TEMPORARY MOVE FOR OAK TREE IN 2000? Sources at Santa Anita say that the Oak Tree Racing Association will have to move its fall meet to either Hollywood Park or Del Mar in 2000. Santa Anita, under new owner Frank Stronach, will undergo major renovations and the entire eastern part of the stands, including the turf club, will be torn down for rebuilding after the track's winter/spring season ends in April next year. Oak Tree, a not-for-profit organization, has been running a fall meet of about 27 days annually under a lease arrangement with Santa Anita since 1969. Several of the Oak Tree stakes are important preps for Breeders' Cup horses. Oak Tree recently disqualified itself as host for the Breeders' Cup in 2000 because the track is being rebuilt. Sources say that Oak Tree has had discussions with Hollywood Park and Del Mar officials about moving the 2000 meet. The last time a major Thoroughbred meet in Southern California was moved to another venue came in 1949, when fire damage forced Hollywood Park to run at Santa Anita. Sherwood Chillingworth, executive vice president at Oak Tree, declined to comment about the association's 2000 plans. Regarding the Breeders' Cup, Chillingworth said, "I don't think we have a chance to host the races in 2001, because what I hear is that they're certain to go to New York (Belmont Park). But we hope to be considered as the host in 2002."

KEENELAND APRIL CATALOGUES 225 A total of 225 two-year-olds will be offered at this year's Keeneland April Two-Year-Olds in Training Sale, to be held in Lexington Apr. 13. "We've worked awfully hard to make sure we took the right horses and that we had quality. Last year, we didn't have the big numbers, but we had good horses and the results proved us to be correct," Keeneland Assistant Director of Sales Geoffrey Russell said. "This year we've got 60 more horses than we had a year ago, but we haven't compromised one thing." Top sires represented in the catalogue include A.P. Indy, Deputy Minister, Gone West, Nureyev, Sadler's Wells, Seattle Slew, Seeking the Gold, Storm Cat, Unbridled and Woodman. The first preview for the sale is set for Monday, Apr. 5, with a second scheduled for Monday, Apr. 12; both will begin at 10:30 a.m.

Foreign Report cont. South Africa Sale Shows Gains:

After the first two sessions of the South African National Yearling Sales at Gosforth Park in Johannesburg, both the gross and average had climbed from last year's figures, while the sales topper was, almost inevitably, a son of the hottest stallion in that part of the world, Fort Wood (Ire) (Sadler's Wells). After business closed Sunday night, 209 lots had been sold for \$2,904,418, compared to last year's totals of 198 sold for \$2,708,916, a rise of just over seven percent. The average of \$13,897 showed a slight increase of about 1.5 percent from \$13,681. The sales topper so far at \$104,418 was Wilgerbosdrift Stud's black colt by Fort Wood (Ire) out of Blakes Affair (SAf) (Commodore Blake {GB}). Bought by Northfields Bloodstock and already named Lionheart (SAf), he was the only yearling by Fort Wood to be offered on the first two days of the four-day sale, but the sire of the country's outstanding three-year-old colt Horse Chestnut (SAf) will be represented by five more yearlings over the next two days.

Valenzuela's Attorney Predicts Vindication:

Pat Valenzuela's attorney is confident that the jockey of 1989 Kentucky Derby winner Sunday Silence will be exonerated of robbery charges. Valenzuela was arrested Feb. 26 and accused of robbing a cab driver of \$150 at gunpoint near Santa Anita two days earlier. "If I don't win this one, I'll turn in my license," said Donald Calabria, the second attorney to represent Valenzuela in the case. "The evidence is weak and circumstantial. This is the kind of case where if it gets to the jury, they appoint a foreman and five minutes later they turn in a not-guilty." Valenzuela, 36, has had a checkered career that's been repeatedly interrupted by drug-related suspensions and arrests. The winner of six Breeders' Cup races, Valenzuela hasn't ridden since the fall of 1997. Last Friday, after his bail had been reduced from \$75,000 to \$40,000, Valenzuela was released from custody when his family put up the money. Calabria said that Valenzuela has witnesses who will testify he was elsewhere at the time of the robbery. The lawyer also said that the cab driver has not been able to identify his client, and that Valenzuela will plead not guilty at an arraignment hearing on Mar. 31.

When is a race not a race?

The simple answer is when it is a private trial of the Godolphin horses in Dubai. For the last five years, Classic contenders have been jetting into Britain in late April fully primed for their big test, but without any public form to their name since the fall. Instead the horses have been readied in a series of works which, in everything but name, amount to proper races.

This type of Classic preparation has produced rich dividends for Godolphin. Since Dayflower got the venture off to a respectable start with her fifth in the 1993 English 1000 Guineas, the Dubai raiders have enjoyed success with Mark of Esteem (Ire) in the English 2000 Guineas, with Vettori (Ire) in the French equivalent and with Cape Verdi (Ire) in the English 1000 Guineas.

Now American racegoers will have to come to terms with the idea of horses challenging for the Kentucky Derby without the demanding type of preparation considered essential. They will have to take seriously the Godolphin candidates after Worldly Manner clocked a speedy 1:46.59 for nine furlongs in defeating a high-quality collection of colts at Nad El Sheba Sunday.

Of course he is no stranger to American racecourses, having won three of his four starts last year before being sold by the Mabees for an estimated \$5 million. His victories included five-length wins in the GIII Best Pal S. and the GII Del Mar Futurity.

Worldly Manner's emergence as a potentially top-class colt puts another feather in the cap of his astonishing sire, Riverman. Back in January I mentioned, in connection with Mr. Prospector, that one of the unanswered questions in Thoroughbred breeding is whether a veteran stallion can be expected to be as effective in his ripe old age as he was in the first flush of youth. The answer seems to be a definite "yes" where Riverman is concerned.

Although his fertility was naturally in decline by the time he turned 26 in 1995, Riverman sired 26 live foals from the 47 mares he covered that year. It is a small crop by today's standards, but it has already produced two graded-stakes winners bred by the Mabees, the other being Brancaster, an unbeaten winner of both his juvenile starts in England, including the G3 Horris Hill S.

Riverman currently has 62 Group or Graded stakes winners to his credit in the major Northern Hemisphere countries and has also sired important winners in Australia and South Africa. Although the majority of his 22 Group/Grade I winners have been turf specialists, they also include such runners as Latin American (Californian S.), Loup Sauvage (third, Dubai World Cup), River Special (Hollywood Futurity, Norfolk S.) and Virginia Rapids (Carter H.). We shouldn't be surprised, as Riverman is largely a product of European bloodlines which have enjoyed great success, via the likes of Never Bend, Prince John and Princequillo, on America's dirt tracks.

Nor should we be surprised that the Mabees continued to support Riverman into his ripe old age. They have enjoyed plenty of previous success with him in the shape of such as Worldly Manner's three-quarter brother River Flyer (GI Hollywood Derby), River Special and Half A Year (G2 St James's Palace S.).

The idea of sending Lady Pastor to Riverman probably owed something to the fact that she is inbred 4x4 to Nasrullah, through Fleet Nasrullah and Bold Ruler. As Riverman is by Never Bend, Worldly Manner is inbred 3x5x5 to the brilliant Nasrullah through three of his successful stallion sons.

Worldly Manner's fourth dam is Bayou, a champion three-year-old filly out of the outstanding broodmare Bourtai. His third dam, Slew, was a half-sister to Alluvial, a mare who found fame as the dam of Slew o'Gold and Coastal and as second dam of Sleep Easy (Gl Hollywood Oaks). Slew herself bred Slew's Exceller, winner of the Gl Flower Bowl H., and Youthful Lady, the dam of four stakes-winning daughters including Lady Pastor.

Although Lady Pastor was a stakes winner over six furlongs at two, Worldly Manner should stay the Kentucky Derby distance. Her broodmare sire, Flying Paster, got the distance well enough to finish second in the Santa Anita H. and Strub S., and Youthful Lady is by Youth, a top-class winner at up to 13 furlongs.

ASHFORD STUD
