KEENELAND SALE CONTINUES ON

UPSWING During Wednesday's third session of the 1995 Keeneland September Yearling Sale, 290 horses brought a gross of \$16,146,000 for an average of \$55,676, up a healthy 17.2 percent from last year's third session average of \$47,505. Yesterday's median price of \$42,000 represented a five percent increase over the 1994 median price of \$40,000. The highest price of the session was paid for a bay colt by Gulch--Balinese (Nijinsky II), purchased for \$475,000 by English bloodstock agent Charlie Gordon-Watson for an American partnership. "They wanted a Gulch colt, and we liked the female family, Gordon-Watson said, adding that the colt will stay in the U.S. to race. The second highest-priced yearling of the day at \$330,000 was President's Decree, a dark bay or brown colt by Capote--Mitterand (Hold Your Peace). Purchased by Fred Yelinek's Little Fish Stables, the colt, a half-brother to stakes-winner Princess Mitterand and recent GII Jerome H. winner French Deputy, will be sent to Glencrest Farm and later to Payson Park in Florida to train. He will be conditioned by David Carroll. Don Sucher of Echo Valley Horse Farm Inc., who sold President's Decree as agent for Irving and Marjorie Cowan, said, "The market is very strong. The catalogue got weaker today, but the market has stayed proportionally as strong as it was the first two days. We estimated this horse would bring between \$300-\$400,000. We're very happy with the price." Mrs. Georgia Hofmann bought the third highest-priced individual of Wednesday's session, a chestnut colt by Forty Niner out of the multiple Grade I winner Banker's Lady (Nijinsky II), for \$325,000. "I'm not sure whether I'll race him or sell him at a two-year-olds in training sale," Hofmann said. "I'll probably keep him to race." The sale continues through September 20.

Future Quest, fresh off a 5½-length maiden score at Del Mar Aug. 27, quickly sped to the lead, set rapid fractions of :21.93, :44.39 and 1:08.89 along the inside, responded when challenged by Othello in midstretch and gamely held off that rival while drifting out a bit in the final stages. "The plan was to put this horse on the lead and let him do his best," said winning jockey Kent Desormeaux. "I thought if I took 'em real fast, they wouldn't go fast for fear of burning out. My rocket went and just didn't flame out." Overwhelming 3-5 favorite COBRA KING (Farma Way), who took Del Mar's GIII Balboa S. by 7½-lengths in his last outing, ran evenly for fourth. "He just didn't run today," said trainer Mike Puype. "It wasn't the company, I can guarantee that. He'll be back for another dance."

DRAGONE RESIGNS; NOE TO TAKE NYRA POST New York Racing Association President Kenny Noe has been elected NYRA Chairman of the Board of Trustees, replacing Allan Dragone, it was announced yesterday following a NYRA board meeting. Dragone, who has held the post since 1989, will remain a member of the board. "I can't thank the NYRA board and Allan enough for this vote of confidence and for this opportunity," said Noe. "I'm very flattered even to have been considered. I've really enjoyed working with Allan since I came back to the NYRA 11 months ago and he has been extremely helpful and generous with his time and counsel." Dragone, meanwhile, said the move will allow him to devote more time to his racing stable, adding he felt confident in leaving the position at this particular time. "NYRA has the same problems the rest of the racing industry does, but now we have the potential to solve them," said Dragone. The 67-year-old Noe will retain the title of president, while delegating some of his former responsibilities to other NYRA employees. "The board

LONE STAR RECEIVES '96 DATES The Texas Racing Commission awarded Lone Star Park at Grand Prairie a total of 11 racing days for 1996, virtually clearing the way for the track to complete its financing and proceed with construction, according to a story in yesterday's Dallas Morning-News. The track is scheduled to open December 14, 1996. The racing commission carved up a total of 336 1996 racing dates to five racetracks and one county fair, including 88 to Trinity Meadows, 97 to Retama Park and 95 to Sam Houston. The commission also rejected a proposal to allow county fairs to operate as year-round simulcast outlets, according to the paper.





IT'S A 'MILLION' THING

With the running of the Molson Export Million this weekend, the Rothman's International a month from now and the Breeders' Cup October 28, we are moving hellbent and headlong into the Million Time of Year. Four \$1 million events have already been decided this year-the Santa Anita Handicap, Hollywood Gold Cup, Pacific Classic and Arlington Million. Those races have all exceeded their expectations as providers of major news. (Those of you keeping score at home will quickly notice that California has three and New York none.)

Gary Stevens won "The Big Cap," flying in from Hong Kong to handle Urgent Request, who allowed owner Stewart Aitken to cash a bet worth \$844,000 in the tote. Urgent Request started Stevens on a victory tour that is one of the most remarkable in modern times.

Horse-of-the-Year frontrunner Cigar took the Gold Cup. On the very week he was enshrined in the Hall of Fame, Bobby Frankel earned his fourth consecutive Pacific Classic with Tinners Way; Awad took the Arlington Million in track-record time of 1:58 2/5 and became the first winner of the Secretariat to return and win the Million.

The Million, bless it, remains the Million because it was the trailblazer 15 years ago when John Henry, bless him, kicked off million-dollar racing. There have now been 146 of them. Next year, the Kentucky Derby joins the list at long last, putting the Preakness and Belmont a bit into the shade. Think the Derby will make use of that \$1 million pot in promotional ways? You bet.

The horse everyone now seeks is the one who can win the \$1 million Breeders' Cup Juvenile as a two-year-old and the \$1 million Kentucky Derby, Molson Export Million and \$3 million Breeders' Cup Classic as a three-year-old. That would click in at about \$3,180,000. The four-year-old season would concentrate on taking the Big Cap, another \$1 million edition of the Gold Cup, the Pacific Classic, plus the Breeders' Cup Classic. That done, we are now looking at a pot filled with \$6.3 million from a mere eight events.

It took Alysheba 26 starts and 11 victories to attain his \$6,679,242. Alysheba almost did all of the above. He lost the Breeders' Cup Juvenile by 2½-lengths after circling from 10th and then ran second in the Hollywood Futurity. He lost the \$3 million Classic by a nose as a three-year-old, but even worse was the fact that a \$1 million bonus was denied him by an obtuse rule that gave Bet Twice a bonus even though Alysheba won two legs of the Triple Crown and Bet Twice won one. None-theless, Alysheba did win three \$1 million races, a Classic, Big Cap and Super Derby when it was worth \$1 million.

Only one other horse has won three--Best Pal, taking the Hollywood Futurity, Big Cap and Pacific Classic. Eleven horses have won two million-dollar races and



John Henry is among those, as he well should be. Prized, however, is the only one to win an event of that magnitude on both dirt (Molson Export) and turf (Breeders' Cup Turf). The others: Easy Goer, Lure, Miesque, Steinlen, Stephan's Odyssey, Tinners Way.

Wayne Lukas has reeled in 18 races worth a million, a dozen of those in Breeders' Cup events. Next comes Shug McGaughey with nine; Charlie Whittingham, eight; and Neil Drysdale, Bobby Frankel and Ron McAnally with six each. Strangely, Andre Fabre has five and among them is the highest paying winner, Arcangues, at \$269.20 on a \$2 win bet.

The leading jockeys are: Pat Day with 15, Laffit Pincay, Jr, 13, Jose Santos, 12, Eddie Delahoussaye and Chris McCarron at 10 each, Pat Valenzuela at nine and Jerry Bailey and Angel Cordero Jr. at seven.
