to vet school to become an equine practitioner in order to get rich. They studied, sacrificed and worked hard because they want to help horses.

I understand that working on the backstretch can lead vets to become jaded and callous, which can make them vulnerable to crossing the line. But these instances most assuredly would fall into the minority.


Being proud people that have sworn their allegiance to improving the lot in life of a racehorse, vets should want their families and peers to respect and admire them. But when cheating takes place at the racetrack each and every day and onlookers consider vets to be the source of the problem, it seems reasonable to assume that vets would want to stand up for themselves and their peers.

Yet, here we are. The AAEP (American Association of Equine Practitioners) has just finished yet another annual meeting and nothing has changed for the better.

So since they cannot seem to generate the inertia required to move their butts off the dime, I will offer them a suggestion to take a positive step in the right direction.

Somebody...ANYBODY...at the AAEP, come up with a plan to join with major racetracks in America to create on-track pharmacies for the sole purpose of giving confidence to horseplayers, fans, trainers and owners that the vets are not involved in administering any illegal substances to racehorses. **Cont. p6**

It is not for me to say how this will be funded or operated, but the basic premise goes something like this...if anything is found in the system of a horse that was not obtained from the on-track pharmacy and administered in a timely fashion, the veterinarian can no longer be held responsible.

This will shift the focus of cheating away from equine practitioners and squarely on to the trainers where it most assuredly belongs.

Rare is an instance of any vet administering a substance to a horse without the direction or permission of the trainer.

If, on the other hand, a vet is found to be responsible for a foreign substance being in the system of a horse on race day, his or her license should be suspended and or revoked, so that this individual is no longer dragging down the entire veterinary profession.

Honest, hard working vets should want crooked vets out of the system more than anybody else.

Yet...yet...here we are. It is nearly 2014 and the vets are more worried about having their income streams interrupted than doing something to protect their professional reputations.

Every honest owner and trainer reserve the top veterinarians. It is time for these stalwarts of their profession to take positive steps to remove any suspicion about their practices or motives.

Please, I urge you, take the initiative before somebody or some entity does it for you. In order to stop tongues from wagging, show that this game has the ability to take steps to improve the public perception of horse racing by providing a vehicle to end all of the suspicion.

TDN Q&A

The Thoroughbred Aftercare Alliance recently announced that they have awarded a total of \$1,000,000 to 23 accredited facilities. Since its formation in Feb. 2012, the TAA has provided accreditation to Thoroughbred aftercare facilities and provided them with a source of funding to support their efforts. The TDN's Catlyn Spivey caught up with newly appointed Executive Director James Hastie to discuss what it means to be accredited and what the TAA has to look forward to in 2014.

TDN: Before coming to the Thoroughbred Aftercare Alliance last month, you worked on behalf of the American Red Cross. Can you explain your background and how you became involved in the Thoroughbred racing industry?

JH: I was working for the Red Cross essentially raising money to provide funding to people displaced by fire, flood, tornadoes and other disasters.

With four years at the Red Cross, I had really taken a step away from horses. I grew up on a hunter/jumper farm in Casenovia, NY. My younger sister and I were the only ones really involved in competing in horse shows which generated from my mother's love of horses. I competed and had the opportunity to ride with some really high-class riders in the circuit, like Rodney Jenkins before he retired to become a racehorse trainer. The board at the TAA was looking for someone who had experience with horses but also had a non industry take on fundraising. Through due diligence with a rehabilitation center, I was connected with the people at TAA.

TDN: Every organization that is funded by your organization must first apply and complete a rigorous accreditation process. Can you explain what it takes to be accredited?

JH: First, it's a very thorough application process. We have an accrediting committee composed of a diverse group of individuals that have been involved in aftercare, as well as financial representatives that decide the financial stability of these facilities and their programs. Our accredited partners agree to live up to a specific set of standards. Often, they undergo surprise inspections by volunteers such as vets and farriers. This component sets the TAA apart and allows for us to ensure the money is going to support the horses. Everyone involved is extremely passionate about the process and the donor's dollar. We have a very strong commitment to making sure the money is spent wisely and efficiently.

TDN: Why is the rigorous application process so important to donor confidence?

JH: It's the same whether we are talking about horses or the Red Cross. You want to know that your money is going to where we say it's going. It's all about delivering upon the mission. Our core supporters stepped up early on in this process to get the foundation going. Aside from the seed investors and the money they set up for basically starting the foundation, we can honestly say that every dollar we raised from our donors goes directly to horse care.

TDN: Some may say Thoroughbred aftercare is not a taxing issue. After raising \$1,000,000 to support the efforts of those striving to care for racehorses after their career, how much would you say is needed to solve the issue?

JH: It's easy for people to say how much is needed when people have lost everything and have nothing. The horse world is a bit different. We are trying to work on researching the issue a bit more to come up with a figure. As we accredit more facilities we are going to need more money. The \$1,000,000 we awarded from Arizona was just so well received, and the aftercare facilities and the volunteers were so grateful it makes me want to work even harder. I think anyone who has ever owned a horse knows it's a fairly expensive proposition. We have some folks that are really great at providing Thoroughbreds with a comfortable retirement and/or a quality retraining program, where they can find them a new job and adopt them out to a family that is going to really care for them and pamper them.

TDN: With so many generous donors already contributing to the program, what are some new fundraising ideas in place for the future?

JH: We are reaching out to every segment of the industry right now. There is a lot of interest out there. I'm hearing from bloodstock agents, vets, jockeys, owners. People that I never thought I could get a meeting with, instead they are reaching out to me. I want people to know if they are in a position to help us, in any of the different sectors of the industry, we absolutely need their help. The potential is out there. I just need to meet with these folks one on one. The sales companies and stallion owners were first to step up. The Jockey Club, Keeneland, Fasig-Tipton, OBS, Barretts and the Breeders' Cup have all been phenomenal. For somebody in my position, it has been extremely gratifying to see all the people reaching out to me. For each person that contacts me I have a different idea for how they can help. If we can get modest contributions from every sector in the industry the aftercare solution is going to present itself.

TDN: If you had one goal for the TAA in 2014, what would it be?

JH: My one goal for 2014 is to grow that \$1,000,000 to \$5,000,000 and we are well on our way.

BUTLER WITHDRAWS APPEAL

Former British trainer Gerard Butler, banned from racing for five years by the British Horseracing Authority Dec. 4, has withdrawn an appeal lodged Dec. 11. Butler, 47, admitted to all seven charges relating to administration of anabolic steroids to nine horses in his care late last year. While Butler's use of the steroids came to light during the Sungate scandal that gripped Newmarket earlier this year, it was unveiled during his disciplinary hearing Nov. 18 and 19 that Butler also obtained and administered himself a medication called Rexogin, which is intended for use in humans and contains the anabolic steroid stanozolol at ten times the strength of Sungate. Butler also failed to keep adequate records of his horses' treatments, according to the BHA, who determined that Butler failed "to take all reasonable steps to ensure the safety and welfare of horses under his care."

BRITAIN FORECASTS RECORD PURSES

Prize money in Britain is expected to exceed £123 million in 2014, an increase of more than £10 million from this year. The increase is attributed to prize money agreements with racecourses, arrangements with major bookmakers and a new Levy deal.

Commenting on the forecasted increase, British Horseracing Authority Chief Executive Paul Bittar said: "This increase is evidence of the benefits of stronger collaboration amongst racing's key stakeholders, together with a more constructive approach to working with the betting industry. The two main developments contributing to the increase have been the securing of Prize Money Agreements or commitments from racecourses, and the terms of the recent Levy deal and four-year arrangement with the major bookmakers. A critical point that should not be overlooked is the increased stability that these deals provide, particularly in light of the £16-million drop in prize money between 2009 and 2011 that followed a significant reduction in Levy."

Bittar noted that the new four-year Levy agreement, combined with the commercial Betfair agreement struck last year, exceeds the amount that can be collected under current legislation.

"While we will continue to pursue legislative change, the arrangement with major betting operators is significant; a conclusion that could not have been reached without the support of the Levy Board, and we are grateful for their role in the process."

"We still have a long way to go to match our international competitors in terms of prize money, but the financial model of British racing is unique. To have achieved a new record in prize money against a backdrop of an out-of-date central funding mechanism is encouraging, and we are determined to continue to work together with our stakeholders to further increase the sport's value."
