SANTAGATA OUT FOR THREE MONTHS Jockey Nick Santagata, who was injured in a spill during the first race at Aqueduct last Friday, Dec. 22, was released from North Shore Hospital on Long Island late in the afternoon Christmas Eve (Sunday, Dec. 24). Wednesday, Santagata made a follow-up visit to the office of Dr. Stephen J. O'Brien, director of the New York Racing Association's Emergency Medical Care Team. According to O'Brien, "upon further examination, we found that Nick has two fractured ribs on the left side. This is in addition to the five ribs fractured on his right side and a fracture of the sternum. Two of the (five) ribs on the right were 'floating,' which means they were broken in two places. Also, there is some fluid in the right lung, which is not at all unanticipated with these injuries. Therefore, we are sending him to see Dr. Joseph Cook, a pulmonary specialist at New York Hospital. Nick is doing well and is very lucky, but he's not out of the woods yet. He had a concussion with a momentary loss of consciousness but his head is okay and there were also minor injuries to his left shoulder and right knee." O'Brien estimated that Santagata would return to riding in about three months.

STEINLEN HEADS WEST Turf Champion Steinlen (GB) (Habitat) has moved to Harris Farm near Coalinga, California. The 12-year-old stallion had previously stood at Lane's End in Versailles, Kentucky. During his five year racing career, Steinlen started 45 times, winning 20 races including 16 stakes and amassing earnings of \$3,301,159. Steinlen was named Champion Turf Horse in 1989 as a six-year-old when he won the GI Breeders' Cup Mile, GI Arlington Million, and GI Bernard Baruch H. As a freshman sire of 1994, Steinlen was represented by Miss Union Avenue, winner of last year's GIII Young America S. and Junior Champion S.; the filly went on to win this year's Palisades and Tanya S. Steinlen will stand for a 1996 fee of \$3,500 live foal.

THE WINTER PLACE TO BE

What if, instead of Bethlehem, Mary and Joseph were on the road to Palm Beach and needed lodging? Chances are they'd have to stay in the Payson Park house, because there's no room in the barn.

All 503 stalls are taken, have been taken for as long as anyone can remember. And not just with run of the mill horses, but with some of the best horse flesh this side of the Mississippi. Over the years, at least 18 divisional champions and eight Horses of the Year from the U.S. and Canada have stabled here, including St. Jovite, owned by Virginia Kraft Payson, the Payson in Payson Park.

The 700-acre training center, located 90 miles north of Gulfstream Park, was carved out of scrub pines and sable palms in 1956 by Michael Phipps, Bull Hancock and C.T. Young. Charlie and Virginia Payson took over in 1980.

The first thing you notice about Payson Park is what you don't hear. You don't hear 18-wheelers gearing down for stop lights, you don't hear jet engines reversing their thrusters for a landing, you don't hear P.A. systems barking orders.

What you do hear is the crack of dawn...crickets chirping, the morning wind dying down, a horse's whinny as the barn door opens. Just before daybreak, Tim Jones gets a leg up on likely Horse of the Year Cigar.

"He usually goes out around 6:30. We have someone walk him to the track, then I'll let him stand for a long time before he jogs," says Jones. (When you're 10-for-10 on the year, you can set your own schedule.)

As Cigar walks the quarter-mile from his stall to the training track, the multi-colored Christmas lights that serpentine the supports of the second-floor roof on the clockers' stand are flicked off. The loudest sound you'll hear all morning is people booing the man who turns off the Christmas lights. "Scrooge," is uttered; "Bah, humbug," says another.

As Cigar is led towards the top of the stretch to stand and survey his surroundings, Lena Erickson brings My Flag to the lower side of the clockers' stand. Lena waits a few minutes before moving the Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies champ, a contender for the top two-year-old filly honors, out for her morning exercise.

The clouds part as Cigar is led back to the barn. My Flag is jogged out past where the finish line would be, if there were a finish line.

The one-mile oval is deep with a rich coffee-color loam. Mike Rivers, manager of Payson Park, says they keep the track about seven inches deep. "Around three inches of loose stuff and another four of lightly packed soil," Rivers says as he kicks the ground. Horses coming out of Payson to run at Gulfstream are more muscled up, even if their workouts don't indicate it.

A couple of hundred yards north of the training track is the turf course. A seven-eighths oval with no inner rail, the course is open two days a week for horses to work. But if a trainer is looking for another type of workout for his horse, he can use the five-eighths European-style trail for a change of pace. The trail gently rises and falls as it meanders through the pines and palms.

Trainer Elliott Walden, whose brother owns the Vinery, has stabled horses at Payson Park for eight of the last nine years. What's the biggest advantage of Payson? "April," says Walden. "When I take my horses back to Kentucky in April, they're fresh and well-rested. They are more on top of their game than horses stabled at a racetrack." Walden might have an ulterior motive for staying at Payson; at 6-feet 5-inches, he towers over his shorter opponents in pick-up basketball games.

Shug McGaughey has been stabling selected horses at Payson Park since 1983, even before he took over training for the Phipps family. "You have to like the deep track they have there," Shug said from his Gulfstream Park office. "That turf course is really nice, and if you want to break the routine up a little, you can take a horse on that long trail they have. It's just really good for a horse." Shug kept his turf star Lure at Payson for three winters.

Bill Mott has to be the prime real estate holder at Payson with 70 stalls in his name. "If you ask for 29 stalls here (at Gulfstream), you get 29 stalls. If you ask for 129 stalls, you still get 29," said Mott. "I have to keep my horses somewhere, and that's about the best place available. It's quiet, restful--it usually suits some horses really well; others don't like it. I'll tell you, though, my help that goes back year after year really seem to look forward to coming down to Payson each winter. They get as much out of the place as the horses do," Mott says with a certain bit of envy in his voice.
