



MAGE RETIRES TO AIRDRIE STUD

Mage (Good Magic--Puca, by Big Brown), this year's Grade I Kentucky Derby winner, has been retired from racing and will begin his stallion career at Airdrie Stud for the 2024 breeding season, announced his connections in a press release Monday.

Racing for the ownership group of OGMA Investments, LLC, CMNWLTH, Sterling Racing, LLC and Ramiro Restrepo and trained by the father-son team of Gustavo Delgado and Gustavo Delgado, Jr., Mage's victory in Kentucky Derby 149 stands as the highlight of a whirlwind 3-year-old campaign that saw him break his maiden in his racing debut on Jan. 28 and win the Derby in just his fourth career start less than 100 days later. In historical context, only Justify (2018) and Apollo (1882) won the Derby without the benefit of starting as a 2-year-old, and Mage matched Justify's record feat by winning the race having competed only three times previously. **Cont. p3**

A CASE APART, CLAY GETS THE LAST LAUGH

He'd given himself five years to make it onto Saturday Night Live. But it had now been six years, and Case Clay could see where he might be headed if he wasn't careful. Stick around too much longer, and he could end up like the guy in the comedy club, sitting there on his own every night with a drink at the end of the bar.

"He was a fixture, and a beloved fixture," Clay stresses.
"Sometimes he'd be on stage with you, performing, but the rest of the time you'd see him back there in the same seat, clapping or critiquing. At one point he did get hired for a writing job, but he came back after a season, said he'd missed it too much. And that's fine: each to their own, right? But we were all, like, 24 and he was getting on for twice that. I was married, I knew I wanted to have a family. And I just couldn't see myself supporting kids sitting at the end of that bar, never having made the big time."

Clay and his buddies had started out in the graveyard slots, 7 p.m. and nobody there, and meanwhile he was doing all manner of day jobs to keep the dream alive. These included a couple of years as a management trainee at Arlington Park, albeit the only time he got anywhere near Mr. Duchossois was when manning the elevator for him on Elvis Day, duly equipped with shades, slicked hair and sideburns. But nor, equally, did he then imagine that he would ever get any closer to the business for which anyone--anyone other than Clay himself, maybe-could see that he had been born. **Cont. p4**

Mage's defining win came on the heels of a narrow defeat at

the hands of Juvenile Champion Forte in the Grade I Florida Derby and preceded a runner-up effort in the Grade I Haskell Invitational and third-place finish in the Grade I Preakness S. He retires as North America's leading 3-year old earner with more than \$2,500,000 in 2023 earnings, a figure that trails only Breeders' **Cup Classic winner White** Abarrio among all North American runners. The son of leading young sire Good Magic and Broodmare of the Year candidate Puca will stand his

first season at an announced stud fee of \$25,000.

Mage had several works this fall at The Thoroughbred Center in Lexington, most recently a five-furlong move in 1:02.20 on Oct. 22. But Gustavo Delgado said that a scan revealed `the beginning of a small issue' that would compromise his


four-year-old career.

"Mage has been a great blessing in our family's life," said

trainer Gustavo Delgado, Sr. "He was special for so many reasons and he gave all of us that were blessed to be associated with him the greatest days you could ever have in racing. He was so brilliantly talented and an incredible horse to work with, as his mind and determination were as exceptional as his abilities. We were planning to have a championship 4-year-old campaign with him, but our routine end-of-the-season scan revealed that he had the beginnings of a small issue that would require us to miss his early-

season goals. He has been so good to us and owes us nothing. It is time for him to begin his next career and we look forward to winning the big races with his sons and daughters in the years ahead. He will not be a good sire, he will be a GREAT sire."

"It is an incredible privilege for our team to be able to bring Mage into the Airdrie stallion barn," said Airdrie's Bret Jones. "To be able to stand a Kentucky Derby winner is so extremely special and we will always be grateful to the Delgado family and Mage's ownership group for giving us this opportunity. The great work they did with Mage really can't be overstated. Not only were they able to win the Kentucky Derby less than 100 days after his career debut, but I really believe they put together the strongest season that any 3-year-old colt had this year. Mage retires as the leading 3-year-old earner in America and has won or placed in four Grade I races this year. No other leading three-year-old has done that more than twice. He ran the highest dirt Beyer Speed Figure of any 3-year-old beyond a mile and his 105 Beyer from the Derby is the highest of any winner in the last 15 years. He is a very special horse and, when combined with being by one of the hottest young sires in the world and out of a mare that has the look of being truly important, has all the credentials to be a very special stallion."



For it was his father Robert, of course, who founded Three Chimneys Farm in 1972. Clay was born the following year and, to any inherited intuition, he could add endless horse lore absorbed every time the family sat down to dinner. But while he did take vacation jobs on the farm as a young man, that had been sheer convenience. There had been no thought of following in his father's footsteps.

Instead, while his fellow economics students at DePauw were all putting on suits to interview for management consultancy, Clay had allowed his imagination to be captured by a night out in Chicago with wife-to-be Lorin in 1996.



Though his stage experience to that point had been virtually nil, Clay started out with classes at Second City--past training ground for the likes of John Belushi, Chris Farley and Tina Fey--and landed with a project named Improv Olympic. He found himself routinely on stage with Seth Meyers and Jason Sudeikis, with whom he has lasting friendships. Gradually the young livewires worked their way up the bill until cracking the prime 10.30 p.m. slot. Always a pretty tough crowd, in Chicago, but at least there was now a crowd.

"By random luck I just happened to be put into this group with these incredibly talented people that are on TV now," Clay says. "I remember coming back to Lorin and I'm like, 'These guys are really good.' My grandmother was very funny, so maybe I got a little bit of that. But obviously I'm not that funny, because here I am sitting in Kentucky!"

That same modesty is also referenced if you look Clay up on the Improv Wiki database. "He's funnier than you," someone has written. "But too nice to say it."

One way or another, it was fun. "Lots of adrenaline," Clay acknowledges. "You're getting home at midnight and you're buzzing, your heart's racing, you can't get to sleep. With improv, the nice thing is that you're all up there together. If you're dying, you're dying together. You're looking at each other like, 'This is going horrible.' **Cont. p5**

He continued, "But standup, you're up there alone. I didn't do a lot, but when I did, I'd make sure I filled the crowd with my friends! But then there are nights where you just kill it, and it's a great rush."

But there was always that guy reliably perched at the end of the bar, night after night: a flesh-and-blood warning from a future he could still evade. Clay wisely took his cue. Having done so, he's entitled to tire of being asked about a walk of life he abandoned nearly 20 years ago. At the same time, however, many of the skills honed in those days still serve him well in the niche he has meanwhile carved in our community.

Take Clay's recent appearance on center stage at the Keeneland November Sale. Not because there was anything remotely improvised about the sale-topping deal he secured for Puca (Big Brown), carrying a sibling to GI Kentucky Derby winner Mage (Good Magic). True, there had been something a little surreal about showing her again, 90 minutes after she left the ring unsold, under the archway light in the largely deserted barn complex. There was actually something magical, to the handful present, in seeing such an important mare in this moment of quiet, animal calm, putting her head down to graze on a rope shank while her future was settled. But the point is that you can't create the opportunity Clay did, in ultimately selling her to John Stewart at \$2.9 million, without first having positioned your horse, and your clients, by much unseen diligence before and during the sale. And that was pretty much true of comedy, as well: wit without professionalism will never be more than the guy who makes cracks at the bar.

"Yeah, I suppose this business is about combining improvisation with a lot of thinking, a lot of deliberation," Clay reflects. "You're always going to have some bumps in the road. But when all's said and done, I'm really happy that we stuck to our guns, because she's such a nice mare. Not many horses RNA and then sell for more outside the ring. That mare ended up well sold and well bought. If Dornoch [Mage's 2-year-old brother] wins the [GII] Remsen, she'll surely be Broodmare of the Year. So [vendors] Grandview Equine got what they wanted, and so did John Stewart."

A gratifying start, then, to this latest dimension to Clay's Thoroughbred Management portfolio. For in making his debut as a consignor, with two of the best mares in the catalogue, he had also seen Dalika (Ger) (Protectionist {Ger}) confirm herself in his affections by fetching \$1.65 million. In the process, she doubled her racetrack earnings for the clients on whose behalf Clay had purchased her privately from Germany four years previously.

A few days later, Clay was back in the headlines from the other side of the fence, signing consecutive \$350,000 dockets that shared top billing at the Horses of Racing Age Sale: a mare to send to Australia, and a juvenile for Wathnan Racing. In bookending trade at Keeneland, then, he had offered an instructive snapshot of the diversifying services he has been able to offer since going solo 11 months ago--and a measure of the way he has adapting a flair for teamwork to an environment barely less colorful and unpredictable than the stage.

In Chicago, approaching 30, Clay had gradually been drawn into office jobs that drew more on his college training. And then, while copywriting ads for retirement homes, he kept reading about small advertising agencies selling up for big money to the Leo Burnetts of the world. At that time, Clay didn't know how to start a business. But he knew a man who did.

So he called his father and asked to pick his brains.

"And for a year, nine o'clock every Saturday morning, he said, 'You come up with the questions, and I'll try and answer them,'" Clay recalls. "And every example he gave was about the horse business, and it just became more and more interesting."

Lorin happens to have family in Lexington and, when they came home one Easter, Clay's father showed them a farm he was looking to buy: Big Sink, now the yearling division of Three Chimneys. On their tour, they went into the dilapidated main house.

"So on the drive back to Chicago, for about three hours I was just thinking," Clay recalls. "And then I said, 'Would you ever want to live in Lexington?"

They renovated the house, and Clay belatedly started doing all the things he might easily have done a decade earlier. He had a latent foundation of knowledge, of course.

But now he filled that out with stints at the Irish National Stud and Arrowfield Stud in Australia. By 2004, he was ready to start under Braxton Lynch in the sales division of Three Chimneys.

But the twists and turns of his path, to that point, would continue even after this homecoming. Clay had assumed that Three Chimneys would remain a family business. In the event, however, his father sold the farm in two phases to the Borges-Torrealba family. (Grandview Equine, of course, is one of the projects that has engaged him since.) Clay stayed on, but was grateful to the new owners for permitting him to serve outside clients. Over time these have proliferated to the point that last December--albeit he still represents Gun Runner for Three Chimneys in Japan and Australia--Clay set up shop on his own.

"It's a really great group," he says of his clientele. "And the fun part of it is that I can be selling yesterday, and shopping today. It's compartmentalized. After Dalika sold I was having a beer with [his client on the mare] Paul Varga, and someone came up to me and said, 'I just bought this weanling, can you insure it for me?' Everybody has different lines of business. We're all working in multiple buckets. And nowadays, thankfully, we have so much data coming to us. It's a completely different world from when Dad started the farm. Things are happening all over the world that we can see in real time, all the time, and people are very sharp. You don't want to miss anything."

And one thing leads to another. Last year someone called Clay about a mare entered for the Magic Millions Sale: instead of paying for an advert, he wanted Clay ("You know everybody...") just to make a few calls so that she would be on people's radar.




And then one of those calls, in incidentally alerting a contact to his new availability, opened another door. That was typical of how various silos can support each other.

Naturally Clay feels a profound debt to his father, as a conduit to such relationships. One way or another, moreover, there's evidently some real creative flair in the pedigree. (Besides Clay's own adventures in comedy, his sister is a novelist.) There was a degree of trepidation, of course, about going solo. He has a daughter in college, after all. But Clay is hugely gratified by the progress he has made inside a year, and can now also look back on his consigning debut with relief, as well.

But then that had itself emerged organically from an expertise he has long established: Dalika herself had been a private purchase, while completing the Puca deal ultimately hinged on the same practiced instinct for bringing parties together. You could almost say that it became just a public variation on the private market Clay knows so well. **Cont. p7**

"So often in horse deals, you find yourself thinking at the 11th hour that this isn't going to happen," he remarks. "And then it all falls into place and it gets done. The whole experience was great, a lot of fun. Many thanks go to Solis/Litt for all things Puca, from start to finish, to the team at the barn, to Runnymede Farm and Trackside Farm. As a consignor, I'm thinking of myself like a pop-up shop. If I don't have anything in my camp next November, then I'll just keep my sign in the shed behind my house. But if I do, then I'll put it up and keep vertically integrating."

As things stand, he certainly doesn't envisage expanding to yearlings. "I put clients' yearlings with consignors, I do business with consignors, I insure for consignors," he notes. "So I'm just trying to pick my spots and keep those relationships good. Also, selling yearlings is a grind."

That said, the whole appeal of this game is that you never know what opportunities might lurk around the next corner. All Clay knows for sure is that there can never be complacency, whether about his own business or the sport overall.

"I have such admiration for people who bear the overheads of a farm," he says. "That's stressful. I just have an office and an accountant that helps me. But the most coveted, most valuable thing we have in Kentucky is the land. So I have great appreciation and respect for people who own that land. Because they're carrying it forward for the next generation.

"There's always going to be another shortsighted builder trying to make a buck. Once that land goes, we're Columbus, Ohio; we're like any other town. So that's critical. And then safety, that's also paramount; and having a clean sport. And we have to keep up with the rest of the world, as well. Learn from them. Australia's booming. Japan is incredible. And meanwhile we keep shrinking. What's it going to look like here, in 20 years? Hopefully this business is still here. Because it's a great game." In fairness, Clay must be pretty well equipped for nearly any eventuality, if he can stand up to the hecklers of Chicago. And to go from RNA to sale topper, either side of sunset, on one level was just another test of livewire adaptability. But everyone still had to be confident where they stood.

"Oh, for sure, you had to think on your feet in Chicago--and everybody, in this business, is a pro at that." he says. "Horse racing is a difficult business. Just about the only one you could find that's harder is show business. But none of what transpired is about me. It's about horses, their owners and their connections. I'm lucky to have grown up in the business, to know a lot of good people, and I'm grateful to those who have helped me along the way: they know who they are. It's not easy. But you're only ever a conduit. And then it just goes back to what feels right; to how you earn people's trust, and keep it."

DIRT GENES PUT TURF STAR UP TO THE COMMERCIAL MARK by Chris McGrath



The commercial travails of turf stallions in Kentucky have become notorious. But there are a couple of aligning trends that give **Up to the Mark** every right to make a breakthrough when he starts his new career at Lane's End in 2024.

For one thing, there appears to be a growing consensus that opportunities for grass horses will only increase over the years ahead—even as those coming round to that opinion find their options much reduced by the loss of Kitten's Joy and English Channel. At the same time, Up to the Mark is blatantly entitled to help breeders rediscover the reality that stallions are far more adaptable, in terms of racing surface, than has lately been allowed by characterisation of their genes or racing careers.

For the fact is that Up to the Mark has already confounded such prescriptive thinking once. On pedigree, you would say that he was born for dirt. True, his sire Not This Time is heir to a mighty influence for versatility as well as class and toughness, in Giant's Causeway. But both Not This Time, in his brief career, and his half-brother Liam's Map (Unbridled's Song) harnessed those attributes to the Tartan Farm dash condensed by their mother's inbreeding to Ta Wee (Intentionally). Up to the Mark's own first three dams, moreover, are by sterling dirt brands in Ghostzapper, Capote and Fappiano.

Sure enough, albeit not until he was three, Up to the Mark began his career with a debut sprint success on dirt at Saratoga. Yet it was only after four subsequent reverses on the main track that a light came on, with his switch to turf at Gulfstream at the start of this year. He never looked back, just finishing too late when third on his Grade I debut but then running up a brilliant hat-trick at that level over nine, 10 and eight furlongs respectively.

In the last of those, he nailed Master Of The Seas (Ire) (Dubawi {Ire}) at Keeneland. The runner-up then served as an eloquent proxy when winning the GI Breeders' Cup Mile, while Up to the Mark himself instead explored uncharted territory at Santa Anita in a vintage edition of the Turf. It's fairly uncommon for domestic turf horses to measure up to the best of the specialists from over the water, but you could argue that only an audacious rail ride, on a truly accomplished European champion, sufficed to thwart the finish of Up to the Mark.

This, then, was one of those rare occasions where our "second sucks" sport actually thought more of a horse for losing. It's hard to conceive of a scenario where he might have gained more from the Breeders' Cup without winning. His latest victim at a mile showed the merit of that form in one discipline; while Up to the Mark himself, pushing boundaries in a fashion you seldom see nowadays, reiterated his sheer class even as he introduced breeders to latent reserves of stamina.

Having announced his recruitment before the Breeders' Cup, then, Lane's End could hardly have been more gratified by the way things turned out.

"I think the thing that attracted us to Up to the Mark in the beginning was just the dominant way that he won his Grade I at Churchill Downs at a mile and eighth," said the farm's Bill Farish "And then he came back in the Manhattan and did the same thing. I mean, to draw away from those Grade I fields the way he did really appealed to me. Being by Not This Time, and having so much dirt in his pedigree, he showed what a brilliant turf horse he was. And then to take a summer break, and come back and win backing up to a mile in a Grade I at Keeneland was just phenomenal.

"And then everybody saw what he did in the Breeders' Cup, in maybe the best rated race in the world this year. To run against that field, and really run a winning race, and only get beat by a brilliant ride by Ryan Moore, I think the Breeders' Cup did a lot to enhance his reputation. Because he would have been very competitive in the Mile, he'd have been right there. So to have that kind of versatility, and carry that speed the way he did, I just couldn't be more excited about him.

"There was no downside to running him in the mile-and-a-half race. If he did it, it was historic: to win [Grade Is] at a mile, mile and eighth, mile and a quarter, mile and a half. And I still think that if the race was a mile and a quarter, he wins it."

Moreover that talent is underpinned by a physique that always set the horse apart.

"So to get him at the farm and see his physical presence more critically has been very encouraging," says Farish. "He was a \$450,000 yearling in that first crop of Not this Time, so before they were fashionable. I think he's also a very intelligent horse,

and hopefully he'll be passing all those attributes on. He's still maturing, but has a beautiful head on him and really a great presence: just that physique that yearling buyers love. He really has that fast look to him, and great shape to his top line. I think breeders are going to love what they see as he lets down and continues to mature."

Farish acknowledges the incongruous development of the horse's track career, given his pedigree. Remember that the second dam Capote Belle won signature dirt dashes in the GI Test S. and GII Prioress S., though interestingly another of her daughters by Ghostzapper (i.e. a full sister to Up to the Mark's dam) secured her stakes success/graded-stakes placing on turf. Unsurprising, then, to find that a daughter by Storm Cat (a sireline obviously extended by Up to the Mark himself) should have produced a grass runner as gifted as Catapult (dual Grade II winner, GI Breeders' Cup Mile runner-up) when paired with the chlorophyll-trademarked Kitten's Joy.

"I think it surprised everybody a little bit, just how good he is on the turf," Farish remarks. "But he really is a world-class horse. He definitely looks very much like a dirt type, but it's kind of hard to say that, having watched him run on the turf. That must be what we should be looking for, for a turf type!

"He's got dirt top and bottom, so I think he's going to be a very versatile sire. That's one of the things that really attracted us to him. But really, I was taken by his dominance, just by his raw ability. And I think you've got to start with that, if you're going to have a great stallion."

The clincher, for enlightened breeders, will be that his turf accomplishments arguably come at a perverse commercial price. For \$25,000, in the current environment, represents a pretty restrained pitch for a horse of incontestably elite caliber.

"Yeah, there was quite a bit of debate about it," Farish admits. "Because, you know, he's a world-class horse by a meteoric young sire. To start at \$25,000, when he's a three-time Grade I winner and top Breeders' Cup horse, is great value for breeders. We're so excited about what he can do, starting out at that fee, because everybody can get to him.

"I think breeders are going to get very good value, because of the turf aspect. But pure, raw ability-wise, this is a phenomenal horse. I just think it's really a great opportunity to breed to a horse of this quality."

This farm, of course, has a laudable history in terms of breaking down barriers in the transatlantic gene pool. And here's a horse with mileage far beyond the domestic market.

"I think he really will appeal to European breeders," Farish says. "I always go back to Kingmambo, because he was such an amazing stallion, probably the most versatile that we've ever had. He won Group 1s in England, Ireland, France, Japan and the U.S. and, very early in his career, [got horses] on dirt and turf. And I'm hoping this is another Kingmambo.

"There's plenty of speed in the pedigree and I think his turn of foot is really what sets him apart from a lot of American horses. He really had that tremendous burst, and could deliver it at [any distance]. And that's just so exciting to me. He really is a full package."

WHITE ABARRIO TO TRAIN ON IN 2024

C2 Racing Stable's **White Abarrio** (Race Day), last-out winner of the GI Breeders' Cup Classic at Santa Anita Nov. 4, will be kept in training for a 5-year-old campaign in 2024, according to a post on X made Monday afternoon.

A \$7,500 OBS January short yearling turned \$40,000 OBS March breezer, the 2022 GI Florida Derby winner was originally trained by Saffie Joseph, Jr., but was turned over to trainer Richard Dutrow, Jr. this past summer. A longshot third, beaten 3 3/4 lengths behind Cody's Wish (Curlin) in the GI Hill 'n' Dale Metropolitan H. June 10, the gray colt caused a 10-1 upset in the GI Whitney S. at Saratoga, scoring by 6 1/4 lengths. Dutrow, Jr. elected to train White Abarrio up to the Classic, arriving in California over a month ahead of the race, and the decision paid dividends when White Abarrio held off Derma Sotogake (Jpn) (Mind Your Biscuits) by a length as the 13-5 favorite.

Clint Cornett, the managing partner of C2 Racing, believes the best lies ahead for White Abarrio.

"We really think he is just coming into his own right now as a late 4-year-old and that he'll be even better at five," he said. "He's sound, there are no issues whatsoever and so it makes sense to see what he can do on the racetrack."

Cornett said that White Abarrio remains on the grounds at Santa Anita and would likely ship down to Gulfstream Park in mid-December. The GI Pegasus World Cup Invitational, a race in which White Abarrio was sixth at 6-1 last year, is a possible starting point for 2024, as is the \$20-million G1 Saudi Cup. Cornett said that White Abarrio would train up to one or the other of those spots, but would not run in both.

Over the course of his three years at the track, White Abarrio has amassed a record of 7-1-3 from 15 starts for earnings of \$4,946,350.

MCMAHON ANNOUNCES 2024 FEES, STALLION SHOW

The five stallions standing at McMahon of Saratoga Thoroughbreds will be shown to the public at the farm's annual stallion show to be held Saturday, Dec. 9 from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. ET. A season drawing will be held for each of the sires.

New to the Empire State for 2024 is **Bucchero** (Kantharos), a leading second-crop sire who has relocated from Pleasant Acres Stallions in Ocala, Florida. He will stand his first New York season at \$7,500 alongside **Solomini** (Curlin), the leading freshman sire outside of Kentucky, and leading sire **Central Banker** (Speightstown), who will also cover mares at an advertised fee of \$7,500.

Also new to the MOST roster is **Provocateur** (Into Mischief), who will stand for an introductory fee of \$5,000, while **Redesdale** (Speightstown) is offered at \$2,500.

HISA RELEASES DATA DISCLOSURE POLICY

The Horseracing Integrity and Safety Authority (HISA) said that despite not being subject to the Freedom of Information Act, they will release certain data beginning in the first quarter of 2024. The news of their formal data disclosure policy, which includes the routine public release of data collected through its Racetrack Safety (RS) and Anti-Doping and Medication Control (ADMC) Programs, as well as a process through which individuals may request additional records from HISA, was announced in a press release Monday morning.

The release reads:

"The Horseracing Integrity and Safety Authority, Inc. ("HISA") is a private, independent, self-regulatory, nonprofit corporation, and, therefore, is not subject to the Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA") or state and local open records laws. However, as the organization charged with developing and implementing a horseracing anti-doping and medication control ("ADMC") program and a racetrack safety ("RS") program for covered horses, covered persons, and covered horseraces, HISA believes that sharing certain data and information collected in connection with these programs is integral to improving the safety and integrity of Thoroughbred racing.

As part of HISA's commitment to public reporting, HISA intends to release certain data under the RS program on a quarterly basis beginning in the first quarter of 2024. Going forward, an annual report will be released in Q1 of each calendar year that presents new data from Q4 of the previous year, along with a full analysis of the previous calendar year's complete data set. Quarterly reports will also be issued in Q2, Q3 and Q4 of each year, which will present new data from the previous quarter. Information relating to HISA's ADMC program will be released by the independent enforcement agency of the ADMC program, the Horseracing Integrity & Welfare Unit (HIWU), in accordance with a similar disclosure schedule.

HISA's initial release of information in the first quarter of 2024 will include data for all of calendar year 2023 concerning equine fatalities, registrations, fines assessed, track accreditation, and riding crop violations. Additional RS metrics will be released as HISA's level of confidence in reporting by Covered Persons and the ability to track and aggregate data improves. Beginning in 2024, HISA will also start regularly sharing meeting minutes for meetings of the HISA Board and its Standing Committees.

In addition to HISA's regular reporting, beginning in the first quarter of 2024, individual requests for information may be submitted by contacting Mandy Minger, Director of Communications (mandy.minger@hisaus.org, 917-846-8804). HISA will respond to these requests on a case-by-case basis by taking into consideration whether there are privacy or confidentiality interests, ongoing investigations or pending litigation, or other circumstances that make public disclosure impractical or unfair to interested parties."



"Have you anything to say on the back wall?" enquired auctioneer Simon Kerins of Anthony Stroud, who had also been in the fray, but no answer came the stern reply, and the chestnut (Lot 182) was hammered down to Washbourn to his delighted cry of "I love Tatts, it's theatre!"

Compared to the ducking and diving of certain bidders, Washbourn is a breath of fresh air, and his style is certainly unconventional. He jumped up the price for the colt from Richard Hannon's final bid of 170,000gns straight to 200,000gns, much to the bemusement and/or amusement of those gathered in the gangway to watch his progression.



Washbourn Lands Top Lot, cont.

Washbourn then delighted in telling the gathered press corps how he is going to "smash Coolmore up the Ascot straight. Boof, boof, boof!"

Bred by Michael O'Leary of Gigginstown House Stud, the son of the Dubawi (Ire) mare Narak (GB), who is a daughter of Group 1 winner Chachamaidee (Ire) (Footstepsinthesand {GB}), had been withdrawn from October Book 1 but returned here to steal the show in a manner which those present will be unlikely to forget in a hurry.

Washbourn continued, "This particular sale is amazing value for money, because occasionally you get Book 1 rejects and the most important thing is understanding why they have been rejected.

"These Pinatubos look like middle-weight fighters and this thing will be smashing Coolmore up the Ascot straight. I thought I might not be able to get him because Laura, my lovely girlfriend, was supposed to be keeping me under control, but I lost the plot and bought a Mohaather."

Washbourn, whose horses are trained at Coombelands in Sussex by David Menuisier, enjoyed notable success with the G2 York S. winner Thundering Blue (Exchange Rate), and this year he has been represented by his homebred Caius Chorister (GB) (Golden Horn {GB}), who won last month's G3 Prix Belle de Nuit, and G1 Kameko Futurity Trophy runner-up Devil's Point (Ire) (New Bay {GB}).

He said, "I'm a small, insignificant owner who has had seven or eight group winners. I have a brilliant pedigree man, and I then have my own rules, and I have a brilliant trainer. Physically, this colt was for us a four-star rating. He's as near to Thundering Blue as we've ever had, so that was it, number one target."

He added, "I think I probably overpaid. I had a rush of blood. I've probably been a complete idiot but I wanted this horse."

"If anyone is ever going to train a Group 1 winner for me, it's David. I love David, he's a real horseman. What a finish he's had to the season, with Caius, and Devil's and [Group 1 winner] Sunway."

Final Stop, Tattersalls

This was the last stop on the yearling sales circuit for 2023 and, along with the lively finale provided by Mr Washbourn, the sale added a little footnote to bloodstock history with the offering of the final yearling by Galileo (Ire) at public auction.

Lot 171, bred by Coolmore and consigned by Castlebridge, caught the attention of many but the duo that is taking him home is known professionally as Glending Stables and more

personally as Roderic Kavanagh and Cormac O'Flynn.

"He looks like a fast Galileo. Physically he's very nice and hopefully he gallops the way he walks because he's a great mover," said Kavanagh after signing the ticket for the son of Listed winner Manderley (Ire) (Clodovil {Ire}) at 125,000gns.

"We've a similar number [of breezers] for next year and we waited all day for him. We'll get to work now."

Lot 171 - the final Galileo yearling to be offered at public auction Tattersalls

Manderley was trained by Richard Hannon to finish fourth in the 1,000 Guineas, and the sister to Group 2 winner Gregorian (Ire) is also the dam of last season's Listed Prix de la Seine winner Hidden Dimples (Ire) (Frankel {GB}).

A record number of six-figure lots for the December Yearling Sale -- 13 in total -- led to a record average of 37,330gns, which was up by 8% on last year's trade. Turnover was also up, by 6%, to 4,778,200gns, and the median dropped by 9% to 20,000gns. At 79%, the clearance rate was also down slightly on last year.

RP Racing, which has had an extraordinary season on the racetrack thanks to the outstanding GI Breeders' Cup

Breeder Lord Margadale has enjoyed plenty of success already with the 12-year-old mare Frangipanni (Ire) (Dansili {GB}) and the sale of her Showcasing (GB) colt for 170,000gns helped to

brighten an otherwise gloomy day considerably.

Twice a winner for Lady
Rothschild, Frangipanni, a daughter
of the G1 July Cup winner Frizzante
(GB) (Efisio {GB}), was bought for
the Lord Margadale by Anthony
Stroud at the July Sale of 2014, and
it was Stroud who returned to buy
her yearling for an undisclosed
client. Last year, the mare's Dubawi
colt had been one of the highlights
of October Book 1 when sold for 1

million gns to John Dance's Manor House Farm. Frangipanni's first foal, Tropbeau (GB), is also by Showcasing and won the G2 Prix du Calvados among her three group wins for Andre Fabre, as well as finishing runner-up in the G1 Prix Maurice de Gheest. Another of her offspring, Toussarok (GB) (Iffraaj {GB}), won six of his 44 starts for Mark Johnston.

"[The family] has been very good to us. We're over the moon, but if he'd been a filly he wouldn't be here," said Lord Margadale. "The only filly she has ever had is Tropbeau.

"[The yearling] has always been a lovely horse from the word go, and it's great that the mare has produced another really lovely horse by Showcasing. He's a little bit smaller than Tropbeau but slightly sharper looking."

Frangipanni's colt foal by Zoustar (Aus) is catalogued as lot 773 in Friday's sale and is also consigned by Folland-Bowen Bloodstock, the operation run by Natalie Folland and Matt Bowen and based at Lord Margadale's Fonthill Stud in Wiltshire.

He added of the 12-year-old mare, "She is having a year out but she is going back to another Whitsbury Manor Stud stallion next year, Havana Grey, because pace is really her thing." Stroud confirmed that the Showcasing colt would follow his elder sister, a graduate of the Arqana Breeze-up Sale, to Andre Fabre's Chantilly stable.

Lord Margadale added, "Hopefully he'll have fun with him and this time round he'll have him from the word go because he won't have breezed.

"People told me that he was one of the two nicest horses in the sale, but I wouldn't know, and obviously he was going to be the apple of my eye."

"I was hoping he might make around about the 150-mark. Last year when we sold the half-brother by Dubawi he stuck at around 140 for about three minutes, and I was thinking 'Oh Jesus.'

"Unfortunately, because he was bought by John Dance, we don't really know what has happened to him, which is worrying, but I am told that he's a nice horse and that he's grown a bit, so he may not have run this year anyway." **Cont.**



Sea The Stars Trio in Top Ten

The December yearling catalogue always includes a number of well-bred horses who have missed earlier engagements for a variety of reasons. That was true of the Sea The Stars (Ire) colt offered early in the session as Lot 9 by WH Bloodstock. Bred by The Lavington Stud, the son of Listed winner Pirouette (GB) (Pivotal {GB}) was withdrawn from October Book 2 but this time around sold for 150,000gns to trainer James Tate on behalf of Rabbah Bloodstock.

Eddie O'Leary's Lynn Lodge Stud draft was another to offer a colt by the Aga Khan Studs stallion, and Lot 95, from the family of Classic-winning fillies Minding (Ire), Tuesday (Ire) and Empress Josephine (Ire), will be heading into training for Simon Taplin. The owner of Norman Court Stud in Wiltshire bid 120,000gns for the colt out of Contemptuous (Ire) (Danehill Dancer {Ire}), an unraced sister to the G1 Coronation S. winner Lillie Langtry (Ire).

"I usually buy fillies, but we have had a good year and we are looking to get the stud further forward and he took my eye yesterday," Taplin said. "My trainers are going to be fighting over him."

Those trainers include Jack Channon, Clive Cox and Eve Johnson-Houghton, with the latter being the trainer of the juvenile Mister Sketch (GB) (Territories {Ire}), who was bred by Taplin and sold privately to Wathnan Racing after winning a





TIMEFORM AWARDS EQUINOX NEW HIGH OF 136

The long-awaited appearance of **Equinox (Jpn)** (Kitasan Black {Jpn}) in Sunday's G1 Japan Cup did not disappoint and his four-length victory over the fillies' Triple Crown winner **Liberty Island (Jpn)** (Duramente {Jpn}) was deemed to be a career-best performance by the assessors at Timeform.

Already rated the best horse in the world, his previous mark of 135 has been raised to 136, which rates him 3lb ahead of G1 Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe winner Ace Impact (Ire) (Cracksman {GB}), who has recently been retired to Haras de Beaumont.

"Equinox confirmed his status as the leading horse in the world with an exceptional performance to win the Japan Cup in Tokyo on Sunday," said Timeform's Flat editor David Johnson.

"The full package." That's how consignor Tom Blain of Barton Sales describes Teona (Ire) (Sea The Stars {Ire}) and it is hard to disagree that the five-year-old has everything a breeder would look for when attempting to buy a first-class breeding prospect.

A winner of one of the key middle-distance tests for top-class fillies in the G1 Prix Vermeille, she is also out of a Group 1 winner, the Pretty Polly S. victrix Ambivalent (Ire) (Authorized {Ire}), with mother and daughter both being by outstanding Derby winners.

The cherry on the top for Teona is that she is being sold in foal for the first time to none other than Frankel (GB). Her resultant foal is thus bred on the same cross as G1 Grand Prix de Paris winner and new sire Onesto (Ire).

Trained, like her dam, by Roger Varian in the colours of Ali Saeed, Teona was a winner at two and progressed throughout her three-year-old season to add the Listed August S. and Prix Vermeille to her tally of wins, before bowing out with a third-placed finish in the GI Breeders' Cup Turf.

Blain adds, "Ever since she got here, she's been very straightforward. She's like a lot of the good fillies in that she knows what she wants. She marches around the place like she owns it. But she's very good looking, she's got a very good action, she's very correct, she's a good size. She's the full package."

The Sceptre Sessions were introduced to the Tattersalls December Mares Sale for the first time last year as a way to showcase the potential jewels of the four-day sale. Last year, almost 46 million gns - more than half of the total turnover of the mares sale - was spent on 71 lots, led of course by Alcohol Free (Ire) (No Nay Never) at 5.4 million gns.

This year, across the Monday and Tuesday early evening sessions at Park Paddocks a total of 83 well-credentialed fillies and mares will be sold under the Sceptre banner.

Blain continues, "When the world descends on Tattersalls in December for the new Sceptre Sessions, that is what people want."

"You want to buy mares from good pedigrees and you can't





get much better than winning Group 1s, and being a Group 1 winner and out of a Group 1 winner."

Of Teona's cover to the champion sire-elect Frankel, he adds, "He's the best stallion in the world at the moment. And the combination of a Frankel cover out of the Sea The Stars mare, for me, is incredibly exciting. I hope everybody else feels the same and comes to try and buy her."

The five-year-old Teona is one of five fillies or mares being consigned by Barton Sales to the Sceptre Sessions, along with the Group 2 winner and Group 1-placed Rogue Millennium (Ire) (Dubawi {Ire}), Group 2-winning juvenile Polly Pott (GB) (Muhaarar {GB}) and Zain Claudette (Ire) (No Nay Never), and the Listed winner Wonderful Times (Ire) (Golden Horn {GB}) from the family of the celebrated matriarch Rafha (GB).

"We've got others like Rogue Millennium who are fantastic racehorses," Blain says. "She is obviously a fantastic race filly. She won the Duke of Cambridge this year at Royal Ascot and she was second in the Irish Champion Stakes, along with a lot of other good performances this year. She's owned by the Rogues Gallery, who are a relatively new racing syndicate, and Tony Elliott, who who heads that up, has done a fantastic job buying these horses, and Tom and Jackie Clover have done a brilliant job with her.

"We've got a nice draft, so I'm really excited, and we can't wait to sell them."

NZB RELEASES NATIONAL YEARLING SALES SERIES CATALOGUES

With the 98th National Yearling Sales Series now just two months away, New Zealand Bloodstock (NZB) on Monday released its catalogues for the six-day sale, which begins on January 28, 2024 at Karaka.

Book 1 boasts 682 yearlings, while Book 2 has 442. These numbers are slightly up on 2023 (644 yearlings in Book 1, 435 in a quality Book 2).

More importantly, NZB's Managing Director Andrew Seabrook said the quality is better than ever.

"I think the stallion strength is the strongest we've seen for a few years. The past 12-24 months... it's certainly the strongest New Zealand stallions have been performing for a number of years," Seabrook told The Thoroughbred Report.



"The number of Australian mares to come over to be served by New Zealand stallions is the highest it's been, and New Zealand mares going to Australia this year was the lowest for a number of years; that signals the stallion strength here in New Zealand.

"We've had strong support from New Zealand breeders this year and I think we've seen fewer horses going offshore."

Over 100 sires are represented, including big guns such as Savabeel, Proisir, I Am Invincible, Snitzel, Justify (USA), Almanzor (Fr), Per Incanto (USA) and Ocean Park (NZ), as well as exciting young stallions like Hello Youmzain (Fr), Circus Maximus (Ire), King Of Comedy, Banquo, Admire Mars (Jpn) and Ancient Spirit (Ger).

"We didn't have any of Satono Aladdin's progeny in the sales this year because of COVID, so it's great to have them back in the book. In fact, Rich Hill Stud is on a bit of a high, as they also have Ace High, who is doing a nice job... Molly Bloom handed him his first Group 1 just recently," Seabrook commented.

"There's a nice crop of first-season sires, including Hello Youmzain and Circus Maximus."

"Per Incanto continues to do a fine job in Australia, New Zealand and Hong Kong, there's plenty of talk around Super Seth, and Contributer had a good sale last week at the Ready to Run Sale."

Coolmore Australia's Tom Magnier confirms the status of the sale as a must-attend event.

"You have to take this Sale seriously every year, because there is always a champion that comes out," Magnier said. "There's nowhere in the world that looks after you like New Zealand, the hospitality is fantastic from every farm. Without a doubt, it is the best week on the sales calendar anywhere in the world."



Favourite moment - racing, sales or breeding-related - for the 2022/23 season?



Jon Freyer: Selling our top-priced yearling of the year, a Snitzel colt at Inglis Easter who is the first foal of a lovely mare, Ms Bad Behavior (\$1,500,000 to Tom Magnier), we stretched to purchase at Fasig-Tipton in 2019 (US\$600,000).

Which sire do you consider a value sire? Fee <\$50k and not a first-season sire.

JF: I think Supido is a definite overachiever. An analysis of his early books indicates he has so far exceeded expectations. A fast horse from a stallion family, I expect his fee will continue to rise.

What young sire (less than three crops) do you think will one day be Champion Sire?

JF: It's early doors but we are confident The Autumn Sun will emerge as a truly top-class stallion capable of providing the complete spectrum of performers, right through to the Classics.

Which yearling purchase in 2023 are you most excited about?

JF: We purchased the top lot at Inglis Easter, a filly by The Autumn Sun from Via Africa (\$1,800,000). She is quite a special filly, and we hold high hopes for her next year.

What, if any, is your greatest current-industry concern?

JF: Racing is primarily funded by gambling and worldwide there is a growing and powerful anti-gambling lobby.

Name an emerging human talent in the industry, and say why?

JF: Adrian Bott has already emerged as a champion trainer in waiting. Well-trained and training well!

If you had \$10 million to invest in an industry initiative, what would it be and why?

JF: I think racing needs to know a great deal more about those it interacts with – participants, punters, customers, fans and opponents. A better understanding of these groups will help us continue to improve everything we offer and, more importantly, make it sustainable in the long term. Data collection is the key.


