HOLLYWOOD, BAY MEADOWS OUT OF TRA

Hollywood Park and Bay Meadows have notified the Thoroughbred Racing Associations that they will drop out of the TRA as of December 31, 1995. "We have been notified that Bay Meadows and Hollywood are going to leave at the end of the year," said TRA Executive Vice President Chris Scherf, following the TRA's meeting in Tucson, Arizona yesterday. "Since they weren't at the meeting today, I can assume I didn't change their mind." Hollywood President Don Robbins confirmed the decision is all but final. "We are still looking at business plans to revise (the association), but as of this moment, we still plan to drop out," said Robbins. "We came to the conclusion that it wasn't worth what we were paying for under the current structure." Scherf said there were "other tracks" who were considering leaving the association as well, but declined to name them. He reported that the TRA officially added three new members at the meeting--Oaklawn Park, Beulah Park and Prairie Meadows. "I feel we've finally gotten our house in order," said Scherf. "We can go forward in 1996 knowing who the players are and what the battle plan is."

KENTUCKY CUP CLASSIC AND SPRINT

RAISED TO GRADED STAKES Less than two years after their inception, two Kentucky Cup Day of Champions races at Turfway Park have been accorded graded stakes status. The \$400,000 Kentucky Cup Classic was given a Grade III ranking, and the \$150,000 Kentucky Cup Sprint for three-year-olds was awarded Grade II status. Turfway Park officials were informed Thursday of the stakes rankings by the North American Graded Stakes Committee. "We are extraordinarily pleased that the Graded Stakes Committee has accorded graded status to these two fine races," said Mark Simendinger, Turfway Park's president. "Less than one percent of all races run in North America--and less than 20 percent of all stakes races--are graded stakes, so this is a great honor. It is an even greater honor because the committee has decided to grade these races after only two runnings. Without any doubt, the gradings are a testament to the quality of the fields that the Kentucky Cup Day of Champions has attracted from the very start." The past two runnings of the Kentucky Cup Classic were won by Belmont Stakes winners Tabasco Cat (Storm Cat) and Thunder Gulch (Gulch), while the 1994 and 1995 Kentucky Cup Sprints were won by End Sweep (Forty Niner) and Lord Carson (Carson City).

old filly Privity (Private Account) in Sunday's Grade I event, said vesterday he also plans to enter Edmund Gann's The Key Rainbow (Ire) (Rainbow Quest) in the race. The three-year-old French import, who rallied from last to finish second in a 12-furlong turf allowance at Hollywood a week ago, had been scheduled to ship to Florida for the \$150,000 W.L. McKnight H. at Calder December 16; if Frankel does run both horses, he will bump 1994 Breeders' Cup Turf winner Tikkanen (Cozzene) from the starting gate. According to the rules of the race, if the number of entries exceeds 14, first preference is given to 1995 group or graded stakes winners and second preference is given to horses with the highest 1995 earnings; of the four non-group or graded '95 stakes winners in the prospective field of 15, Tikkanen has the lowest earnings for the year at \$54,587.

Suave Tern (Arctic Tern) and Rifapour (Ire) (Shahrastani) arrived from France Wednesday night and are currently stabled at Hollywood's quarantine facility. If all goes well, both Turf Cup hopefuls will be released from quarantine early this afternoon.

Four runners breezed over the Hollywood turf course yesterday morning, and all four were clocked going a half-mile. Trainer Neil Drysdale sent out **Patio de Naranjos (Chi)** (Gallantsky), :51 1/5, and stablemate **Party Season (GB)** (Shirley Heights {GB}), :48 4/5. **Talloires** (Trempolino) turned in a time of :53 1/5 for trainer Richard Mandella, while Tikkanen went the distance in :49.

DEBATE OVER CHECK-OFF BILL A debate between breeders and track operators over the merits of the Thoroughbred Horse Industry Research and Promotion Act, more commonly known as the "Check-Off Bill," dominated discussion at vesterday's 1995 Symposium on Racing in Tucson, Arizona. Ken McCarren, an advertising executive who handles the well-known "milk mustache" campaign, funded by a tax on each gallon of milk consumed, kicked off the morning session, "Marketing, It Does A Sport Good," with a proposal on how a similar campaign might help horse racing. The checkoff bill would impose a one-quarter of one percent surcharge on each dollar bet to fund a \$25-million marketing campaign for horse racing. McCarren compared milk's steady consumption figures in a rapidly growing beverage market with racing's consistent handle figures in the midst of an overall gambling explosion, pointing out that the \$53 million campaign had helped milk's sales figures and improved its image. Robert Clay, owner of Three Chimneys Farm and a member of the board of directors of the Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders' Association, proponents of the check-off bill, urged support for the measure. "We have no consistent message to our public," said Clay. "Our image is tarnished. We cannot develop a consistent message without a resolve to do so." Steven Crist, vice president of communications and development for the New York Racing Association, attacked the bill for taxing racing fans while sparing every other segment of the industry from footing the bill for the campaign. "The first problem and the major problem with the check-off bill is the funding," said Crist. "No one has adequately explained to me why the entire funding is supposed to come from racetrack customers. I think it's a sad situation that it has gotten this far--that a bill could reach the floor of the U.S. Senate that is opposed by every racetrack in the country."

SADLER'S WELLS FILLY TOPS TATTERSALLS THURSDAY Vaguely Regal (Ire), an unraced two-year-old bay filly by Sadler's Wells--Reine Mathilde (MGSW) (*Vaguely Noble), brought \$94,919 to top Thursday's fourth session of the Tattersalls December Mares, Horses In and Out of Training and Stallions Sale in Newmarket, England. Consigned by Cheveley Park Stud as a Horse Out of Training, the filly was purchased by Horse France. Overall, 174 horses were sold Thursday for a gross of \$2,046,976 and an average of \$11,763, down 14.8 percent from last year's fourth session average of \$13,803. The sale concludes today.

SUCCESSFUL ONTARIO RACING SEASON COMES TO A CLOSE The Ontario Thoroughbred racing season came to a chilly close at Woodbine Wednesday night, but the year-end statistics left Ontario Jockey Club officials with a warm glow. Total wagering at Woodbine, Fort Erie and Greenwood amounted to \$330,361,996,down from \$413,581,682 last year. But, the burgeoning Teletheatre network produced pari-mutuels totaling \$174,993,852, a substantial 127.6 percent increase over last season's off-track total of \$76,870,611. Total wagering at Woodbine, Fort Erie and Greenwood plus the Teletheatre network came to \$505,355,848,up \$14,903,555 or three percent over last year. That figure will grow, however, with further simulcast wagering on racing from Calder scheduled through the end of 1995. In addition, the Ontario Jockey Club's wagering on races telecast to other remote sites grew to \$108,981,987,up over \$38 million or 55 percent from last season. In all, total wagering on the Thoroughbred season is \$614,337,835, up 9.5 percent over last year. Attendance in 1995, including estimates for Teletheatre racegoers, is 1,961,432, an increase from 1,757,380 in 1994.

INAUGURAL HONG KONG SELECT SALE **RESULTS** The Royal Hong Kong Jockey Club yesterday conducted its first Hong Kong Select Sale at Happy Valley race course. For this inaugural sale, 24 vearling colts (Southern Hemisphere two-year-olds at the time of the Sale) were hand-picked by the Commercial Thoroughbred Breeders' Association of Australia and, upon selection, withdrawn from the 1995 William Inglis Easter Yearling Sale in Sydney, Australia's most prestigious yearling sale, in order to be included in the Hong Kong Select Sale, Topping the sale with a final bid of \$367,877 was a bay colt, foaled Oct. 26, 1993, by Marscay (Aus)--Dream Appeal (Valid Appeal). The colt, a half-brother to South African Group 1 winner Sydney's Dream (Aus) (Bletchingly {Aus}) and a full-brother to Australian Group 3 winner Marskin (Aus), was consigned by Widden Stud. The 24 colts sold grossed a total of \$4,210,153 for an average of \$175,423.

MOUNTAINEER'S LICENSE CONDITIONALLY

RENEWED According to a story in today's *Daily Racing Form*, Mountaineer Park's 1996 racing license was conditionally renewed this past Monday at a meeting in Morgantown, West Virginia, provided that the track gives the West Virginia Racing Commission information on a new lender by the end of the month. Mountaineer Park is seeking a \$13 million loan from Astrafund of the Cayman Islands to pay off an earlier loan of \$10.2 million for renovations to The Bennett Funding Group Inc. of Syracuse, New York. Under the license, Mountaineer Park can schedule 220 racing days in 1996. The Commission also approved the license for Charles Town to run 220 days in 1996.

EL COMANDANTE TO SIMULCAST TO

MEXICO Equus Gaming Company L.P., a publicly traded partnership with horse racing and entertainment interests in the Caribbean, reported yesterday that an agreement has been signed to begin simulcasting races to Mexico from El Comandante Race Track in Puerto Rico in the first quarter of 1996, pending approvals from the appropriate government agencies. The agreement is with Cesta Punta Deportes, S.A. de C.V., a Mexican company that has the franchise to operate nine sports betting facilities throughout Mexico. The states in which the nine sports books operate have a combined population of approximately 30 million people. According to the agreement, there will be a commingled wagering pool on the El Comandante races simulcast to Mexico.

ARCA AWARDS DINNER SUNDAY This Sunday, Dec. 10 at Gallagher's Steak House in New York City, the Amateur Riders Club of America (ARCA) will hold its annual awards dinner. 
