The 2022 class of first-crop yearling sires features a diverse batch of Kentucky-based young stallions including a pair of Breeders' Cup champions, two sons of reigning top sire Into Mischief, five graded stakes winners at two and five Grade I winners on turf. Throughout the course of the yearling sales season, we will feature a series of freshman sires as their first crop points toward the sales ring. Check out past editions of our series [here](#).

Omaha Beach (**War Front**--Charming, by Seeking the Gold) set the bar high for this year's class of first-crop yearlings stallions at the Fasig-Tipton July Sale, where five of his progeny sold and averaged \$236,000. His top lot, a Spendthrift-bred daughter of Grade III winner Gas Station Sushi (Into Mischief), brought \$410,000 and was the highest-priced filly by any sire at the one-day auction.

"When we went out to Fasig July, we were extremely happy with what we were seeing," Spendthrift Farm's Mark Toothaker reported. "It was fun for us to watch them. They were nice-sized horses--not overly big, but very correct with good bodies."

Toothaker explained how he thinks of Omaha Beach as the first horse Spendthrift took a big swing for when they began seeking out some of the most in-demand stallion prospects in recent years. **Cont. p3**

JUSTIQUE IS LEAD IN LAST SUNDAY'S TRIPLET OF RISING STAR FILLIES by Patrycja Szpyra

In the same way which astronomical stars largely form in groups, so too did the 'TDN Rising Stars' this past Sunday. Not one, not two, but three leading ladies emerged from the nebulae of Del Mar and Saratoga, each with her own brand of brilliance. Chief among the splendor, and the last to show her shine, was **Justique** (**Justify**), whose brilliant turn of foot and effortless dismissal of rivals summoned forth comparisons to another glorious 'Rising Star' in her heyday--a John Shirreffs masterpiece, Hall of Famer Zenyatta (Street Cry {Ire}). Since then, she's come out "bright and hungry" and the focus shifts to what her enormous potential signals for the future.

Justique marks her conditioner's first debut winner in three years. John Shirreffs is a man famous for his patience and keen intuition toward what his horses need on a personal level. Much like the breed he loves, his training style has shifted and changed through the years. The focus on his firster record might be a bit *too much* research on some of our parts. **Cont. p6**

He remembers visiting the Fox Hill Farms-campaigned colt in the days between his nine-length maiden-breaking score and his victory over juvenile champion **Game Winner** in the GI Rebel S.

“When Richard Mandella told me that Omaha Beach was the best horse he'd ever had in his barn, it didn't take long to get back here and say that we needed to figure out a way to get this thing done,” Toothaker recalled. “With the amount of ability that this horse had to go along with his great looks and pedigree, Omaha Beach was just the entire package.”

The winner of the GI Arkansas Derby and morning-line favorite for the 2019 Kentucky Derby was sidelined before his Derby bid due to an entrapped epiglottis, but returned later in his sophomore season to defeat Shancelot (Shanghai Bobby) in the GI Santa Anita Sprint Championship S., run second in the GI Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile and cap off his career with an easy victory in the GI Malibu S.

Launched at a stud fee of \$45,000, Omaha Beach bred 215 mares in each of his first two seasons at stud. Toothaker said that the initial demand for the regally bred son of **War Front** was unprecedented in Spendthrift's history.

“We've never had a horse have 600 requests for seasons in his first year,” Toothaker explained. “I don't know that we've ever had a horse get that kind of book to get them started. With the type of mares that he got in his first year, there's no telling what this first crop can do because the potential is crazy.”

Omaha Beach's first crop was in demand as weanlings, with 19 of 24 selling to average \$112,736 and stamp their sire as the number one **freshman stallion by weanling average**. His top-selling weanling, a colt out of stakes producer North Freeway (Jump Start), sold for \$200,000.

At next week's Fasig-Tipton Saratoga Sale, Omaha Beach will be represented by six yearlings. The first to go through the ring will be **Hip 36**, a filly out of Peter Blum's stakes-placed homebred Night Time Lady (**Midnight Lute**).

"She was a late foal, but she still has lots of size," agent Bridie Harrison said of the late April-foaled yearling. "She has great bone, great substance and a really good walk. We like her a lot."

Harrison reported that Blum has been a strong supporter of Omaha Beach throughout the stallion's first years at stud.

"Peter fell in love with Omaha Beach when he saw him in Richard Mandella's barn in California," she said. "He thought he was a big, strong, beautiful horse with a great temperament. We bred a few mares to Omaha Beach and I like all the foals. Omaha Beach added a lot of size to our mares. Every one of our Omaha Beach foals are taller than most of the mares' other foals. They have lots of substance and bone and they're strong, rangy-type horses."

Also during the first session of the Saratoga Sale, Mill Ridge Farm will send **Hip 67** through the ring. The Omaha Beach colt out of the winning **Sky Mesa** mare Savannah Sky was a \$140,000 weanling purchase at the Keeneland November Sale.

"We liked this colt from the get-go," Mill Ridge's Headley Bell explained. "His presence and athleticism was really everything that you look for in a horse. We couldn't be more pleased with him. We've always been big fans of Omaha Beach. Two years ago, we bred 12 mares to the horse with our clients."

Other yearlings by Omaha Beach at the same sale include **Hip 41**, a half-brother to GSW & MGISP Pappacap (**Gun Runner**); **Hip 93**, a New York-bred half-sister to MGSW Highway Star (Girolamo) and MSW Captain Bombastic (Forty Tales); **Hip 196**, also a New York-bred and a half-sister to MSW Espresso Shot (**Mission Impazible**) and current stakes performer Venti Valentine (Firing Line); and **Hip 205**, a filly out of Hot Water (**Medaglia d'Oro**), the dam of this year's GIII Ben Ali S. and GIII Michelob Ultra Challenger S. winner Scalding (**Nyquist**).

Omaha Beach will have four additional yearlings sell at the Fasig-Tipton New York-bred sale.

As the young stallion's first crop begin to make their way to the track next year, Toothaker said he looks for Omaha Beach's progeny to show speed right out of the gate as juveniles.

"With his speed, he was able to win a Grade I going six furlongs and also lay very close in all of his two-turn races. With his pedigree, your hope is that he turns out to be a Classic sire, but that he's also going to be able to throw horses with enough speed that I think you'll see plenty of them be well received at the 2-year-old sales."

Hailing from one of the most influential dirt families in recent years, Omaha Beach is a half-brother to champion Take Charge Brandi (Giant's Causeway). His second dam, 2013 Broodmare of

the Year and MGISW Take Charge Lady (Dehere), has now produced three Grade I winners while her daughter I'll Take Charge (Indian Charlie) is the dam of recent GIII Dwyer S. winner Charge It (**Tapit**).

"It's one of those female families that is just going to keep getting bigger and better," Toothaker said. "It's as good as there is in the stallion book. Omaha Beach was a really good dirt horse out of a really good dirt female family, but he's by one of the best sprinters and now turf sires out there. It's an interesting combination and we look forward to seeing what they do on the track."



"Personally, I don't want to win first-time out," said Shirreffs in a text. "You never much learn about a horse's style when it is chased. When I trained for [Marshall Naify's] 505 [Farms], we won first-out quite often. I try not to make speed the priority [any more]."

With his newest budding star, the focus was confidence building and not so much where she'd be early on. They had to give her someone to follow in the mornings, Shirreffs reported, and he was careful not to upset her by asking for something she didn't understand. And to address the big mare in the room, he maintains an accurate comparison is impossible off a single maiden win.

"Justique has the ability to make running appear effortless with her huge stride. Zenyatta had the ability to lengthen as she ran, getting longer and lower."

Part and parcel with that huge stride, there was a lot to like about her long before her eye-catching first start. Her intelligent eye and quiet, steady demeanor made quite the impression at the September sale, especially on Shirreffs's wife, Dottie Ingordo-Shirreffs. Justique was her favorite horse.

"It is interesting how much sale yearlings change from September to July. At the sale, she had the classic Thoroughbred appearance; long, great underline, clean legs, sharp intelligent eyes...I can still see her standing quietly, waiting as we inspected her. 'One more walk, please.' I bet she knows those words!"

Beyond her impressive physical, Justique gains the benefit of potential versatility hinted by her 'Rising Star' half-brother **Mo Town (Uncle Mo)**, who successfully reinvented himself as a turf horse later in his career. In his sole start at the same venue as his half-sister's coming-out party, **Mo Town** ran down and out-kicked Channel Maker (English Channel) at the head of a salty GI Hollywood Derby field. **Cont. p7**

To complete the circle, Justique's connections won the 2021 edition of the race with Beyond Brilliant (**Twirling Candy**). Justique already shouldered the weight of expectation with her royalty befitting price tag, but unlike many who share auction amounts in the high six-figure range, she's shown that there just might be something there.

Shifting focus to the East coast, and from the faithful, fruitful grounds of Champions past, present, and future--known as Saratoga--emerged **Prank** (Into Mischief) for the partnership of StarLadies Racing, LNJ Foxwoods, and Gainesway Stable. The half-sister to GI Belmont S. winner Mo Donegal (**Uncle Mo**) gave her sire another monumental mark to his already legendary career by becoming his 33rd '**Rising Star**', and the second on the weekend behind **Newgate** at Del Mar July 30. The 9 3/4-length gap on rivals, after burning through :21.91 and :45.11 fractions, further emphasized the ability running in the family, and she'll be the flag bearer for the moment with **Mo Donegal on the sidelines** to recover from bone bruising.

Earlier, on the same card, and more than able to hold her own on raw ability, came the aptly-named **Be Your Best (Ire)** (Muharaar {GB}). Sent away in a competitive field, and never in any hurry early, she certainly caught the eye as she cruised passed rivals into a six-furlong 1:14.29 split.

Try as they might, the field could not catch her as Be Your Best bounded home as easily as she pleased for owner Mike Ryan and conditioner Horacio De Paz. The filly hails from an incredibly deep female family with no less than 10 graded stakes winners in it, including, five filly Grade I winners and Canadian Champion 3-year-old filly Munnyfor Ro (**Munnings**). The latter recently placed in the GII Dance Smartly S. at Woodbine.

Saratoga and Del Mar in the summer are famous for attracting deep, talented fields of young horses. Be their beginnings humble or worthy of a throne, there is no greater thrill than seeing a runner justify the faith they've been entrusted with; solidified by recognition from peers and industry experts. It's not every day the *TDN* gives out three 'Rising Star' nods, but when there's talent, one cannot ignore the siren song.

ONE LIFE IN A BOX: RICHARD HAZELTON

For nearly three years, a frayed cardboard box has hidden in the corner of a small apartment in the Westside of Los Angeles, buried from view by wooly blankets, a tennis racket with broken strings, worn clothes long earmarked for the thrift store and an old jacket with a broken zipper and patched leather sleeves.

The box is filled mostly with creaky photo albums stuffed full of old newspaper clippings pasted onto faded paper, laminated win pictures--the plastic as brittle as sheet-ice--and handwritten letters. There are magazines and an old DVD and family photographs taken when Kodak shops weren't just a punch line for Millennials.

The box has remained undisturbed for years--since its subject, trainer Richard Pierce Hazelton, passed away--only to be unearthed during a spring clean, quite by chance, near the anniversary of his passing in 2019 when he was 88.

"King Richard" lies 10th on America's all-time winning-most trainer list, 4,745 victories officially to his name. Between Hawthorne, Arlington and Sportsman's Park alone, he held 36 individual training titles. For those counting, add another 15 from Turf Paradise.

But like many such boxes--dusty treasure troves stuffed into corner or closet and brought out only occasionally--its narrow scope, a few scattered years among decades, holds something of a frustrating paradox.

While offering up much so more than just its contents, the box still feels an unsatisfying relic, the memories hidden within telling only fragments, leaving one to wonder at what else has already slipped entirely away.

"If Hazelton trains 'em... he's a runner..."

On May 21, 1971, Ellyn Shaunahoff sat down to what one imagines was a desk overlooking a pretty primrose garden and put pen to paper--in florid cursive baby-blue ballpoint--to ask Hazelton for any information on Maxwell G., then a prolific winner in less than prolific contests.

Maxwell G. had been Shaunahoff's favorite horse since attending her first race meet at Hollywood Park on April 19, 1969.

"I have followed him ever since and have cheered his stretch runs many a time," she writes. "I've been to Del Mar, Santa Anita and even Turf Paradise to see him race."

At that point in time, Ellyn assumed the then-10-year-old had retired, saying he had "about reached the age limit for racing." As it turned out, Shaunahoff was a little premature in relegating the old veteran to pipe and slipper.

"There must be a fountain of youth hidden somewhere in Chicago," wrote the Illinois scribe, Neil Milbert, about the 11-year-old, who had just scored his third victory in a row at Arlington Park just one year later. Even then, AARP was forced to hold fire on sending their magazine to the horse fans called "Maxie."

Indeed, it wasn't until five years later, in 1977, that Maxwell G. ran his last race when the "grizzled gelding," as one writer put it, was but a supple 16-year-old.

"Grizzled" really doesn't do the horse justice. A picture from 1972 shows Maxie--tall, raw-boned, yet handsome in elder statesman fashion--standing serenely beside his groom, large ears pinned forward as though gathering radio signals.

Richard Hazelton cont.

By the time of his swan song, Maxwell G. had won 47 out of a staggering 233 career starts, not all for Hazelton, who had claimed him for \$1,000 at Yakima Meadows, in Washington, in May of 1965 (another story has it that Hazelton claimed him for \$6,200 in 1968 at the Los Angeles County Fair).

It was Hazelton's touch, however, that gave this lowly claimer the veneer of a celluloid star.

The *Chicago Sun-Times* claimed that Maxwell G., at the height of his fame, brought thousands of fans to the track, lured by his Houdini-like theatrics, when he would race far off the pace before making "a bold bid to win," as one writer prosaically put it.

Another scribe describes this last gasp maneuver with a tad more relish: "Typically, he will start a race slowly, plodding along behind the field until about the quarter-mile from the finish. Then he will swing wide and make a mad dash for the wire."

By the time Hazelton had turned 80, memories of his own life were hazy or as terse as Hemingway's prose.

"My dad was involved in horse racing," he told the poor writer of a Hawthorne Racecourse program, one obviously hoping for Horatio Alger. "I went to live with him when I was seven or eight years old. He had horses. I started galloping them and then I started riding them when I was 14."

Not exactly edge of the seat stuff.

Hazelton's stint as an apprentice rider can hardly be deemed a bust, not when, south of the border, fans referred to him as "El Ricardo." But here's his own take on that brief spell, 65 years later.

"I first rode in Phoenix. That's where I was born and raised. I was the leading rider at Caliente in Mexico in 1945. I went to work for the Klein Cattle Company after my stint as a jockey."

When it came to his horses, however, Hazelton's mind suddenly illuminated, as though a bolt of lightning had passed through it.

"I lost him three or four times but I always claimed him back," Hazelton remembered, of Maxwell G. "He was a favorite of announcer Phil Georgeff. I remember they took him to the paddock in front of the grandstand and gave him two bushel baskets full of apples. They even named a race for him at Sportsman's and ran it for a few years."

Hazelton added, proudly: "He was the only horse that was ever on the front page of the *Wall Street Journal*."

The 1974 front page *Wall Street Journal* story in question wouldn't pass editorial muster by today's standards.

"If ever a racehorse was a candidate for the glue factory, it was Maxwell G.," the story begins, in Dickensian fashion, explaining how poor Maxie, at the age of five, suffered a badly injured left foot, snagged in barbed wire while out punching cattle.

Hazelton would manage the problem appendage with a special shoe that eased the pressure on it. Maxwell G. would repay this favor through what's described in the *Journal* as "calm affection" and a willingness to "nuzzle strangers."

As Hazelton put it, "He wouldn't give a nickel for an earthquake."

Stable hands, the *Journal* notes, adored the horse.

"When another owner bought Maxwell G. in a claiming race two years ago, one stable hand came to Mr. Hazelton in tears, threatening to quit if he didn't buy back Maxwell G.," writes the *Journal*. Hazelton did what was demanded of him.

"What's really amazing is that he's done it the hard way, a nickel and dime at a time," Hazelton said of the horse's career—an assessment seemingly apropos of the trainer himself and so many of his trainees.

Take Full Pocket, a horse a Sportsman's Park program writer described as one of the "finest" Hazelton ever trained. He was certainly one of the nation's finest and fastest handicap sprinters during that era. In 1973, he won more than \$200,000 and was second in the Eclipse Award balloting to champion Shecky Greene for Sprinter of the Year.

Special mention goes to Full Pocket's 3-year-old "reign of terror at Sportsman's."

This included the "dandy young star's" imperious victory in the \$38,400 National Jockey Club Handicap, before a Labor Day crowd of nearly 24,000, when he led home stablemate Moon splash for "Cowboy Richard," as one contemporary reporter coined the trainer.

Postage stamp Full Pocket was hardly a Colossus of Rhodes, "something breeders will hold against him," one miser once noted. But that didn't stop breeders from trying anyway.

By the time the horse retired to stud at Hurstland Farm, in Kentucky--a good outcross to mares with Nearco blood, noted the 1974 *Stallion Directory and Farm Register*--Full Pocket had won 27 of his 47 lifetime starts and placed in 14 others. He also won 17 stakes and was placed in 11 more.

Again, Hazelton's 80-year-old mind came alive at the horse's memory. "He was one of the reasons I came to Chicago," said the native of Arizona. "I brought him from the yearling sale for Mr. Bensinger, of the Brunswick Corporation. He named all of his horses. We paid \$18,000. That was a lot of money back then. He was never a great sire, but he certainly was a runner."

Dates and details, places and people--the box is something of a scramble of puzzle pieces sharing oftentimes conflicting information, giving the trainer a shape-shifting quality that somehow only sweetens the myth.

Part of the reason appears to be the man's aversion to the press. As one scribe put it, "I tried to interview him for years but Mr. Hazelton didn't like to talk about himself--or to me."

One such seemingly slippery fact surrounds his age.

"Jockey records in 1945 list him as having been born in 1929," wrote longtime Sportsman's Park fixture Don Grisham, of Hazelton's Icarus-like career in the saddle for his father, George. "As a supposed 16-year-old in '45, he finished among top apprentice riders in North America."

Grisham's "supposed" does a lot of heavy lifting, for the minimum age for apprentices back then was 16.

"However, in those days, it was possible for an underage youngster to get by stewards and begin riding before turning 16. There is reason to believe Hazelton might have fallen into in this category.

"It is a matter of record he emerged a riding star at Arizona tracks and Caliente. One nine-race card at Caliente, he rode six winners, two seconds, and a third during a single afternoon."

The melting sun to Hazelton's Icarus dream was biological. "Increasing weight soon terminated his saddle career," Grisham noted, with blunt assessment.

What happened then depends upon the bard.

One version is that Hazelton returned to his studies in Phoenix, where the natural athlete became a prep school football star.

Another is that he became a mainstay of the Southwestern rodeo circuit. Either way, it wasn't long before the Stetson-loving Arizonan turned his hand to training. Some reports pin the date as late as 1957. A tattered win picture from 1948 lists Hazelton as the trainer.

"After struggling for a while to saddle his first winner, the day finally came in Silver City, New Mexico. But Richard would have to wait until he was 26-years-old for his first 'bread-'n-butter' horse, a \$500 claimer named Foxation," one profiler made of Hazelton's early years with a license.

The box yields precious little of Foxation but considerably more of Zip Pocket, whom Hazelton saddled in 1967 to a 5 1/2-furlong world record of :55 1/2. The following year, Zip Pocket set a world record of 1:07 1/5 for three-quarters of a mile.

"Was it because of the biochemicals sprayed on the track or is Zip Pocket really that fast?" asked writer Pete Peters, after the horse's winning appearance at Turf Paradise.

Peters, a brylcreemed pipe-smoking staff writer for the *Gazette*, had the full-faced appearance of someone with limited athletic inclination. This is in stark contrast to the typical Hazelton runner, jettisoned into racing folklore as though shot from a cannon.

"If Hazelton trains 'em... he's a runner..." one observer described it. An early example was the Rudy Krize-owned "speed-gearred grey colt" Wandering Boy, who came out on top in a \$3,500 winner-takes-all duel at Turf Paradise against the Quarter Horse, Arizonan.

The clippings bear no date, but given how weathered is the tissue-thin newspaper, the late 1960s seem a safe bet. The following decade the trainer stepped it up another gear, with much of his success hinged upon bringing an army of horses West to East before commandeering the Chicago claiming circuit to make room for fresh legs.

"Contrary to rumors, Richard Hazelton did not suggest this dinner. Hal has claimed 11 horses off Richard this year and won only one race with the sum total," said trainer Bill Resseguet, at a dinner--which sounds more like a roast--organized by the Chicago chapter of the Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association in honor of trainer Hal Bishop.

"I realize Richard is most appreciative of unloading those 11 horses," Resseguet deadpanned.

The observation, though couched in jest, provides a useful entry point into the subject's character.

On the one hand, Hazelton is made as inscrutable as an IRS inspector.

"Husky," one scribe calls him. Another, "a man of few words." "Taciturn." A "dark-browed horseman who prefers boots and Stetson." And a "modest wonder man from Arizona" with "his ever-present cowboy hat and slow Western drawl."

Yet ambition doesn't run on empty fumes alone.

To the *Chicago Sun-Times*, Hazelton let slip the mask. "It's been a difficult job," Hazelton said of plans to reach 5,000 wins, "but I have been averaging approximately 134 winners a year so maybe in the year 2001 I can brag of what I did in less than 40 years."

The pipe-puffing Pete Peters managed to elicit from Hazelton another rare peek through the same slim aperture. "I finally landed him," crowed Hazelton about the wealthy businessman, Harold Florsheim, who Hazelton lured to his owners' ranks for the 1966-67 Turf Paradise racing season.

"I've been after him for a long time but I couldn't convince him to come West with his horses," Hazelton added. "He finally consented. He's got some good stock."

Modeling the trainer's work ethic, Don Grisham at Sportsman's Park turned to a quote of Hemingway's: "You got to learn something: Never confuse movement for action."

As Grisham put it, "There is always tote action on Hazelton-trained horses. As for the movement, Hazelton was in Kentucky Friday to inspect yearlings with Harold Florsheim, the shoe magnate. He jetted back in time to saddle two winners on Saturday's card, including Glory Run in the \$22,425 Crete Handicap."

In her husband, Marge Hazelton--a champion calf roper and an integral part of the story--saw an "uncanny ability to remember all the horses on the grounds and what they have done in each of their races. His memory helps him put our horses in races in which they have a good chance of winning."

With her husband's ego evidently in mind, Marge added: "He can't remember anything else, of course."

Then comes Dr. Richard Radke, the former orthodontist and a key patron of Hazelton's over decades.

Radke believed his trainer of having "one of the highest IQs of anyone I've ever met, but not many people are aware of that because he's so modest and quiet," or so he told John McEvoy of the *Daily Racing Form*.

Hazelton's parsimonious approach to shared connection had some unintended side effects.

"There have been a few times that we didn't have the best communication," Radke added, warmly. "Times like when I'd call up Richard and ask about one of my horses, and Richard would say, 'Oh, I sold him for you. I guess I didn't call you about that.'"

Given how often the search for a father's approval launches the hero's journey--or so says Joseph Campbell--perhaps the most telling insight is from Hazelton's own tongue, shared on the back of a Sportsman's Park program in a potted bio in which we also learn the trainer's favorite food (steak) and favorite movie ("Shawshank Redemption").

"I'm very proud of my father, George. He was a real 'man's man'," Hazelton said. "He had that rare ability, I think we call it charisma, to draw people to him." **Cont. p12**

"Arlington builds a great deal right around you"

Where naval gazing has now become all but a national occupation, Hazelton offers a refreshing alternative, one very much of its time, when exterior interests held almost exclusively one's private inward-lit gaze.

The box is a sobering reminder of this at a time when it can feel as though the coattails of horse racing have snagged on some fast-moving bullet train, dragging it forward to goodness knows where, bumping and somersaulting, never able to quite get its footing. For it is not lost how Hazelton's favorite playgrounds are now an aberration of his memory--Arlington a tumbleweed ghost town and Turf Paradise a derelict disgrace.

So, why not turn to the architects of this collection of halcyon summers for advice on where indeed to tread now--people like Richard Duchossois, then Arlington's chairman when in May of 2011 he wrote to Hazelton the sort of letter one imagines rarely escapes today's sterile racetrack boardrooms.

"We are delighted you have returned to Arlington," Duchossois wrote, when the trainer had all but stored away for good the stable's shingle. "You are one of the staples of Arlington and Arlington builds a great deal right around you."

He wasn't wrong--a good deal right was built around Hazelton. And so, after all, maybe it's okay if the box contains only a sliver of the great arc that constitutes a life greatly lived, just as long as every now and then such memoirs are unearthed, rediscovered anew, spread out across the floor in the evening lamplight by the kneeling archeologist with a lump in their throat.



HISA SEEKS STAY AFTER LOUISIANA, WEST VIRGINIA RULING *by Bill Finley*

Just six days after Horse Racing Integrity and Safety Authority (HISA) opponents **won a round in court in which a federal judge granted a preliminary injunction** that halted implementation of HISA rules going into effect in Louisiana and West Virginia, HISA and the Federal Trade Commission were back in court Monday filing an emergency motion for a stay pending appeal.

The motion was filed in the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit.

The filing from HISA maintains that when granting the preliminary injunction, the court erred in regards to the length of the period required for public comment. Lawyers for HISA contend that the Federal Trade Commission, which oversees HISA, has provided 14 days for public comment following its publication of proposed rules, which does not violate any rules. They contend that the "court mistakenly believed required the Commission to provide a minimum 30-day comment period."

The filing continues: "A stay is warranted because that ruling rests on legal error and does not reflect a sound balancing of the equities. The APA (Administrative Procedure Act) imposes no minimum comment period, and the district court plainly erred in concluding otherwise."

When granting an injunction to the plaintiffs, which included the Jockeys' Guild and the states of West Virginia and Louisiana, Judge Terry Doughty of U.S. District Court (Western District of Louisiana) did not appear to consider the public comment period a major factor in his decision. Instead, he focused on the plaintiffs allegations that HISA was causing them irreparable harm and that an injunction was needed while still other courts were deciding the constitutionality of the Horse Racing Integrity and Safety Act.

"Here, there is an obvious link between the HISA rules and Plaintiffs' alleged injuries," Doughty wrote. "All the above alleged injuries are 'fairly traceable' to the rules enacted thus far by HISA and the FTC."

Borrowing a page from their adversaries, HISA attorneys wrote that if they are not granted a stay and HISA regulations cannot immediately be implemented in West Virginia and Louisiana that "will cause grave and irreparable harm to the horseracing industry and the public in contravention of Congress's clear intent." They called Doughty's decision a case of "flagrant judicial overreach."

Two separate federal courts have already dismissed lawsuits from the same plaintiffs that include similar arguments made before Doughty's court and question whether or not HISA is constitutional. Both courts ruled in favor of HISA but those decisions have been appealed.

"The preliminary injunction is unlikely to survive appeal and, in the meantime, will cause irreparable damage to the Authority's ability to implement the Act in a timely and orderly fashion," HISA's court filing reads. **Cont. p13**

HISA Seeking Stay cont.

The HISA filing relies on the same arguments that gave birth to the Horse Racing Integrity and Safety Act, that when it comes to integrity and safety, the industry was adrift, in need of change and that the best way to accomplish that was through a central authority.

“The importance of this program cannot be overstated as [the Authority] build[s] on advances the industry has already made by implementing national, uniform rules and regulations, increasing accountability, and using data- and research-driven solutions to enhance the safety of our horses and jockeys,” the filing reads.

The filing concludes: “This Court should stay the order pending appeal as soon as possible, but no later than Aug. 5, 2022 (as the harm from the injunction mounts with each racing day).”

TEXAS TRACK GROUP FILES LATEST HISA

A group of entities associated with various racing-related industries in Texas, including the owners of Lone Star Park, has filed a new lawsuit against the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Act (HISA) in which declaratory and injunctive relief is sought along with a request for a preliminary injunction, [according to court filing dated July 29](#).

Submitted to the United States District Court for the Northern District of Texas, Amarillo Division, the suit focuses on the relative power of the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Authority--the umbrella non-profit established by the Act--to implement the program.

This latest filing is in the same district court--but different division--as a separate lawsuit filed by the National Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association (NHBPA) in 2021.

Earlier this year, a federal judge threw out that case. The NHBPA subsequently filed an appeal with the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals, which is pending.

“The ‘Authority’ is empowered by law to, among other things, subpoena documents and compel testimony, search businesses and private databases and seize documents, conduct adjudicatory proceedings, and prosecute actions in federal court like other federal prosecutors,” the latest filing states.

“No private individuals have such powers. No private individual can show up at one’s door and demand documents and testimony under sanction of law. No private individual can conduct a private search and seizure. And no private individual has the power to hale another private citizen into court to enforce offenses against the public. But the “Authority” does,” the filing adds.

So far, the Texas Racing Commission (TRC) has [refused to comply with Act](#), which went into effect at the start of July, arguing that under Texas law only the commission has the authority to oversee horse racing in the state. HISA’s current remit covers only Thoroughbred racing.

As a result, the signal from the state's Thoroughbred tracks cannot be sent out of state and advance deposit wagering companies are prevented from taking betting on Texas Thoroughbred races. There are no Thoroughbred meets scheduled in Texas between now and the end of the year.

According to a spokesperson for the Authority, HISA will mount a legal defence “while the Authority’s focus remains on implementing the Racetrack Safety program and finalizing Anti-Doping and Medication Control rules.” Implementation for the latter is scheduled for Jan. 2023.

“The majority of racing participants support HISA’s mission to protect those who play by the rules and hold those who fail to do so accountable in order to keep our equine and human athletes safe and the competition fair,” wrote the HISA spokesperson.

“The immense collaboration with state racing commissions, stewards, veterinarians, racetracks, trainers, and other horsemen that has taken place to date is evidence of this support, and we intend to continue to fulfill our mandate and work to make the industry safer,” the spokesperson added.

The plaintiffs include Global Gaming LSP, a limited liability company which owns Lone Star Park, and Gulf Coast Racing LLC, which owns a greyhound racetrack located in Nueces County, Texas. Gulf Coast Racing is allegedly seeking to redesignate the track as a Class 2 horseracing track, according to the filing.

The other two plaintiffs consist of LRP Group Ltd. a limited partnership working towards “operating an active horseracing track” in the south of the state, the filing states, and Valle De Los Tesoros, a limited partnership similarly looking to operate a horseracing track in South Texas, one currently designated inactive by the TRC.

It’s unclear whether the planned racetracks listed in the suit are intended for Thoroughbred racing.

Among the arguments the plaintiffs make is that the legal jurisdiction given the Authority is of government power “in general” and of executive power “in particular,” but that the current design of the Authority renders it unconstitutional, meaning it is exercising “nothing other than naked legislative power.”

The plaintiffs write: “The ‘Board’ of the ‘Authority,’ comprising private individuals appointed through a Nominating Committee whose membership is established by the Authority’s own incorporation documents, has not been appointed through the constitutionally required mechanisms for the exercise of executive power.”

To argue their position, the plaintiffs reference such historic texts as The Federalist papers of U.S. founding father, Alexander Hamilton, and “Commentaries on the Laws of England,” by William Blackstone, an English jurist from the 18th century who long suffered terrible gout.

This latest lawsuit constitutes the fourth legal challenge to HISA. Aside from the NHBPA filing, a case filed by the state of Oklahoma in the United States District Court, Eastern Division of Kentucky, is similarly ongoing.

Late last month, Louisiana and West Virginia won a preliminary injunction in federal court aimed at keeping HISA from being implemented in those two states until the Act’s constitutionality gets decided in full.

HISA has since filed motions for stay pending appeal with the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit.

CITY OF LIGHT REPRESENTED BY FIRST TWO WINNERS

About 24 hours before Lane’s End Farm’s **City of Light** (*Quality Road*--Paris Notion, by Dehere) celebrated his first American winner in the form of Ellis Park second-time starter Roja Liger, the first-crop stallion was represented by his first winner when the colt **City of Knowledge** raced away to graduate by daylight in a 5 1/2-furlong allowance over a sloppy strip at Hipodromo Camarero outside of San Juan, Puerto Rico, Saturday, July 30.

Sent off the 4-5 second choice in a field of six, the \$100,000 Keeneland September yearling and \$32,000 OBS March breezer won the break and was soon clear beneath leading jockey Juan Diaz through an opening quarter-mile in :23.24. Opening up on his rivals on the turn, the dark bay carried a five-length advantage into the final eighth of a mile and went on to best favored **Husky Driver** (*Outwork*) by a handy 5 3/4 lengths. The final time was 1:04.71 ([video](#), SC 3).

Bred in Kentucky by Betz/B & K Canetti/J Betz/D J Stables/Graves/GTL, City of Knowledge is the first foal out of three-time winner and \$174,425 earner Mo Knows (**Uncle Mo**), a half-sister to GSW & GISP Payton d’Oro, who was acquired by Bill Betz’s Betz Thoroughbreds for \$285,000 with the colt in utero at the 2019 Keeneland November Sale. Mo Knows is also the dam of a yearling colt by **American Pharoah** and a colt foal by **Justify**.

Roja Liger made it a weekend double for **City of Light** when running out a 1 1/4-length winner of a sloppy Ellis maiden July 31. The bay filly took some nibbles at 9-1 for her July 1 debut at Churchill, but bombed the start and finished well-beaten.

Spectacular in winning the GI Breeders’ Cup Dirt Mile and GI Pegasus World Cup Invitational S., **City of Light** is the sire of 101 foals of racing age and stood the most recent breeding season for \$60,000 at Lane’s End.



The speedy Conagher, just cut down late last out in the Iowa Derby, picked up his first stakes score with a frontrunning success in Monday's Housebuster Overnight H. at Colonial.

Just a \$9,000 Fasig-Tipton October buy, Conagher was privately purchased out of a debut second last spring at Keeneland and placed in two Churchill tries before earning his diploma over the local turf. Sixth following a near seven-month layoff in a Gulfstream grass sprint Feb. 23, the chestnut became a new animal when returned to the dirt, running away to a stunning 6 3/4-length allowance upset at 73-1 Apr. 13 at Keeneland and dusting GISW and Sunday's GII Amsterdam S. hero Gunite (**Gun Runner**) by 5 1/4 lengths June 3 at Churchill. That race earned a 104 Beyer, tied for fourth-highest among sophomores this season, and he was bet down to 1-2 trying two turns for the first time in the July 9 Iowa Derby at Prairie Meadows, dueling on a fast pace and drawing off in the stretch before getting tagged by a closer in the shadow of the wire.

Made a heavy chalk once again getting back to one turn here, Conagher broke alertly from the rail and made the lead without much resistance, being lightly chased by longshot Exxel (**Tale of**

Ekati) and second choice Old Homestead through a :22.37 quarter. The pressure picked up as the top three came to near even terms passing a swift :44.44 half, but Conagher turned for home under confident handling by Joe Rocco, Jr. and discarded Exxel in early stretch. Old Homestead soon came calling while shifting in on his left lead approaching the eighth pole, but Conagher was too good, keeping to his task to prevail fairly comfortably in the end.



SEVEN DAYS: HOMEBRED HEROES

Goodwood's trio of Group 1 races all went the way of owner-breeders, results that are both pleasing to see for the people who invest so much thought and money into the sport over generations, and which also highlight how hard it can be for prospective owners to get into horses at the top level.

This season, 10 European Classics have been won by homebreds, with two of those, Sammarco (Ire) (Camelot {GB}) and Mangoustine (Fr) (Dark Angel {Ire}), having been offered for sale by their breeders but bought back. Only 1,000 Guineas winner Cachet (Ire) (Aclaim {Ire}) and Derby winner Desert Crown (GB) (Nathaniel {Ire}) have actually changed hands in a sale ring, the former for 60,000gns as a breezer and Desert Crown for 280,000gns as a yearling.

The victory of Kyprios (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}) in the Goodwood Cup continued a banner anniversary year for his breeder Eva Bucher-Haefner of Moyglare Stud, who races him in partnership with the Coolmore team as a result of a foal-share agreement. Following the 4-year-old's victory in the Gold Cup at Ascot, and the emphatic Irish 1,000 Guineas success of Homeless Songs (Ire), it brings the tally of 2022 Group 1 wins to three for Moyglare, and counting.

Deauville's four-week bonanza begins on Tuesday with an array of class across four pattern races headed by the G1 Prix Rothschild, which brings together two of Europe's leading fillies in Saffron Beach (Ire) (New Bay {GB}) and Tenebrism (Caravaggio). While the former's stamina for this mile is assured and proven, TDN Rising Star Tenebrism has yet to confirm that the trip is within reach. Saffron Beach, who had already displayed her quality at this level when overpowering her rivals in Newmarket's G1 Sun Chariot S. in October, arguably performed to an even higher standard when making light of a five-pound penalty in Royal Ascot's G2 Duke of Cambridge S. on her 2022 European bow June 15.

For this observer, Baaeed (GB) (*Sea The Stars {Ire}*) has now lit up two seasons, but his absence as a 2-year-old and lack of Classic performance means that he has not quite been taken to the hearts of many as a horse of his calibre should. One of the many irksome things about social media is the 'Yeah, but what did he beat?' brigade, who clearly don't reserve their weary cynicism solely for Baaeed but were out in force last Wednesday after he posted his ninth successive victory.

His trainer William Haggas is all too aware of the likely fleeting nature of Baaeed's tenure at the top, and in his stable. He commented at Goodwood, "I said this to Jim in the paddock, we've got him for two more races after this so let's just enjoy him and make the most of him, because he will most likely go to stud at the end of the year and I'll spend the rest of my training

career trying to find the next one."

And then there was Nashwa (GB) ([Frankel {GB}](#)). What a thrilling filly she has been so far for Imad Al Sagar. This sight of him almost skipping from the grandstand to the winner's enclosure to greet his star at Goodwood on Thursday after the Nassau S. was to underline the pure joy a horse of such quality, particularly a filly, can deliver for a breeder. Nashwa's second Group 1 victory after the Prix de Diane was as much about the future of Blue Diamond Stud and elevation in stature that the eventual inclusion of a Classic winner in the broodmare band can bring. But for now, and next season, she races on, likely heading to Paris next for the Prix de l'Opera, followed by America and the Breeders' Cup Filly & Mare Turf. Godspeed.

Classic Leaders

The French Classic winners Vadeni (Fr) ([Churchill {Ire}](#)) and Nashwa are certainly doing their best to uphold the 3-year-old division this season after disappointments and defections from some of the leading players, including the injured Derby winner Desert Crown, who may or may not be back before the end of the season.

In Germany, Sammarco (Ire) ([Camelot {GB}](#)) looks a special colt for Helmut von Finck and, like Vadeni and Nashwa, he has now added a Group 1 victory over 10 furlongs against his elders to his German Derby success.

Of course it is not all about the Classic winners, and two particularly plucky 3-year-old fillies stood out at Goodwood as being worthy of praise. The hardy George Boughey-trained Oscula (Ire) ([Galileo Gold {GB}](#)) made 10 starts as a juvenile, from as early as May 19, and won the Woodcote at Epsom on her third appearance. She ran right through to the end of October, winning the G3 Prix Six Perfections and earning four

Group placings, including when third in the G1 Prix Marcel Boussac. Not bad for a 4,000-guinea Book 4 purchase, and I must admit when I watched her run last in the gruelling deep dirt of the Saudi Derby in February I thought it might well be the last we saw of the light-framed filly. Happily, I was very wrong indeed.

A good freshen-up through the early spring clearly worked wonders and, along with other notable representatives from her stable, especially Cachet, Oscula has continued to advertise the talents of her young trainer. Since returning to Epsom this Derby weekend to finish second in the Listed Surrey S., the Nick Bradley Racing-owned filly has not been out of the places in black-type contests. Her tally of wins has increased to five, with her late-lunge of a victory in the G3 Oak Tree S. being typical of her never-say-die manner, coming just four days after she was beaten a nose by Jumbly (GB) in a Group 3 at Ascot. Oscula is a lovable wonder.

More sparingly campaigned but still noteworthy is Sandrine (GB) ([Bobby's Kitten](#)), who twice beat Oscula as a 2-year-old when winning the G3 Albany S. and G2 Duchess of Cambridge S. She, too, notched a Group 1 placing that year, taking third in the Cheveley Park S. behind Tenebrism ([Caravaggio](#)) and Flotus (Ire) ([Starspangledbanner {Aus}](#)).

Launched straight into the 1,000 Guineas for her 3-year-old debut, the Lanwades homebred ran a creditable fifth, less than three lengths behind Cachet, and she was a thoroughly deserving winner of the G2 Lennox S. at Goodwood when dropping back to seven furlongs after gaining yet more Group 1 black type in the Falmouth S.

It could be a very exciting Arc weekend for Kirsten Rausing if Alpinista (GB) ([Frankel {GB}](#)) lines up for the main event and Sandrine tackles the G1 Prix de la Foret.

Coventry a Corker in Hindsight

The Coventry S. form is looking jolly good, isn't it? The winner, Bradsell (GB) (Tasleet {GB}), is two-for-two and heads next to the G1 Keeneland Phoenix S. at the Curragh on Saturday for his first appearance since Royal Ascot.

While he's been at home with trainer Archie Watson, the rivals he left toiling in his wake on June 14 have been busily proving themselves here, there and everywhere. Runner-up Persian Force (Ire) (Mehmas {Ire}) has subsequently won the G2 July S., in which he was chased home by Show Respect (Ire) (Showcasing {GB}), who had been 11th in the Coventry.

Third-placed Royal Scotsman (Ire) (**Gleneagles {Ire}**) landed the G2 Richmond S. on Thursday, and Blackbeard (Ire) (**No Nay Never**), who was fourth at Ascot, has won the G2 Prix Robert Papin as well as being beaten a short-head in the G2 Railway S. Unsurprisingly, all four are entered in the G2 Gimcrack S. on August 19, though the G1 Prix Morny two days later will doubtless lure some away, despite the increase in prize-money at York to £250,000 for the Al Basti Equiworld-sponsored race.

Welcome To The Races - Or Not

Some racecourse wandering over the last ten days has included trips to fairly major days at Ascot, Goodwood and Newmarket, as well as to the small National Hunt course of Newton Abbot, and to Vichy for the track's Festival du Galop.

There is nothing more thrilling than seeing some of the best horses in the world up close and being able to study them in the paddock beforehand, but there is also nothing less welcoming than having your bag searched on arrival and then being marched past a sniffer dog before being allowed entry to a racecourse.

This is now the norm for major days at racecourses in the UK, and what a sad indictment it is of British society in general. It is hardly the fault of the racecourse management teams that they have to enforce such measures in the wake of on-track brawls, behaviour which is doubtless exacerbated by alcohol and drugs. But it sets a bad tone for the day, compared to an outing to a country course in midweek, or to the laid-back, family atmosphere one finds at racecourses in France and Germany.

Two particular occasions stand out over the last year, and they really are what British racing should be aiming for in order to halt the dwindling attendance figures and encourage a love of the horse from a young age. At Baden-Baden in September, its unusual walkway of stars from the racecourse back to the winner's enclosure was lined with children patiently waiting for an up-close glimpse of the horses returning post-race. It is far less easy to interact with the horses on some courses in Britain, where people are restricted to certain areas of the racecourse depending on the badge they have.

At Vichy last week there were umpteen small ponies wandering around the racecourse for children to ride or lead, and the demand for them from the many families on course was consistent throughout the evening. Small ponies are what led me, eventually, to a life in racing, and I am sure they would perform the same role for others if given the chance.

Compare that to a recent scene on an English racecourse where a mother with two young children who had put a rug on the floor (no picnic) was asked to pick it up and was moved along from where she was sitting. Picnic rugs (and picnics) abounded in both Germany and France, where it also doesn't cost an arm and a leg just to get through the gates.

The problem of drink and drugs is not exclusive to racing, of course, but it would be very easy for racecourses to fix the latter issue with a bit of imagination and a more welcoming approach to families, not least with reduced entry fees. Who knows how many of those children enjoying pony rides and picnics will return to the races in later life as the owner of a proper horse who wants to book a hospitality box for the day?

Jane Chapple-Hyam has no concerns heading into this contest, which sits perfectly in the 4-year-old's program heading to the Breeders' Cup. "It is a small, competitive field, but I feel she is good enough for the task ahead," she said. "She has turned into a really good traveller now. She was always a little bit sticky as a younger horse, but even when we do go to the Breeders' Cup, I won't be nervous about her travelling. If we have got go on and lead, we will do. She made all in the Sun Chariot and at Ascot, just about."

Painting The Picture

With Saffron Beach the lead performer on form with stamina to go further, it would be no surprise to see William Buick turn this into a test from some way out. Whatever the obvious talent of Ballydoyle's Tenebrism, the fact remains that she has excelled over six furlongs in the G1 Cheveley Park S. and at seven in this venue's G1 Prix Jean Prat July 10 and has been out of the frame when tried at a mile in the 1000 Guineas and G1 Coronation S. Ryan Moore has to ensure he is not too far out of his ground as the British raider applies the pressure and this will provide the definitive test as to whether she stays or not. "She showed at Ascot that she gets a mile and I think we saw a much better filly last time, with the promise of more to come," her rider said in his *betfair* blog.

Hidden Pearls?

Haras de Saint Pair's capable **Pearls Galore (Fr)** (Invincible Spirit {Ire}), who has a trio of pattern-race wins in her native Ireland including the May 22 G2 Lanwades Stud S. at The Curragh, will be prominently placed to add pace pressure and this has been the target for some time according to Paddy Twomey. "It has been the plan all year," he said. "Andreas Putsch's farm is in Deauville and she was born and reared in Deauville, so the plan is to take her back and go and win there." Of the French, Yeguada Centurion's May 8 G2 Prix du Muguet winner **Sibila Spain (Ire)** (**Frankel {GB}**) could add another dimension if reverting to her old front-running tactics, while the Wertheimers' **Goldistyle (Ire)** (Dubawi {Ire}) is a daughter of Goldikova (Ire) (Anabaa) who turned this into her own private procession between 2008 and 2011. She has to improve markedly on her latest fourth in the G3 Prix Bertrand du Breuil at Chantilly June 19, where she held every chance but weakened late.

A Fast Start

Deauville's opening card begins with the G3 Prix de Psyche Sky Sports Racing for 3-year-old fillies over 10 furlongs, where Andre Fabre holds a strong hand including Ecurie Ama Zingteam's **Hidden Dimples (Ire)** (**Frankel {GB}**). Impressive when beating the subsequent G1 Prix de Diane runner-up La Parisienne (Fr) (**Zarak {Fr}**) in ParisLongchamp's Listed Prix de la Seine over 11 furlongs May 15, she was a well-beaten fourth trying a mile and a half on soft ground in the G3 Prix de Royaumont at Chantilly June 5. Next up is the G3 Prix Six Perfections Sky Sports Racing over seven furlongs for the juvenile fillies, where Flaxman Stables' July 10 Listed Prix Roland de Chambure runner-up **Terrestrial (Ire)** (**Kingman {GB}**) encounters Rashit Shaykhutdinov's **TDN Rising Star Gain It (GB)** (De Treville {GB})

who impressed with a seven-length success at Saint-Cloud July 16, and Avatara SA & Haras D'Etream's similarly-unbeaten **Sea The Lady (Fr)** (Sea The Moon {Ger}). In the six-furlong G3 Darley Prix de Cabourg also for the 2-year-olds, Ballydoyle look for further success with their strong crop with the July 17 G2 Prix Robert Papin runner-up **The Antarctic (Ire)** (Dark Angel {Ire}). Jean-Claude Seroul's June 5 Listed Prix la Fleche scorer and July 10 Listed Prix Yacowlef runner-up **Wootton City (Fr)** (**Wootton Bassett {GB}**) is among his rivals and she is three pounds better off with Guy Pariente's **Sivana (Fr)** (Goken {Fr}), who beat her by a head in that five-furlong contest.

KERRIN MCEVOY BACK IN EUROPEAN CLASSIC ACTION

A treble winner of the Melbourne Cup, McEvoy joins Christophe Lemaire, Takeshi Yokoyama and Jason Collett on the Rest of the World team for Saturday's unique fixture at Ascot, which welcomes back McEvoy's former Godolphin colleague Frankie Dettori to the Shergar Cup for the first time in six years.

The Australian spent four years riding in Britain, predominantly for Saeed Bin Suroor, from 2004, during which time he won the St Leger on Rule Of Law, as well as the G1 St James's Palace S. on Shamardal and G1 Prix Jacques Le Marois aboard Dubawi (Ire).

His most recent big-race success in his home country came in May in the G1 Doomben Cup when riding Huetor (Fr) for Peter and Paul Snowden.

The rider confirmed by text message as he was about to board a flight from Sydney to the UK on Monday that he will also return to European Classic action on Sunday when he takes the ride in the German Oaks equivalent on Toskana Belle (Fr) for Andreas Wohler. The German trainer previously teamed up with the owners of the filly, Australian Bloodstock, to win the 2014 Melbourne Cup with Protectionist (Ger), who sired Sunday's G1 Grosser Dallmayr Preis-Bayerisches Zuchtrennen runner-up Amazing Grace (Ger).

Toskana Belle, a daughter of Shamalgan (Fr) was third in the G3 Diana Trial after winning the Listed Henkel-Stutenpreis at Dusseldorf in May. She is currently around 14/1 for the Preis der Diana, with the Aidan O'Brien-trained Toy (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}) co-favourite with Gestut Schlenderhan's Mountaha (Ger) (Giuliani {Ger}) at 9/2.

THE PLATINUM QUEEN POSSIBLE FOR NUNTHORPE

The Platinum Queen (Ire) (Cotai Glory {GB}), impressive winner of Goodwood's Alice Keppel Fillies' Conditions S. July 27, is being considered for the G1 Coolmore Nunthorpe S. at York Aug. 19. Campaigned by Middleham Park Racing, the juvenile would have to be supplemented to the five-furlong test. Sent off the 5-6 favorite in her latest start, the Richard Fahey-trained filly came home a four-length winner over nine rivals, setting a new track record for 2-year-olds while recording a faster time than the winner of the G3 Molecomb S. on the same card.

"We were quite impressed with how Trillium (GB) (**No Nay Never**) went about her business in the Molecomb, the jury was out on whether we should or we shouldn't have run in that race after [her win]," said Middleham Park's Tom Palin. "There were a few people thinking we'd done the wrong thing but she's quite a forward-going filly. She's not buzzy, she doesn't sweat or anything like that, but for her development we felt it was best to give her a slightly quieter day in slightly calmer waters to get another win under her belt."

In addition to the Nunthorpe, Palin indicated the Listed Roses S. is also an option during York's Ebor meeting. Hollie Doyle is slated to ride.

"She will definitely go to York, the Roses is on the Saturday, the listed five-furlong race. I imagine she'd be even-money or maybe a bit shorter than that if she went there. It is still a definite option."

"We will probably leave it as late as we dare, just so we know how the filly is. We'll make the decision and speak to the syndicate when we've got all the information at our disposal and we feel it's something we want to take a chance on."

"It could be quite sporting to roll the dice and give it a go. She has speed but it's not just speed, she's classy as well."

"He's been a good horse and I thought his [28-1] price was a bit disrespectful to him," said Joseph O'Brien. "Declan [McDonogh] gave him a lovely ride and he handled the drop back to six really well. He's in at Tipperary on Friday, but I'd say we'll probably go to the Curragh for the Sportsman sales race. This is a huge pot and it's fantastic. The race is very well supported every year with such a big field and is always a very strong race. State Of Rest was

fourth in it a couple of years ago and everyone always runs the horses that are qualified. Credit to Ballyhane, the EBF and everyone who puts the money into it. There is no doubt the second is a stakes filly and you need a stakes horse to even be placed in it." Voce Del Palio, the second straight winner of this contest by his sire (by Dansili {GB}), is the sixth of eight live foals and lone winner produced by Caption (GB) (Motivator {GB}), herself out of an unraced full-sister to four pattern-race winners headed by G1 Haydock Sprint Cup-winning sire Danehill (Danzig) and GII Arlington Classic-winning sire Eagle Eyed (Danzig). The April-foaled homebred bay, whose fourth dam Spring Adieu (Buckpasser) is kin to Northern Dancer, is a half to a yearling filly by **Caravaggio** and a weanling colt by **Starspangledbanner**. Making continued headway under pressure in the straight, the 7-2 chance gained a narrow lead approaching the furlong marker and was ridden out in the latter stages to defeat Warrior Lion (GB) (Roaring Lion) by a comfortable 3 1/4 lengths. "He's a big baby still, but we're delighted with him," commented Aidan O'Brien. "He spooked at the road [crossing], he was very green and babyish, but he's a lovely horse. He's a fine big fella, we'll go gently with him and give him a little bit of time now. We couldn't be happier with him." 'VINNIE' CLAIMS CHAMPION SIRE TITLE



I Am Invincible | Yarraman Park

With the 2021/22 season now behind us, we take a look at the Premiership winners, both equine and human, across the various categories in both Australia and New Zealand.

After a lengthy and highly entertaining battle with Coolmore Stud's headline stallion So You Think (NZ), Yarraman Park resident I Am Invincible officially claimed a maiden Champion Australian Sire title, on Sunday, after the final race of the season was run and won. Meanwhile, across the ditch, Waikato Stud's Savabeel was crowned New Zealand's Champion Sire for an eighth consecutive season.

Not only was it a first for 'Vinnie', it was new ground for Yarraman Park's Mitchell family and a richly deserved reward after five decades in the industry.

Having finished second the previous four seasons (behind Snitzel in 2017/18, 2018/19 and 2019/2020, then Written Tycoon in 2020/21), I Am Invincible finally went one better.

In 2021/22, from 359 runners, he had 185 individual winners (the most by any sire) combine for 314 wins (also the most of all sires). His progeny amassed \$19,860,096 in prizemoney, which is \$546,341 more than second-placed So You Think, with his star performer being Home Affairs, who took out the G1 Black Caviar Lightning H. and G1 Coolmore Stud S. He finished with 17 stakes winners and 25 stakes wins, and Lombardo and Marabi joined Home Affairs as elite-level winners in Australia.

By comparison, in 2020/21, I Am Invincible had 358 runners, with 208 winners tallying 335 wins. He had 12 stakes winners and 17 stakes wins (the same as Premiership winner Written Tycoon), with Libertini his best-performed progeny; she amassed \$944,000 of Vinnie's season's earnings, which was \$15,741,201.

So You Think had 298 runners in Australia, with his 250 wins coming from 149 individual winners. He had 12 stakes winners and 18 stakes wins. Think It Over was his best performer, with the Queen Elizabeth S. winner bringing in \$5,615,000 of the stallion's \$19,313,755.

Arrowfield Stud's multiple Champion Sire Snitzel had another outstanding season, finishing with 324 runners, 163 winners, 237 wins, 18 stakes winners and 26 stakes wins (both season-high marks), and \$17,898,452 in earnings. G1 Moir S. hero Wild Ruler contributed \$1,083,400.

If there was any doubt Savabeel was an all-time great of the breeding industry, surely that argument has been put to bed. Savabeel enjoyed another phenomenal season. In addition to his eighth-straight New Zealand crown, the now 21-year-old finished 10th in the Australian Sires' Premiership.

In New Zealand, Savabeel had 118 runners, 48 winners, 74 wins, eight stakes winners and 12 stakes wins, for earnings of NZ\$3,392,269. Noverre (NZ) was his star performer, with the 2000 Guineas winner earning NZ\$347,500.

Savabeel also had the most Group 1 winners in Australasia last season, with Mo'unga (NZ), Probabeel (NZ), The Perfect Pink (NZ), Noverre (NZ), The Chosen One (NZ) and Savy Yong Blonk (NZ) all scoring in top company.

The ill-fated Tavistock (NZ) finished second, NZ\$549,109 behind Savabeel, while third-placed Burgundy (NZ) was NZ\$1,386,169 adrift of the champion.

Redoute's and O'Reilly Deliver Yet Again

The legendary Redoute's Choice claimed another Champion Broodmare Sire gong, his third from the past four seasons. The superstar tallied \$29,491,158, knocking off his arch-rival Encosta De Lago by \$2,880,989. Incredibly, that duo has run the quinella in this category the past five seasons.

The great Zabeel (NZ) (\$21,440,697) rounded out the top three.

In New Zealand, O'Reilly (NZ) captured the title for a third time, having won it in 2016/17 and 2018/19. He finished with NZ\$4,029,761 in prizemoney, with Volksraad (GB) second with \$2,476,393 and Pins third with NZ\$2,186,806.

Russian Revolution, Almanzor Lead the Way

Newgate Farm's Russian Revolution kept churning out the winners in 2021/22, and his consistency was rewarded with the Leading Australia First Season Sire title.

Russian Revolution had 15 winners, four more than second-placed Hellbent, and 18 wins, four more than second-placed The Mission, with earnings finishing up at \$1,840,685. Two-time winner Russian Conquest (\$582,850) contributed the most to that figure.

Gold Standard, who will call Widden Stud in Victoria home, finished runner-up to Russian Revolution, predominantly due to the exploits of star filly Sheeza Belter. She won the lion's share of her sire's earnings of \$1,539,565.

Aquis Farm resident The Mission rounded out the top three with \$887,645 in prizemoney.

In New Zealand, Almanzor made it a seasonal double, claiming the title with NZ\$701,935. He held a comfortable edge over runner-up, Little Avondale Stud's Time Test (GB) and Derryn, who resides at Grangewilliam Stud.

Pike, Waller Reign Supreme

Western Australian hoop William Pike, who relocated to the eastern seaboard during the season, won the Australian Jockeys' title with 189 wins. Clint Johnston-Porter (184) was second and Chris Parnham (162) third. Two jockeys surpassed 100 metro wins--James McDonald (131) and Chris Parnham (108).

Chris Waller was once again the pre-eminent trainer in the land, his 352 winners earning him another National Trainers' Premiership. Ciaran Maher and Dave Eustace ran second with 321 wins, while Kris Lees placed third with 172.5. Waller's 270 metro victories earned him honours in that category, with Maher/Eustace (129) once again having to settle for second.
