WHEN IT COMES TO DRUG-TESTING REFORM TRANSPARENCY A GOOD PLACE TO START

In the weeks since allegations raised by People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) were reported by *The New York Times*, there has been no shortage of commentary in traditional or social media, and it seems likely that the dark cloud hovering over our sport will be there for the duration of our Triple Crown season.

One columnist recently suggested that the trainer implicated in the PETA video should stay away from the Kentucky Derby and the Kentucky Oaks for "the good of the game." I concur wholeheartedly.

Various investigations are still underway, but his presence and participation would indicate that it's just "business as usual" in the Thoroughbred industry.

In fact, it is not--at least where The Jockey Club is concerned. We are working diligently on several fronts.

We have provided input to the authors of the bill that was introduced last May (Horseracing Integrity and Safety Act - H.R. 2012), which would designate the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency (USADA) as the independent anti-doping organization for horse races with interstate, off-track betting.

We have also reached out to USADA to explore how that organization could partner with racing interests to bring about the needed reforms as proposed in the National Uniform Medication Program (horseracingreform.org).

At the same time, in keeping with our pledge, we are working closely with state-based racing regulatory authorities to improve medication rules, penalties and lab testing. Just last week in Tallahassee, representatives of The Jockey Club stood shoulder-to-shoulder with other industry colleagues, providing testimony to Florida legislators about the dire need for updated rules and drug-testing protocol in that state.

TAYLOR MADE TURNS 35

Taylor Made Sales Agency, which has been a mainstay of the American auction scene for more than three decades, is celebrating its 35th anniversary selling horses at public auction this spring. In that time, the company has grown from a small family business to one of the most successful and innovative sales agencies in the industry. The company is run by, and was grown by, four Taylor brothers: Duncan, Ben, Frank and Mark, along with Pat Payne, a life-long friend of the family who serves as the company's vice president of sales.

Joe Taylor, the father of the Taylor brothers, raised his sons in the horse business. The elder Taylor got a job with Clarence Gaines, who ran Gainesway Farm, and ended up being a key contributor to the growth of that farm. Together, Taylor and Gaines built one of the most successful trotting horse stables in the country, and laid the groundwork for the farm's transition into Thoroughbreds. The Taylor brothers grew up around Gainesway Farm, working with and learning horsemanship from their father.

We have reached out to racetracks to explore a greater use of “house rules” to keep unsavory horsemen away from their premises and their races.

We continue to promote the confidential use of the Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau's toll-free integrity hotline (866-847-8772).

As we did last month, The Jockey Club routinely reports on the data we collect in the Equine Injury Database and we strongly encourage all racetracks to make public their own statistics.

The Jockey Club also maintains vigilance by denying privileges of The American Stud Book to those convicted of committing an act of cruelty to a horse, those who have been found to have violated applicable racing authority statutes, rules or regulations relating to substances that have been classified by the RCI as Class 1 or Class 2, and those who have had three or more violations within a 365-day period involving substances of any RCI class.

When the Olympic movement created the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) as the global body responsible for uniform rules and coordination of policies at every level, it created the WADA Code, which set forth the criteria for evaluating what labs were going to be allowed to test the samples and the standard for those labs.

In fact, WADA was the model for the Racing Medication & Testing Consortium's (RMTC) lab accreditation standards, one of the main pillars of the National Uniform Medication Program.

In 2009, The Jockey Club, through our Thoroughbred Safety Committee, pledged financial support to RMTC for new national laboratory standards for testing, the implementation of a laboratory accreditation program, and a new independent Equine Quality Assurance Program.

Five years later, just two labs have completed the accreditation process and one lab has been provisionally accredited. As is the case with the uniform medication rules, other labs are reported to be “in process” with their changes.

Clearly, the Thoroughbred industry needs a new plan.

A connection with USADA--whether through a federal mandate or private association--would provide solutions to many of our medication regulation issues. The organization would bring independence, integrity and expertise to our sport.

In the meantime, there is something that can be done now. It can bring greater credibility to the races that define our sport, at a time when millions are watching. We would be taking a page from a protocol in place at the Hong Kong Jockey Club, which, coincidentally or not, is among the leading jurisdictions in the world in wagering handle.

I propose that veterinary records of every horse entered in this year's Triple Crown races be made immediately available. The New York State Gaming Commission does this, but only for a three-day period from the day of the race. I suggest a much longer period: 14 days. **Cont. p4**

In fact, that was the principle behind the 2013 recommendation of The Jockey Club's Thoroughbred Safety Committee to create a centralized database of all treatments and procedures administered to horses in training. A majority of states already mandate this kind of reporting, but there is spotty compliance and, with few exceptions, little public disclosure.

As I've said previously, enough is enough.

All of us need to look ourselves in the mirror and make sure we are doing all we can not only for the good of the game, but for the welfare of the athletes, the integrity of competition and the survival of the sport.

The disclosure of veterinary records would be a good place to start.

THE NUMBERS GAME

Today's G3 Prix Penelope at Saint-Cloud is yet another French Pattern race in which Andre Fabre has excelled down the years, boasting a record seven wins with some accomplished fillies such as the subsequent G1 Irish Oaks heroine Wemyss Bight (GB) (Dancing Brave). Fielding two this time, the unexposed duo of **My Jolie (Ire)** (Oratorio {Ire}) and **Hug and a Kiss** (Thewayouare) represent Team Valor and Michael Tabor, respectively and have shown glimpses of ability in a pair of starts apiece. The latter took the eye when scoring over this track and trip Mar. 20, while My Jolie was a close-up fourth behind the re-opposing trio of **Goldy Espony (Fr)** (Vespone {Ire}), **Bereni Ka (Fr)** (Vadassin {Ire}) and **Green Speed (Fr)** (Green Tune) in the 10-furlong Listed Prix Rose de Mai at this venue Mar. 15. Another intriguing type is Highclere Thoroughbred Racing's **Whim (GB)** (Nayef), who scored over a mile at Chantilly in September and who represents the Freddy Head stable seemingly always replete with distaff talent.

Grade I winner **Egg Drop** (Alphabet Soup--Rehocracy, by Adhocracy), retired from racing last week, will be bred to Gainesway stallion Tapit this spring before selling at auction next November. "Egg Drop has brought so much joy and excitement to our racing partnership," said Little Red Feather Racing's manager partner Billy Koch. "She deserves the very best and that was a big part of our decision to breed her to Tapit. He's the most dominating sire in the world right now with a GI Kentucky Oaks favorite and several entries in the GI Kentucky Derby. So it will be fun to see what happens. If everything goes according to plan, we will offer her for sale at public auction this November." Egg Drop won last year's GI Matriarch S., GII Goldikova S. and GII Yellow Ribbon S. On the board in 11 of 13 starts, she won six times and earned \$534,020.

DALAKHANI WILL RETURN TO OZ

His Highness the Aga Khan's **Dalakhani (Ire)** (Darshaan {GB}--Daltawa {Ire}, by Miswaki) will shuttle to Cornerstone Stud, South Australia for another Southern Hemisphere breeding season, it was announced Monday. The 2003 European Horse of the Year covered 97 mares when he shuttled in 2013, and his stock have done well in Australia, led by G1 Queen Elizabeth S. winner Reliable Man (GB).

"We remain convinced that Dalakhani is the perfect outcross for Australian mares and he thrived in the conditions last season," explained Pat Downes, Manager of Gilltown Stud, the Aga Khan's stallion operation in Ireland.

Already represented by seven winners from nine runners, Dalakhani's progeny have earned in excess of A\$27 million and 35 stakes winners internationally.

"We would like to thank those that supported Dalakhani last season," said Cornerstone Stud Managing Director Sam Hayes. "The response from across the country proved that we have a sophisticated market in Australia that appreciates stallions with such breed shaping potential."

Dalakhani's 2014 fee will be A\$22,000 inc. GST.

Taylor Made Turns 35 (cont. from p1)

“We grew up running around Gainesway Farm with my dad, and he basically mentored us,” Mark Taylor, the Vice President of Marketing and Public Sales Operations, said. “My dad was a workaholic. He was obsessed with horses and that rubbed off.”

Duncan Taylor, along with his business partner Mike Shannon, launched Taylor Made in 1976, though it was initially a boarding operation. Within the first few years of the business, however, Duncan realized there was an opportunity to get involved with the sale of horses by applying marketing principles from other successful businesses to the sale of Thoroughbreds.

“The culture back then was almost all of the big breeders sold their own horses. There were few other ‘sales agencies,’” Taylor explained. “Duncan saw that the farmers that had been bringing the product to market really weren’t equipped to market as effectively as someone who was doing it full time.”

Taylor Made took on a modest consignment of three horses in 1979 and grew steadily from there. The company’s breakthrough came in 1984, when, at the Keeneland summer sale, the agency sold Fiesta Lady, a Secretariat filly raised on the Taylor Made Farm, who went on to capture the GI Matron S. for trainer D. Wayne Lukas that year. Later that year, three mares Taylor Made had consigned each sold for over \$1 million at the Keeneland November sale. “That year really put us on the map,” Taylor said. “People looked at us and said: ‘These kids are on to something.’”

Taylor Made’s growth always stemmed from the brothers. Each brother found a way to contribute to the company in a way that both eased the workload and added a new dimension to the business by carving out a niche for himself.

“The business grew as the brothers grew and were added,” Taylor said. “It started with just Mike [Shannon] and Duncan and they were boarding horses. Then [the late] Chris [Taylor] came into the business so they had more support on the farm, which allowed Mike and Duncan to start working on more deals. Then Ben came along, and he added more support on the farm, which allowed Duncan to work on the business-- processes, procedures, structures, hiring and training people -- and allowed him to fall into his niche as the kind of CEO that really loves business. Frank came in, and Frank is a natural horseman, he became full-time farm manager, but he also worked on cultivating business. That allowed Ben to move into the office and get into private sales, which really became his niche.

All of us started on the farm and moved into the office when the time was right.”

While Joe Taylor was still working for Gainesway when Taylor Made took off, his instruction and ideas formed a foundation for the company to build on.

Taylor, who would write the definitive book on managing a horse farm in *Joe Taylor's Complete Guide to Breeding and Raising Racehorses*, was a constant presence at Taylor Made as the Taylor brothers were building the company.

"We were living the book before it was written," Taylor said. "He'd get off work at Gainseway and he'd drive around Taylor Made coaching us and telling us what we were doing wrong. We were constantly corrected."

And though the Taylor brothers were largely responsible for developing the company's sales operations, Joe Taylor's philosophies about the horse business were fundamental to the growth of Taylor Made.

"My dad always said that in the horse business, you never have it figured out; things are always changing and you have to have a progressive open mindset, or you're going to get passed by," Taylor said. "Even though he was at the top of his career, he was always assimilating information and coming up with new theories and ways to do things. So we didn't take his model, but we took his mindset and his philosophy of always trying to improve."

That philosophy helped Taylor Made develop an innovative approach to the marketing and sale of horses.

"As time has gone on, if you look at a lot of the things that are considered standard operating procedure by most consigners, a lot of that started with us," Taylor said. "We were the first ones to have a full-time research department, the first ones producing our own catalog."

The core of Taylor Made's approach, however, is to create and promote a brand for each horse they are charged with.

"We have a philosophy that we always put the horse and their credentials first, and the Taylor Made brand second [in advertisements]," Taylor said. "Customers know that we are focused on telling their horse's story, not Taylor Made's story."

As Taylor Made grew, the company focused on recruiting a team that could implement the Taylor Made philosophies and strategies over a broader customer base.

"We try to be very systematized in everything we do," Taylor said. "We've got the knowledge and experience and the core values of the Taylor family, but we've surrounded ourselves with a hell of a team that lets us be very organized in our approach."

Taylor Made's resilience is, in large part, a testament to its commitment to the approach to business and core philosophies that the Taylor family has developed. In 2008, when the economic recession caused a severe downturn in the sale of Thoroughbreds, Taylor Made focused on keeping its commitments low and its core principles intact.

"Our philosophy of not having a huge portfolio of horses we own is what paid off," Taylor said. "Our income obviously dropped, but we didn't have to worry about debt we'd incurred to buy a bunch of broodmares. We could hunker down and focus on our core customers and weather the storm."

That commitment extended to the team Taylor Made had assembled when the market was strong.

"A big goal of ours was not to break up our team," Taylor said. "We had a lot of overhead and a big team put together, but we came out of it in tact and I think we're a better company because of it."

Though Taylor Made is sure to face uncertainty going forward, the Taylors have faith that adhering to their fundamental values will see them through.

"We're nimble and I think, as an industry, we're well positioned going forward," Taylor said. "What we've got is the horse. When someone gets exposed to the beauty of the horse they want to get involved. I think the horses are the key to the future with us."



Part of my role as pedigree consultant to Juddmonte Farms since 1995 is making the initial mating suggestions for Prince Khalid Abdullah's European mares. This is a fascinating task, but you will understand that not all the recommendations are made with the same degree of confidence. Maybe a very attractive mating has been tried before without achieving the expected results, or perhaps there simply isn't much information available. Sometimes I am overruled before the suggestions reach the Prince, with General Manager Philip Mitchell often having his own views, based on his profound knowledge of the Juddmonte families.

However, there was plenty of confidence in the two candidates that the team arrived at for the Prince's Classic-winning mare Zenda when the suggestions were sent to the Prince in December 2009. One suggestion was Montjeu. With six crops on the track, the brilliant son of Sadler's Wells had already been represented by two

winners of the Derby and three of the Irish Derby. Zenda is by Gone West's son Zamindar and Gone West had sired the dam of one of

Montjeu's Derby winners. Montjeu had

also gone close to

winning the King George

with Papal Bull, a horse whose broodmare sire was

Zamindar's brother Zafonic. Montjeu also had Group 1

winners with Lyphard and Bellypha blood, so he was

likely to suit a mare whose broodmare sire was Lyphard's

brilliant son Dancing Brave. Zenda was also a likeable

Significantly, his biggest success came in Haydock Park's Sprint Cup--a race also won by Green Desert.

In other words, he had inherited a full measure of his sire's speed and little of his female line's stamina, which had helped his dam Rafha win the G1 Prix de Diane over 1 5/16 miles. His third dam, Border Bounty, had flourished at up to 1 3/4 miles.

In this respect, Invincible Spirit was very similar to Zenda's brilliant half-brother Oasis Dream, another son of Green Desert. Hope, the dam of Oasis Dream and Zenda, was a sister to another middle-distance Classic winner in Wemyss Bight, winner of the Irish Oaks. The next dam, Bahamian, had stayed even better than Wemyss Bight, once crossing the line first in a Group 2 over 1 7/8 miles; and Bahamian's dam Sorbus numbered a second in the Irish St leger among her achievements. Even though his first three dams were all by major winners over a mile and a half, Oasis Dream inherited none of their stamina. Fortunately, he was fast enough to become Europe's champion 2-year-old of 2002 and then Europe's champion sprinter at three.

Sending Zenda to Invincible Spirit would therefore produce something bred along similar lines to Oasis Dream and Prince Khalid preferred this option. How right he was to do so was amply demonstrated three days ago, when Kingman--Zenda's Invincible Spirit colt--maintained his unbeaten record in exhilarating style in the G3 Greenham S.

His victory was so stylish that the bookmakers have made him a very short-priced favorite for next month's G1 2,000 Guineas. He is priced at between even money and 6-4, even though the potential opposition includes two unbeaten Group 1 winners in Toormore and Kingston Hill and another very exciting prospect in Australia.

Clearly there are few worries, despite Invincible Spirit's overall record as a stallion, that Kingman will stay a mile. He settles well and Zenda stayed at 1 1/8 miles, as she showed with her narrow defeat in the G1 Queen Elizabeth II Challenge Cup at Keeneland.

She had previously won the G1 Poule d'Essai des Pouliches with some give in the ground and had been caught close home when second in the G1 Coronation S. on a fast surface.

Zenda's broodmare career could be used to argue the importance of situating breeding stock to maximise their opportunities. As Zenda was in the U.S. when the decision was made to retire her, she spent the early years of her broodmare career in Kentucky. It wasn't known at that time that her sire Zamindar would make very little impact during a short spell in Florida (of course he later returned to Europe to sire the brilliant filly Zarkava).

During her time in Kentucky, Zenda visited a mixed bag of stallions, producing foals to Danzig, Storm Cat, Empire Maker and Johannesburg. None of them won. Zenda is a tall daughter of a very tall stallion and the decision was reached that Europe might offer her a wider choice of stallions, so she returned to England for the 2008 breeding season. Juddmonte's excellent stallion Dansili had obvious claims, as he had already sired Group 1 winners from mares by tall stallions such as Zamindar's brother Zafonic and Theatrical. Also, Zamindar had been represented in 2007 by the exciting 2-year-old Zarkava, who shared the same broodmare sire--Kahyasi--as Dansili.

The first mating with Dansili resulted in Panzanella, a lightly raced winner who is visiting Invincible Spirit's Classic-winning son Lawman this year. A second visit to Dansili proved much more rewarding, resulting in the very talented Remote. **Cont. p11**



A busy spell last spring saw Remote make rapid progress from winning a maiden race at 25-1 to justifying favoritism in the G3 Tercentenary S. over a mile and a quarter at Royal Ascot. Although he was sidelined during the second half of 2013, Remote could well be a name to remember this year.

Zenda then made it three consecutive winners with Kingman and there is every reason to be optimistic about her third Dansili foal, the 2-year-old Multilingual, who has followed her siblings into the care of John Gosden. In a move which underlines Juddmonte's confidence in Dansili's fast son Bated Breath, Zenda visited him in his first season and produced a likeable filly at the end of January. Zenda is now a member of the illustrious book of mares visiting Frankel in his second season.

So this family looks primed to continue the excellent work which began with the purchase of Kingman's third dam, the Mill Reef filly Bahamian, as a yearling 28 years ago. [CLICK HERE TO SHARE THIS STORY](#)



PAUL SAYLOR:

(In response to Ciaran Dunne's 'No More Gallop-Outs')

The gallop-out is not the primary problem--the sales prep program based on what buyers expect is. The pre-sale breeze is usually not the first time most sale horses have been asked to lay it down. By the time they get to the sales, most have some physical issue. Forty-five percent of Keeneland entries scratched before the breeze show. This could be the result of a lack of buyer interest, but it is a good bet a lot of the scratched horses would not have withstood a breeze satisfactory to get them sold. Consignors are not at fault. They are running businesses to sell horses in a manner encouraged by sales companies and buyers.

Horsemen do not buy focused primarily on early speed, but intermediaries with discretionary client capital do. If the focus on short speed was replaced by 1/4-mile or 1/2-mile two-minute licks, horsemen would have the ability to make purchase decisions based on "how" rather than "how fast" they move.

And what is with the Keeneland track condition? Geoffrey Russell could have gone in :11 flat. Also, carding 2-year-old races in April seems to be contrary to the message behind the correspondence started by Ciaran Dunne.

SUSIE HART:

I want to commend Ciaran Dunne for having the courage to be the first consignor to take a stand about the breeze show gallop outs. There are so many people who are supporting his bold decision, but we need to do more to keep the momentum going.

I thought Patti Miller's scientific letter was excellent and it put so much into perspective about mechanics. The problem didn't just start a few years ago. We've been traveling down this road for a long time, but it's high time for buyers, sellers and sale companies to all accept responsibility for what we have done and work together to fix this problem while the subject is front and center on everyone's minds.

Sales companies should endorse the no gallop outs and buyers should sign on as well. Terry Finley publicly announced that his team wouldn't even use stopwatches. Kudos to Terry.

Maybe we can get back to basic horsemanship if we have to watch the horses move and judge them by their way of going instead of relying on the stopwatches so much.

The Ocala horsemen are top notch, but they've allowed this to happen in order to stay competitive. The buyers complain about the fast times but they still buy the fast horses that manage to come out of the breeze shows without vet issues. And the sales companies want fast times so they also have a role in this. Their responsibility should be making sure the tracks are safe but not lightning fast.

I think we all agree that the attrition rate is unacceptable. The fact that a small group of top consignors control a large percentage of the product should actually make this change easier for everyone. The major consignors could all agree to limit the gallop outs, buyers could sign on saying they support that action and sales companies could do their role by encouraging this or possibly removing poles past the wire (not my idea, but a good one). Why not publish a list of people who are willing to commit to doing what's right for the horses? I am sure the majority of people in our industry will be willing to support this position. Not only will it be good for the horses, it will do so much for our reputation in the rest of the world.

Years ago, I set a world record (that stood for five years) with a colt that open galloped through the lane and he went on to be a graded stakes winner. In those days, no one wore spurs and sticks were used judiciously. There were no 1/8-mile breezes with Thoroughbreds being ridden like Quarter horses. They galloped to the pole, often in sets, to breeze and there were very few horses that came out of the works with career-ending injuries. And the clearance rates were much better than they are today. That was then and this is now. I like those days better and I'm sure most horsemen do too.

I often sit in the repository and write reports for my husband and I have been shocked at the number of horses that have had "issues" this year. Enough is enough.

Next week is the OBS April sale and that would be an ideal venue to be the first auction to support this action because so many board members and shareholders are also consignors. Today is the first day of the breeze shows. Hopefully others will follow Ciaran's lead.

EUGENIO COLOMBO:

In response to Keeneland announcing that they will return to a dirt surface...

The racing surfaces are obviously important for the safety of horses and jockeys, but it is not the most important element to consider. The tight bends and small, short stretches, compared to the wide turns and long stretches of European and Australasian tracks are the most important and pivotal factors for safety.

Outside the U.S., 2-year-olds train and race at five to six furlongs on a straight course, with minimal stress on knees and joints. In America, the first breezes and races are at six furlongs around tight bends; a tremendous stress on developing joints and consequently the beginning of our unsoundness issues. Bute and joint infiltration provide short term relief, but are not the cure for the problem.

Another aspect of improving unsoundness lies in the hands of the track's management. After the track break, the American trainers only have, at the most, 3 1/2 hours to train versus the five to six hours of European and Australasian trainers. Then add in the racing secretary who writes a very boring conditioning book: six furlongs, six furlongs, six furlongs, six furlongs, 1 1/16 miles, etc. This exasperation of speed accelerates the unsoundness issues.

We have limited our 1 1/4-mile dirt races. We have a few on dirt at the Classic distance of 1 1/2 miles, but the majority of them are on the turf and those are still limited. We should have more 1 1/4 to 1 1/2-mile programs nationwide on the dirt.

The training and racing conditions are still running like the early 1900's. If we do not change the turns, distances and races carded at our tracks, changing the surfaces will only be a tremendous waste of money for the tracks and loss of the horse use is a financial killer for all the owner--a negative domino effect for all involved!

Give the trainer the optimal conditions to be able to run on zero medication. And, yes--it is a MUST for the American racing and breeding industry to race on zero medication. We are making a mockery of ourselves worldwide and continually create a negative image as animal abusers in the American society through all media outlets. Medication is masking the real level of our horses--their true racing abilities and financial value will only be apparent when we race without medication.

NONANT-LE-PIN A STEP CLOSER TO PROTECTION

The international Thoroughbred Breeders' Federation (ITBF) has classified the breeding lands around the village of Nonant-le-Pin as a protected region for the breeding of horses. Presented by Hubert Honore, Vice President of the French Breeders' Association, the case was put before representatives of 20 countries for discussion when the ITBF met in Santago, Chile Mar. 5. "The breeding lands around the Haras du Pin benefit from a worldwide reputation for excellence, which explains why the totality of the countries in the Federation are behind us," said Honore. "The marks of support are going to multiply, especially given the upcoming World Equestrian Games." The breeding lands in the Haras du Pin region have been under application for the UNESCO world heritage list since 2013 and this declaration by the ITBF is very strong support in the instruction process of the application. The World Equestrian Games will be the destination for representatives of the International Federation as well as breeders of the Orne region in Normandy from Aug. 23 to Sept. 7.
