BOSTON HARBOR OUT OF TRIPLE

CROWN Boston Harbor (Capote) lost his chance of becoming the first Breeders' Cup Juvenile winner to take the following year's Kentucky Derby when he was injured in a workout Monday morning at Santa Anita. Last year's Champion Two-Year-Old Colt will be sidelined for a minimum of four months after suffering a non-displaced condylar fracture in his left front leg. According to trainer D. Wayne Lukas, the Overbrook Farm runner was scheduled to be operated on vesterday morning in a veterinary clinic near Lukas's training center. During the operation, a pin will be placed in the area of the broken bone. "It's something you have to deal with," Lukas said. "Every day there is this possibility. We've had our highs and lows before. You do the best you can and hope it all works out for the best." With the injury, the jinx hovering over two-year-old champions and Breeders' Cup Juvenile winners will continue for at least another year. No Breeders' Cup Juvenile winner has ever won the Kentucky Derby and the last two-year-old champion to do so was Spectacular Bid in 1979. Pointing for this Sunday's GII San Rafael S. at Santa Anita, Boston Harbor completed a six-furlong workout yesterday in 1:12 1/5. While pulling up, the exercise rider noticed the colt was taking some awkward steps. X-rays taken later revealed the fracture. "The prognosis is very good," Lukas said. "The timing is bad," Lukas said that Boston Harbor will definitely return to the races, hopefully for a fall '97 campaign. "No thought was given to retiring him," he said. "It never even crossed my mind. I think he'll come back big this fall." Boston Harbor won six of his seven starts as a two-year-old and set a record for most earnings ever by a juvenile with \$1,928,605. He finished fourth, beaten 14 3/4 lengths, in his 1997 debut, the Santa Catalina at Santa Anita.

CALDER A dark bay or brown ridgeling by Storm Cat out of the Grade I-winning mare Dismasted (Restless Native) topped Monday's first session of the 1997 Fasig-Tipton Calder Selected Two-Year-Olds in Training Sale. Consigned by Nick de Meric, agent, the Virginiabred was purchased for \$780,000 by Roger M. King. "I thought he was beautiful and I wasn't going to let the horse leave the country," said King. "He's going to go to (trainer) Sonny Hine. (Hine) is the boss, and hopefully he'll bring us to the Kentucky Derby." Hine also raved about the new purchase, adding, "He gave a beautiful impression; he looked all racehorse. We vetted him prior to the sale. We were going to go to \$600,000 for him. That's what we thought he was going to go for." When asked about future plans for the two-year-old. Hine replied, "We're going to send him back to where he came from for a few weeks and then we'll bring him to Gulfstream and we'll decide from there." Another of the expected sales toppers, a colt by Mr. Prospector out of the GI Fantasy S. winner Fantastic Look, was a late withdrawal from the auction. The Mr. Prospector colt was injured prior to the sale but is expected to fully recover and will be available for sale in the future. Overall, there were 64 juveniles sold Monday night for a gross of \$7,238,000 and an average of \$113,094, up an impressive 41.6 percent from last year's first session average of \$79,847. The sale concludes today.

CALDER INTRODUCES NEW AND IMPROVED

STAKES SCHEDULE Calder Race Course President Ken Dunn vesterday unveiled a record stakes schedule worth over \$5.7 million for the upcoming Calder and Tropical meetings. The most dramatic change is the \$4.1 million Calder stakes lineup of 34 stakes--16 of which are worth \$100,000 or more, and eight of which are in excess of \$200,000. Included in the schedule will be the \$250,000 Princess Rooney H., the richest sprint in the country for fillies and mares, to be contested on the richest day in Florida racing, the Oct. 4 Festival of the Sun. "We are all excited about this (stakes) schedule," said Dunn. "It is an extremely important development for this racetrack. For years our racing program has produced great young horses that would go on to become champions in other parts of the country. Now we'll have the opportunity to see these and other champions right here." The prestigious 1997-98 Tropical meet, by adding two stakes and increasing the purses of two others, boasts 15 stakes worth \$100,000 or more in a period of just seven weeks. The two new stakes are the \$100,000 Hollywood Wildcat (for two-year-old fillies at 1 1/16-miles on the turf) and the \$100,000 Mecke (for two-year-olds at 1 1/16-miles on the turf). Also noteworthy is the fact that three events in 1997 have been renamed in honor of important figures in racing. The GIII \$100,000 Fred W. Hooper H. (formerly the Tropical Park H.) honors the industry's elder statesman, owner, breeder and Calder Hall of Famer, who turns 100-years-old in October. In addition, the \$50,000 Gardenia S. has been renamed the Jack Smallwood S. in honor of the retired Daily Racing Form columnist, and the \$50,000 Manatee S. will now be called the Bill Braucher S., paying tribute to the Miami Herald journalist emeritus. Calder opens for its 1997 meeting May 23. JAPANESE STAR TO KENTUCKY DERBY The three-year-old colt Brave Tender (Gulch), bred in Kentucky by Peter Brant and Foxfield, has raced exclusively in Japan thus far for owner Koji Maeda, in whose colors he won Sunday's G3 Arlington Cup at Hanshin Racecourse--worth over \$660,000. However, the bay colt, whose dam Larida was a multiple graded stakeswinner in the U.S., has been nominated to the Triple Crown and is expected to make the journey overseas to compete in the 123rd Kentucky Derby May 3. "I look forward to heading to Churchill Downs with this horse," said Brave Tender's jockey Mikio Matsunaga after Sunday's Arlington Cup victory. (For complete Arlington Cup race result, see p. 3)

GULFSTREAM INCREASES OVERNIGHT

PURSES Gulfstream Park will increase all overnight purses by five percent effective Wednesday, Feb. 26, Director of Racing Robert D. Umphrey announced Monday. This is the second five percent increase of overnight purses during the current meeting, meaning that the overnight purse structure will now be 10 percent higher than it was at the track's January 3 opening. The increases will continue through closing day, March 16. "The new purse levels are the result of the large handle produced by Gulfstream's full-card incoming simulcasting," Umphrey said.

SUPER DERBY LOSES SPONSOR The Isle of Capri Casino has pulled its \$500,000 sponsorship from the 1997 Super Derby at Louisiana Downs, according to an Associated Press report. "When we started going over the budget numbers, it just wasn't feasible for us to do it this year," said Isle of Capri General Manager Joe Faruggio. "With increased (casino) competition and with us wanting to move ahead with new construction and things like that, it just wasn't in the cards to be this year." In both 1995 and 1996, the two years that the casing sponsored the event, half of its money went to the GI Super Derby and the other \$250,000 to additional races during the week-long Super Derby Festival. This year's Super Derby is scheduled for Sept. 28. According to the Associated Press, if the track cannot find a new sponsor, the 1997 purse will drop from \$750,000 to \$500,000.

ASHKALANI TO SHUTTLE Arrowfield Group Ltd. and the Irish National Stud announced today that the Champion French Miler of 1996, Ashkalani (Ire) (Soviet Star), will begin shuttle duties and stand in the Southern Hemisphere in 1997. The four-year-old stallion enters stud in the Northern Hemisphere in 1997 at the Irish National Stud, where he stands for a stud fee of \$20,880. During his first season there, he has attracted a full book of 85 mares. Ashkalani was bred and raced by H.H. the Aga Khan, and upon conclusion of his racing career, was syndicated by the Irish National Stud for about \$4,730,000, with H.H. the Aga Khan retaining a significant interest. Unbeaten at two, the gray horse was even more impressive during his three-year-old campaign of 1996, winning the G1 Poule d'Essai des Poulains (French 2,000 Guineas) and the G1 Emirates Prix du Moulin, both over a mile at Longchamp. He will stand the Southern Hemisphere season at Arrowfield's Victorian base, Chatswood Stud, for a fee of \$12,616. "Ashkalani, a top-class miler, has all the necessary ingredients for success at stud in Australia." said Arrowfield Director John Messara. "It is a measure of the growing importance of the Victorian breeding industry that we are placing a stallion of his quality at Chatswood." Ashkalani will be the seventh stallion to shuttle by arrangement with Arrowfield in 1997. The others are Brocco (Kris S.), Catrail (Storm Cat), Chief's Crown (Danzig), Baryshnikov (Aus) (Kenmare {Fr}), Flying Spur (Aus) (Danehill) and Hector Protector (Woodman).




