FRANCOIS BOUTIN DEAD AT 58 Francois Boutin, one of Europe's most successful trainers over the past three decades, died in Paris Wednesday morning after a long battle with cancer. He was 58 years old. Boutin was perhaps most famous in America as the trainer of Miesque, winner of back-to-back Breeders' Cup Miles in 1987 and '88, and Arazi, winner of the 1991 Breeders' Cup Juvenile and the favorite in the '92 Kentucky Derby. But Boutin's record on his native continent and his always impeccable manners marked him not only as a great professional but also placed him among the most popular men in racing. Born Jan 21, 1937, Boutin was assistant to Etienne Pollet for four years before taking out his own license in 1964. He won 1,881 races, including over 70 Group or Grade I races since 1980 alone, an average of nearly five a year for 15 consecutive years. His impressive list of wins in France featured great names like April Run, Nureyev and Sagaro. He won the Prix de la Salamandre seven times and the Poule d'Essai des Poulains and Prix Jacques le Marois six times each. British successes included wins in the 1000 Guineas (Miesque, 1977), 2000 Guineas (Nonoalco in 1974 and Zino in 1982), as well as the Oaks with La Lagune in 1968, his first Classic win. But, astonishingly, he never managed a victory in either the Epsom Derby or the Arc de Triomphe, where his best finish was Northern Trick's second-place behind Sagace in 1984. Diagnosed with cancer of the liver in 1993, Boutin nonetheless continued to train his large string at his Chantilly base. He is survived by his wife, Lucy, the daughter of owner-breeder William T. Young, as well as three children by a previous marriage, Eric, Patricia and Nathalie.

BREEDERS' CUP REDUCES SUPPLEMENTAL FEES Supplemental fees for Breeders' Cup Championship races will be reduced from the current 12 percent of the purse to nine percent, officials of Breeders' Cup Ltd. announced yesterday. The change will take effect with the two-year-old races to be run in the 1998 Breeders' Cup Championship. The supplemental fee applies to horses who were not nominated as foals, but were sired by Breeders' Cup nominated stallions.

BREEDERS' CUP REDUCES SUPPLEMENTAL FEES, Continued:

Horses sired by stallions not nominated to the Breeders' Cup will still have to be supplemented for a fee of 20 percent of the purse. "Our directors have indicated an increasing interest during the past year in reviewing and reevaluating our supplemental entry requirements," said James I. Bassett III, president of Breeders' Cup Ltd. "We feel that this modification will not result in a reduction in foal nominations. At the same time, this change will also provide more encouragement to owners of non-eligible horses to supplement and participate in the Breeders' Cup Championship." In a related development, yesterday's Racing Post reported that an agreement has been reached on a new cross-registration deal between the European Breeders' Fund and Breeders' Cup Ltd. to allow European-bred horses to take part in the series without having to pay the highest level of supplementary fees. Full details of the agreement will be revealed at a press conference next Tuesday.

CHARLES TOWN TRACK OFFICIALS APPLY FOR INTERIM RACING SCHEDULE

The Charles Town Races board of directors voted yesterday to apply for an interim racing schedule, a decision enabling the resumption of live racing while track officials continue their efforts to sell the troubled Thoroughbred track. Track President D. Keith Wagner credited the newly formed Charles Town Horsemen's Association and the West Virginia Racing Commission for making the return of racing possible. "The Charles Town Horsemen's Association came to us in a spirit of true cooperation and expressed an interest in working out a plan under which we could resume racing while we look for a buyer," said Wagner. "As a result of our talks and the cooperation of the Commission, we believe we've identified enough expense-cutting measures to bring our projected losses down to a level that we believe we can withstand while we continue our efforts to sell the track. That will allow the horsemen a place to race their horses, it'll put many of our employees back to work, it will lessen the impact on our colleagues in the business community and it hopefully will enhance the prospects for selling the track." Among the cost-saving measures taken were the closing of the Shenandoah Downs training facility and the elimination of a state-mandated patrol judge position which had been funded by the track. In an effort to enhance revenues, the track and horsemen plan to offer additional simulcast racing, including the introduction of greyhound simulcasts. The track's license application, submitted Wednesday to the West Virginia Racing Commission, requests approval to conduct live racing March 1 through December 17, but track officials cautioned that a firm date for the resumption of live racing won't be set until simulcast racing resumes. "We'd like to resume full-card simulcasting within the next two weeks and resume live racing in early March," said Wagner.

"The time lag between the start of simulcast and live racing is necessary to allow sufficient time to reestablish our horse population and allow the horsemen to rebuild their purse fund through simulcast revenues." The application requests 221 racing days, one more than the 220 required for tracks offering full-card simulcasting.

TURFWAY CANCELS WEDNESDAY CARD

For the fourth time since the beginning of its Winter/Spring meet January 1, Turfway Park's live racing card was cancelled last night, this time due to track condition. Because of Wednesday's warmer weather, the main track thawed and became waterlogged. "The track maintenance crew will attempt to squeeze some of the water out of the racing surface before it tightens up again as temperatures drop this evening," said Turfway President Mark Simendinger yesterday. "As of now, we plan to race tomorrow evening." Thursday's first race post time is 7 p.m.

TRAINER KILLED AT MONMOUTH

Trainer Michael J. Vincitore was killed by a northbound New Jersey Transit commuter train as it passed through a portion of the Monmouth Park stable area around 9:30 Wednesday morning. Vincitore, 68, was in his van when the accident occurred. Officials from the New Jersey Sports and Exposition Authority declined to comment, referring inquiries to local police. "The accident took place at a private crossing in the back portion of the stable area," said Robert Joyce, Chief of the Oceanport, N.J. police department where Monmouth is located. "He was a trainer who had a barn in the stable area." With training closed for the winter, however, Joyce said it was unclear why Vincitore was in the backstretch. "We're still looking into why he may have been there. He may have been dropping off some equipment at the barn for the spring, but we don't want to speculate." Joyce was unaware of any other injuries caused by the accident. Vincitore, who has trained in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Florida, saddled seven winners last year from 69 starts for earnings of \$62,874.

CALIPHA READY FOR RETURN

Trainer Bud Delp will send three-time stakes winner **Calipha** (Two Punch) against odds-on favorite **Educated Risk** (Mr. Prospector) in the seven-furlong, Gill Shirley Jones H. at Gulfstream Sunday. Winner of her last five starts, four-year-old Calipha has not raced since taking the Gill Reeve Schley Jr. S. at Monmouth by seven lengths last June 26. Prior to that, she was victorious in the Gill Black Eyed Susan S. at Pimlico in May.

WESTERN ECHO FIGHTS BRONCHITIS Bud Delp, conditioner of last year's GIII Laurel Futurity winner **Western Echo** (Eastern Echo), is hopeful that the three-year-old colt can overcome a mild bout with bronchitis in time to run in the GII Fountain of Youth S. Saturday, Feb. 18 at Gulfstream Park. "He belongs with these horses," Delp insisted yesterday, despite **Western Echo's** sixth-place finish in the GII Hutcheson Jan. 28. "He didn't have a good trip," said Delp. "Western Echo went into the air at the start and found himself last. And because of the bronchitis, the colt's speed was compromised and he didn't finish strongly. (Jockey) Mike Smith tells me that he's going to work **Western Echo** and is going to stay with him." If the bronchitis continues, Delp has been advised that a return to cold weather would take care of the problem.

ARCHES OF GOLD RETIRED Six-year-old sprinter **Arches of Gold** (Strike Gold), who was expected to make the final start of her career in Saturday's \$50,000-added **Orinda H.** at Bay Meadows, will pass the race. According to her trainer Bob Baffert, owners Mike Pegram and Bob Roth want to ship the mare to Kentucky where she'll be bred to Deputy Minister. A five-time stakes-winner of \$434,006, **Arches of Gold's** career highlight came in 1992, when she took the GIII **La Brea S.** at Santa Anita.

CROW FAMILY AGREES TO MANAGE LONE STAR RECAPITALIZATION Yesterday, the Trammel Crow family interests (TCI) notified the Lone Star Jockey Club partners, City of Grand Prairie and Texas Racing Commission of its decision to proceed with its plan to organize an effort to recapitalize Lone Star and commence construction of the proposed Class I Thoroughbred racetrack in Grand Prairie, Texas. This decision represents the culmination of a process initiated in early September, 1994 by an invitation to the Crow family to help bring the racetrack to fruition. "We are pleased that the Lone Star partners have supported the TCI offer to provide new capital and expertise to help the project," said Clay E. Crawford, vice president of Class MGP Inc., now the sold managing general partner of Lone Star and spokesman for TCI. "We hope they will choose to invest with us in this final round of financing."

PAUL JENKINS NAMED RIVER DOWNS RACING SECRETARY Paul Jenkins has been named Racing Secretary at River Downs in Cincinnati, Ohio. Jenkins has been a racing official in Pennsylvania and New Jersey for the last 15 years, and most recently served as Racing Secretary at Philadelphia Park. "We are excited to have a veteran like Paul join our staff," said River Downs General Manager Jack Hanessian. "Coming from Philadelphia Park where the competition for horses is fierce, he has had to be

very creative to entice horsemen to race with him. That experience will be invaluable in our market." Jenkins replaces Warren Wolf, who resigned from the post after 18 years at River Downs.
