CORDERO READY TO RIDE Angel Cordero Jr. expects to make his return to riding Sept. 3 at Monmouth Park, where he will begin to prepare for a fall riding schedule culminating in an appearance in the Oct. 28 Breeders' Cup at Belmont Park. Cordero, a 52year-old Hall of Fame jockey who has not ridden in a race since suffering serious injuries in a Jan. 12, 1992 accident at Aqueduct, has been a Thoroughbred trainer since that time. He said he expected to ride two or three races at Monmouth Sept. 3 and had mapped out a tentative Belmont Park fall schedule which includes riding appearances on Super Saturday (Sept. 16). Breeders' Cup Preview Day (Oct. 7), New York Showcase Day (Oct. 14) and Breeders' Cup Day, Oct. 28. He will ride Rogues Walk (Ends Well), who he currently trains, in the New York Showcase Day, and said he didn't expect to have problems lining up mounts for the other days. Cordero will give up his trainer's license while he is riding; his stable will be trained by his wife, Marjorie. Cordero said he is also open to making special appearances at other tracks, for a fee, and had already lined up a tentative stop at El Commandante in his native Puerto Rico. He expects to end his riding career in the Dec. 3 Classico del Caribe Dec. 3 in Santo Domingo, "It doesn't matter to me that people say I miss the limelight," said Cordero. "When you get to be my age, that doesn't mean anything to you. It's just something that's bothering me--l just wanted to ride one more time. I didn't want to retire like I did." Cordero said his current weight had dropped to 112 pounds after working 2 months with a personal trainer.

HOLLYWOOD NEXT TO JUMP TRA SHIP?

Hollywood Park President R.D. Hubbard, talking to reporters in Del Mar's paddock Sunday, said he did not see his track continuing its membership with the Thoroughbred Racing Associations. "I see where Tom Meeker (President of Churchill Downs) is withdrawing Churchill because of the direction the TRA is taking," Hubbard said. "People have told me Meeker is one of the smartest guys in racing, and if that's the way he feels, that's the way I'm going to go." If both Hollywood and Churchill do leave the TRA, they will become the fifth and sixth tracks to defect in the last nine months, joining Golden Gate Fields, Oaklawn Park, Sportsman's Park and Beulah Park.

Kentucky Derby and Belmont Stakes winner Thunder Gulch (Gulch) worked five-eighths in an easy 1:05.02 over Saratoga's Oklahoma training track yesterday. "We're just trying to keep him happy," said trainer D. Wayne Lukas, who described the colt as "the ultimate alley fighter; he doesn't know the word give-up. Once he eyeballs you, you've got some problems." Trainer John Ward Jr., who will saddle Pyramid Peak (Mt. Livermore) in the Travers, agreed, saying, "He is probably the toughest competitior I've seen in the past 10 years. He's the horse to beat--but he's beatable. Pyramid Peak is the one to do it. He has improved tremendously this season."

Two fillies will be travelling from France for Sunday's Del Mar Oaks, and both will remain in the U.S. afterwards for North American campaigns. "She's a big, rangy, nice-looking filly," said trainer Gary Lewis of the new girl in his barn, Fiddling Blade (GB) (Sure Blade), winner of the Prix Caravelle Haras des Granges at Toulouse in her last start May 28. Lewis pointed out the bay filly carried 141 pounds in one of her three victories in France, and has won at 11/4-miles. Fiddling Blade is owned by Charlie Dunn, owner of Jumron (GB), fourth in this year's Kentucky Derby, Leslie Grimm's Collecta (Fr) (Caerleon), who also notched a stakes victory in her last, taking the Prix des Lilas at Saint-Cloud June 13, arrives in the U.S. Wednesday and won't be at new trainer Ron McAnally's barn until Friday.

BREEDERS' S.-GIC, \$300,000 (R), 3yo, 12fT

The third leg in Canada's Triple Crown is expected to attract a field of 13, including Queen's Plate winner Regal Discovery (Regal Classic). The bay tried out the Woodbine turf course for the first time yesterday, galloping a mile and a half as he gets ready for his grass debut. "From what I could see, he seemed to enjoy it," said trainer Roger Attfield. The colt will work between races Wednesday evening. Also expected for the race are Queen's Plate runner-up Freedom Fleet (Afleet); the chestnut worked six furlongs in 1:14 on the turf around the "dogs" yesterday. "This horse had a super work," said his conditioner, Daniel Vella. "I was thrilled." Mt. Sassafras (Mt. Livermore), third in the first two-thirds of the Triple, also worked over the grass yesterday, getting six furlongs in 1:15 2/5, while Your Majestic (His Majesty), went seven furlongs in 1:26. Other probables are Disciple (Risen Star), who dumped his rider during his tour of the course and had to be corralled by the outrider; Dagda (Alysheba), a maiden who breezed fiveeighths in 1:01 4/5 Monday; Charlie's Dewan (Charlie Barley), three-for-four on the grass; Runaway Crusader (Runaway Groom); Causeforall (Cozzene); Banquet (With Approval); Gentleman Beau (Beau Genius); Moon Bow (Affirmed); and Set Ablaze (Mi Selecto).

AVERAGE UP AT SARATOGA PREFERRED

SALE While only half as many yearlings went through the ring at Fasig-Tipton's Saratoga Preferred Yearling Sale, the average for the '95 auction, held Sunday, was up 25 percent over last year's figure. A total of 30 hips sold for \$551,500 this year, averaging \$18,383; 60 vearlings sold for a gross of \$882,300 in '94, an average of \$14,705. The '95 sales topper was Hip #517, a filly by Spectacular Bid--Torelia (Torsion). Consigned by Harry L. Landry, agent for Howard T. Whitbred, the dark bay went for a bid of \$41,000 to the Klaravich Stables Inc.; she is a half to graded stakes winner Dr. Kiernan (Majesty's Prince) and New York-bred stakes winner Maiesty's Time (Maiesty's Prince).

CHURCHILL REPORTS STRONG SECOND

QUARTER Churchill Downs Inc. yesterday announced results for the three- and six-month periods which ended June 30, 1995. The Company reported secondquarter net income of \$10.7 million, or \$2.81 per share, as compared to \$10.5 million, or \$2.77 per share, for the same period in 1994. Second guarter revenues of \$49.3 million were up 23 percent from the \$40 million recorded in last year's second quarter. Record total wagering on Kentucky Derby and Kentucky Oaks Days, combined with substantial growth in the interstate simulcasting of Churchill Downs races, generated the second-quarter increases. Net income for the first six months of 1995 was \$8.9 million, or \$2.34 per share, compared to \$8.3 million, or \$2.19 per share, for the same time period last year. Revenues for the six months were \$58 million, an increase of 37 percent from \$42.4 million for the first half of '94. But expenses resulting from the first full year of operation of the Sports Spectrum training center, a slight decline in profit margins due to the shift from wagering on live racing to interstate simulcast wagering, and start-up costs and delays in opening Churchill's satellite wagering facilities in Indiana contributing to lower-than-expected profits from the operation in Indiana, are all expected to impact net income for the second half of the year. Accordingly, Churchill Downs currently expects that net income for Fiscal Year 1995 will approximate 1994's record earnings of \$1.63 per share.
