**BELMONT OPENS TODAY** Belmont Park in Elmont, NY will open for its 90th anniversary season today. The Spring meet, which features 41 stakes worth \$5,350,000, will run through July 17 on a five-day-a-week, Wednesday through Sunday schedule. The highlight of the meet, the \$500,000-added Belmont Stakes, will be run for the 127th time June 10. Belmont Park is also the venue for the Triple Tiara for three-year-old fillies: the May 7 Acorn S., the June 9 Mother Goose and the July 8 Coaching Club American Oaks. Also featured is the Handicap Triple Crown, which consists of the May 29 Metropolitan H., the June 17 Brooklyn H. and the July 4 Suburban H. Post-time for the first of each day's nine races is 1:00 p.m.

### FILLIES LINE UP FOR BRITISH 1,000

**GUINEAS** **Myself (GB)** (Nashwan), winner of the G3 Shadwell Stud Nell Gwynn S. at Newmarket April 18, and **Hoh Magic (GB)** (Cadeaux Genereux {GB}), the Highweight Filly at Two in England and France and runner-up to **Aqaarid** (Nashwan) in the G3 Gainsborough Stud Fred Darling S. at Newbury April 21, have been given the go-ahead to run in Sunday's British 1000 Guineas at Newmarket. "Myself looks a picture and is really ready for Sunday," said her trainer Peter Chapple-Hyam. "They should go a good gallop at Newmarket and that will help her cause. Aqaarid and **Harayir** (Gulch) (the early co-favorites at 3-1) will take a bit of beating, but we are going with every chance." A total of 19 three-year-old fillies were left in at the five-day stage. In addition to the four previously mentioned, they were: **All Time Great (GB)** (Night Shift), **Autumn Affair (GB)** (Lugana Beach {Ire}), **Brief Glimpse (Ire)** (Taufan), **Bring On The Choir (GB)** (Chief Singer {Ire}), **Deceive (GB)** (Machiavellian), **Epagris (GB)** (Zalazi), **Fleet Hill (Ire)** (Warrshan), **Gay Gallanta** (Woodman), **Macoumba** (Mr. Prospector), **Menas Gold (GB)** (Heights of Gold {GB}), **Moonshell (Ire)** (Sadler's Wells), **Musetta (Ire)** (Cadeaux Genereux {GB}), **Poppy Carew (Ire)** (Danehill), **Queenfisher (GB)** (Scottish Reel {Ire}) and **Ridgewood Pearl (GB)** (Indian Ridge {Ire}).

Debbie & Lee Lewis's **Sierra Diablo** (Conquistador Cielo), winner of the GIII Baldwin S. at Santa Anita two starts back, won his only start over a wet track, a 6 1/2-furlong allowance at Saratoga last August, by 12 1/2-lengths. **Blissful State** (Buckaroo) took the seven-furlong Bay Shore S. (GIII) at Aqueduct by three lengths April 15, defeating Withers runners **Northern Ensign** (Blue Ensign) and **Pat N Jac** (Pentelicus) in the process. **Devious Course** (Crafty Prospector), third in Talkin Man in the Gotham last out, won the GIII Nashua at this distance last November. Late-running **Ave's Flag** (Personal Flag) is always tough; the New York-bred rallied to take the NY Stallion S. by 3 1/2 April 23. The wild card in the race appears to be Sidney L. Port's **Blu Tusmani** (Afleet). Winner of two listed stakes in Italy last year, the Kentucky-bred colt will be making both his three-year-old and North American debut.

### KENTUCKY DERBY NOTES:

With jockey Garrett Gomez up, Gil Arkansas Derby winner **Dazzling Falls** (Taylor's Falls) worked an easy half-mile in :52 4/5 over a muddy Churchill Downs track yesterday. The Nebraska-bred colt went the first quarter in :25 4/5 and galloped out five furlongs in 1:07. "The time didn't matter because he wasn't going to do much anyway," said trainer Chuck Turco, who gave the colt only one light half-mile work prior to the Arkansas Derby. Gomez, who has ridden the colt in all four of his 1995 starts, said, "I let him gallop out on his own. He didn't work real fast, but I was happy with the way he did it."

Trainer Bruce Jackson said Tuesday morning that Chris Antley will have the mount on **In Character** (GB) (Never So Bold {Ire}) in the Kentucky Derby. "He came up to me about a half-hour after the Louisiana Derby and said if he had a chance to get on this horse that he'd like to get on," Jackson said. Antley rode Petionville to a narrow victory over In Character in the Louisiana Derby.

**Jumron** (GB) (Sharpo {GB}) worked five furlongs over Churchill Downs' muddy surface yesterday in 1:02. With jockey Goncalino Almeida aboard, the colt went in fractions of :26 for the first quarter and :50 for the half-mile, galloping out six panels in 1:16 2/5. "Goncalino said the track was dead and that the horse wanted to go faster," said trainer Gary Lewis. "I was pleased with his workout. From day one he's acted like he's been here all the time. He's happy, he likes the weather, the people, everything. All we need now is some luck."

**Ski Captain** (Storm Bird), Japan's first representative in the Derby, was due to arrive in Chicago about 10 p.m. last night and board a Tex Sutton charter for Louisville. The colt was expected to get into Churchill around midnight.

#### SANTA ANITA COMPANIES ANNOUNCE AGREEMENT WITH AMC THEATRES

The Santa Anita Companies and AMC Theatres, the Kansas City, Missouri-based movie theatre chain operated by AMC Entertainment Inc., yesterday announced a definitive agreement for AMC to build a 25-screen multiplex adjacent to the Santa Anita Racetrack and Santa Anita Fashion Park Mall in Arcadia, California. The 5,500-seat, 102,000 square-foot multiplex, which will be the largest complex ever built by the 234-theatre national circuit, will anchor a new entertainment/retail complex being developed by Santa Anita on a 400-acre parcel of land that includes Santa Anita Racetrack. The theatre is expected to open in Spring 1997. Chairman of the Boards of The Santa Anita Companies Stephen F. Keller said, "With the signing of our first anchor tenant, we have reached a major milestone in our strategy for maximizing the tremendous value of Santa Anita's assets by developing our Arcadia property into a world-class entertainment environment with Thoroughbred horse racing at its core. The AMC facility is expected to bring approximately two million theatre patrons onto the Santa Anita property annually. We believe it will increase business at Fashion Park, introduce a broad, new population to Thoroughbred horse racing at the Santa Anita Racetrack and greatly enrich the entertainment and retail opportunities for Arcadia and the surrounding communities."

#### BILINSKI CONFIRMED AS NYS RACING AND WAGERING BOARD CHAIRMAN

Dr. Jerry Bilinski has been confirmed as the new chairman of the New York State Racing and Wagering Board. The appointment was made yesterday by Governor George Pataki and Bilinski is expected to assume his new duties immediately. Joe Neglia, who had been serving as the acting chairman, will remain with the board as a member. Bilinski has been a prominent upstate New York breeder, owner and veterinarian. His New York Stallion Station stands Cormorant and Go and Go (Ire). It is believed he has had to drop his role as an owner and breeder in order to qualify for the job under New York racing regulations.

## THE INTERNATIONAL HORSE

It is appropriate Jumron is in this year's Kentucky Derby. The race is expected to have its largest international cast of horses and Jumron has more international connections than the United Nations.

The owner, Charlie Dunn, is a Canadian native; the trainer, Gary Lewis, is an American; the rider, Goncalino Almeida, is from Brazil and Jumron, well, he hails from Britain. "He's got worldwide connections," Dunn said. "I think he's the all-American dream."

He is certainly the dream of Dunn, a native of Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, who moved with his family to Portland at age five. Dunn's father, Wilson, who worked as a steward at several U.S. tracks, bred George Royal, the horse of the year in Canada in 1965. Among George's Royal victories were back-to-back scores in '65 and '66 in the San Juan Capistrano.

Wilson Dunn's brothers were also involved in the sport as trainers or officials. One brother, Wally, trained four Kentucky Derby starters including Correspondent, who placed fifth in the 1953 Run for the Roses.

Charlie Dunn, who is 39, did not become involved in horse ownership until about seven years ago, starting off in the claiming game in Portland and later expanding to California. He has steadily built up his stable, buying yearlings at sales in Washington and Kentucky. He has about 15 horses racing and about a dozen two-year-olds in training.

Last year proved to be a pivotal point in Dunn's life. He sold his business, Labtee Enterprises, which manufactured audio equipment for computer electronics, and bought Jumron for \$150,000 following the colt's fourth career race, a victory in a minor stakes in Vancouver. Jumron has since become a major player in this year's three-year-old crop, following stakes victories in the El Camino Real and Golden State Derby and a narrow loss in the Santa Anita Derby.

Few could have predicted such a dramatic rise for the colt, who may rival Santa Anita Derby victor Larry the Legend as the Cinderella horse of 1995. Purchased for about \$5,000 as a yearling in Britain, Jumron was returned to the seller because he was a nervous horse who weaved in his stall. Trainer A.B. Aziz later bought the son of Sharpo for about \$30,000 and moved him to Oregon, where he made his career debut at Portland Meadows and won by 15 lengths--and caught Charlie

Dunn's eye for the first time. After three successive races, two of which were minor stakes wins, in Oregon and Hastings Park in Vancouver, Dunn inquired about buying the colt. When Aziz told him the price, Dunn issued a check on the spot.

And now Jumron is in the Kentucky Derby of all places. "I think he's got a lot of people pulling for him," Dunn said. "I have at least 30. That's how many I'm taking to Kentucky." The group includes family and friends and Aziz and his wife.

Another member of the group will be Wally Dunn, who is 83 but feeling spry and excited about going back to Louisville. "You bet your life (I'm going)," Dunn said. "I'm tickled to death he's got a good horse. They're hard to come by." Wally Dunn really didn't know his nephew growing up, but Charlie contacted his uncle when he was looking for someone to train his horses at Santa Anita. Wally, who retired in 1973 after a career of more than 30 years, is a regular visitor to the Southern California tracks where he was based for most of his career and recommended Gary Lewis. "He's been very successful with a small stable, he's a very thorough trainer," Wally Dunn said.

Charlie, Gary and Goncalino will all be racing in the Derby for the first time. But, if the Santa Anita Derby is any indication, the rookie triumvirate are not suffering any anxiety attacks. "I'm not intimidated; I hope Gary is not intimidated," Charlie said before the Santa Anita Derby. "I'm excited, but not intimidated. I haven't been intimidated since the last time I missed curfew."

Charlie has received a fair share of criticism for sticking with Almeida. Many critics have suggested using a more experienced, high-profile jockey. "I've always been a believer you go with what got you there, in my business and my personal life," he said.

And what does Charlie think of his horse and his chances in the race? "I don't think we'll be all that far out of it," he said. "I don't think it will be all that blistering of a pace. I hope it is, but I don't think so. You never know. Our horse has never been able to run early, but he can be situated anywhere you want. If he gets clearance at the top of the stretch, he'll be awful tough."
