INTERNATIONAL CLASSIFICATIONS

RELEASED For the second year in a row, Cigar (Palace Music) was rated highweight on the International Classifications, which were released yesterday. The probable two-time Horse of the Year was rated at 135 pounds by the panel of senior Jockey Club handicappers from Europe and American racing secretaries. This was the second year that North American horses were included in the scale and the first year for the inclusion of Japanese horses. Cigar was weighted one pound above the top-rated three-year-old Helissio (Fr) (Fairy King) and six pounds over the tied runners-up in the four-year-old and over category--Halling (Diesis {GB}) and Pentire (GB) (Be My Guest). American Champion Three-Year-Old Skip Away (Skip Trial) was the fourth rated three-year-old, behind Helissio, Mark of Esteem (Ire) (Darshaan {GB}), 133, and the highest rated filly or mare--Bosra Sham (Woodman), 131. Eclipse Champion Three-Year-Old Filly Yanks Music (Air Forbes Won) was listed at 126 pounds--the second highest filly on the classification and tied for sixth highweighted three-year-old with Unbridled's Song (Unbridled), Louis Quatorze (Sovereign Dancer) and Even Top (Ire) (Topanoora {Ire}). Breeders' Cup Distaff heroine Jewel Princess (Key to the Mint), at 126, was the highweight for older fillies and mares. American runners are not included in the two-year-divisions, where highweight honors went to the juvenile colt Revogue (Ire) (Fairy King), 123, and filly Pas de Reponse (Danzig), 116.

EDNA BROKAW MORRIS DEAD Edna Brokaw Morris, wife of the late Thoroughbred owner John A. Morris, died Sunday at her home in Manhattan. She was 88. Mrs. Morris and her husband, who died in 1985, were familiar figures around the New York tracks for decades. Their all-scarlet racing silks were the oldest continuous colors in the country, originating before the Civil War by Mr. Morris's family. The 1867 Kentucky Derby was won by the filly Ruthless, owned by Francis Morris, Mr. Morris's great-grandfather. Services will be held today at 10 a.m. at St. James Episcopal Church on Madison Avenue and 71st Street. In lieu of flowers, contributions may be sent to Girl Scout Council of Greater New York, 43 West St., NY, NY 10010. Mrs. Morris is survived by her sons Alfred and Dr. John Morris Jr.

MONMOUTH SETS NEW DARK DAYS FOR 1997

MEET Live Thoroughbred racing at Monmouth Park will be conducted on consecutive days, Wednesdays through Sundays, for the 1997 race meet which begins May 24 and runs through Sept. 1. Monmouth's dark days will be Mondays and Tuesdays, instead of the Mondays and Thursdays which have been utilized in the past. "This advent of full-card simulcasting has changed the dynamics of a successful live racing day at Monmouth Park," said Hal Handel, executive vice president and chief operating officer of racing at the Oceanport, New Jersey track. "I believe the opportunity to show the Belmont Park signal on a five-days-aweek basis to our guests coupled with the ability to offer the Monmouth Park signal similarly at Belmont Park will be positive for all concerned."

EMERALD DOWNS SUSPENDS FRIDAY RACING

Emerald Downs in Auburn, Washington will offer racing exclusively on weekends for the remainder of its winter meeting, which concludes March 2. The track's revised winter schedule includes racing each Saturday and Sunday as well as special holiday cards this Monday, Jan. 20, Martin Luther King Jr. Day, and Monday, Feb. 17, Presidents' Day. The move to eliminate Friday racing came after several Friday cards were cancelled due to insufficient entries.

ON A WING AND A PRAYER by: Clark Spencer

Maybe it was due to divine intervention that **Pulpit** (A.P. Indy) won his first race the way he did at Gulfstream Park, in a charismatic blur that vaulted the three-year-old's name into the thick of the Triple Crown chase.

A Catholic priest, don't you know, was in the winner's circle to present the trophy for Saturday's fourth race. Father John Muscat even bet the first foal out of Preach on name alone.

Pulpit didn't let the clergyman down.

The colt not only won by 7 1/2 widening lengths, but did so in 1:21 4/5. His jockey, Shane Sellers, wrapped up on Pulpit with three furlongs to go in the seven-furlong event.

"He's scary," said trainer Sonny Hine. "Talk about a freight train passing a hobo. I don't ever want Skip Away to run against him going seven furlongs."

Said trainer Carl Nafzger, "He could be as good a horse as we've seen in a long time. If he's a freak, and he may very well be, he can do anything. If he comes back in his next race and does the same thing, believe me, I'll bet on him for the Kentucky Derby."

The performance had handicappers checking and rechecking their speed figures. Chuck Streva, who sets the morning line for Gulfstream and calculates his own set of figures, said Pulpit received the best number he's ever given a young horse. "If he progresses, he'll be a better horse than Cigar," Streva said. "The typical Florida Derby winner, a good one, usually gets a four or five on my figures. This colt got a minus two."

In Streva's book, the lower the figure the better. And to think, nobody had ever heard of the horse before Saturday.

Unraced as a two-year-old, Pulpit was led out of the closet for the first time by trainer Frank Brothers and buried a field of fellow maidens. It wasn't so much the margin of his victory or winning time that had folks buzzing. It was the graceful manner in which he did it.

"I think he could have broken the track record (1:20 3/5) had he let him run through the stretch," Hine said.

Said Sellers, "There's nothing I can say that nobody didn't see. A blind man could see that he has a lot of talent. It was a feeling like I've never had before." Brothers is naturally cautious about his horse, who is a son of A.P. Indy. The quiet Brothers, who trained 1991 Preakness and Belmont winner Hansel, had an upstart horse in 1994 by the name of Canaveral. Like Pulpit, Canaveral was an unraced two-year-old who smoked at three.

But an injury prevented Canaveral from reaching the Kentucky Derby, just as an injury kept Cahill Road-another late bloomer who emerged in 1991--from making it to Churchill Downs on the first Saturday in May.

It is difficult enough for any horse to make it to the Derby, but more so for horses who aren't race-seasoned as two-year-olds. Only one past Derby winner won the roses without a race at two. The horse: Apollo. The year: 1882.

"It is a lot easier if you've done something with them at two," Brother said. "But I believe one day you'll see a horse win the Derby who didn't run at two. I think if the horse has enough ability, he can do it."

There is little question that Pulpit, a Claiborne Farm product, has plenty of that. The question is whether he can catch up in racing experience to the rest of the three-year-olds which, this year, is absent a true standout.

"He's the most impressive I've seen," Hine said. "There's not enough money to buy him now."

Said former jockey Don Brumfield, who rode many a good horse in his career, "I haven't seen a horse run that easy and impressively in a long, long time."

Did Pulpit remind him of anything?

"Yes," Brumfield replied. "It reminded me of how much I'd like to ride a horse like that again."

Gulfstream is fielding a lot of calls from racing folks throughout the country who want to know if Pulpit is for real.

"It's just spread like wildfire," said Mike Tanner, assistant director of communications at Gulfstream. "Everybody's calling to find out about him. I can't ever remember another horse drawing this much interest off a debut. I've re-watched the race four times and it's the most impressive debut that racing has seen in years." Pulpit has them bowing at his feet.
