ARKANSAS DERBY UNDER INVESTIGATION At the behest of Oaklawn Park, the Arkansas State Racing Commission has launched an investigation into last Saturday's Arkansas Derby, probing whether or not jockey Billy Patin used an electrical device aboard winner Valhol (Diazo). Arkansas State Racing Commission Chairman Cecil Alexander confirmed that an Oaklawn employee found an electrical device lying on the track after the running of the race, but would not say how the battery had been linked to Patin or Valhol. "This is a most serious offense, so I'd rather not say anything until the inquiry goes forward," Alexander said. "If we did not feel there was evidence we would not be having this meeting today." In a hastily called meeting, the commission agreed yesterday to launch the inquiry, re-empanel the track stewards for the purpose of gathering facts and withhold payment of the purse. The Arkansas racing authorities will be under pressure to resolve the matter prior to the May 1 Kentucky Derby. There will not be any justification to ban Valhol from the Kentucky Derby, but if the \$300,000 he earned in the Arkansas Derby is stripped from his record he may not get into the field. The Derby is limited to the top 20 earners in graded-stakes races. Eliminating the \$300,000 from his record, Valhol has \$38,400 in graded earnings. "We certainly hope to have this resolved before the Kentucky Derby because it is so important for racing," Alexander said. "We feel we are a part of the Triple Crown and we are pleased to have Kentucky Derby nominees go through Arkansas." Making just his third career start. Valhol. who had finished fourth a start earlier in the GIII Louisiana Derby, won by 4 1/2 lengths and paid \$62.80. Patin is an obscure rider on the Louisiana circuit who was just 9-for-120 on the year entering the Arkansas Derby. He was 34-for-673 in 1998 with earnings of \$389,141. Patin took off his one mount on last night's card at Lone Star Park.

The Under Tack Show continues this morning at 9:30 a.m. The Spring Sale runs from Apr. 19 through Apr. 22.

WONDERTROSS OUT OF DERBY PICTURE William J. Condren, the co-owner of Wondertross (Chief's Crown), announced yesterday that the colt would not run in the May 1 Kentucky Derby. Condren, who owns the colt in partnership with George Steinbrenner's Kinsman Farm, reported that the colt was discharged from the Hagyard Equine Hospital after being treated for colic and returned to trainer Nick Zito's Keeneland barn yesterday at noon. After consulting with veterinarians Mark Cheney and Fairfield Bain, Condren, Steinbrenner and Zito decided that there was too little time to prepare Wondertross for the Derby. "Unless the colt is absolutely 100 percent, none of us want to run him," said Condren. Nick Zito said that if the colt trains well, the GI Preakness remains a possibility.

HOLLYWOOD CANCELS HANDICAPPING

CONTEST Hollywood Park has canceled its \$1 million Gold Cup Handicapping Challenge due to concerns that the contest may not conform with California Horse Racing Board rules governing pari-mutuel racing. The contest, which required \$10,000 to enter, was slated for June 25-27. "We think the contest was a tremendous idea for everyone involved," said General Manager Eual G. Wyatt, Jr. "We thought it would enhance Gold Cup weekend. We will take a look at restructuring it with the hope of rescheduling a similar contest in the future."

CORRECTION: The date for this year's NTRA All-Star Jockey Championship at Lone Star Park in Grand Prairie, Texas was incorrectly reported in yesterday's *TDN*. The event will be held June 25.



RECORDS SET AT TATTERSALLS BREEZE-UP

As predicted, the second and final session of the 1999 Tattersalls Breeze-Up Sale in Newmarket, England last night saw terrific trade, with records broken all around. The sale set a new standard for top price at a European two-year-old in training sale as a colt by Phone Trick out of Shywing (Wing Out) was sold for 99,000 guineas (\$167,715). Bloodstock agent Linda Tate outlasted Newmarket trainer Stuart Williams after a long duel. The colt was consigned by Ireland's Yeomanstown Stud. Tate said, "He was the pick of the sale, breezed very well and is a tremendous horse--very correct and a good mover. I couldn't fault him." The previous record of 95,000 guineas (\$160,939) was set by a Nureyev filly as last year's Tattersalls Sale. The other records broken for the two-day event were the average of 19,553 guineas (\$33,125), up 24 percent from '98; and the median of 15,000 guineas (\$25,411), up 50 percent from a year ago. A total of 149 two-year-olds sold for an aggregate of 2,913,400 guineas (\$4,935,576). Yesterday's Kirkwood consignment produced the sale's top-selling filly. The daughter of Woodman out of Devil's Needle (Nureyev) brought 75,000 guineas (\$127,057) from Japanese owner/breeder Dr Koichiro Hayata. She will be sent to the Ritto training centre in Japan. Tattersalls Chairman Edmond Mahony commented after the sale, "We felt that this was the strongest catalogue ever assembled for a European Breeze-Up sale and it is particularly satisfying to see this reflected in the final figures. The vendors have provided us with quality two-year-olds, and the buyers have recognised what is very much a sale on the upgrade. The first-ever Japanese buyers at a European two-year-olds in training sale, as well as new faces from as far afield as California, are a graphic illustration of the growing international stature of the Tattersalls Breeze-Up, but equally encouraging for the continued development of the sale has been the strong domestic demand."

He said the undefeated mare will return to his Belmont stable around May 1 and have her first workout about a month later. She has been wintering in Camden, South Carolina with Mickey Preger. "I spoke to Mickey this morning and all the reports are good," Schosberg said. "She looks fantastic--good and strong." Schosberg expects Mossflower to have her first 1999 start shortly before the Saratoga meet and she will then be pointed for the Aug. 7 GI Go for Wand H. and the Aug. 27 GI Personal Ensign H. Mossflower, six-for-six in her career, has been sidelined with arthritic joints in both front ankles.

Delta Downs Handle Up:

Delta Downs finished the 1999 Mixed Meeting with an overall increase of 70 percent in total handle and a 14.8 percent increase in total attendance. Most of the gains in handle were attributed to added simulcast revenue. "We made some technical improvements to our signal prior to this last meet," said track President Kathryn Berwick. "Plus, our director of simulcasting (Dave Wilson) was able to add new markets in Florida and Lone Star Park to take our signal." Berwick attributed the rise in attendance to the improved track atmosphere and concessions.

Sam Houston Posts Strong Gains at '98-99 Meet:

Sam Houston Race Park in Houston, Texas, reported increases in handle, attendance and purses at its recently concluded 94-day meet. Live attendance averaged 3,300 per day, up 2.4 percent over last year, and total handle was up 22.5 percent. Average daily purses increased 10 percent over last year to \$92,363. "We are extremely pleased with these numbers," said Robert L. Bork, the track's senior vice-president and general manager. "This proves Houstonians are enjoying our product and that racing fans across the country see Sam Houston Race Park as an excellent race track with full fields and rewarding wagering opportunities." The 1999-2000 Thoroughbred meeting at Sam Houston will commence Oct. 28, 1999.

Questions About Hialeah Turf:

Hialeah took the ninth race off the turf Wednesday and moved it to the main track when the jockeys said the course was unsafe. After High Stepper fell in Wednesday's sixth race, and favored Coretta (Ire) nearly went down in the GII Black Helen on Saturday, the jockey's decided not to ride on the turf until it could be checked out. Racing Secretary Sean Greely said, "Because it's been extremely dry, we've been watering the turf course. With the grass long, the water lays on top instead of sinking it, making it slippery. We may try horses on Friday morning to see how safe it is. We'll do everything we can to keep the (GII) Hialeah Turf Cup on the grass on Saturday."

Maryland Passes Budget With Racetrack Subsidies:

The Maryland Legislature passed a budget that provides \$10 million in subsidies to the state's racetracks, the Harness Tracks of America Newsletter reported yesterday. The measure passed after the tracks agreed to end their advertising campaign for slots.

In landing this race, Compton Admiral made himself a 16-1 (Ladbrokes) shot for the May 1 G1 Sagitta 2000 Guineas. The winter favorite for that race, Mujahid, was decisively beaten and could only manage a disappointing fifth. Compton Admiral settled in last position as the early pace was set by Mensa (Rudimentary). As the race developed, it was clear that Mujahid (Danzig) was not going to win, as complete outsider Debbie's Warning hit the front and looked for a moment like he would go on to take the prize. However, he was soon headed by Brancaster, who was in turn headed on the outside by Compton Admiral, who came with a storming run under the driving influence of his Italian jockey. Delighted owner Erik Penser commented after the race, "I think he is actually a Derby horse. His breeding says a mile and a half, but today he showed that he has enough speed to win a Guineas as well." Winning trainer Gerard Butler said afterwards, "He didn't have the clearest of runs, but when he met the rising ground, he finished. The main day is the first Saturday in May and then the first Saturday in June."

FRESHMAN SIRES OF 1999

from EQUIX Biomechanics

As has been our custom in the past few years, we've selected the stallions we think will dominate this crop in the long run and placed them in various "Groups." However, for the purposes of this report, we have a bit of a twist: Our Number One selection was deemed to be in a "Group of his own," and the next grouping consists of four horses which can logically be paired off two-by-two because of the similarities of the biomechanical profiles, as well as short and long-term prospects, for each pair.

Each of the stallions selected has been subjected to a variety of biomechanical tests. The choices are the consensus of the EQUIX staff after a comprehensive review of all the tests and other variables which we consider to be important--physical similarities to other successful sires, size of crops, relative quality of books of mares, etc.

All of our selections were originally published in December, 1998, prior to any of the current two-year-old sales, and have not been influenced by the results of those sales.

The bottom line here is that this is an average crop of stallions, much in the same way the Class of 1997 appears to be--one break-out in Belong to Me along with solid and consistent sires such as Marquetry, Gilded Time, Mountain Cat, Alydeed and Line in the Sand.

There is a clear standout in the \$5,000-and-up range--French Deputy (Deputy Minister)--and he is our selection to lead the crop, not only over the long term, but also as the Leading Freshman Sire of 1999. He is strong across the board and scores very well on all our tests. He especially matches up well with a very wide cross-section of mares, regardless of their own biomechanical strengths or deficiencies.

The following four stallions are rated just about equal to each other, but are separated into pairs because of the similarities of those pairs.

Chimes Band (Dixieland Band) and Mister Baileys (GB) (Robellino) have better profiles as potential sires of early two-year-olds than the two coupled below. Each also has excellent strengths which could put them among the leaders of the crop in the long run.

On the other hand, both Tabasco Cat (Storm Cat) and Thunder Gulch (Gulch) have profiles which indicate that they may do better with later-maturing juveniles and are likely to sire horses which may want a bit more ground than most sires today.

Among the rest of the \$5,000-and-up stallions, we have nice things to say about Distant View (Mr. Prospector), Go for Gin (Cormorant), Numerous (Mr. Prospector), Unaccounted For (Private Account), You and I (Kris S.), Cherokee Run (Runaway Groom), Devil His Due (Devil's Bag) and Pembroke (Gone West), any one of which could rocket to the top at any time given enough runners and one or two "big horses." All of these, as well as the top five (except Thunder Gulch, who is in Japan this year), stand in Kentucky.

There are a number of stallions which stand for \$5,000 or less who represent excellent value, but if we had to put our finger on one likely "break-out" horse, it is likely to be Maryland's Not For Love (Mr. Prospector), who has as strong a biomechanical profile in this group as does French Deputy in his. Others with wide potential in this category are Blush Rambler (Blushing Groom {Fr}) and Dixieland Heat (Dixieland Band) in Kentucky, Explosive Red (Explodent) and Kissin Kris (Kris S.) in Florida. Among the regional sires, Key Contender (Fit to Fight) in New York is a clear standout followed by two Maryland horses: In Case (Storm Cat) and Rinka Das (Nureyev).

EQUIX Biomechanics combines physical measurements of horses with sophisticated computer programs based on mathematical formulas and growth curves to project which horses will be the most efficient runners or breeders.
