HOLY BULL DRILLS BULLET Holy Bull (Great Above) sizzled six furlongs in a bullet 1:11.3 from the gate yesterday morning at Gulfstream Park in what owner/trainer Jimmy Croll termed, "his big work for the race." The race is the seven furlong \$50,000 Olympic H., to be run Jan. 22. Regular exercise rider Bobby Perna was aboard for the drill, which marked the first time the gray colt has been in a starting gate since his victory in the Sept. 17 Woodward. "He broke good, then kind of looked around and went off slow," Croll said. "I got his first eighth in 13.3 which is slow for him. Then he said "Oh" and went on with it. This should put him more on the muscle, on his toes. It is just like with people, the fitter you get, the more on edge you get. Holy Bull is a tough one to pick a fight with." Croll confirmed yesterday that the four-year-old colt is scheduled to run in the \$300,000 Donn H., followed by either the Santa Anita H. or the Gulfstream Park H. "He is not going to be 100 percent for the Olympic, but I think he will be right where he should be to win," said Croll. "He got a hair tired this morning, just in the last three or four jumps as I wanted him to. He has been relaxed and we have been letting him lollygag around there. Now, we are getting more serious. He definitely knows something is in the wind now."

TIMBER COUNTRY TO SKIP EL CAMINO

REAL Due to the continuing rains in California, Breeders' Cup Juvenile winner Timber Country (Woodman) will pass Saturday's El Camino Real Derby at Bay Meadows, trainer D. Wayne Lukas reported. "Though Timber Country hasn't missed any training because of the weather, we just felt that it was better to play it safe, considering the current situation," said Lukas. "As I speak, we're not going. I've been able to train him remarkably well, all things considered, but it's an eight hour van ride in good conditions and with the stormy conditions, who knows what will happen. I'm in a good position and I don't have to be that worried about gearing him up for one race in January." Lukas said he will now consider two options-shipping to Gulfstream Park for the Feb. 18 Fountain of Youth, or waiting until the March 4 San Rafael at Santa Anita.

KEENELAND THIRD SESSION RESULTS Two mares sold for \$100,000 each to top Wednesday's next-to-last session of Keeneland's January Horses of All Ages Sale. James Keogh, agent, paid \$100,000 for Ms. Preacher, a six-year-old multiple stakes-placed mare by Deputy Minister--Mrs. Witt (Alleged). Taylor Made Sales Agency sold Ms. Preacher as a racing or broodmare prospect. Fontainebleau Farm paid the same amount for Crnagora (FR) (Esprit Du Nord), a seven-vear-old broodmare in foal to Sky Classic. Eaton-Williams, as agent, sold Crnagora, who was a stakes-winner in France. Keeneland sold 251 horses Wednesday for \$2,963,300, an average of \$11,806. With one day remaining in the four-day sale, 798 horses have been sold for \$17,484,900, an average of \$21,911.

TURFWAY CANCELS WEDNESDAY CARD

Turfway Park cancelled its racing card originally scheduled for 7 p.m. Wednesday, January 11. Track President Mark Simendinger called the races off at approximately 11:30 a.m. due to the waterlogged condition of the racetrack. "Racing tonight was questionable," Simendinger said yesterday. "We decided to take the cautious route and spend the next 24 hours working on the track. We believe this is the safest course of action for our horses and jockeys." The Race Book at Turfway Park continued its afternoon simulcasting program Wednesday with races from Gulfstream Park in Florida. Turfway is scheduled to resume live racing tonight with first race post time at 7 p.m.

RETAMA PARK AND TEXAS HBPA SIGN TWO-YEAR AGREEMENT Retama Park and the Texas Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association have signed a two-year horsemen's agreement. "This agreement is fair for both the horsemen in Texas and Retama Park," said Tom Durant, president of the Texas H.B.P.A. "We are very glad it was completed prior to the track's inaugural race season." The agreement, which is effective through the final day of the last live race meeting during the calendar year of 1996, allows Retama Park to import a maximum of six out-of-state simulcast signals as determined by racetrack management. It also allows the racetrack to export its simulcast signal to any facility out-of-state with 50 percent of the proceeds, after expenses, going to the purse allocation for horsemen participating at Retama Park. "We are pleased to have completed this agreement so quickly, and look forward to a strong relationship with the Texas H.B.P.A. and its members," said Retama Park President Bob Quigley. Retama Park, currently under construction in northeast San Antonio, will open for live racing April 7, 1995.

VALID WAGER TO FLORIDA Southern California-based trainer Mike Mollica has an East Coast agenda for his promising three-year-old Valid Wager (Valid Appeal). "It looks like we're leaving on the (Jan.) 17th for Florida," said the 40-year-old conditioner. "He's going to run in the GII Hutcheson S. (Jan. 28 at Gulfstream). It's a good steppingstone to the Fountain of Youth (Feb. 18) and then maybe the Florida Derby (March 11)." A Triple Crown campaign could be in the offing. "He's going to have to be very competitive," Mollica said. "If he doesn't win the Hutcheson, I just might come back with him here and freshen him up and wait." Valid Wager, winner of the GIII California Juvenile S. at Bay Meadows, also placed second in the GII Arlington-Washington Futurity and GIII Hollywood Prevue Breeders Cup S.

SAN FERNANDO S.-GII, \$200,000a, 4vo, 9f Dramatic Gold (Slew o' Gold) worked 1/2-mile in :48 3/5 handily vesterday over Santa Anita's training track, which was listed as sloppy. "We're going to enter, said trainer Davis Hofmans of the Golden Eagle Farm four-year-old, who finished third in the Breeders' Cup Classic. "If the track's okay, we'll run." Hollywood Derby winner River Flyer (Riverman), whom Hofmans had also intended to run in the GII event, will pass. "We weren't able to work him so we're not going to run," Hofmans said. "We'll wait for grass races for him." Trainer Richard Mandella said yesterday of La Presle Farm's Dare and Go (Alydar), "He breezed an easy half-mile (in :50) this morning. We're planning to run." Trainer Bob Hess Jr. said Wekiva Springs (Runaway Groom) went five furlongs over Hollywood's sloppy main track Monday in 1:05 4/5. "He went an easy, easy five-eighths," said Hess. Trainer Richard Mandella intends to run the half-brother to \$5,129,645-earner Best Pal in the El Camino Real if the weather cooperates. "We're thinking of going," Manella said. "We'll just have to wait and see how the track is up there." Trainer Gary Lewis, meanwhile, said he plans to run Charles Dunn's 2xSW Jumron (GB) (Sharpo {GB}) in the GIII race.
