National Stud CEO Anna Kerr Launches the Young Professionals Bloodstock Network

The National Stud, like its Irish counterpart, treads a dual pathway in being both a commercial stallion operation and boarding farm as well as a seat of learning. Managing those twin aspects of the business within the wider umbrella of its parent company the Jockey Club means that the plate of chief executive Anna Kerr is already stacked pretty high, but she has recently added to her own inbox through the setting up of the Young Professionals Bloodstock Network.

It is perhaps no surprise that Kerr remains intent on providing something of a nurturing role in the industry as her original brief when joining the National Stud in 2020 as its COO was to oversee its education programme. She took over as CEO in 2023 and it was a conversation with Richard Norris, the Jockey Club's director of racing, which prompted Kerr to organise a Youth Bloodstock Forum in Newmarket earlier this year.

"We wanted it to be very much focused around breeding and ownership," she says. "Eighty per cent of the attendees at the forum were graduates of the National Stud Diploma course, and we invited other young professionals working in the industry, under the age of 40." [Cont. p3](#)

=3. BARROW BOY (IRE)

Bayside Boy (Ire)--Illumined (Ire), by Sea The Moon (Ger)

Timeform performance rating: 92

Trained by Gavin Cromwell, Barrow Boy was a dominant winner of the near-6f maiden run at Navan on May 16, fully confirming the promise of last month's debut when he chased home Tribeca (Blue Point) over the same course and distance. At the line he was over two lengths clear of his closest pursuer, once again doing his best work at the finish in the style of one who ought to stay 7f when the time comes.

In the meantime, Barrow Boy is reportedly being aimed at the Listed Windsor Castle Stakes at Royal Ascot, which will be run over 6f for the first time this year and restricted to juveniles whose sire won at least once over 7f+ at two or 1m+ at three and above. [Cont. p5](#)

"We had the most fantastic kick-off session on the eve of the February Sale. I was blown away by the engagement and the thirst for it," Kerr adds.

"I think that says an awful lot about what is positive about our industry and what bodes very well for the future. Off the back of that, we discussed five different areas, which were about getting started, supporting the process, increasing industry participation, what happens when you don't sell [a foal or yearling], and stallion diversity. From that, we then had a clearer output of themes."

From the initial forum, Kerr has now set up several working groups and has enlisted the support of the Thoroughbred Breeders' Association CEO Naomi Mellor. She says that the team at Tattersalls has offered support and that she is also approaching Goffs.

"It's really looking to those industry leaders about what we, as institutions, can do collectively to create a framework that supports the community of young professionals in our industry," Kerr says.

Two group sessions have taken place this week in Newmarket, with this correspondent allowed to take part despite being neither young nor very professional.

"There's a lot of people above 40 who have an awful lot of input to offer, so it's mixing the two generations together through these working groups, which have been really fascinating. Allowing the space for the conversations is very powerful in itself, and there's a clear concept emerging from those conversations. A smaller working group will work on honing that concept and creating a delivery model to apply for funding."

Some of the conversation has naturally focused around what can be done to encourage more people to become involved in the breeding sector by facilitating a pathway through syndicates and racing clubs. Greater accessibility to shared ownership is a hot topic, allowing as it does not just a more affordable option for people to become directly involved with racehorses but also the advantage of a like-minded social network.

Kerr says, "The core objective for me is in creating the community, the connectivity, and through that, it creates a platform from which young people can be recognised and seen and heard. Through getting to know each other, and that networking and that connection, more opportunities will come."

The Young Professionals Bloodstock Network will be managed by the National Stud while working closely with the TBA and other industry partners.

"We're here to support, introduce and connect," she adds. "But the importance of community is at the core of it, while helping younger members of that community to understand the intricacies of our industry."

"And as part of the network, what the National Stud can do is accessible breeding clubs, young stock clubs, leasing resources, and doing it in an affordable way where it's paying by direct debit instead of needing five or eight grand up front."

One of the attendees of both the initial forum and this week's working group is Lilly Sahla, European marketing manager for Ace Stud, who graduated from the National Stud Diploma course five years ago. Originally employed in the music industry, Sahla says that her introduction to bloodstock came quite by chance when she ended up working at Segenhoe Stud to fulfil the requirements of her visa while travelling in Australia.

"Creating a network for young professionals, breeders and others in the racing industry is incredibly important, and I think this is a brilliant initiative that Anna Kerr and Naomi Mellor are driving forward," she says.

"I found my way into this industry completely by chance and would definitely have benefited from more guidance and support in those early days if I'd known it was available.

"The National Stud Diploma course was a great introduction to the industry for me, but at the time I still felt like I was coming into it all quite blind. It's easy for us to assume that everyone knows everything in this industry, but we need to give younger people the space and confidence to learn without feeling embarrassed or excluded."

Sahla continues, "Over the years I've been lucky to build a great support network around me, including people who became brilliant mentors, like Anna herself, as well as Ross Doyle and Richard Phillips, but making that initial contact can feel daunting. Again, the National Stud course was vital in the early stages of my career because it gave me a strong foundation of friends and colleagues within the industry, but not everyone is fortunate enough to have that opportunity.

"I feel strongly about opening the doors to racing to people from different backgrounds and changing the perception that success only comes if you grew up in the industry. We need to showcase the broad range of jobs and opportunities our world can offer."

It is a mission shared by Kerr, who also worries that the politics of an industry which has its share of potential crises bubbling away in the background can be somewhat draining.

"It's very easy for us all to talk about how awful everything is, and if we look over the lid of the box, things are pretty awful, but actually, there's also an awful lot that's good," she says.

"There's a lot of positive things happening but we need to support those who are going to be here in 20 years' time. we need to make them feel that not all they're hearing is doom. This is the world they love and they've chosen to be a part of and we have a responsibility to the next generation coming through to leave the industry in the best state that we can."

She points to the unique communities that can be found on racecourses all around the world as an example of how the sport can bring people together.

"I worked in Leopardstown for four years, and I'd be going racing and there's the same core group of people who are at pretty much every race meeting. Yes, they're there on their own, but they weren't actually on their own, because it's a race meeting. It's a coming together of people, and it's our secret sauce in a way. A really special thing is that you get to be part of a community of people where the horse brings us together."

Kerr adds, "I say it to our students here that we're so privileged that we get to be at that foaling, that we get to walk down to the stallion shed, and talk to champion sprinters, champion stayers. If you're having a bad day, go and talk to your favourite horse. There is so much that is good, and it's down to us to preserve it as best we can. There are always going to be things that are out of our control, but there are things that are within our control, there are levers that we can pull, and we have to activate them."

Barrow Boy is eligible for the new-look Windsor Castle as a son of the G1 Queen Elizabeth II Stakes winner Bayside Boy, who is going great guns with his first crop in Europe, while his Listed-placed dam has already produced a Royal Ascot winner for these connections in the Listed Chesham Stakes heroine Snellen (Expert Eye).

Illumined herself is a half-sister to the G3 Preis der Winterkonigin winner Night Lagoon (Lagunas), perhaps best known as the dam of the multiple Group 1-winning sire Novellist and Irish Oaks heroine Magical Lagoon (Galileo).

=3. CARRY THE FLAG (IRE)

No Nay Never--Ejaazah (Ire), by Acclamation (GB)

Timeform performance rating: 92

Runner-up to Star Prospect (Starman) at the Curragh last month, Carry The Flag made rather heavy weather of it when getting off the mark at the second attempt at Naas on May 9. Sent off the 30/100 favourite for that 5f maiden, he was pushed along entering the final two furlongs before finally putting his head in front in the dying strides, ultimately getting the verdict by a head from his fast-finishing stablemate, Sun Goddess (*Sioux Nation*).

Nevertheless, the timefigure suggests this was a better performance from Carry The Flag than it might appear at first glance, with the promise of

more to come from him when he steps up to 6f. Bought for €250,000 at Book 1 of the Goffs Orby Yearling Sale, he isn't necessarily bred to stay much further as his dam was Listed-placed over 5f as a juvenile, while his half-sister, Secret Hideaway (*Starspangledbanner*), won last year's Listed Marygate Fillies' Stakes at the same trip.

=3. CONFUCIUS (IRE)

No Nay Never--Millisle (Ire), by Starspangledbanner (Aus)

Timeform performance rating: 92

Having been backed as if defeat was out of the question, Confucius made it a double for the Ballydoyle two-year-olds on that Naas card (May 9) when making all to win the maiden over just shy of 6f. He briefly looked threatened when tackled two furlongs out, but at the line he was going away again, appearing to have plenty in hand as he registered a near-four-length verdict in a 'TDN Rising Star' performance.

An unlucky loser when beaten a nose at the Curragh on April 3, Confucius remains very much a work in progress after just the two starts, but there should be a bigger effort in the locker when the situation demands it, with a step up in grade looking the obvious next step. Certainly, his pedigree is an ongoing recommendation as the third foal out of the G1 Cheveley Park Stakes scorer Millisle, hence his hefty price tag when bought by the Coolmore partners for 1.7 million gns at Book 1 of the Tattersalls October Yearling Sale.

=3. SILENT BEAUTY (IRE)

Night Of Thunder (Ire)--No Speak Alexander (Ire), by Shalaa (Ire)

Timeform performance rating: 92

Another 'TDN Rising Star' performance came from Amo Racing's Silent Beauty when she made a successful debut at Yarmouth on May 13. Sent off the 5/4 favourite for that 6f fillies' maiden, she travelled smoothly throughout and proceeded to

stretch clear in good style after being produced to lead two furlongs out, inflicting a four-length defeat on her seven rivals in the manner of a well above average prospect.

Like Confucius, Silent Beauty is bred in the purple as the second foal out of the G1 Matron Stakes winner No Speak Alexander. Bought for €1 million at Book 1 of the Goffs Orby, she certainly couldn't have made a more promising start to her career and all roads surely now lead to the G3 Albany Stakes at Royal

Ascot, with a step up to 7f promising to suit later in the season.

2. AL HUDAIBA (GB)

Dark Angel (Ire)--A'Shaari (GB), by Dubawi (Ire)

Timeform performance rating: 94

Royal Ascot is also likely to be the next port of call for Al Hudaiba following his debut success at Newmarket on May 15, with the first two from that 6f novice both appealing as very bright prospects for the future.

It was Victorious Forever's Mrair (Mehmas), a £880,000 purchase at the Goffs UK Doncaster Breeze-up Sale, who was sent off the 4/7 favourite, but his inexperience proved his undoing as a very slow start left him with loads to do. [Cont. p6](#)

Al Hudaiba, on the other hand, proved a model professional, just needing to be pushed out in the final furlong to get the verdict by a length and a half from Mrair, who produced a very encouraging effort of his own under the circumstances to pull five lengths clear of the third.

Both Al Hudaiba (94P) and Mrair (89P) have a large 'P' attached to their respective Timeform master ratings to denote that they are open to significant improvement, with a rematch in the G2 Coventry Stakes at Ascot potentially something to look forward to.

The first two-year-old runner of the season for the powerful Charlie Appleby stable, Al Hudaiba is bred to be much more than just a whizz-bang juvenile, too. He is the first foal out of a winning full-sister to the G1 Prix Marcel Boussac and GI Breeders' Cup Filly & Mare Turf heroine Wuheida who, in turn, is out of the G1 Fillies' Mile and GI Yellow Ribbon Stakes scorer Hibaayeb (Singspiel).

1. CUT A DASH (GB)

Starspangledbanner (Aus)--Promising (Ire), by Invincible Spirit (Ire)

Timeform performance rating: 98

Richard Hannon's Cut A Dash must be considered another likely sort for the Coventry following an impressive debut of his own at York on May 13. By far the most immature of the six runners in the preliminaries, including at the start, he nevertheless proved very professional in the event itself and looked a good prospect, sealing it with a turn of foot as he quickened clear under a hands-and-heels ride to win by nearly three lengths.

The timefigure for that 5f novice provides plenty of substance to the form, putting it right up there among the best two-year-old performances we've seen in Britain so far in 2026.

Cut A Dash, who was very much the pick of the field on looks as well, possessing size and substance, should prove just as effective at 6f. All told, the Denford Stud homebred--who is out of the G3 Prestige Stakes runner-up Promising--is not one to underestimate when he tries his luck in deeper waters.

FOREVER YOUNG HEADLINES STRONG PRIX DE L'ARC DE TRIOMPHE ENTRIES FOR JAPAN

Breeders' Cup Classic winner **Forever Young** (Real Steel) spearheads a seven-strong entry from Japan for the 2026 G1 Qatar Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe.

Trained by Yoshito Yahagi, Forever Young became the first Japanese runner to win the Breeders' Cup Classic. He has also won back-to-back editions of the Saudi Cup and boasts career earnings in excess of €25 million. Yahagi has also entered **Shin Emperor** (Siyouni), who was down the field in the 2024 edition of the race.

Byzantine Dream (Epiphaneia) and **Alohi Alii** (Duramente) are also no strangers to ParisLongchamp. In September, Byzantine Dream lifted the G2 Qatar Prix Foy before finishing fifth in the Arc, while Alohi Alii also ran in Europe's richest race last year after winning the G2 Prix Guillaume d'Ornano.

The five-year-old **Meisho Tabaru** has also received an entry. He is a son of Gold Ship, who was a runner in the 2014 edition of the Arc. Last year, Meisho Tabaru won the G1 Takarazuka Kinen, the final event of the Japanese spring season where fans cast votes to determine the runners. [Cont. p7](#)

Another five-year-old is **Admire Terra** (Rey De Oro), who finished third in the G1 Osaka Hai in May. He is trained by Yasuo Tomomichi, who has already saddled Makahiki and Do Deuce in past editions of the Arc.

The Japanese entries also include the three-year-old filly **Juryoku Pierrot**, who is going to run in the G1 Yushun Himba (Japanese Oaks) on Sunday, May 25. She will be partnered by the 22-year-old female jockey Seina Imamura. Juryoku Pierrot is by Orfevre, twice runner-up in the Arc--in 2012 and 2013.

A total of 73 entries, compared to 78 in 2025, were received for the Group 1 that takes place on Sunday, October 4. Last year's winner **Daryz** (**Sea The Stars**), runner-up **Minnie Hauk** (**Frankel**) and third-placed **Sosie** (**Sea The Stars**) have all been entered again in the 2026 renewal.

Potential highlights include an Ardad half-brother to the GIII Cecil B. DeMille Stakes runner-up **Iriseach** (**Ubettabelieveit**), consigned by Hyde Park Stud. **Iriseach** himself is a previous graduate of the breeze-up session, having sold to Sean Davis Racing and GS Bloodstock for 15,000gns in 2025.

KAISER BALL HEADLINES RECORD TRADE AT THE GOFFS UK SPRING HIT/PTP SALE

The six-year-old **Kaiser Ball** (Nom de d'La) (lot 443) took star billing during a record-breaking session of the Goffs UK Spring HIT/PTP Sale on Wednesday when bought by Tom Malone for £360,000.

Last seen finishing third behind the subsequent dual Grade 1 winner King Rasko Grey (Galiway) in a maiden hurdle at Limerick over Christmas, **Kaiser Ball** was sold by Tony Costello of Treannahow Stables, who spoke afterwards of "a day of days".

"I knew he'd sell well," he added. "He's a proper Grade 1 horse with proper Grade 1 form. He ran once in a Fairyhouse bumper for Willie Mullins and he beat a Grade 1 horse [Eachtotheirrown] by seven and a half lengths, and he ran once for me in a Limerick maiden hurdle. I've never trained a winner under Rules, but he finished third behind King Rasko Grey, who was also mine to begin with."

"We gave King Rasko Grey 8lb and we were beaten five lengths. What was a maiden hurdle turned out to be a Grade 1. We took a gamble on bringing Kaiser Ball home and now it's paid off," Costello added.

Malone was clearly determined to secure Kaiser Ball as he took his rivals by surprise by opening the bidding at £100,000 and then quickly countered every other offer made for the horse.

"It's rare a horse like this comes to market," said Malone. "He won a bumper by over seven lengths and there were 140-rated horses everywhere around him in that race. He was third to a Cheltenham Festival winner on his first start over hurdles and hit the line hard that day, and all the horses around him on that day are all rated in the 140s, too.

"He's going to be a high-class black-type horse, if not better, in this country. If he stays sound, he'll end up at Cheltenham next year. To me, considering what some point-to-pointers can make, he's actually good value. It might sound like a silly thing to say, but he is."

Some £7,879,700 was spent at Doncaster on Wednesday, up 47% from last year's corresponding session and a long way in advance of the previous record figure of £6.8 million.

The average of £37,523 represented an 11% increase from 2025, while the clearance rate clocked in at a very healthy 86%. The sale concludes on Thursday, starting at 10am.

HARTY RESORTS TO FIRST PRINCIPLES

Horses long ago tutored Eoin Harty in the kind of coincidences that defy rational explanation, as we'll discover when reaching the story of Well Armed. But losing both parents inside a week, in February, was maybe not quite as bewildering as it may seem. As Harty says himself, after 66 happy years together, perhaps the reason his father followed his mother so quickly was not so much a heart attack, as a broken heart.

As a fifth-generation trainer, Harty owed not just personal but professional formation to his Irish genes. Much of the lore passed down by his father Eddie, the only Olympian also to win the Grand National, will have dated back to "Boss" Harty in the 1880s.

"My dad taught me so many nuances," Harty recalls. "You had to look at everything: their ears, their eyes, the space between their eyes, what shape their head is, how they carry their tail; stuff most people wouldn't even think about."

If horses were his principal bond with his father, if anything Harty had a more elementary affinity with his mother Patricia. "A wonderful person," he says gratefully. "Very quiet lady, but very articulate, with a great sense of humor. She could turn her hand to anything: play an instrument, paint a picture, whip up a dinner. We had an awful lot in common: whenever I went home [to Ireland] we'd spend the whole week sitting at the kitchen table, just talking."

Q&A: RAMON A. DOMINGUEZ ON HIS NEW ROLE HELPING JOCKEYS SUCCEED IN SECOND CAREERS by T.D. Thornton


A three-time Eclipse Award-winning jockey and a member of the National Museum of Racing's Hall of Fame, Ramón A. Domínguez has been retired since 2013, when he suffered a traumatic brain injury in a racing accident. He has since devoted his time to helping causes like the Permanently Disabled Jockeys Fund and New York Race Track Chaplaincy, and he was instrumental in the introduction of the 360 Gentle Touch Riding Crop, a modernized and more humane version of the traditional whip.

After the initial recovery from his accident, Domínguez was devastated about missing the routine and everyday moments that made up his day as a jockey. Initially, he wanted to stay away from the racetrack. But at the urging of his family, he returned, and one visit led to another. "Now I love coming to the track," Domínguez told TDN in a 2019 profile. **Cont. p6**

"The day after her funeral, he was almost bizarrely well, mentally and physically," Harty recalls. "Yet next day, I found him the shadow of the man I'd left a few hours before--and he was dead within the hour. But both had very fulfilling lives. I don't think they were cheated out of anything."

His double bereavement came even as Harty was adjusting to a radical change in his life across the water. Having trained for so many years in California, he had decided to face facts and base his string in Kentucky.

"I made the decision based solely on what was best for my career," he explains. "It's very unfortunate, but looking at all the markers, the writing was on the wall for California. A friend of mine won the Santa Barbara Stakes the other day: an iconic grass race, won by some of the great fillies and mares as a Grade I. Now it's just Listed. When I first went out there, Hollywood Park was getting 30,000-plus, midweek. But only a diehard Californian will be staying out there now, when you can run for three times the purses here. And while I wouldn't say I opened the floodgates, a lot of others have left since, with probably more to come. Even [Bob] Baffert has left town, to a point."

There is a heartening continuity, however, with the return to

training of First Resort (Uncle Mo), last seen winning the GI Kentucky Jockey Club Stakes in November 2024.

"If you have a barn full of talent, you can afford to lose one every now and again," Harty reflects. "But I just don't have that depth. So horses like that are a real godsend, and sorely missed. He had a very small fracture of his hock that refused to heal, but he's back now and looks fantastic. He's matured and I can't wait to get him back going."

Even without his services, Harty has only once accumulated more domestic prize money than he did in 2025: \$2.3 million from just 156 starts, at a win ratio of 19 percent. Others meanwhile thriving include Golden Sunshine (Medaglia d'Oro) and First Resort's half-sister Hen Party (Into Mischief), both fresh from flying finishes for their first graded stakes placings. As already intimated, however, Harty operates on a different plane from the so-called "super trainers" who spread themselves across different time zones. While making no judgment on those programs, or their patrons, Harty would never be comfortable--nor so fulfilled--without routinely having hands on every horse.

"For me, if you want to get the best out of a horse you need that intimate relationship," he says. "You just see so many things, literally from walking round the barn, constantly watching what's going on; those little observations that can make all the difference." **Cont.**

In a career that has transcended many frontiers, migrating to the Midwest actually feels a relatively trifling transition. For a long time, Harty was virtually commuting to Dubai to supervise young stock for Godolphin. Before that, as assistant to Baffert, he handled the third winner of the G1 Dubai World Cup; and later saddled the 14th in his own right. Throughout Harty has maintained an equilibrium between an easygoing personal style and a work ethic that makes him one of few American trainers who reliably attends the yearling sales.

With his longstanding connections to Godolphin, at any given time he might only be housing a couple of dozen horses for other patrons. But he still puts in the legwork, with unfailing enthusiasm. "I love looking at horses, period," he stresses. "And then going back over my notes over the next

couple of years, to see where I dropped the ball! But I learned from the best. Bob didn't start off with the money he has now. He just has an innate feeling for an athlete. He'd just be sitting out there with the cowboys, spot something, jump off that back wall and buy it.

"Thirty Slews was the first horse he bought at the September Sale. He was sweating bullets to find the people to cover the \$30,000, and then he goes and wins the Breeders' Cup Sprint. Then a few years later he's buying Real Quiet for \$17,000. In my opinion, that's what separates him from the rest. And I like to think a little bit of that rubbed off on me. I wouldn't say I have the same eye, but I kept my mouth shut and watched what was getting off that van every year."

Baffert had just 13 horses when Harty began his eight years on the team. It was Silver Charm's 1998 success in Dubai that doubtless drew Godolphin's attention to Baffert's lean, energetic assistant with a bottomless pedigree in the Irish Turf. **Cont.**

"I loved Silver Charm," Harty enthuses. "I loved him because of his humble pedigree. I loved him because of his outlook. He was lazy, only did what he had to do, but did it so well. And he had, not a mean streak, but a macho one--a trait I enjoy. He had three different horses take a shot at him in that long stretch, and saw them off one at a time."

It was in Dubai the following year that Harty met Bill Casner, who sent him four Tiznow juveniles when he opened a public stable. (That first batch included Colonel John, winner of the GI Travers in 2008.) Harty always loved Tiznow: he had been assistant to John Russell when his sire and dam, Cee's Tizzy and Cee's Song, were stabled in adjacent stalls at Hollywood Park, where his wife Kathy galloped them both. And it turned out that Tiznow's 2003 crop included a colt born on what should have been the 24th birthday of Casner's daughter Karri, killed in the Bali nightclub bombing the previous year.

His name was Well Armed, and he seemed to have reached the end of the road when breaking his pelvis. "Everybody's telling Bill that the humane thing to do is to put this horse down," Harty recalls. "But this was his last link to his daughter, this horse born on her birthday. So he brings him back to Texas and rehabs the horse himself."

One day Casner rang and told Harty that he was sending him an old gelding. Everybody would tell him that he was a lost cause, but he wanted Harty to make up his own mind.

"Well, there's varying degrees of lost cause in this business," Harty reflects. "And when you're a trainer, you never know where any horse might take you."

Harty deployed his strongest help to semi-wrestle the horse into 30 days of cantering until one day letting him go from the quarter-pole.

"So :26 would have been ideal," Harty continues. "But by the time he pulls him up, he's done five-eighths in a minute and the outrider's chasing them."

As a 6-year-old, Well Armed won the World Cup by an impossible 14 lengths. Still more impossible, however, had been the way three young women happened to sit alongside Susan Casner and Harty at the midweek party.

"Maybe there are 3,000 people there," Harty recalled. "These

girls sit down and we get talking. And it turned out that they had been traveling with Karri in Bali, and had been the first to alert Bill and Susan that their daughter was potentially a victim. What are the chances of that? You hate to sound zany, but I always think that that was Karri's way of saying, 'Dad, I got this.'"

Doing what he did with a heavy-topped, knock-kneed gelding was miracle enough. It certainly showed that Harty, long confined to educating juveniles, can turn his hand to any type.

Did immersion within a massive project conceivably hold back Harty's career? He scoffs at that suggestion.

"Initially the mandate was that when they turned three, you would turn them over and get a fresh batch," he recalls. "And everybody wanted me to say, 'Oh, it's horrible giving up these horses.' When in reality I loved it. Training 2-year-olds is the greatest part of this business: finding and developing talent, seeing them go on and prove you right or wrong. That first day you worked them, every spring, was like Christmas. And it still feels that way today."

In the end, every horse is a team project--and Harty, unmistakably, is a team player.

"I'm extremely fortunate to train for Godolphin," he says passionately. "Everybody knows their role, nobody's more important than anybody else. You get this real team spirit, and it's nurtured from the top down. You're just glad to be part of it."

Nowadays, of course, he can see the process through anyway.

"I have the best of all possible worlds," Harty agrees. "While I don't have a ton of owners, the ones I have are very good and send me quality horses. If the talent's in there, I have the belief in myself that I'll get it out of them."

Having first arrived as a teenager, Harty feels an eternal debt to Dr. Michael Osborne for opening his horizons.

"I'm not at the end of my career, but I'm closer to the end than the beginning," he says. "And I've just been very, very lucky. I've met some wonderful people in this business, leading to lifetime friendships. And, at the end of the day, I think that's even more important than what races you won or didn't."

"Not only to watch the races, but also to see and visit the people that have become like family."

Last month, Domínguez, now 49, added another project to his inspiring list of advocacy and wellness initiatives: He's the executive director of the newly created **Jockeys' Guild Education Foundation (JGEF)**, which will be dedicated to the educational empowerment of professional riders. Through scholarships, personalized academic guidance, and practical skills training, JGEF will aim to give jockeys tools to build financial security and employment opportunities during and after their riding careers.

TDN recently spoke to Domínguez to learn more about this new role and his vision for JGEF. An edited transcript follows.

TDN: Please start by telling us about the reception JGEF has received from the industry since the Apr. 21 press release announcing its launch.

RD: The one thing we realized is that timing-wise it was difficult just because our announcement coincided with the week leading to the Kentucky Derby. People were like, "Beautiful, great initiative. But let me get back to you after the Derby."

Now that the Derby is behind us, we have a plan to actually go to some racetracks and meet not only with the jockeys to have focus groups and talk about this, but also to talk with different groups within the sport, like the HBPA or other organizations, who ultimately will be able to support this program, or to support us in the process of bringing this to the jockeys.

Right now, we're about to send out a survey to all of the jockeys' rooms. Just with our press release about the program being rolled out, there were a handful of jockeys who reached out via email, saying, "I'm interested, I want to know more." So, that was very good to see.

TDN: What have the jockeys been asking about?

RD: The responses have been really anything from, "I'm definitely interested" to "Tell me more. What options are available?"

For example, we had one jockey who was specifically interested in a job in welding. He wanted to know if there was any way he could take some classes or courses, and our answer is "Yes!" So it's great, because not only there is an interest in doing something, or preparing, in some cases, for a Plan B, but there are some jockeys who already have in mind what is it that they would like to do, and that makes the process easier for us in terms of facilitating the pathway. It's helping our jockeys to discover in what area they'll be able to thrive.

I think if we had to put all the jockeys in one group, I think that overall, they will be able to do very well in something that is hands-on. Because our profession as jockeys is so physically demanding that I think, given the good and the bad, we are really accustomed to thriving in that type of environment where we have to just go, go, go and do things with our hands. So I think that there are many of those types of fields where jockeys will be able to do something great with their hands.

TDN: You've said that when you had to retire because of your injury, it was at first difficult. But then you adopted a mentality of "One chapter is closing in my life, but another is opening." Other jockeys might be contemplating career changes without--thankfully--having to endure a career-ending injury. Are there still parallels to coming up with an effective exit strategy?

RD: Either way, it's not easy. When I retired, I didn't really know exactly what I wanted to do. You have to know that you will be able to overcome that initial, really big, obstacle of coming to terms that you're no longer going to do what you have done for many years that you were really very proud of and that you put your heart and soul into.

There is this separation of an identity that we created. And the process really is different for every jockey. That's because you have to really come to the understanding that you're no longer going to ride.

There can be this [and here Domínguez pauses to choose the right word] "unhealthy" identity with the profession. And that's really easy to understand, because, again, we are just so focused on what we do. But at the same time, it's great when one realizes, "I can do many other things, not just ride horses."

Since my retirement, I have interacted with so many different jockeys who have retired for various reasons. Some of them by their own choice, some of them not. And you do see that with athletes from other sports. **Cont.**

I think it's very consistent to say that no matter what the reason is for one's retirement, when you are an athlete, it is always difficult at first.

But at the end of the day, it's awesome to know that I'm not just limited to riding racehorses. I can do something else. That is the reality. But in theory, it sounds better than in practice, because the other part of the equation, so to speak, is that we feel like we don't have the necessary tools to do something else.

TDN: How do you aim to help jockeys along that path?

RD: The support is so, so key. I received support from my family and friends. And in this case, JGEF will be an extended source of support for the jockeys to be able to decipher what is it that they want to do.

We have an incredible board that I feel so, so good about. Because when we have meetings and Zoom sessions to talk about any topic, I realize that there is this incredible level of experience and expertise outside the sport being offered by people who are successful working with many not-for-profit initiatives, and who have a good understanding and care about our industry.

We have a very amazing team where there will be some positive synergy created that will be able to really be able to maximize our efforts.

I'm so glad that **professor Gabrielle Kuenzli** [the JGEF's academic coordinator, who has done specialized historical research related to Latino jockeys] will be able to help all these jockeys through this process. She's brilliant. She speaks Spanish, which is really helpful.

I think that these conversations will be so valuable, because it's not like, "Okay, this is available to you, take advantage if you want or not." If that was the case, it's going to be a failure. But we're here to really work alongside the jockeys and help them from the beginning to the end.

TDN: If you have your crystal ball fired up, please look into the future and tell me what JGEF will have accomplished a year or two from now.

RD: It's amazing that this opportunity is going to be there for the jockeys. But it comes along with some challenges. This is all new to the jockeys. And it's even new to us who are part of the board managing this organization.

I don't even want to put a number on how many jockeys will take advantage of the program. But it's not going to be huge the first year, because there may be a little bit of doubt as to, "Can I do this?"

Being able to have some success stories, I think that that will have a ripple effect. I do feel very confident that after this first year, there will be some awesome stories that we can share from the successes that we have, when possible. And I say "when possible" because we also want to respect a jockey's confidentiality if they would rather not have their stories publicized.

But at the end of the day, we all will learn from this, and the word will get out about the jockeys who have gone through the programs, who are taking some classes. And I think the second year, most likely, there will be doubling in terms of the jockeys that will be taking advantage of this.

So I'm not really answering the question directly. It's not black-and-white in my opinion. But I do think that having a couple dozen of jockeys taking advantage of this, to me, would be a success.

'SUMMER SHOWDOWN' PURSE FOR GI STEPHEN FOSTER DOUBLED TO \$2 MILLION

The purse for Churchill Downs's marquee race for older horses, the Grade I Stephen Foster on Saturday, June 27, has been doubled from \$1 million to \$2 million, according to a press release from the track on Wednesday.

Billed as the "Summer Showdown," the 45th running of the 1 1/8-mile dirt race for 4-year-olds--which is part of the Breeders' Cup 'Win and You're In' Challenge Series--will be broadcast on NBCSN and Peacock from 4:30-6:30 p.m. (all times Eastern).

Five of the world's elite dirt horses have already expressed interest in running in this year's Stephen Foster: reigning Horse of the Year and 2024 GI Kentucky Derby winner **Sovereignty** (Into Mischief) (10-6-3-0, \$6,079,050) and GI Pennsylvania Derby winner **Baeza (McKinzie)** (10-2-3-3, \$1,717,200) from the barn of trainer Bill Mott; GI Dubai World Cup winner **Magnitude (Not This Time)** (13-7-2-1, \$8,544,365) for trainer Steve Asmussen; and recent GII Oaklawn Handicap winner **White Abarrio** (Race Day) (26-11-3-3, \$8,445,170) and GI Pegasus World Cup winner **Skippylongstocking** (Exaggerator) (38-14-4-7, \$5,893,650) for trainer Saffie Joseph, Jr.

“Stephen Foster Day has grown tremendously over the last several years attracting some of the world's best horses, and this purse boost helps solidify our closing weekend as a must-see premier racing event,” President of Churchill Downs Racetrack Mike Anderson said. “Firmly positioned in late June with lucrative prize money on the line, the Stephen Foster is an ideal summertime race for the best Thoroughbreds to compete at historic Churchill Downs. We truly believe horsemen and women, as well as horse racing fans around the world, will enthusiastically respond to this Summer Showdown.”

All-sources wagering for last year's Stephen Foster Day was an event record \$20.7 million, up \$1.9 million or 10% from the 2024 Stephen Foster card that handled \$18.8 million.

In addition to the two-hour broadcast on NBCSN and Peacock, FanDuel TV will televise the entire Stephen Foster Day program, which features seven stakes events on the 12-race program that begins at 12:45 p.m.

Nominations for the Stephen Foster close Wednesday, June 10. Owners will pay \$20,000 to enter and \$20,000 to start, which equates to 2% of the total purse.

First prize is 53% of the purse--estimated at more than \$1 million--after 1.5% percent is paid to each of the sixth through last place finishers. Second place will receive 22.5%, third at 12.5%, fourth at 7% and fifth at 5%.

LISA LAZARUS JOINS THE TDN WRITERS' ROOM PODCAST PRESENTED BY KEENELAND

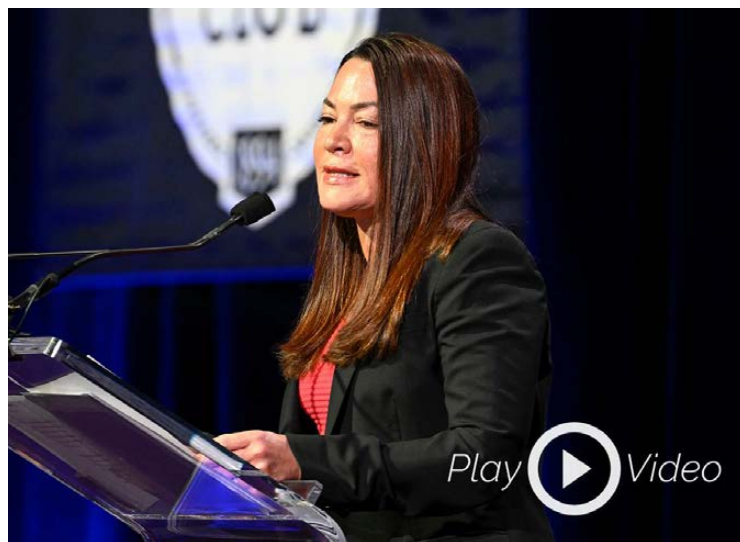
The Horseracing Integrity and Safety Authority (HISA) was back in the news earlier this month when the HISA Board of Directors ruled that there would be no change to the status quo when it came to the rules regarding Lasix. That decision came after HISA commissioned a number of studies to look into the effects of the medication.

To discuss the Lasix decision, another drop in the number of fatalities, the controversies surrounding why so many pre-race vet reviews are leading to scratches, the HERF initiative and more, HISA CEO Lisa Lazarus dropped by this week's *TDN Writers' Room Podcast* presented by **Keeneland**. She was the **Gainesway Guest of the Week**.

Was this a matter of science winning the day?

“One of the things that was so important when we actually appointed people to that committee was that nobody had a political agenda,” Lazarus said. “The goal was, what is the right outcome for the industry? And we've got to do these certain things that are laid out in the statute to answer these questions. So we're going to do our job and take it very seriously. And they did take it very seriously. The science was really interesting.”

Along the way, a conclusion was reached: if the Lasix rules are working, why blow them up? **Cont.**

"The best interest of racing is another component," Lazarus said. "The business, the social license, all of those things are things that have to be considered by the board. So everyone took it extremely seriously, as you can imagine. There was obviously a lot of concern within the industry that this would go away or that wouldn't go away. And ultimately, the board taking all of those factors into consideration felt that the system we had was working and that there was no reason to disturb that system."

In HISA's latest quarterly report, it was announced that the number of fatalities per one-thousand starters had dropped again, and was down to .95.

"When it comes to the fatality rate, we always want to do better," Lazarus said. "Obviously, and with time and with better technology and better data analysis, we will be able to continue the trend. But the number of horses that we lose is not a massive percentage, it's a very small percentage of the overall number of horses that raced. So it's very hard at those numbers to bring the percentage down that dramatically or consistently bring it down that dramatically. So for me, staying around one is a really good benchmark."

The "Fastest Horse of the Week" was Navajo Warrior (**Candy Ride {Arg}**), who earned a 101 Beyer when winning the GIII Pimlico Special. The Fastest Horse of the Week segment is sponsored by **WinStar, which stands the sire Two Phil's**.

Elsewhere on the podcast, which is also sponsored by the **PHBA, 1/ST TV, and West Point Thoroughbreds**, Randy Moss, Bill Finley, and Zoe Cadman reviewed last week's GI Preakness Stakes. On his NBC television gig, Moss picked Napoleon Solo (**Liam's Map**). They also looked at a veteran who is a rising star as Burnham Square (**Liam's Map**) won the GIII Louisville Stakes. The team also delved into Peter Brant's decision to take horses away from Chad Brown and new reports that linked the Ortiz brothers to cockfighting.

The following rulings were reported on HISA's "**rulings**" portal and through the Horseracing Integrity and Welfare Unit (HIWU)'s "**pending**" and "**resolved**" cases portals.

Explainer: Medication violation for the presence of Methocarbamol--a class C controlled substance--in a sample taken from Neck of Cairo, who won at Tampa Bay on 4/10/26.

Explainer: Violation for the breach of rule 3313, the "Use or Attempted Use of a Controlled Medication Substance during the Race Period," pertaining to the horse Bravo Kitten on 2/12/26.

According to the **case resolution**, on February 12 the date Bravo Kitten was entered to run in Race 8 at Tampa Bay Downs, Rodriguez was observed "walking out of the stall of the Covered Horse with an empty dose syringe that had a light buttery yellow color residue inside, and he admitted administering that substance to Bravo Kitten."

Penalty: A fine of \$500; imposition of 1.5 Penalty Points.

According to the [final ruling by an internal adjudication panel](#), Trevino served a seven-day suspension that began on Oct. 22.

On Oct. 27, representatives from HISA and HIWU met Trevino at his Mahoning Valley barn and told him his horse, Fatih, could participate in a race that day as the horse had been entered prior to his period of ineligibility, but that Trevino could not "participate in any activities related to any Covered Horse," according to the IAP ruling.

"Respondent stated that he understood the restrictions and Trainer Ricardo Bailey saddled Fatih for Respondent before the 4th race," the ruling states.

Later that day, however, "Fatih participated in and won the 4th race at Mahoning Valley," and Trevino "retrieved Fatih from the racing surface and accompanied the horse to the Winner's Circle. Respondent participated in the win photo following the 4th race," the final ruling states, thereby breaching the parameters of his suspension.

While the HIWU website lists only Fatih as the "covered horse" in question for this particular sanction, the IAP's final ruling states that Trevino had violated his "period of ineligibility" multiple times during that seven-day period, including with other horses.

Delgado began her tenure in 1983 with Breeders' Cup Limited as a part-time data entry and file clerk before the inaugural running of the Breeders' Cup World Championships in 1984.

Delgado manages the Breeders' Cup racing team, equine security team, veterinary panel and field selection panel. She is also responsible for all horse recruitment and equine event logistics for the annual World Championships, including coordination with all federal, state, and international regulatory authorities. Additionally, she oversees the Breeders' Cup foal and stallion nomination programs worldwide.

Named a Sports Business Journal Game Changer in 2021, Delgado was also the recipient of the Clay Puett Award in 2024.

2027 KENTUCKY DERBY BETTING CHALLENGE TO OFFER \$400K; TWINSPIRES TOUR RETURNS

The Kentucky Derby Betting Challenge (KDBC) will return in 2027 with a record \$400,000 guaranteed prize pool as TwinSpires also unveiled the second season of the TwinSpires Tour, which will award \$50,000 in prizes throughout the year.

The KDBC, scheduled for Kentucky Derby Day on Saturday, May 1, 2027, will feature a guaranteed \$400,000 prize pool following the addition of \$50,000 in seeded cash from TwinSpires. Kentucky Oaks Day on Friday, Apr. 30, 2027, will offer a \$1,000 First Chance/Last Chance KDBC Qualifier with \$25,000 in added cash from TwinSpires.

The 2027 KDBC will mark the third edition of the tournament and will now reduce the minimum number of required races from seven to six.

"We will be adding \$50,000 to the cash prize pool, allowing us to guarantee the prize pool at \$400,000 in its third year," said Darin Zoccali, director of loyalty & retention for TwinSpires. 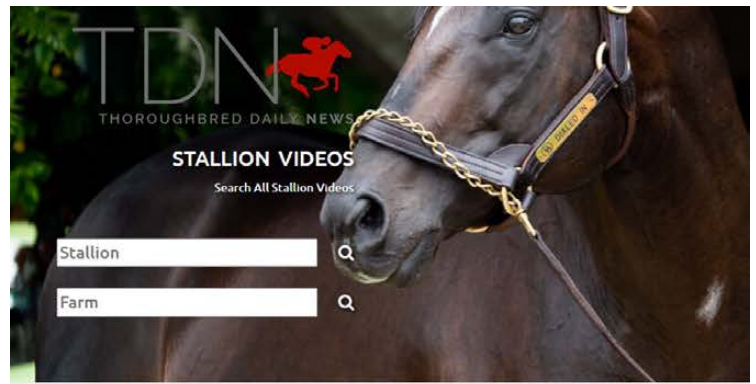
