LONE STAR INVESTORS RESPOND

FAVORABLY TO CROWS Ninety percent of Lone Star Jockey Club investors responded favorably to the Trammell Crow family's offer to take over the financial direction of the proposed \$100 million Class I track in Grand Prairie, near Dallas. In mid-January, the Crow family proposed to infuse a needed \$10 million into the struggling project and assume control of its financing. Partners in Lone Star were asked to respond to the offer by February 1. With the majority of investors responding positively to the proposal, the Crow family has assumed control of the project and started talks with potential investors. In order to move the track into its next phase of development, the Crow tenure will need to secure approximately \$25 million in bank financing and an additional \$10 million in equity. The Sports Facilities Development Corporation, an organization that monitors Grand Prairie's participation in the project--which includes approximately \$40 million in city sales tax supported bonds--has requested that Lone Star make an April 1 presentation on its financial status. Those against the Crow takeover include DJ Track Consultants, owned by attorneys Joe DeFrancis and Martin Jacobs, operators of Laurel and Pimlico and part of the original Lone Star management team. Both DeFrancis and Jacobs have threatened to take legal action against the project. Class MGP Inc. is now the sole managing general partner of Lone Star. Trammell Crow is president of Class MGP, and Clay Crawford, a Crow family attorney, serves as vice-president.

TURFWAY PARK CANCELS AFTER TWO

RACES Thursday night racing at Turfway Park in Florence, Kentucky was cancelled after the running of the second race, when the racing surface was deemed unsafe by track officials. It was the fifth cancellation of the meet. Wednesday's card had also been cancelled after warmer temperatures caused the track to thaw and become waterlogged. As of last night, the remaining water was still draining from the track, causing slippery conditions. The track maintenance crew will work around the clock, attempting to "squeeze" the remainder of the water from the track with specially-designed floats, which are pulled behind tractors. Racing is scheduled to resume Friday night, with a first race post time of 7 p.m.

STRUB S.-GI, \$500,000, 4yo, 1 1/4m
Dramatic Gold (Slew o' Gold) worked five furlongs in :59 3/5 handily over Santa Anita's fast main track yesterday. "It was a good work," said trainer David Hofmans. "All systems are go." Also working yesterday was Colonel Collins (El Gran Senor), who sizzled a half-mile in a bullet :46 1/5 under apprentice rider Brice Blanc. It was the fourth straight bullet work on dirt for the colt. "If everything's tight and cold (Friday) morning, we'll enter," said trainer Rodney Rash. Probable favorite Wekiva Springs (Runaway Groom) jogged Thursday and is scheduled to gallop two miles both Friday and Saturday, said trainer Robert Hess Jr. The probable field also includes Dare and Go (Alydar), College Town (Snow Chief) and Strodes Creek (Halo).

SANTA MARIA H.-GI, \$150,000a, 4yo/up, f/m, 8.5f Trainer Ron McAnally expressed satisfaction with Thursday's workout from Paseana (ARG) (Ahmad), who will run in the Santa Maria off a six-month hiatus. The eight-year-old mare was clocked in :59 3/5 for five furlongs under regular rider Chris McCarron. Trainer Bill Spawr said Barry Schochet's Desert Orchid (Storm Cat), an 11-length winner of a \$62,500 claiming race at Santa Anita Jan. 8, is a "possible" starter in the GI race. "If she runs, David Flores has the mount," Spawr said. Flores, who celebrates his 27th birthday Sunday, has ridden Desert Orchid in her last 10 starts. Also likely to start are Corrazona (El Gran Senor), Desormeaux; Key Phrase (Flying Paster), Antley: Queens Court Queen (Lyphard), Nakatani; and Thirst For Peace (Time for a Change), Solis.

CRYPTIC BID UNDERGOES SURGERY AGAIN

Cryptic Bid (Cryptoclearance), who underwent major surgery last Thursday, Jan. 26 to repair his cecum, had to be operated on again mid-day Wednesday for the same problem, trainer John Kimmel said vesterday. "Cryptic Bid suffered another setback." Kimmel said. "He showed repeat signs of colic and after talking to the people in Gainesville (the horse is at the School of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Florida there), it was determined the cecum (which leads into the large colon) was distended and not emptying properly. They performed another operation, a three-hour procedure, bypassing the cecum. It's very traumatic for the animal and with his history of previous surgery, the prognosis is very guarded. I'd hate to put numbers on it, but I'd say right now it's 50-50. The main concern is infection. If we can keep the infection at bay for four or five days, his chances would probably go up to 75 percent." Cryptic Bid was one of the East's most exciting Triple Crown prospects on the basis of two impressive victories at Aqueduct last fall. He was pointing to the GII Hutcheson S. at Gulfstream when he had to undergo surgery to remove a chip from his right front ankle last month.

CIGAR TO FACE HOLY BULL IN DONN Allen Paulson's Cigar (Palace Music), winner of last year's GI NYRA Mile, will be going for his fourth consecutive victory when he takes on 1994 Horse of the Year Holy Bull (Great Above) in the GI \$300,000 Donn H., to be run Saturday, Feb. 11. "I think we are being very sporting to run," said Cigar's trainer Bill Mott. "I'd like to win if we could. We haven't proven we can beat Holy Bull, but we'll give it our best shot.' Five-vear-old Cigar has won his last three races since switching from turf to dirt by a total of 17 lengths. "We thought he was a nice horse, but when we put him back on the dirt it was a complete turnaround," said Mott. "At first we thought it might be a fluke and didn't know if he would do it again. As it turned out, it wasn't." Jerry Bailey worked the colt five furlongs Wed. in 1:03 3/5 and will ride him in the Donn. Regarding race strategy, Mott confessed, "If you go with him (Holy Bull), he is going to kill you. If you don't, you'll never catch him. It seems like a tough situation to me."

CALIFORNIA THREE-YEAR-OLD SHUFFLE Undefeated GI Hollywood Futurity-winner Afternoon Deelites (Private Terms) is on his way to the San Vicente H. at Santa Anita Feb. 12, while Petionville (Seeking the Gold) and Timber Country (Woodman) are pointing to a showdown in the March 4 San Rafael S. American Day (Nureyev), 7 1/2-length winner of a one-mile allowance at Santa Anita Wed., could also make his next start in the San Rafael S. For the present, Dick Mandella, trainer of both Afternoon Deelites and American Day, plans to keep the

two colts on separate paths. "Ideally, I'll use one race for one, and the other for the other," said Mandella. "I'm not in any hurry to put them together. There's no need for it." Trainer Randy Bradshaw said Thursday that his unbeaten San Miguel S. winner Petionville will make his next start in the one-mile San Rafael S. against Breeders' Cup Juvenile Champion Timber Country. "Seven-eighths doesn't make much sense to us now," said Bradshaw, referring to the San Vicente distance. "After winning at six furlongs (San Miguel distance), a mile fits much better into his schedule." Trainer Gary Jones has indicated that Jumron (GB) (Sharpo (GB)), nine-length winner of the GIII El Camino Real Derby, will await either the San Rafael or the San Felipe. Ron McAnally, conditioner of GII Del Mar Futurity-winner On Target (Forty Niner) and GII Hollywood Juvenile Championship hero Mr Purple (Deputy Minister), said yesterday he will point both runners to the San Vicente.

HORSEMEN SET TO DISCUSS NATIONAL REPRESENTATION Representatives from several Eastern horsemen's associations are scheduled to meet today in Fort Lauderdale to discuss possible changes in the way they are nationally represented, according to members of the groups set to gather. Horsemen's groups from Florida, Illinois, Kentucky, Maryland, New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania are expected to be represented. "The National HBPA has been less than effective in dealing with problems affecting horsemen," said Kent Stirling, president of the Florida HBPA. "Some of the groups attending are dissatisfied and some, like our group, are on the fence and are curious about what they will talk about."

CANAVERAL RETURNS SUNDAY Morven Stud's Canaveral (Relaunch), an early sensation last winter in winning his first three career starts at Gulfstream by a combined 19 lengths, is scheduled to make his four-year-old debut in the seventh race this Sunday at Gulfstream. Trained by Frank Brothers, Canaveral disappointed by finishing unplaced as the 2-5 favorite in his next start, the GIII Flamingo S. at Hialeah. The chestnut colt didn't race again last year. Canaveral displayed speed Wed. in a five-furlong workout from the gate, clocked in :57 2/5 handily.

U.S. JOCKEYS TO COMPETE IN JAPAN American jockeys Corey Nakatani and Joe Bravo will head to Nakayama Racecourse near Tokyo, Japan for the fourth annual Young Jockey World Championship Series, to be held Saturday and Sunday, March 4th and 5th. The competition is open to riders age 27 or younger; both Nakatani and Bravo were born in 1970. There are 12 jockeys from six countries scheduled to compete. The contest is comprised of four turf races, varying in length from from six to 10 furlongs. Nakatani finished seventh in the 1994 edition.
