DEL MAR OPENS TODAY The Southern California Thoroughbred racing circuit's stop at the shore--the popular summer stand at Del Mar--will be off and running today. The seaside track will offer 43 days of sport on its normal six-days-a-week schedule during its 56th season. As usual, Del Mar will have a 2 p.m. first post time every day except the first five Fridays of the meet, when fans can enjoy twilight racing beginning at 4 p.m. There will be no racing Tuesdays. The \$1,000,000 Grade I Pacific Classic, to be run Sunday, August 13, highlights the richest stakes program in Del Mar history; the schedule calls for \$4,950,000 in purses for the 24 stakes offered. Daily average purses are expected to top \$400,000.

HOLLYWOOD REPORTS RECORD AVERAGE

HANDLE Handle was up almost \$1.5 million daily from 1994 as the 67-day Hollywood Park spring/ summer meeting ended Monday afternoon. The daily average of \$9,618,258 was up 18 percent from the figure of \$8,148,391 in 1994 as an unprecedented \$644,423,260 was wagered, contributing to record daily purses of \$382,838--an eight percent increase from a year ago. In addition, Hollywood Park's daily on-track handle average of \$2,675,783 was down just 1.5 percent from 1994, "Our product is being exposed to more people than ever before," track Chairman R.D. Hubbard said. "We had action around the clock at Hollywood Park with the Hollywood Casino also accommodating race players. For the first time we imported and exported races to Canada. We continued the simulcasts from Hong Kong throughout the season, and fans in New York State also had the opportunity to bet on races from Hollywood Park for the first time." While combined handle was up, the combined average attendance of 27,074 was down 8.1 percent from 1994. The on-track average attendance of 11,611 fell 8.8 percent. Corey Nakatani captured his first Hollywood Park title by riding 82 winners, while Sandy Shulman won his first spring/summer training championship by saddling 23 winners. Juddmonte Farms led all owners in money won with \$958,800. Allen E. Paulson's Cigar (Palace Music), who captured the \$1 million Hollywood Gold Cup, was the unanimous choice for Horse of the Meet.

HASKELL INVITATIONAL H.-GI, \$500,000, 3yo, 9f D. Wayne Lukas assistant Dallas Stewart reported that Haskell hopeful Serena's Song (Rahy) came out of her Monday work in good order. "She's doing great," he said yesterday. "We're looking forward to running her Sunday." Gll Peter Pan winner Citadeed (Shadeed) breezed five furlongs in 1:01 2/5 yesterday at Saratoga. "That's what we wanted from him and that's exactly what we got," said trainer Rick Violette. Violette added that the colt, third in the GI Belmont S, in his last start June 10, will ship to Monmouth early Sat. morning. Trainer John Ward reported vesterday that **Pyramid** Peak (Mt. Livermore), who took the \$78,000 Long Branch Breeders' Cup S. at Monmouth July 8, will ship into the Jersey Shore track at the end of the week. "He should get in Friday sometime," said Ward. "We won't breeze him again before the race. He'll just gallop." Trainer Bobby Barbara said Tuesday from Saratoga that Pat N Jac (Pentelicus), second in the GII Withers and GII Peter Pan, is on target for the Haskell. "He's all ready to go," said Barbara. "He's got his last breeze in and he'll just gallop up to the race. We'll put him on a van about 9 or 10 Friday night." Also pointing to the GI event is Blu Tusmani (Afleet), last year's Highweight Colt at 2 in Italy and more recently winner of the GII Withers S. "He's training forwardly and everything is on course for the Haskell," said trainer Christophe Clement. "He will work (Wed.) morning 1/2-mile at Belmont Park. We'll ship him to Monmouth the morning of the race." Kingdom City (Cryptoclearance), who took the GIII Round Table S. at Arlington July 8, will be trying for his fourth straight victory in the Haskell. "He'll work (Wed.) morning at Saratoga, five-eighths with (regular rider) Craig Perret," said trainer Elliot Walden. "He's doing super right now." Also confirmed for the race are GII Blue Grass winner Wild Syn (Wild Again), Long Branch Breeders' Cup third-place finisher Mighty Magee (Cormorant) and John and Pat (Shimatoree), while Fritz (Gulch), winner of the July 2 Victoria Park S. (GIIIC) at Woodbine, is considered only a possible starter.

FRENCH 2000 GUINEAS WINNER TO CONTEST

TRAVERS Vettori (Ire) (Machiavellian), winner of the G1 Dubai Poule d'Essai des Poulains (French 2000 Guineas) at Longchamp May 14, will represent the Godolphin team in the \$750,000 Travers S. at Saratoga August 19. The bay colt will be partnered in the GI race by Britain's champion lockey Frankie Dettori, who has ridden Vettori only once before, guiding him to victory by a short neck in the 2000 Guineas. Vettori, trained at Newmarket last year by Henry Cecil, has twice suffered defeat since his French classic triumph. He finished sixth to Lammtarra in the June 10 Epsom Derby and then third in the G1 St. James's Palace S. at Royal Ascot June 20. Currently trained by Saeed bin Suroor, Vettori, who is two-for-five lifetime with earnings of \$248,024, has never before raced on dirt. Both his career wins came at a distance of one-mile on the turf.

HOMEBUILDER TO FLORIDA John Franks and Josephine Abercrombie have announced that Homebuilder (Mr. Prospector) will move next month from Pin Oak Stud in Versailles, Kentucky to Franks Farm Southland Division in Ocala, Florida. Jim Scott, manager of Franks Farm Southland Division, expects the 11-yearold stallion to be well-received by Florida breeders. "Given his pedigree and the popularity of sons of Mr. Prospector here and at other Florida farms, I know he'll do well," said Scott. "I've already had a number of calls from breeders who wish to book to him." A Grade II winner of \$1,172,153, Homebuilder won or placed in 30 stakes and is the only son of Mr. Prospector to win or place in graded stakes each year from age two to age five. His third crop to race is now two, and his runners include Royal Mitch, winner of the 1995 Holy Bull S. at Gulfstream and runner-up in the GIII Flamingo S. and GII Lexington S., as well as stakes-placed Hometogether, Shed Some Light and Amacarpenter.

PICCOLO'S CAREER THREATENED Piccolo (GB) (Warning {GB}), winner of the G1 Keeneland Nunthorpe S. at York last summer and the G2 King's Stand S. at Royal Ascot this past June, has sustained a career-

threatening injury. Connections had recently paid \$29,508 to supplement the four-year-old to today's G1 Sussex S. at Goodwood. But Piccolo suffered a fracture to his left hind leg during exercise Monday and may have to be retired. "It's a slight fracture, but I think it's certain to be the last you'll see of him this year, at least," said trainer Mick Channon. "We'll wait a while to assess the situation while he's box-rested. But he could be sold to stud."

BEHIND THE SCENES

A leggy brunette named Pam perched atop a high stool. She spun a tale of woe, including returning home from a trip only to find her week-old Volvo up to its headliner in water. Then, a couple of days later she was \$130 short in the cash drawer and had to use her previous week's paycheck to cover the shortage. It wouldn't be the last tale of woe heard that day.

No, it wasn't a seedy singles bar in Miami. It was the second floor mutuel line at Calder Race Course. Pam had nine years experience punching tickets and instructions from the head of the mutuel department to keep an eye on the new guy sitting beside her. I was the new guy, and I'd be spending the day finding out what its like to punch bets.

There isn't a punter alive who doesn't have horror stories about clerks punching wrong tickets, or a teller whose fingers got stuck in the machine just as the bell shut them out. I knew the bettor's side of the window, but what was it like on the other side...what was it like to be a pari-mutuel clerk for a day? I soon found out, when I punched in at 12:15 and didn't stop punching until 6:00.

With an editor's blessing and the okay of Calder management I stepped to the other side of the window. Three mornings of training on the AmTote Spectrum 2000 didn't prepare me for the onslaught of abuse and

anxiety that thousands of clerks face every day.

You haven't felt guilt until you experience a customer who gets locked out in the middle of a complicated daily double ticket when the bell rings. And the language...I'm not sure those words were meant to be used together in some of the combinations heard.

Placing a bet commands a language of its own, but there are people out there speaking a dialect I've never heard. It's a language within a language and while clerks admit that they get used to the rhythm of people calling tickets, it's not always easy. When I asked people to repeat their tickets they just walked. The ones who stayed made you pay the price for not understanding them. They attempted to enunciate their words, but what often came out is portions of their lunches, which somehow seemed to land on the key I was about to hit.

Calder ran 11 races July 8 and simulcast 22 more from Arlington and Monmouth. Considering I sold 540 tickets worth \$5,440, cashed 78 more for \$3,597, cancelled 31 to the tune of \$392 and only came up \$11.45 short, I don't think that's bad for the first day. And while people came back to inform me I had punched the wrong ticket, nobody came back and said I gave them too much money.

The day could be viewed in increasing degrees of anxiety, for myself and the bettors. The first couple of hours produced an even flow of money and customers. Jimmy Halavas, a former jump rider whose picture graced one of the early editions of *Sports Illustrated*, guarded my right flank while Pam Jenks, the leggy brunette, took care of the left. Jimmy, a veteran clerk, had a steady patter of conversation which kept people coming back. But even Jimmy's congenial personality didn't stop patrons from jumping lines when the clock ticked down to the final minute.

As the day reached its mid-point and bank rolls started to strain, the anxiety level of patrons grew. Customers became more irritated when they had to repeat numbers, less forgiving when they asked for Monmouth and received Calder tickets, more abusive when the tri they were trying to bet at Arlington wouldn't go into the machine because the track didn't offer a tri on that race.

The favorite in Belmont's feature race finished second at 1-5, wiping out the last few dollars of many. There was one race left at Calder and two at Arlington to get even. Calder offered a superfecta and the back end of the late double held some last hopes for a few. Two of the hundreds of customers who stood in my line all day cashed on the last race. The rest were on their way to the parking lot, while a couple stayed for the Arlington races, but my day was done.

In the end, the experience was worth the effort. The overall impression was one of pleasant surprise at how well-behaved most people were and a better understanding of how the person on the other side of the window views a horse race. I'll probably still get mad if I get a wrong ticket, but I'll probably walk away from the window before screaming.
