Holy Bull's groom Bob Coffey will retire from the racetrack and return home to Tennessee. "I knew if there was a hair out of place on his body," said Coffey. "I let him get too close. It is hard not to with an animal like this. Every race was fantastic with him. The way he wouldn't give up in the Travers. The way he blew them away in the Woodward. He would say, 'You want to run? C'mon, let's run.' Holy Bull himself, cooperative all morning, hesitated when asked to step on the van that would take him away from the races forever. But by 11:20 yesterday morning, he was standing comfortably in a box stall bound for Jonabell.

Wekiva Springs should be ready to race by mid-April at the latest, maybe on the turf or maybe out-of-state." UNCERTAIN Owners Irving and Marge Cowan were weighing a decision yesterday as to whether or not Hollywood Wildcat (Kris S.) will continue her racing career, according to trainer Neil Drysdale. "There's a small lesion on her left front leg," Drysdale explained. "The tendon is flat and looks normal, but on the scan, it shows a small lesion." If not retirement, said Drysdale, the five-year-old mare is facing a long recovery period. "Of course, she's a three-year-old filly champion and her value as a broodmare speaks for itself, so there's a great deal going into their decision.' Winner of the 1993 Breeders' Cup Distaff, Hollywood Wildcat has earned \$1,432,160 from 12 wins in 21 career starts. In her absence, the confirmed starters for Sunday's Grade I Santa Margarita are: Paseana (ARG) (Ahmad {ARG}), Queens Court Queen (Lyphard) and Klassy Kim (Silent Screen). One provisional entrant, Borodislew (Seattle Slew), was added to the invitational list Wednesday.

#### CIGAR WORKS FOR GULFSTREAM PARK

HANDICAP The top two finishers in the Feb. 11 Donn H. worked vesterday at Gulfstream Park and are scheduled to meet again in the Grade I \$500,000 Gulfstream Park H. March 5. Allen Paulson's Cigar (Palace Music), 5 1/2-length winner of the Donn, drilled seven furlongs in 1:28 1/5. "He went very well," said trainer Bill Mott. "He was aggressive and happy about doing it." Cigar will be going for his fifth straight win as he tries 1 1/4-miles for the first time in the Gulfstream Park H. "It is a good test for him," Mott added. "It will answer a lot of questions regarding our plans for later in the year." Pennsylvania-bred Primitive Hall (Dixieland Band), second in the Donn at odds of 69-1, worked a bullet five furlongs in :59 4/5 yesterday. "He went very fast," said trainer Wilfred Lewis. "But he went very easily. He is better now than he ever was. His training is tremendous and he is as happy as can be."

# DE NIRO'S RETURN DELAYED De Niro (Gulch), winner two of three career starts including the GIII Tremont Breeders' Cup S. at Belmont last June, got loose yesterday morning at Gulfstream Park and suffered minor injuries. The three-year-old colt was scheduled to make his 1995 debut today, but has been scratched due to the injuries. Jockey Eddie Maple was aboard the colt as he walked the wrong way to school in the paddock. When he got under the tunnel, De Niro reared up and dropped Maple, then ran back around the clubhouse turn. "When the

pony boy ran alongside of him to catch him, De Niro ran into the bushes and got cut up a little," trainer Allen Jerkens said yesterday. "It is serious enough to keep him from running tomorrow. The cuts are in tough places to treat--his arm, his hock and his stifle. I never should have tried to school him; he is so sharp right now." Jerkens noted that De Niro will miss some training, but may be able to run by the end of the Gulfstream meet.

#### CONNECTICUT OTB'S TELETRACK

REOPENS AS NEW 'SPORTS HAVEN' Connecticut OTB's Teletrack, which opened in New Haven in 1979 as a pioneer simulcasting outlet in North America, will reopen March 1 as a revamped racing and entertainment complex called "Sports Haven." The facility will feature full-card simulcasting on four giant screens, 300 individual wagering desks, three restaurants--including one gourmet affair--a sports bar, and a virtual-reality high-tech game room. At the nucleus of Sports Haven will be a 47,000 gallon shark tank to remind horseplayers with Las Vegas-like glitz that racing can be an exciting game. "Sports Haven will be a one-of-a-kind facility," said Rick Cowan, president of Autotote Enterprises, owners and operators of both Connecticut OTB and the Sports Haven site. "This is the most exciting project that I've been involved with in my entire racing career." Teletrack was closed in 1992 and, after Autotote purchased OTB operations from the state in 1993, plans were developed to resurrect the facility. "Our strategy was to capitalize on what a racetrack cannot do," said Cowan. "Sports Haven will appeal to all age groups and expose new, younger fans to racing. We will operate 15 hours a day, seven days a week, and remain open as an entertainment facility even after the evening's last race has been declared official."

#### NEW RULES UPSET BRITISH JOCKEYS

Britain's jockeys are angry following the imposition of strict new rules covering riding offenses. Effective March 2, jockeys found guilty of a range of wrongdoings, from not weighing-out to holding their mounts back in an attempt to deceive handicappers, will be subject to suspensions rather than the present fines. But British trainers, who shoulder the ultimate responsibility for booking riders and instructing them how a horse should be handled in a race, will still be dealt with on a purely financial basis. John Reid, joint president of the Jockeys' Association of Great Britain, said, "No jockeys are stopping horses for their own benefit and it's all very well saying we can ignore a trainer when told to give a horse an easy race. But how many more rides would you get for that trainer if you didn't follow his instructions? We're just the guys who are out there, the guys people see, but we're being made out to be the bad guys."

#### MONMOUTH CHANGES SAPLING/SORORITY

NOMINATIONS Nominations to Monmouth Park's premier events for two-year-olds, the \$200,000 Grade II Sapling and \$200,000 Grade III Sorority Stakes to be run in August, will be taken on an early bird basis for the 1995 season, it was announced vesterday by Michael P. Dempsey, Monmouth's director of racing. "In the past we've run the Sapling and Sorority as futurities but we believe that is a method whose time has passed," said Dempsey. "We wanted to offer horsemen a simpler, less expensive way to participate in our top two-year-old events." Early bird nominations to both races will close Monday, April 3. Horsemen who spend \$400 for the early bird closings will now automatically be nominated to the \$50,000 Tyro or \$50,000 Colleen, the traditional prep races for the Sapling and Sorority.

#### FERNANDO VALENZUELA BACK IN THE

SADDLE Southern California-based jockey Fernando Valenzuela was back in the saddle Wednesday morning at Santa Anita, working horses for the first time since his spill opening day, Dec. 26. "I should be back around March 1," said Valenzuela, who suffered two compressed vertebrae in the first-race mishap. "I was on a jogger this morning and a few other horses to begin with. I didn't want to start out with nine or 10 workers a morning. As soon as I trim some of this fat off, I should be ready."

#### HISHI AMAZON'S U.S. TRIP SHORTENED

Masaichiro Abe's Hishi Amazon (Theatrical {IRE}), the world's richest filly or mare with over \$4.82 million in earnings, will run in the \$150,000-added Santa Anita H. at Santa Anita March 18, but will not stay for the \$200,000 Santa Barbara H. April 9 as reported earlier. The four-year-old Kentucky-bred filly is scheduled to arrive from Japan March 4, immediately enter quarantine at Hollywood Park, and ship to Santa Anita March 6. While at Santa Anita, Japan's Champion Two-Year-Old and Three-Year-Old Filly will be stabled at trainer Richard Mandella's barn.

JOCKEY SEEKS DAMAGES Jockey Leon Jenkins Jr., who suffered brain damage in a spill at the Sonoma County Fairgrounds in Santa Rosa, California Aug. 3, has filed a claim with the county's Board of Supervisors claiming the track's outer rail was faulty and is seeking \$10 million in damages. Jenkins was injured when his mount, Hey Ardis, veered into the outside rail and collapsed, causing Jenkins to fall and hit his head on the outer rail. The jockey was in a coma for two weeks and underwent two brain operations following the accident. "I don't know of anything that is wrong with the rail," Sonoma County Fair General Manager G. James Moore told the Associated Press. "And there's nothing in the claim papers that reveals what they think is wrong. If they have found something, they haven't shared it with me."

#### WILLIAM CONDREN IS TOBA OWNER OF

THE MONTH The Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders' Association Owner of the Month for January is William J. Condren. Two of Condren's '95 Kentucky Derby hopefuls--Suave Prospect (Fortunate Prospect) and Mr. Greeley (Gone West)--displayed their potential in January. Mr. Greeley, co-owned by Joseph Cornacchia, won the GIII Spectacular Bid Breeders' Cup S. by 6 1/4-lengths Jan. 4, opening day at Gulfstream Park. Two-and-a-half weeks later, Suave Prospect, co-owned by Mike Sherman, won the GIII Preview S., also at Gulfstream.
