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AOUEDUCT OPENS TOMORROW New York racing action switches to Aqueduct for the remainder of 1995 beginning Wednesday, November 1. The track will be open five days a week, with Mondays and Tuesdays dark; first race post time is set for 12:30 p.m. EST. A total of 24 stakes have been scheduled for the Aqueduct meet, highlighted by the Holidayfest card of November 25 which features the GII \$200,000 Remsen for two-year-olds, the GII \$200,000 Demoiselle for twoyear-old fillies, and the GI \$250,000 NYRA Mile--the race in which Cigar earned his very first stakes victory. The Queens oval will offer full-card simulcasting daily, as well as twilight simulcasting and a menu of important stakes from around the country. Aqueduct, which underwent \$3 million of renovations during the off-season. will also unveil new choices at the concession stands as ServiceAmerica takes over as the New York Racing Association's new concessionaire. The Aqueduct meet will run through December 31.

FIRST STAKES WINNER FOR FESTIN Festin (Arg)

(Mat-Boy {Arg}), a multiple Grade I stakes winner of \$2,196,658, was represented by his first stakes winner from his first crop when the two-year-old **Invest In Festin** took Sunday's Juvenile His S. at Playfair in Washington (see today's Breeders' Edition). It was the second win for the Kentucky-bred colt, who rallied for a twolength score at 3-1 odds. Freshman sire Festin, who captured the GI Oaklawn H. and GI Jockey Club Gold Cup in 1991, stands at Stone Farm in Paris, Kentucky for a fee of \$2,500, live foal.

BROADWAY TO OPEN IN FLORIDA Broadway

Flyer (Theatrical), runner-up in last season's St. Leger at Doncaster, leaves Britain this weekend to join Bill Mott's stable in Florida. The 4-year-old colt is set to switch from John Hill's Lambourn yard on Sunday, first flying into New York before making the journey south to join Mott at either Gulfstream or Payson Park. Connections of Broadway Flyer have decided to make the move in order to maximize his earnings potential. The colt is just below the tops in Europe--his best performance of 1995 was probably his close fifth to Lamtarra in the King George VI and Queen Elizabeth S. at Ascot--and Hills is 100 percent behind the switch. He said, "We'll miss him. But if he clicks in America, he could do very well. If not, he can come straight back."

O, CANADA By Perry Lefko

Horse racing history will be made next year when the Breeders' Cup moves out of the U.S. for the first time and comes to Canada at its flagship track, Woodbine in Rexdale, Ontario.

Since its opening in 1956, Woodbine has played host to some major events--Secretariat's final career race in 1973 and the Arlington Million in 1988--and visits by members of the Royal Family for the annual Queen's Plate. Yet, the Breeders' Cup will command a presence unlike anything else at Woodbine.

"It's much different and bigger than anything we've ever been involved with," said Dave Gorman, the Ontario Jockey Club's vice president of corporate development and liaison with the Breeders' Cup.

Since 1993, when the Breeders' Cup committee announced Woodbine would play host to the event in 1996, the OJC has been meeting internally every three weeks to prepare for the big day, set for Nov. 2.

The OJC had a delegation of 15 at this year's Breeders' Cup, primarily to look at the Cup from an operations viewpoint. Everything from tickets, television, security, pre-entries, money handling and simulcasting was analyzed by the OJC's team, which is on target in terms of schedule.

"It's on time," said Gorman. "We would hope to sign a contract with (Breeders' Cup Ltd.) by the first of December. Some tracks don't sign contracts until the year (of the event). Our planning is right on schedule. Nothing is lagging at all."

The OJC has budgeted \$1 million for renovations. The biggest ticket item will be an expanded press box to accommodate the overflow of media, which will be converted into private boxes after the Breeders' Cup.

Auxiliary seating will be brought in to bump up capacity to some 40,000, which would be the secondlowest on-track total for any Breeders' Cup. However, at least 10,000 more fans are expected to patronize the OJC Champions Teletheatre network in and around Toronto.

Weather could be a concern. A study prepared in 1992 indicated that the temperature in Toronto on Breeders' Cup Day for the previous nine years was only a couple of degrees less than that of New York and Kentucky, on average. The temperature should benefit the European horses, who should feel right at home, but could be on the chilly side for spectators. Gorman described it as "the great unknown." The Europeans are expected to benefit from the 1 1/2-mile E.P. Taylor Turf Course, part of the \$17 million the OJC spent to renovate Woodbine. To make Woodbine usable for both thoroughbred and harness racing, the turf course runs in an uninterrupted oval around the outside of the main track (the previous course crossed over the main track) and features European-style undulations. It is built virtually on top of the grandstand apron, giving fans a close-up view. Many horsemen and jockeys who have already experienced the course consider it the finest in North America. The Breeders' Cup Turf will start at the finish line.

For the OJC, which had been trying to land the Breeders' Cup since its inception and was awarded the event based on an impressive presentation in 1992, the Cup comes at a critical juncture. The OJC has been struggling financially in recent years. Historic Greenwood Racetrack, which played host to the Queen's Plate, Canada's premier race, before it was moved to Woodbine, was sold earlier this year for a reported \$25 million to whittle down the OJC's deficit that had surpassed \$70 million. Amid some criticism, the OJC closed Greenwood for live racing at the end of 1993 to consolidate its operations but keeps it operating as its primary teletheatre.

The OJC has been working hard, but so far unsuccessfully, for a tax break from the provincial government, which takes 7.4% out of every betting dollar. The tax is the highest of any track in North America, although 2.4% is rebated to horsemen for purses. The OJC is looking to shave a further 3%, which would amount to about \$30 million. Given that the Breeders' Cup could reap \$64 million for the local economy, based on a 1992 tourism report, the OJC could curry political favor by putting on a successful show.

The OJC is also battling with its thoroughbred and harness horsemen over the issue of the teletheatres, which has contributed to increased betting but has taken away from on-track revenues such as parking, admission, concessions and programs. The OJC claims the teletheatre network costs some \$10 million to operate and is seeking more than \$5 million collectively from the horsemen. So far, it has been met with resistance by the harness horsemen, which claim their division is subsidizing the thoroughbred side.

In addition to all this, the OJC is currently interviewing for a successor to its president and CEO Pat Keenan, who is steps down early in 1996 after only two years on the job. He accepted his current position for a minimum of two years and a maximum of three, but will remain with the OJC as a trustee and executive committee member. **O Canada cont. p4**

Last week, the OJC announced the it has appointed a nine-member task force from among its trustees, including Keenan, to examine important issues relating to the future of racing in Ontario. But if the OJC's struggles are the focus of much coverage in the local media, Gorman assures that they're poised to get back on track and put on a big show come Breeders' Cup day '96.

"We have only one chance at it and we have to do it right," Gorman said. "My guess is it will not come back very often, but we're not ruling out the possibility of it coming back sometime in the future."
