DEPUTY MINISTER COLT SETS NEW KEENELAND RECORD

A bay colt by Deputy Minister--Bold Lady Anne (Bold Josh) brought a record-setting bid of \$1,200,000, the highest ever for a yearling at the Keeneland September Sales, during yesterday's second session of the 1995 Keeneland September Yearling Sale in Lexington, Kentucky. The previous record was set in 1987, when Darley Stud Management paid \$1,100,000 for Brush Aside (Alleged), who went on to become a Group 3 winner in England. Yesterday's record-breaking colt was purchased by Prince Ahmed Salman's The Thoroughbred Corp. A brother of Thoroughbred owner Fahd Salman, Ahmed Salman, 36, from Saudi Arabia, is the chairman of Saudi Research and Marketing Group, which deals mainly in newspaper publishing. Signing the ticket for him was Southern California-based trainer Richard Mulhall, who currently conditions about 15 of Salman's horses. The colt will remain in the U.S. to race. "He is the best horse I've ever bought," Salman said. "If he had been in the July sale he would have brought more money, but I don't think he was a bargain. He is an extremely good looking colt. I love the Deputy Ministers. He's the kind you have to take a risk on." Salman, who owns three broodmares, also mentioned he is thinking about eventually expanding his broodmare band and concentrating more on breeding. The second highest-priced yearling of the day at \$925,000 was a chestnut colt by Seeking the Gold out of GIII Arlington Oaks winner Overtured (Wavering Monarch). Consigned by Glencrest Farm, the colt was purchased by B. Wayne Hughes of Glendale, California. Hughes' trainer George Vogel said, "If you buy a good individual by a popular sire, they cost way too much money. This is a good colt and obviously I wasn't alone in thinking that." Seth Hancock, president of Claiborne Farm, bought the third highest-priced individual of Tuesday's session, a bay colt by Silver Hawk--Gatap (Buckfinder), for \$625,000. "If he wins a couple of Grade Ones he has the pedigree to make it as a top stud prospect," Hancock said. Overall, 301 yearlings were sold Tuesday for a gross of \$33,397,000 and an average of \$110,953, up a whopping 36 percent from last year's second session average of \$81,564. Yesterday's median price of \$72,000 represented a 10.8 percent increase over 1994's second session median price of \$65,000. The sale concludes Wednesday, Sept. 20.

ROKEBY STABLE TO LEAVE AMERICAN

RACING According to a story in yesterday's *Newsday*, Rokeby Stable owner Paul Mellon, 88, announced Monday that with the retirement of Rokeby's private trainer MacKenzie Miller, 73, after the 1995 racing season, Rokeby Stable will also leave North American racing. Mellon told *Newsday*, "In view of my advanced age, Mack's retirement comes at a juncture of my life at which I have decided to discontinue my American racing activities. However, I will be keeping approximately 10 broodmares at Rokeby Stable (in Virginia). The yearlings produced by these mares in the future will be sent to my longtime English trainer Ian Balding." Together, Mellon-bred and Miller-trained horses have won such events as the Kentucky Derby (Sea Hero, 1993) and the Handicap Triple Crown (Fit to Fight, 1984). Mellon's other successes have included being owner/breeder of 1969 Horse of the Year Arts and Letters and 1971 European Horse of the Year Mill Reef.

MINIMUM WEIGHT INCREASED IN BRITAIN

Britain's diminishing band of lightweight jockeys are upset following the announcement Tuesday that, beginning January 1, 1996, there is to be an increase in the minimum weight a horse can carry in flat-race handicaps. The move, which means the lowest weight in such races will be 108 pounds rather than the current 105, has been instigated after research by the British Horseracing Board revealed 55 percent of horses on the lowest present mark carry overweight. Furthermore, Jockey Club medical officials insist that, in their efforts to keep their weight down, riders are resorting to "a number of unhealthy and ill-advised practices detrimental to their performances." But Nick Carlisle, one of the few British jockeys who regularly rides at under 108 without recourse to anything more sinister than jogging, is upset by the move. He said, "I'm against it. There are not many chances for genuine lightweights as it is. I think it is discrimination."

THUNDER GULCH, SERENA'S SONG WORK FOR KENTUCKY CUP

America's two top three-year-olds, Kentucky Derby, Belmont S. and Travers S. winner **Thunder Gulch** (Gulch) and Haskell Invitational, Jim Beam S. and GI Gazelle H. winner **Serena's Song** (Rahy), both worked at Churchill Downs Monday for trainer D. Wayne Lukas. Thunder Gulch breezed six furlongs in 1:14 2/5, while the filly **Serena's Song** went a half-mile in :49 2/5. Thunder Gulch will try and increase his \$2.6 million in earnings in the Sept. 23 \$400,000 Kentucky Cup Classic at Turfway Park, while **Serena's Song** will run next in the \$200,000 Turfway Budweiser Breeders' Cup, also on Kentucky Cup Day.

REMINGTON PARK'S SATELLITE WAGERING FACILITIES OPEN

Remington Park in Oklahoma City, which began its 1995 Fall Thoroughbred Meeting Sept. 7, also opened its Wagering Intrastate Network (WIN) at three sites around Oklahoma in accordance with the first race of the season. Large crowds and good initial handle numbers were recorded at each of the three locations in Lawton, Enid and Oklahoma City. Total handle for the three sites over the four-day opening weekend was \$269,022. "It was kind of like opening day in 1988 all over again," said Remington's Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer David M. Vance. "There were lines at the sites at 9 a.m. with fans waiting to take part in the opening day festivities. The early indications have prompted me to believe that the earlier we can open our other sites the better everyone will be." Remington Park plans to open its next satellite wagering sites on the WIN Network in Okmulgee and Elk City. More spots will open in Oklahoma City as well.

MGSW **Lite the Fuse** (Buckaroo) worked five furlongs in :59 and galloped out six panels in 1:11 2/5 Tuesday at Aqueduct, with jockey Julie Krone up. Three-year-old **Top Account** (Private Account), first in the GII King's Bishop at the Vosburgh distance at Saratoga two starts back, drilled a half-mile in :47 3/5 yesterday, galloping out in :59 4/5. GI Met Mile and GII Brooklyn H. winner **You and I** (Kris S.), who will be turning back in distance this Saturday, breezed five furlongs in 1:00 1/5 for trainer Bobby Frankel Tuesday at Del Mar. The four-year-old will depart California for Belmont today. "It will be his first start in about two months, but he's run well off a layoff," Frankel said. "And he likes Belmont."

Also working at Belmont yesterday was GI Man o' War S. hopeful **Yokohama** (Theatrical {Ire}), who breezed an easy three-quarters in 1:14 3/5. Trainer Rick Schosberg said of GIII Sanford S. winner **Maria's Mon**, "He worked on the training track today (Tuesday), went in :47 and change, galloped out in :59 2/5. He came back and wouldn't blow out a match. He's doing super." Honour and Glory, winner of his only career start, a Saratoga maiden, by 10½-lengths, breezed five furlongs Monday at Belmont in 1:00.82.

Hoosier Park in Anderson, Indiana is averaging 3,496 patrons a night through the first eight days of its inaugural Thoroughbred meet. Since the meet opened, 27,965 people have passed through the turnstiles. Handle is also strong after two weeks. Total average daily handle on Hoosier Park races is \$437,641, with \$224,479 of that figure coming on-track. Hoosier is also averaging \$95,397 a day in handle for its whole-card simulcasts. In all, a total of \$4,264,306 has been wagered on Hoosier Park live races or during Hoosier Park simulcasting since September 1.

THE EXPERTS PICK THE TOP FRESHMEN SIRES OF '95

We originally ran this story April 26, 1995 and thought it might be interesting to take a look and see how our prognosticators are faring five months down the road. The number of winners and stakes winners for each sire as of September 10, 1995 appear in bold following the sire's name.

Jack Werk - Werk Thoroughbred Consultants

"What counts as success is largely defined by expectations," says Werk. "In that sense, stud fee, not pedigree and not race record, is the most important single variable to success, or at least to its perception."

Taken in that light, his top pick for freshman sire of 1995, Summer Squall (Storm Bird) is priced conservatively, and answers all the questions, says Werk. "Two key indicators of a stallion's potential at stud are pedigree and performance. Summer Squall is blessed with both," said Werk. "Storm Bird is rapidly becoming recognized as a 'sire of sires,' and has a bottom line as strong as they come. Although Summer Squall was passed over twice for championship honors, we expect to see him daylight the field in the race for freshman sire honors."

Predictions:

- 1) **Summer Squall** (Storm Bird) (5 winners, 0 stakes winners), Lane's End Farm, \$25,000: pedigree, performance: he has it all.
- 2) **Black Tie Affair** (Miswaki) (10w, 0sw), Vinery, \$15,000: Durable sprinter to router could give top choice a run for his money.
- 3) **Quiet American** (Fappiano) (5w, 1sw), Gainsborough Farm, \$10,000: Versatile runner with intense inbreeding could prove surprise of the year.

BEST VALUE: Polish Numbers (Danzig) (7w, 3sw), Northview Stallion Station, \$3,500: All-star breeding and flashes of on-track excellence.

John Kimmel, Trainer

A perennial top buyer at the spring two-year-old sales, Kimmel was most impressed this spring by Cahill Road, and even bought two of his own by the sire.

"They showed well," said Kimmel. "They had top conformational attributes, they breezed very well and had terrific cardiac profiles." Kimmel recalls liking Cahill Road equally well as a racehorse. "He ran a tremendous race in the Wood--the best three-year-old race of the year. He's a big, powerful horse by a sire line that seems to be carrying itself on."

- 2--**Summer Squall** (Storm Bird), Lane's End Farm, \$25,000: Showed very well at the sales, and have been handling their early training well.

3--**Black Tie Affair** (Miswaki), Vinery, \$15,000.

Breeders' Cup runner in two different divisions, competing in the Sprint and winning the Classic later on. **BEST VALUE: Cahill Road** (Fappiano). "Here's a horse standing for \$7,500 that I thought enough of to spend six figures on two of his two-year-olds," said Kimmel. "That's serious value."

James Delahooke, Bloodstock Agent

One of Europe's top bloodstock agents and the man who purchased Dancing Brave at auction along with 17 other Group I winners, Delahooke also chose younger brother against older, making Cahill Road his top pick for freshman sire of '95. "It shouldn't be that way around, perhaps," said Delahooke, "but it's an inexact science. I thought Cahill Road had an awful lot of very nice horses who looked like racing horses, looked like they would make two-year-olds. I thought they were outstanding. He had a lot of big horses, but Fappiano was big and it didn't stop them."
