

SAY GOODBYE TO HOLLYWOOD

No better way to write about 32 years of memories at Hollywood Park than by donning one of the old souvenir Zenyatta caps. It sounds corny, and the cap is on life support, but it works. Zenyatta is a bookend for all things Hollywood Park. She won eight of eight starts there, and in 2010 single-handedly accounted for the last day that the place had that big-race feel of yesteryear.

Long before the Los Angeles *Times* began sending me out to Hollywood Park in 1982, I had been a sometime-visitor to the track, more as a horseplayer than a journalist. In the 1960s, I wondered what a Sweet Young Thing known as "The Goose Girl" was doing, wandering around the infield lakes, strewing poseys from a wicker basket in her wake. Glomming the crowd in the Turf Club set me straight. There was Dick Allen, the droopy-lidded baseball slugger, with a full-length fur coat on his back and a starlet on his arm. A few years before, Bo Belinsky, who had just pitched a no-hit game, was denied entrance because he was without a necktie, but then his companion, Walter Winchell, intervened. In those days, this was indeed HOLLYWOOD Park. All they had to do was switch on the klieg lights.

(Years later, I would interview a long-retired Allen, who was paying fealty to his horseracing passions as an upstart breeder and bloodstock agent, wannabe jockey's agent and what have you. He would call the office to complain, of all things, that I had written too much about his baseball derring-do, not enough about his new life in horse racing). *Cont. p3*

MR SPEAKER UPSETS DANIA BEACH

Phipps Stable's homebred **Mr Speaker** (Pulpit) surged through an opening along the rail and spurted clear to take the GIII Dania Beach S. by 2 3/4 lengths over the Gulfstream turf course Saturday. Sent off at 10-1, the dark bay colt was taken in hand soon after the break and settled near the back of the pack as **Bon Accord** (Showing Up) set the early pace. Mr Speaker inched closer down the backstretch and angled to the rail nearing the turn. Forced to wait for room under a patient Jose Lezcano, he burst through an opening along the rail in the final furlong and powered clear, completing the mile in 1:36.60. **Cabo Cat** (Kitten's Joy) rallied on the outside to be second. **Pleuven (Fr)** (Turtle Bowl {Ire}), dawdled briefly at the break and was last for much of the contest before flying late to be third. "He showed me a lot of class down the stretch," Lezcano said. "I think he'll get better with maturity, too. We had a good trip. He broke good and was relaxed down the backside. I let him pick it up a little down the backstretch and he got me inside. As soon as the hole opened up, he shot right through. He showed me a lot." *Cont. p8*

A 'Wild' First Breeders' Cup...

By the 1980s, the star power in the seats at Hollywood Park had been pretty much reduced to an aging Ed McMahon, Vince Edwards in a rumpled brown suit, and those indefatigable handicappers, Dick Van Patten and Mel Brooks. But for one day, the inaugural running of the Breeders' Cup in 1984, the CEO Marje Everett called in a few markers and rustled up enough A-list celebrities for a reprise of the Good Old Days. Midway through the card, I bumped into Neil Papiano, the track's legal counsel. "I've never seen anything like it," he said. "I just got finished escorting Elizabeth Taylor to the winner's circle for the presentation. When the crowd saw her, they parted like the Red Sea."

When the overnight sheet came out, Roger Laurin, trainer of Chief's Crown, looked at the entries and said: "My horse is in the first half of the Daily Double. Can you beat that?" (Chief's Crown would win the Juvenile).

As it should be, the best was saved for last. Wild Again, Gate Dancer and Slew o' Gold tried hammering one another into submission in the Classic, in the most rip-roaring finish to any horse race, anytime, anywhere. Pat Day, with marching orders to avoid the whip, kept the stick to himself and rode Wild Again to an improbable win. His cagey owners had put up \$360,000 in supplemental money just to make their horse eligible, causing Mickey Taylor, one of the owners of Slew o' Gold, to say before the race: "Man, all that money for a 30-1 shot? Those guys are what's known as dead game."

The Wild Again crowd, known as Black Chip Stable, was cocksure to a man. Hours before the race, in a hotel room along Century Boulevard, Bill Allen's future wife Nina stepped out of the bathroom dressed to the 9s and asked Allen how she looked.

"Perfect," Allen said. "You're very pretty. But there's one thing."

"What?" she said. "The purse," Allen said. "It's not big enough. It's not big enough to hold all the money we're going to win out there today."

Incredibly, the supplemental fee for Wild Again was only part of the gamble. His owners bet with both hands at the track and in Las Vegas, where they were yet to commingle the pools. Vincent Timphony, Wild Again's trainer and a part owner, went to his grave without saying how much they collected, but there have been reports that it might have approached the \$1.35-million purse that their horse won. *Cont. p4*

Ron Volkman, another of the owners, was delegated to count and distribute the on-track winnings. He went into a stall in one of the men's rooms to sort out the swag.

"I was shaking so bad, I was lucky the whole thing didn't fall into the toilet," Volkman said.

Wild Again's dramatic win was not without a 10-minute stewards' inquiry. When they decided to leave Wild Again's number up, but disqualify Gate Dancer from second to third place, the owners of both Gate Dancer and Slew o' Gold soured. They planned to appeal the outcome to the state racing board, and the civil courts if necessary. The morning after the race, the stewards called a hearing and invited all parties. A reporter asked Marje Everett if the press would be able to sit in. "Hollywood Park has no secrets," she said.

The hearing lasted 45 minutes. The stewards were Pete Pedersen and the retired jockeys Alfred Shelhamer and Hubert Jones. They had already earned their pay the day before, disqualifying a filly owned by Earl Scheib in the second Breeders' Cup race ever run. Coincidentally, Scheib, who painted cars to pay for his racing stable, had bought time on NBC for a 30-second spot that ran shortly after the disqualification was announced. Scheib was the pitchman in his own commercials ("No ups and no extras").

"You can't imagine," he said later, "how many people called to say how composed I was on the commercial, considering I had just had a million-dollar race taken away from me. Hell, did they think I did those damn things live?"

Wisely, the stewards tapped Bill Hartack, the Hall of Fame jockey, to run the protest hearing. Hartack, a minor official at the track, was adept at breaking down race film. It was the smartest thing the stewards ever did. Hartack took the principals through the stretch run of

the race, in real time and slow motion, analyzing what the three jockeys--Day, Laffit Pincay on Gate Dancer and Angel Cordero on Slew o' Gold--were doing and thinking. When it was over, the appeals were dropped. "I still don't like it," one of the owners said as the room cleared, "but the way [Hartack] laid it out, I'll go along with it." Hartack was the unsung hero. Without his expertise, the result of the first Breeders' Cup's richest race might have meandered through the courts for years. **Cont. p5**

Taking the Shoe Off...

The fall of 1982, my first year on the racing beat, Hollywood Park ran the Matriarch S. for the second time. It was split into divisions, and the second half was won by Castilla, a 3-year-old filly owned by Mary Bradley, the shoe heiress. Nat Wess, the publicity director at the track, lined up Gordon Jones, turf writer for the old Los Angeles *Herald-Examiner*, to make the trophy presentation in the winner's circle.

"If that man comes in here, I'm walking out," Bradley said to Wess.

The Bradley-Jones feud was nine years old, dating to 1973, when Bradley's Cougar II ran in the Hollywood Gold Cup. Bradley thought Bill Shoemaker had ridden her horse poorly in a prep race and asked Charlie Whittingham, her trainer, to replace him with Laffit Pincay. In the days leading up to the race, the criticism of Bradley was relentless, especially in the *Herald-Examiner*. A headline over one of Jones' stories read: "Florsheim Heiress Gives Shoe the Boot."

Whittingham horses ran 1-2-3, with the castoff Shoemaker winning the race aboard Kennedy Road. Quack was second and Cougar II ran third. Jones took one more shot at Bradley in the next day's paper, and they never spoke again. In the Matriarch winner's circle, Wess explained to Jones that his services weren't needed, and out of desperation he turned to me. I was waiting for post-race interviews, and also trying to catch a couple of jockeys on the fly, since there had been a foul claim against the winner.

"I got nobody else," Wess pleaded, and I put away my note pad and handed Bradley her trophy. It was the start of a long friendship, and she even sought my advice for acceptance speech material when Cougar II was inducted into the Racing Hall of Fame. I also liked Gordon Jones, however, and along the way I tried in vain to get Bradley to give up her grudge.

"It's been years, Mary," I said sometime in the 1990s, when Gordon Jones' name came up. "Let bygones be bygones."

"That week that Cougar ran, it was every day, day after day," she said. "He wouldn't let up."

"But there are statutes of limitations," I said. "What do you suggest? Capital punishment?"

"Well," she said, "a public hanging would be nice."

The Brawl...

One of the oddest things I ever wrote about Hollywood Park came on a day when I wasn't even assigned to cover the track. It was a story about a public brawl, not a horse race.

It was 1989, and there was a no-holds-barred proxy fight between Marje Everett and a group headed by R.D. Hubbard, a quarter-horse man who was trying to broaden his base. In the directors' room on a Sunday afternoon were John Forsythe, the actor, who was an Everett supporter and a member of her board; and Harry Ornест, a major Hollywood Park stockholder who was an ally of Hubbard's. *Cont. p6*

Ornest thought that Forsythe had too much influence, considering that he owned only a small amount of stock. The two of them began jawing about Everett vs. Hubbard, and after a while the heated conversation escalated into a shoving and pushing match. Everett was unsuccessful in separating the combatants, and Maury Ornest, one of Ornest's sons, joined in the scuffle.

Relaxing at home, I was tipped off about the incident. I got lucky on the phone, and found a few eyewitnesses. Everett declined to comment, and while I couldn't reach Ornest, I was able to find Forsythe, who was sheepish about the matter. He was 72 and Ornest was 67.

"We acted like a couple of little boys," Forsythe said. "I've got some scratches on my head and my neck, but it's no big deal. The whole thing lasted about a tenth of a round. It was embarrassing, really, and reflects poorly on horse racing."

At one point, an eyewitness said, Everett tried to prevent Maury Ornest from jumping in.

"You can't go in," Everett shouted.

"You can't keep me out," Maury Ornest said.

Hubbard's overthrow was successful. By 1991, Everett was out and Hubbard was running the track.

Frankel-y Speaking...

The year 1990 was also when Bobby Frankel, a future Hall of Fame trainer, ran Pendleton Ridge, a maiden, in the Kentucky Derby. Every time I visited the platform viewing stand on the Hollywood Park backstretch, I thought of Frankel, who won 952 races at Hollywood, more than anybody.

Running a maiden in the Derby was not this canny trainer's style. I decided to have some fun with the story. I only mentioned Pendleton Ridge by name once.

Every other time I called him "The Maiden," because that's what everyone on the Churchill Downs backstretch was calling him.

My story was a feeble attempt at aping Jim Murray, The Times' Pulitzer Prize-winning writer whose wry columns were half wisecracks, half insight. Back in Los Angeles, Bruce McNall, who owned Pendleton Ridge, read my story and called Frankel.

"You sure we should be there with this horse?" McNall said. "I don't want to come off being the laughingstock, and that's what it sounds like, based on what Christine wrote."

Usually it works the other way around--the owner wants to run, but the trainer doesn't. With Pendleton Ridge, Frankel thought he had a shot and McNall's confidence was oozing away by the minute. By the morning of the post-position draw, Frankel was seething. He spotted me in the crowd, came over and gave me both barrels.

"I don't know what you wrote," he said--and I'm omitting the billingsgate--"but you got my owner all over my tail. He's trying to get me to scratch the horse. You're a disgrace. Leave the training of the horse to me, will ya?"

The operative words are "I don't know what you wrote." Frankel hadn't read the story, and I'm not really sure that McNall had, either. I thought it was low on ridicule, and a balanced analysis of Pendleton Ridge's chances.

Pendleton Ridge ran 13th behind Unbridled.

The next week, I was back at Hollywood Park, and one morning, while interviewing Ron McAnally on the wooden stand where some of the trainers go to watch workouts, I saw Frankel coming. Uh-oh. I figured that there wasn't much left of me to chew out after Louisville, but he was going to try.

"I owe you an apology," Frankel said. "I was all wrong back there, and I'm sorry. I got home and read the full story, and it wasn't as bad [as McNall said it was]. What can I say? I was wrong and I'm sorry."

After that, Frankel became one of my best sources. He had a reputation of not suffering fools gladly, but he always returned phone calls, and went out of his way to give me the time of day. I reasoned that he felt he owed me one, to compensate for his public blowup at Churchill Downs.

Hollywood Park, closing for good today after 75 years, announced that it's going to auction off a lot of things in January. I wonder if that backstretch platform will be included in the consignment. It might go cheap. One man's kindling is another man's treasure.

FAREWELL TO HOLLYWOOD

In its greatest glory, Hollywood Park, as a sporting venue, had the ability to transcend sport. For three-quarters of a century, Hollywood Park provided the backdrop for unparalleled drama.

Every variety of star imaginable, equine and human alike, roamed the site in style. Countless champions graced the Hollywood oval, both on sand and sod. The finest jockeys to ever glare through a Thoroughbred's ears and the most gifted trainers to ever tighten the girth on a racehorse used the Inglewood setting as their home stage.

Famous Americans, from movie stars to titans of industry, thumbed through the same *Daily Racing Form* in the Directors' Room, as did the salt of the earth patrons on the track apron, both of whom stood in lines to fling their hard-earned buck into the same pari-mutuel pool.

Hollywood Park, like most racetracks, was capable of serving as the ultimate socio-economic equalizer. What the track of the lakes and flowers has meant to the industry on a local, state, national and a global level cannot be underestimated.

But, as they say, that's turf history.

On Sunday, December 22nd, 2013, the curtain will drop and Hollywood Park will take its final bow. As the track's final act segues to its closing scenes, anyone who has experienced Hollywood Park cannot help but find themselves in a trance, rewinding time and replaying events, both vivid and vague, which took place at the grand venue.

While I can't claim to be a true "old-timer," for this 36-year-old, the memories are broad and deep. Dozens and dozens of scenes have rifled through my mind in recent weeks as I've been overcome by pure emotional nostalgia.

And, what I cannot help but relate to each re-run, whether glorious or heartbreak, is that it is the people who I was surrounded by at that very moment, who are most vibrant in my memory. When I won my first graded stakes race as an owner, it was the embrace with my mother as the filly crossed the wire that I remember so well. When I made my first major score at the betting windows, it was the sting of the "high five" I gave my father that I can still feel in my palm. When my pride and joy mare suffered a fatal injury on the Hollywood lawn, it is the fabric of my brother's blazer which I recall crying into.

When I sat with Bill Shoemaker, my lifelong mentor and friend, when he had his first win as a trainer, I can still see the wink and smirk he gave me as we glided down to the winners' circle and an eerily similar wink and smirk from my other lifelong mentor and friend, Eddie Delahoussaye, as he dismounted the victorious filly. The memories I have of Hollywood Park as a horseman, a bettor and simply as a horse racing fan, are endless.

In an attempt to unveil some semblance of a silver lining from the supremely traumatic blow that the death of Hollywood Park is to the industry, it is the common denominator of each of my memories from which I believe I have learned my lesson, and hopefully a lesson which can be learned by the industry as well.

In an era where our industry and all the factions associated with the industry are scrambling to find the answer to the question: How do we attract new people to our racetracks?...there is but one tried and true method: Nepotism.

The only foolproof way to breed continuous generations of Thoroughbred horse owners and breeders and bettors, is through family. Every recount of memories of Hollywood Park that has been published, whether it be in major industry trades from persons of stature or from the blue collar fan on a message board, is that he or she was first introduced to the track, whether Hollywood Park or any other track in the country, by a family member. *Cont. p8*



Whether a mother, a father, an aunt or uncle, grandfather or grandmother, most people who support the game were introduced to this wonderful and whacky world by a blood relative. So, while marketing experts and consulting companies bill out our racing organizations and racetracks hundreds of thousands, if not millions of dollars to provide them with information that clearly isn't working, the only method which is a can't-miss is to cater to families already caught in our web.

I can't help but think that Hollywood Park's death was a preventable one and that had we simply caressed the hands that fed us, rather than biting them, that the historic venue would still be alive and well today.

Instead, as is the rule rather than the exception in today's racetrack operating environment, the customer has been used and abused.

Had we cared for the families who walked through those turnstiles week in and week out, there would be no generation gap to try to fill in for the industry. The families would breed the next generation of owner, breeder or bettor and provide the industry with a constant flow of consumers. So, while I agree that cutting edge technology is an absolute must to drag Thoroughbred horse racing from the Dark Age to the 21st century, gimmick promotions like giveaways and concerts and food trucks simply aren't cutting it.

How about instead of constantly thinking the grass is always greener on the other side, we adopt a grass roots approach by mending ties with the families who used to flood aprons and infields every weekend of the year? How about rewarding adults who bring a child under the age of 18 to the racetrack? While free admission and parking should be, but won't ever be implemented, all kids under a certain age should gain entry to the park for free, as should any adult who brings that child with them. And, toss in a free program, hot dog, soda, a \$5-betting voucher and a paddock visit to a designated race with a track employee properly trained in customer service. Perhaps we can resuscitate some of the patrons we've lost along the way, lure some fresh blood into the grandstand and perpetuate and, in turn, grow the fan base at a low cost that churns out a high reward.

So, as the funeral approaches and the industry prepares to lay Hollywood Park to rest, it is important to reflect on the life that was and the good times had, but it would be irresponsible of us not to take some responsibility and seek ways to roll up our sleeves, go back to basics and see to it that this doesn't ever happen again.

After all, we have lost a member of our family...

Out of multiple graded stakes placed Salute (Unbridled), Mr Speaker is a grandson of champion Personal Ensign (Private Account). He is bred on the same A.P. Indy/Unbridled cross responsible for this year's GI Kentucky Derby winner Orb (Malibu Moon). The 11-year-old Salute produced a colt by War Front in 2012 and aborted a War Front foal in 2013 before being bred to Hard Spun.

A non-threatening sixth behind Bobby's Kitten (Kitten's Joy) on debut over the Saratoga lawn Aug. 24, Mr Speaker improved to third over one mile at Belmont Sept. 21 before graduating by a front-running 2 3/4 lengths over 1 1/16 miles in Elmont Oct. 14.

Despite the wire-to-wire graduation, Mr Speaker was well off the pace in his stakes debut Saturday, but trainer Shug McGaughey wasn't concerned. "It didn't bother me that he wasn't on the lead today. Jose rode him really good, getting him into position on the backside. I thought he would break good; I thought he might be a little closer than he was. I think he can be wherever he wants [within a race]." McGaughey added the colt could move to the main track for his next start. "Yes, I will try him on the dirt, maybe even next time," McGaughey confirmed. "He's matured a lot since he left Belmont sometime in November and I hope he continues to go that way."

"We could have medicated it but decided that for the longer term she would be better having it removed, so she's going for surgery on Monday," he continued. "After that she'll need a month being boxed, then a month in a yard. Another month in the paddock should see her right, but that will be too late to have her back for any further 3-year-old racing."

Some additional thoughts to Barry Irwin's spot on op/ed letter ([click here](#)) to the track vets.

This past year, it was stated that in a major racing state, the average horse, between entry and going to the starting gate was getting an average of 5 1/2 injections, and that was before it gets its Lasix shot. Think about the math here, that's 572 injections for an average day of racing at one track. I would think that the needle, syringe, and drug sales people are having a Merry Christmas considering that there are about 45,000 races run at the Thoroughbred tracks during the year.

Now everyone being called a vet takes an oath, and just for a refresher this is what vets swear to:

Being admitted to the profession of veterinary medicine, I solemnly swear to use my scientific knowledge and skills for the benefit of society through the protection of animal health and welfare, the prevention of and relief of animal suffering, the conservation of animal resources, the promotion of public health, and the advancement of medical knowledge.

I will practice my profession conscientiously with dignity, and in keeping with the principles of veterinary medical ethics. I accept as a lifelong obligation the continual improvement of my knowledge and competence.

It has always troubled me that anyone passing a trainer's test one day, can tell a well-educated vet the next day to administer drugs to a horse, and the vet will do it. Claiming horses have been injected in all their joints, the horse is claimed, and the vet will do it all over again for another trainer. As long as you are a good pay, the vet is a good enabler. Really, does the horse come first, or does the money come first, and we all know the answer to that.

Imagine an everyday vet telling a trainer what's best for the horse is to be turned out for three to six months. Of course the vet, the trainer, and the owner make no money with the horse turned out and this only happens at the top level, and the top level is a very small part of horse racing.

Owners, trainers, and vets all profess their love for their horses, and it makes for a great sound bite, but we all know in most cases, it's all about their love for the money.

I share Barry Irwin's frustration, and agree that the industry could do a better job of catching and eliminating the cheaters from the game, but I am less concerned with the reputation of veterinarians and/or illegal pre-race medications, and more concerned about a system that results in the vast majority of racehorses being legally over-medicated. If, as Mr. Irwin suggests, track veterinarians shifted the focus of their practice toward charging fees for diagnostic services, several benefits would accrue. Today a racetrack veterinarian has a conflict. Medicating is the only way to get paid, and a lack of a clear diagnosis often means a shotgun approach to medicating, and when the shotgun cure fades over time, no one knows what actually worked last time, so it's right back to the shotgun approach. That may be good for the veterinarian's bottom line, but it's less than ideal for the horse. Simply stated, the current system creates an economic disincentive from performing in-depth and time-consuming diagnostics.

Moreover, most medications, particularly those delivered through a syringe, come with some risk. Hyaluronic acid enjoys a favorable reputation in the business, but invading any joint capsule comes with risks, including infection of the injected joint, and the addition of "just a dollop" of corticosteroids to each hyaluronic acid may or may not be beneficial depending upon the condition of the invaded joint. Even a simple bute shot that accidentally punctures the jugular vein and deposits a couple of drops of bute adjacent to the nerve that sits right behind it can result in partial or complete paralysis of the larynx.

Finally, I am convinced that legal permissible medications contribute to the catastrophic "accidents" that occur too often in races. Do we really approve of injecting corticosteroids into joints just so the horse, not feeling the pain, will try harder in the next race?

I've yet to meet the person that's in the racehorse game because of the likelihood of making vast sums of money. Most of us are in it because we love the horses. This is an expensive game, and even more expensive to play it the right way. The horses don't have a voice, and we who profess to love them owe it to the object of our love to cooperate with each other to do better.

When trainer Todd Beattie deems one good enough to ship into New York from the Keystone State, it's a good idea to pay attention. Beattie, who is winning with 26% of his starters in 2013, is perhaps best known for having orchestrated the career of the outstanding sprinter Fabulous Strike (Smart Strike), who won 12 black-type events, seven of which came on this circuit, including the 2007 GI Vosburgh S. and 2008 Gravesend H., when it was contested as a Grade III. Along with his sister Holly Ross, her husband Brian Ross and Pennsylvania HBPA Executive Director Todd Mostoller, Beattie went to \$90,000 to acquire this Claiborne Farm-consigned filly at last year's Keeneland September sale. "She had everything," Beattie commented. "She was good-sized--not overly big, but also not too small--she had a great walk on her and an enormous heart scan." Sent into serious training in late August, Taris registered no fewer than seven workouts at Penn National that ranked as the best on the morning, but the New York faithful went head-over-heels for Worldly Charm (Malibu Moon), leaving Taris a dime shy of 4-1 on the tote.

Away fairly beneath Clinton Potts, Taris fired through at the fence to take up the running from D' Kennesaw Cat (Wildcat Heir) before the field had reached the turn. While favored Worldly Charm (Malibu Moon) was forced to do it tough while three or four deep on the track, Taris readily turned back that one's bid in upper stretch and sailed home to score by a highly impressive 11 3/4 lengths. Hey Kiddo (Stonesider) rallied up the fence to complete a Pennsylvania-bred exacta. The winner's final time was just 0.38 seconds slower than that recorded by Extrasexyhippzster in the Don Rickles S. earlier on the card. "We were hoping she'd run like that, but you never know, especially when you bring something into New York," stated Beattie, who suggested that this trip is well short of the filly's optimum. "We are thinking long with her," he offered. "She obviously trained great at home and it has really been just a pleasant surprise to see how quick she has been. But we definitely think she'll stretch out and we're very excited about that." Two-turn races such as the Busanda S. and the Busher S. loom--both won last year by Princess of Sylmar (Majestic Warrior)--but Beattie is taking a wait-and-see approach.

"We're just going to unwind and let the dust settle before we make any decisions about what's next," he commented. In addition to Beattie and Mostoller, former Pennsylvania HBPA President Joe Santanna is a principle in Commonwealth New Era Racing. Beattie reports there are seven partners in Taris. 
