NYRA RECOGNIZES COCAINE SUSPENSIONS Two of the three trainers suspended in Florida after their horses tested positive for trace levels of cocaine have been suspended in New York as well. Trainers Mark Hennig and Todd Pletcher were told Thursday by New York Racing Association stewards that they could no longer enter horses at Belmont Park. New York State Steward John Joyce said, "The [New York] Racing and Wagering Board received a fax from Florida [Wednesday afternoon] with the suspension information. We scratched a horse Todd had in [yesterday]. Mark didn't have any running." The third trainer, David Donk, was out of the country when the suspension notices were served. "We didn't get any information on David, so he can still run his horses," Joyce added. Said Donk yesterday morning, "I don't know what's going on. I've been back a couple of days and I heard they were going to serve me today. Then they changed their minds for some reason. I've got a lawyer, but we don't have anything to appeal." A hearing officer in Tallahassee yesterday denied an appeal for a stay of the suspensions while a Colorado lab tested split samples for Hennig and Pletcher.

Conerly), who finished fourth in the 1997 GI Breeders' Cup Mile but came out of the race with a bowed left front tendon and has been out of action ever since, returned to the work tab Tuesday, going three furlongs in :36 4/5 on the Belmont main track. Having won the Listed Prix de l'Avre at Chantilly Apr. 28, Nowhere To Exit continued his fine form on French soil when winning impressively after an enterprising ride by Richard Quinn despite the persistent rain. Taking command after two furlongs, he set a generous pace; on the approach to the home turn, Quinn made a decisive move, kicking his mount into a clear three-length lead and increasing that advantage to four lengths entering the final two furlongs. First Magnitude emerged as the only likely challenger, but couldn't manage to get to the leader despite Olivier Peslier's urgings. Winning owner Gary Pinchen, a director of the Chelsea soccer club, said, "We wanted some cut in the ground, but [with all the rain] we got a bit more cut than we wanted. We wouldn't want it this soft. Last year we thought he was a handicapper, but he is a bigframed horse and has filled out well. This year he has just done everything we have asked of him and he just keeps improving." Quinn added, "I believe the horse is improving with every race; where he's going to stop, no one knows." The winner will now point to the G1 Prix du Jockey Club at Chantilly June 6, for which he will need to be supplemented.

Colonial Downs Fined:

According to the Harness Tracks of America newsletter, the Virginia Racing Commission fined Colonial Downs \$10,000 after the track missed its Apr. 16 deadline to post a \$3.25 million bond guaranteeing 1999 Thoroughbred purses. The bond was posted six days late. Hearing officer Stan Bowker had recommended that, instead of a fine, the track's four OTB facilities be shut down for five days. Reacting to Bowker's recommendation, Colonial President lan Stewart reportedly said, "It appears that horse racing in Virginia and Colonial Downs are on the brink of mutual destruction."

WRITERS UP

RATING THE RATINGS

A few weeks ago, two of the most influential sports columnists in the country were on national television shoveling dirt on the remains of horse racing. Sure, the Kentucky Derby is an event, they were willing to admit. But look at the ratings, they kept saying. Nobody's watching, except maybe a few hardcore gamblers and a bunch of old people with nothing better to do.

This was the day after 151,000 people jammed into Churchill Downs to watch the Derby, two days after 101,000 showed up to see the Kentucky Oaks.

Didn't matter. Doesn't count. All people know today are television ratings.

It's almost enough to make you think Dick Vitale has a point when he goes off on his annual rant every March. As he says, the ratings for the NCAA tournament don't mean a blessed thing because it's not something you watch at home, by yourself. The NCAA tournament is best viewed as a shared experience, in a crowded bar, in a big raucous room on a college campus with a lot of kids jumping up and down.

But if you think the ratings are irrelevant for college basketball, what are they for horse racing? A hill of beans, right? What does it mean that ABC's rating for this year's Derby rose from 6.1 to 6.3?

Means nothing. Until home betting and racing networks become the new reality for the old game, anyone with even a passing interest in the Derby is going to get in a car and drive to a place where they accept wagers. A racetrack, a simulcasting parlor of some sort, a casino race book, whatever's most convenient.

There were 576 such outlets in the United States in 1994. By 1997, the last time anyone bothered to take inventory, there were 1,020 of them. At that rate of growth, and with the proliferation of full-card simulcasting, you would have to figure there are now at least 1,500 places in this country where they will take a bet legally, parimutuelly.

Naturally, Derby day would be the biggest day of the year. But how big is big? More and more places have wised up and no longer charge admission. Therefore they don't keep attendance figures.

They know business when they see it, though, and they know how to count money.

A television rating of 6.3 means that approximately six million Americans were watching the Derby. But what about the 151,000 people who were there? And what about the crowds that descended upon all the simulcasting outlets? Don't they count?

At New Jersey's Monmouth Park Saturday the attendance figure was 6,000 on the nose, which is probably capacity for anyone who needs to know. By comparison, there were 2,041 customers the Saturday before the Derby, 2,260 the Saturday after the Derby.

Same thing at the Meadowlands: 3,556 the Saturday before, 3,439 the Saturday after, and 10,636 on Derby day.

While Freehold showed a modest jump--from 3,275 to 5,766 and back down to 3,243--Philadelphia Park and Garden State packed 'em in. For the three Saturdays in question, Philadelphia and its various turf clubs went from 6,639 to 13,426 and back down to 5,846. Garden State went from 3,413 to 7,133, and back to 4,023.

Aqueduct went from 8,043 to 12,288, and back to 6,802.

Then there are the 75 OTB parlors in New York City, including three tele-theaters and a half-dozen restaurants, none of which keep attendance figures. Said Allen Gutterman, senior vice president for marketing, "This Derby day produced the single largest one-day handle in New York OTB history." A history that dates back to 1971.

The numbers? Saturday before the Derby: \$3,646,453. Saturday of the Derby: \$7,046,139. Saturday after the Derby: \$3,660,506.

Noticing a pattern here?

Up in Connecticut, they had 2,625 customers show up at Sports Haven, compared to 827 the week before, 833 the week after. At the Bradley Tele-Theater in Hartford, the fire marshal actually stood at the door to make sure they didn't exceed capacity, and people were kept waiting in line outside as others made their bets and left.

Do those people count in the estimation of the high and the mighty who make sweeping statements about a game they don't know the first thing about?

While there is nothing wrong with the Derby's TV ratings--everyone's ratings are down what with the fierce competition for the nation's eyeballs--a number like 6.3 is insidious in many ways. It becomes the only number that matters to some decision makers, many of them advertisers, many of them in the newspaper business.

Papers are paying less and less attention to racing these days, except during the week leading up to the Derby. For at least one week every year there isn't a paper in the country that can afford to ignore the sport

So what's the correlation between a week's worth of steady publicity and the fact that business triples at simulcasting outlets the day of the Derby? Is it reasonable to assume that there is some correlation?

This is something the National Thoroughbred Racing Association might consider looking into. Maybe someone over there could find a way to collect attendance figures from all the various simulcasting outlets around the country and get a hold of an adding machine and see what kind of numbers we're talking about.

Either that or we can all sit around and listen to influential sports columnists talk about how racing is history, that the game died 20 years ago, that no one cares.
